On January 6 we reprinted the editorial, "I Am A Tired American," from the Rock County Herald, Luverne, Minnesota. Many readers have asked us to reprint it, and we are doing so. Incidentally, since we printed it the editorial has been in many other papers and was put in in the Congressional Record by Rep. Thaddeus J. Dulski of New York.

Here it is again:
I am a tired American. I am tired of being called "The Ugly American." I'm tired of having the world panhandlers use my country as a whipping boy 365 days a year. I am a tired American--weary of having American embassies and information centers stoned, burned, and sacked by mobs operating under orders from dictators who preach peace and breed conflict.

MODELS OF FAMOUS OLD TRAINS AT HERITAGE GARDEN



The era of the early wood-burning steam engine trains are captured in these models made by C. J. Krschke of Houston which are now on display at Heritage Garden in Woodville. The top photo is the model of the first locomotive engine west of the Mississippi, circa about 1853. It ran on the Buffalo Bayou, Brazos and Colorado Railway. It used "coal oil" for fuel. In the center photo is shown the display case at Heritage Garden with Mr. Krschke's train models. The train in the lower part of the case is the famous "The General" of the Western and Atlantic, captured in 1863 by the Yankees and featured in a two-part television episode on Daniel Boone entitled "Andrew's Raiders." In the lower photo is a model of the first fire pump engine in Weimar, Texas, equipped with a triple-tree to be pulled by three fire horses. All models are scaled one inch to one foot, and all parts were individually made and function. The seat in the fire engine is upholstered. (See story below).

Model Trains On Display

Heritage Garden has been presented with scale models of two old-time trains and a model of a famous wood-burning engine which was the first west of the Mississippi River. In addition, a scale model of the first horse-drawn fire engine in Weimar was presented by the same donor, C. J. Krschke of Houston, formerly of Schulerberg. The models are carved of wood, and each part is made separately and is an exact replica. All the trains, for instance, have brakes which actually can be applied. The coaches and engines have couplings and air-brake connections which can be uncoupled as on a regular train. The trains and the fire engine are scaled at one inch to one foot. Incidentally, one of the trains is the famous "The General," which was captured by the Yankees in the Civil War. As a coincidence, the "Daniel Boone" television show last Sunday began a two-part story in which this famous train figures. The second part can be seen next Sunday on channel 4 at 9:30 p.m.

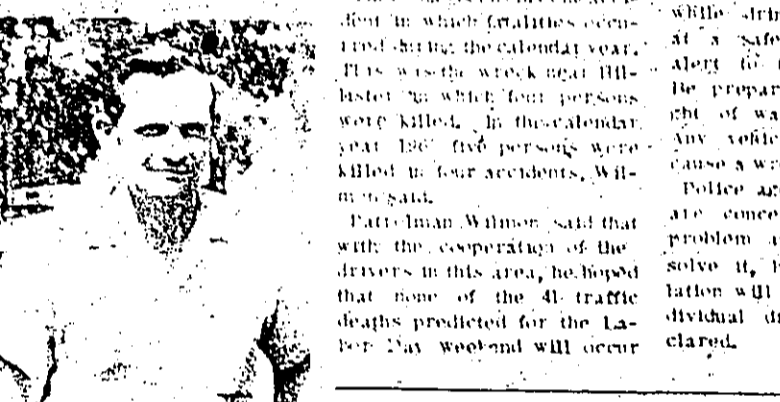
Safe Driving Urged

He stated that 126 people have lost their lives needlessly to date with 3 months remaining in the year. "Last year we lost 129 lives for the entire year. Since July 30, 1966, five wrecks killed 25 people," he said.

With accidents up 50 percent in the Beaumont area, of which Tyler County is a part, drivers are urged to be extra careful and watch out for the other driver's misdeeds over the long last day holiday which will begin Friday night. Patrolman Joe Wilton pointed out that in the fiscal year ending August 31, the local patrol has investigated a total of 123 wrecks. This does not include those which happened in the city limits of Woodville. During this same period, the local patrol has arrested and had convicted in court or by plea of criminal driving while intoxicated cases, and nine other cases are pending in court.

You Bet Your Life

Now the G. I. Bill is back. What would you like to know is can he get a loan on the bill to start him in business? Two or three thousand dollars would help him a great deal.

A—Loans may be made out for the purchase of home or to purchase farms or farm improvements in homes already owned and occupied. Loans may also be made for purchase of property to be used for occupied by the veterans as a home or for farming purposes. The postmaster can help you for an authorized business loan.

Q—Several people have told me that in business a World War II veteran has a right to a marker on his grave site stating he was a veteran. Can I get any information on this matter.

A—Disbursement of veterans benefits is available for an deceased veteran of wartime service. If the veteran was discharged with an honorable discharge and was not a member of any of the veterans' organizations, the discharge certificate should be filed with the county clerk's office. If you are a member of any of the veterans' organizations, the discharge certificate should be filed with the county clerk's office and the organization's records.

WALKING IS GOOD EXERCISE

Take a long walk every day. If you find the time, any sort of walking is good, but a brisk walk is better.

Walking or hiking is an excellent exercise that involves many of the muscles of the body. One of its big advantages is that walking is "universally available" as an exercise nearly every day of the year. The strain of the activity depends on the pace and distance.

Walking can have mental health values, as well as add physical health, if we learn to enjoy the exercise and the open air. Says a pamphlet from the American Medical Association: "Pleasant physical activity can help to reduce mental tension, exercise is most likely to be enjoyable when the activity is done with some purpose."

Like any form of exercise, walking requires a period of gradual conditioning before all-out effort. If you walk outdoors, start slowly with short walks and gradually build up to 15 to 20 minutes, three times a week, and gradually increase to 30 minutes, six times a week. Walking is a low-impact sport and is good for all ages and conditions. It is a safe and enjoyable activity that can be done anywhere and at any time.

TIP FOR OUTDOORSMEN

NYLON SOAP CONTAINER—Drop a bar of soap on the ground at camp and it gets covered with dirt. Eliminate this nuisance by dropping your soap in the toe of an old nylon stocking. Hang the stocking near the wash basin and soap up without removing the bar from the stocking.

Peace Corps To Test On Sept. 10

Woodville area residents interested in putting their skills to use in developing nations will be invited to take the Peace Corps placement test at 9 a.m. on Saturday, September 10, at the post office in Jasper.

The Peace Corps uses the placement test to determine whether an applicant can best be utilized overseas. The test measures general aptitude and the ability to learn a language, not education or achievement. (If test scores indicate a limited language-learning ability, for example, the Peace Corps tries to place the applicant in an English-speaking country.) The placement test requires no preparation and is non-competitive—an applicant can neither pass nor fail.

The application form and placement test is the most important factor in the selection of Volunteers. Persons interested in serving with the Peace Corps must fill out an application, if they have not already done so, and present it to the tester before taking the test. Applications may be obtained from local high schools and churches and from the Peace Corps, Washington, D. C.

The placement test takes about an hour and a half.

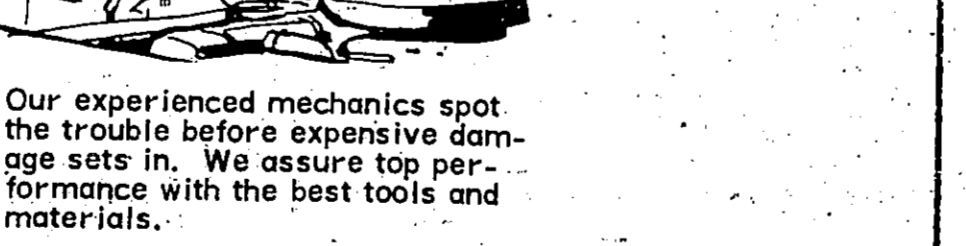

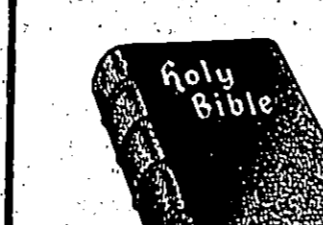
