County Gets By With No Serious Accidents Football Season Opens Friday

The Labor Day weekend which began at midnight Friday and ended at midnight Monday was safe and sane in Tyler County, according to local officers.

Only three minor wrecks and no serious injuries were reported by the Highway Patrol here. The sheriff's department had its usual quota of drunks, about normal for any weekend.

Highway Patrolman Joe Willmon said that only one driver was arrested for driving while intoxicated over the weekend. Traffic was unusually heavy Friday afternoon and by night had become an endless procession of cars from the Beaumont area as residents along the coast look to the road

for a last fling in the great outdoors before schools opened. For the most part they were heading speed limits and driving carefully.

The traffic back toward the coast was scattered over both Sunday and Monday, with the bulk of the traffic Monday night. Again the drivers were more careful than in other parts of the state and nation.

The Texas Department of Public Safety had predicted 11 traffic deaths over the weekend. Late tabulations Monday night put the total at 30, and perhaps some had not been reported.

Over the United States as a whole, the traffic fatalities topped up a new reported 37,700.
