

The Great Society is toting along but it's leaving the breadwinners behind.

Inflation seems to be like the weather. Everybody is talking about it but nobody does anything about it. Unlike the weather, inflation can be curbed if the authorities in Washington will admit it exists.

The ordinary working man can tell LBJ that there is inflation, and that it is reaching a dangerous level. The price of everything is going up, up, up. LBJ may not realize it, but a No. 4 paper sack will now hold \$10 worth of groceries.

Maybe he should check with Lady Bird, and maybe Lady Bird should check with whoever buys the White House groceries.

And while we are using groceries as an example because nearly everybody eats, except newspapermen, we do not mean that only groceries are advancing in price. When you have inflation it's like blowing up a balloon—the whole balloon swells and you can't complain that only part of the balloon is getting bigger. And the balloon can burst if you keep forcing air into it. Just like the economy can burst if inflation is allowed to run rampant. The buyer is effected, the storekeeper is caught in the squeeze, and it becomes a rat race for everybody to try to keep their heads above the rising tide.

Poor old Tyler County is rocking along like the rest of us—dead broke. The county commissioners had to borrow \$18,000 last month to pay current bills. This time they borrowed from the road and bridge funds of precincts one, two and four. At least this doesn't cost the county any interest, but like all loans it will have to be repaid one of these days.

We don't know what the solution will be, but the commissioners will have to face up to the problem soon. The commissioners are caught in the position of having to meet rising costs while the county's income, like the income of individual citizens, is not rising as fast. The trouble is that everybody is after the tax dollar. Uncle Sam gets the big whack first, the schools need their share, the state needs more and more, and the county just gets a nibble, actually, of the total tax dollar.

As an example, the county values land at \$10 and \$11 an acre while the local school district's new valuation is \$28. When the county talks about raising the land valuation, here comes all the land, timber and oil companies with their batteries of lawyers and tax men with the implied threat that if the valuations are raised the companies will go to court. Okay, some people may say, go to court. Well, with a long-drawn out court action and the companies paying nothing on their tax bills the county would soon be out of anything to operate on and whether they can borrow or not to meet expenses for two or three years is a moot question.

Of course, the timber companies say it takes from 20 to 30 years to grow a marketable tree and that if their taxes are raised they will be forced out of business. If you were a county commissioner, what would you do?

It appears from this side of the fence that the land companies, who own most of Tyler County's timberlands, are going to have to give a little so that the county can continue to operate. The companies get the benefit of county government (like the trials of timberlands arsonists last week) and it seems they are going to have to agree to pay a little more.

Awards Banquet Held Here By Area IX Young Farmers

Woodville Plays At Jasper; Warren, Colmesneil Tangle

Tyler County teams enter the second week of the 1966 season with a good record of three wins and one loss. However, the second week may bring different results. Warren, defeated last week by Hemphill, will go to Colmesneil, victor over Chance-Loob last week. One of them will likely be defeated unless a tie results. Chester will entertain Leon and should be in the win column again. Last week the Yellowjackets tied Corrigan, 8-6, but were winners on penetrations. Kirby High of Woodville goes to Jasper, where they will meet the resurging Bulldogs. Last week Jasper played at Nacogdoches, where they finally went under 21 to 0 after fighting a game battle for nearly three quarters. The Dragons wore the Bulldogs down in the last six minutes of the third quarter.

This should be a hard-fought game, and since the Bulldogs came through the Nacogdoches game without injury all their effort to win. Last Friday in the rain and mud at Newton, the Eagles showed good offensive and defensive strength. The Eagles scored in three quarters, once on a 30 yard pass in the first quarter and a 50-yard bomb in the fourth period. They recovered a Newton fumble in the second quarter to set up the other touchdown. In the first period, Eagle Quarterback Steve Oats hit end Curtis Dagle for the 30-yard scoring pass. The wet ground and sloppy field had slowed the Eagle ground game although they ran up 129 yards rushing during the game. Deep in Newton territory in the second quarter, an Eagle fell on a Newton fumble, and Richard Gill carried the ball over from the six. The Eagles scored again in the fourth on a 50-yard pass. The Eagles tried 16 passes in the game and connected on three, but two of them were for pay dirt. They had 90 yards total in the passing department. That old Eagle line, on the alert throughout the game, held Newton to only 16 yards rushing and 16 yards passing for a net total of 32 yards. Each time lost the ball in fumbles, Woodville twice and Newton three times.

Several bears have been seen, and two or three killed, in southeast Texas within the past two years. One was killed near Henderson, another near Daboll, and a recent one in the Vidlar area. The latest bear had a tag in its ear and was identified as one escaping from the Louisiana Wildlife Preserve. THIRD ANNUAL TYLER COUNTY HAY SHOW SET FOR OCTOBER 10; ENTRIES MAY BE MADE NOW, CURRIE SAYS

Tyler County will hold its third Annual Hay Show October 10, at 7 p.m. The location for the hay show will again be at the Colmesneil Community Center. Anyone entering hay in the show this year can carry their hay to their local Agriculture classroom, according to county agent Clinton Currie. The Vocational Ag teachers and FFA departments will be in charge of collecting the hay for the show. The Vocational Ag teachers at the collecting stations are O. L. Marsh, Woodville; Billy Wiggins, Warren; Duane Garner, Spurger; E. C. Hardin, Colmesneil and Joe Glasscock, Chester. Hay may be entered now. The deadline for entering hay in the show will be Wednesday, September 28, 1966. Please contact your Vocational Ag teacher, Currie said. Exhibitors may enter a ball of hay for classification judging in three classes, perennial grasses, annual grasses and legumes. Anyone may enter hay in the show, hay that you raised or purchased, but loose hay will not be accepted. Each entry will be awarded a blue, red or white ribbon if it is scored 50 points or better by the judges. An entry will be disqualified when it contains more than a trace injurious foreign material such as bullet holes, briars, hedge sandbars, poisonous plants, or when it has an objectionable odor or is undecayed, hot, wet, moldy, caked or broken. The hay will be judged on the factors of maturity, texture, leafiness, freedom from non-injurious material, color and protein analysis. The judges for the hay show will be Dr. Neal Pratt, Texas A & M University, Dr. J. L. Sullivan, SFA State College, and Wayne Taylor, Area Farm Management Specialist. Perennial grasses include all Bermuda Grasses, Dallas grasses, Lovegrass, and others. Annual grass includes Sudan Varieties, Sudan Hybrids, Rye-grass, and Johnsongrass. The Laboratory will charge \$2.00 per sample for protein analysis. Hay analysis is the best teaching tool the farmers have in the production of hay, Currie pointed out. The Hay Show is being sponsored by the Agriculture Committee of Tyler County Program Building Committee, Soil Conservation Service Vocational Agriculture Home Administration, Long Leaf SCD. Everyone who is interested in learning more about hay, please attend the Hay Show October 10, at the Colmesneil Community Center.

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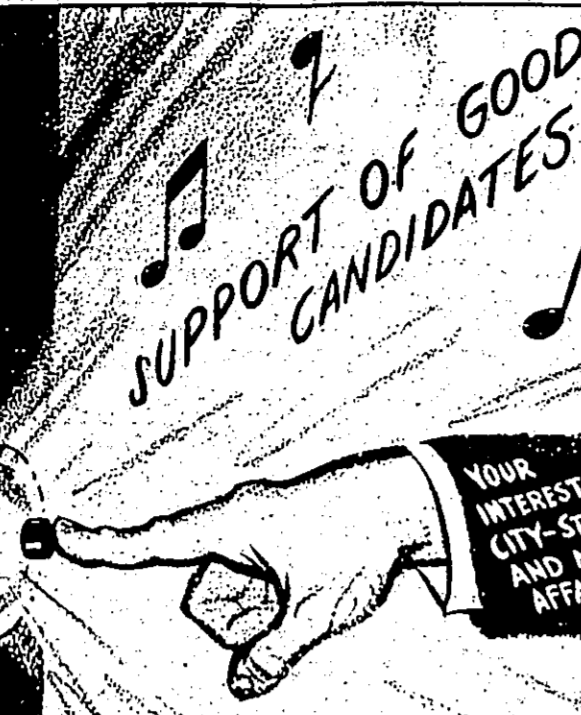

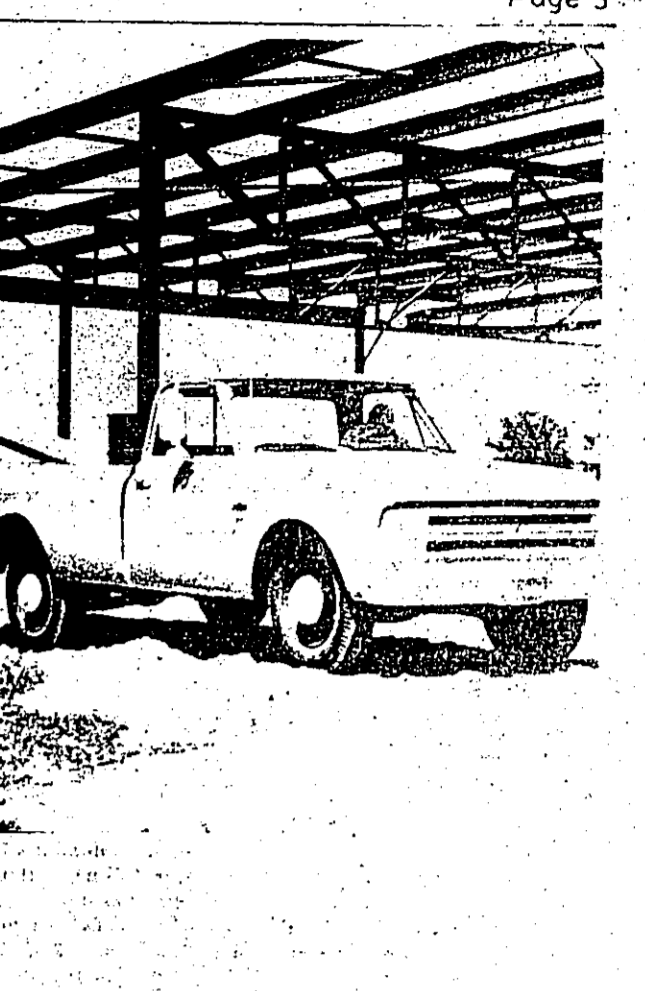

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STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

While most of the state welcomed the touch of cool rains last week, Texas Water Development Board lost all hopes of completing the Texas Water Plan by the time the Legislature opens January 10.

Board will take from four months to a year before it acts on adoption of the preliminary Texas Water Plan due to the scores of suggestions received from a series of river basin hearings.

Approximately 60 Head Start programs are being held up in five Southwestern states because of Congressional delay in approving appropriations for the Office of Economic Opportunity, Regional CES Director Bill Crook reports.

Texas Water Rights Commission has approved an amendment to the permit held by Trinity River Authority and the City of Houston which would nearly triple the storage capacity of the proposed Wallingford Reservoir.

Richard Preston, a water development board geologist, will conduct the study, which will begin with an inventory

and are personally inspecting state institutions, accounting themselves with operations and needs throughout the state.

Group began surveys in the Dallas and Denton areas last week. Next they plan to go to Huntsville, Texas, A. & M. University and Waco.

Page Keeton, dean of the University of Texas School of Law, strongly urges a complete reorganization of Texas' 110-year-old penal code.

Keeton said the penal code had undergone "intermittent patching" through the years "without reference to the principle of maintaining a consistent system."

Keeton recommends complete revision of the laws, rather than "piecemeal" revision.

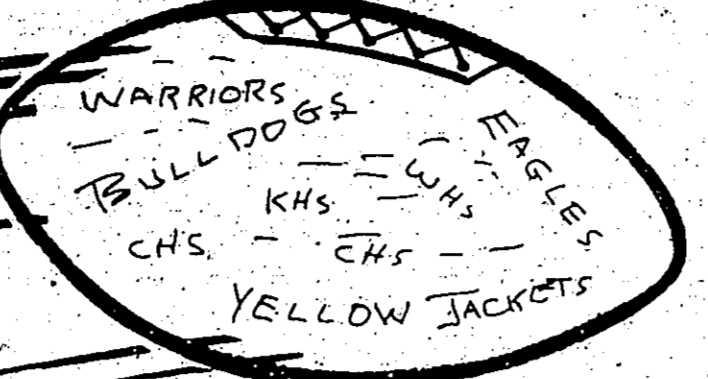

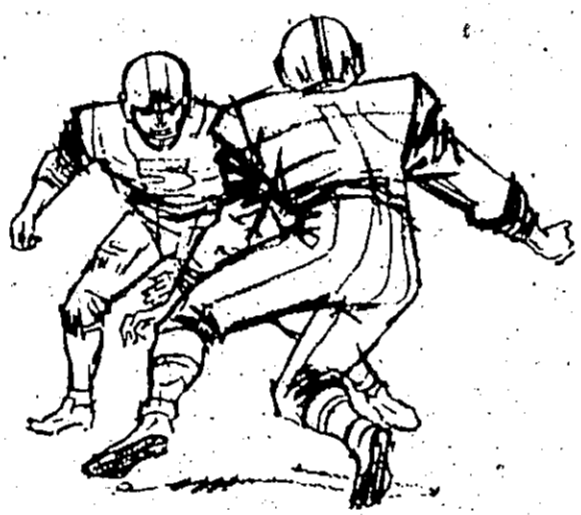

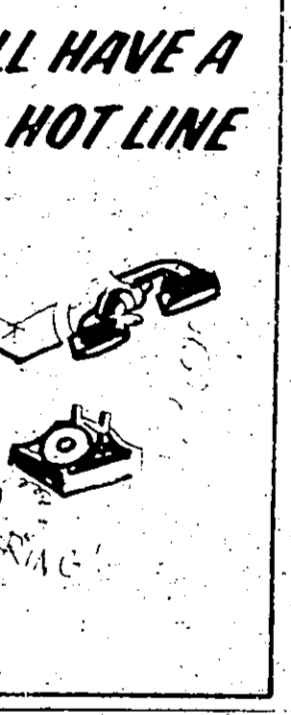
