There is a tremendous interest in the customs, traditions, and way of life which is our inheritance from the past generations. In Texas, especially, this has resulted in the establishment of many small museums to preserve the records and historically significant articles of the yesteryears.

Texas now has 243 museums with 60 new ones being built. This reflects the growing pride of counties and communities in local heritage. It also creates a great need for some guidance and training in museum operation, which is the purpose of the first Texas Institute for Small Museums.

There is a vital need for the county and community museum to preserve local historical articles, many of which have already been lost forever. Each community and each county has a heritage to preserve for future generations. We are the heirs of those who pushed westward to open new frontiers, to create new states, new counties, new towns, new communities in a raw country.

As they pushed forward into the wilderness, the early settlers brought customs and traditions from their former homes and tools to carve a new home in the vast expanse of territory that became Texas. Here in a new environment customs and implements underwent a change to meet new conditions, and new traditions were born.

This, then, is why it is so important to preserve the local historical documents, the many items of household use and the tools of trade of the pioneers.

And that is why every community should have a museum of some kind. For anything which is useful in preserving the heritage of the community should not be lost to future generations of that community. History is a mirror panorama of life of a time, and as you read this, yesterday in history, even this morning our own life and times is being added to the shadowy archives that will leave our heritage to some distant generation.

In many cases the immediate heirs of past generations have not preserved the artifacts that are museum pieces now. The younger generation creates or alters and often disposes of the family articles which were in common use by the past generation.

We hope that with the revived interest each community or county can preserve many things of historical significance. We owe it to the future generation just as we have indebted to those who have made this a great state and country.

We welcome home Gov. and Mrs. Allan Shivers, too, and wish to join with Tyler County in expressing appreciation for the library and museum which bears his name.

The Shivers family heritage is interwoven with that of the county, and we can hope that the Allan Shivers family will always have a warm a spot in their hearts for Tyler County as the people of the county feel for them.

Mrs. Mooney, County Agent To Receive Award For Service

Mrs. Maurine J. Mooney, Tyler County home demonstration agent for the past 11 years, today was among five Texans named to receive the Distinguished Service Award for 1966. It is the highest honor given by the National Association of Extension Home Economists.

Other Texas winners are Mrs. Madeline Kohndorff of Kingsville, Kleberg County home demonstration agent; Mrs. Ruth Shugrine of Martin, Falls County home demonstration agent; Mrs. Selma Harman, Wharton County home demonstration agent at Wharton; and Mrs. Lorely V. Talbot, Waco, associate county home demonstration agent for McLennan County.

Awards will be presented to Mrs. Mooney and other winners at the National Association of Extension Home Economists annual meeting in Las Vegas, Oct. 27-29. Mrs. Mooney has had a leadership role in working with local citizens to improve nutrition habits of first grade students in Woodville and other schools of Tyler County.

The educational program, which began in the fall of 1963, has spread to all schools of the county in 1966, and involved scores of leaders, parents, and students. Other counties now are duplicating some of the teaching methods used in the Tyler County nutrition program.

Besides the outstanding leadership work done by Mrs. Mooney in helping to overcome nutritional poverty of various age groups in her county, the busy home demonstration agent has assisted with other civic projects.

Through the County Program Building Committee, she has helped sponsor many tourism activities in Tyler County, one of the most scenic areas of the state. She has been invited to present programs and demonstrations to many civic and service clubs as well as home demonstration clubs of the county.

Mrs. Mooney, long interested in using native shrubs such as redbud and dogwood for yard beautification projects, has helped create interest and enthusiasm in this project on the part of many homeowners.

The home demonstration agent also has worked closely with the local Committee on Aging, and in community improvement projects in the Colmesneil Community in Tyler County.

Under her leadership, the county has developed a highly effective Adult 4-H Leader Association. Junior 4-H Leaders also assist Mrs. Mooney with the youth project work of the county.

Mrs. Mooney has been with the Texas A & M Agricultural Extension Service for the past decade and formerly lauded home economists in Christine and Gollad schools before beginning her career as a county home demonstration agent.

She is a member of the Texas and American Home Economists Association, the National Association of Extension Home Economists and the County Home Demonstration Agents' Association of Texas. She served as secretary of the area association, active in church work for many years. Mrs. Mooney has taught both adult and youth Sunday School classes. She is a member of the Women's Reading Club, the Board of the American Cancer Society, and the Tyler County Hospital Auxiliary.

Mrs. Mooney has a B.S. degree in home economics from Southwest Texas State College, and has done graduate work at Texas A & M University. She is married to Allan Mooney, an attorney in Woodville.

SHIVERS PLAQUE DEDICATION SET AT 11 SATURDAY

Governor John Connally will dedicate a statesman plaque honoring former Governor Allan Shivers and will also dedicate the Allan Shivers Library and Museum here Saturday.

The statesman plaque is the second issued by the Texas State Historical Survey Committee. The first honored former Governor W. P. Hobby and was dedicated at Moscow in 1964.

Governor and Mrs. Connally and Mr. and Mrs. Allan Shivers and family will be guests at a coffee in the Shivers Museum patio at 10:30 a.m. to which the public is invited.

Mr. and Mrs. Shivers were in Woodville this past weekend making some additions to the museum displays and preparing for the dedication ceremonies.

Governor and Mrs. Connally will arrive at the Tyler County Airport Saturday at 10 a.m. The public is invited to the airport to greet the governor and first lady of Texas upon their arrival.

The dedication ceremonies will begin promptly at 11 a.m. Saturday.

Among those who will be here for the dedication are justices of the Supreme Court of Texas and dignitaries from the Southeast Texas area.

Governor Connally will also address the luncheon meeting of the Texas Institute For Small Museums, which will be in session here at the time.

WORKSHOPS TO BE HELD FRIDAY AND SATURDAY

The first Texas Institute for Small Museums which will be held at Dogwood Motor Hotel here Friday afternoon through Sunday will be attended by over 200 persons from throughout the state, advance registrations indicate.

Registration for the institute will begin at 2 p.m. Friday and the first workshop is scheduled for 4 p.m. It will be conducted by Frank Taylor, director of the U. S. National Museum of the Smithsonian Institution, Washington, and will be on the importance of the small museum, its functions and exhibits.

The dinner meeting at 7 p.m. on Friday will discuss the role of small museums in preserving Texas history. The Texas State Historical Survey Committee and the University of Texas Research in Texas History Department, Entertainment Center, will be the main speakers.

Miss Tyler County, accompanied by Mrs. Laurel Reese, will be the main speaker at the Saturday morning sessions which will include a discussion by John E. Austin, director of exhibits of the U. S. National Museum, and on general exhibit techniques. Mrs. Helen Boyd, accession registrar at the Fort Worth Children's Museum, will talk on how to acquire and properly handle collections.

The institute will recess at 12:30 p.m. Those attending to go to the Allan Shivers Memorial Museum and Library, where a statesman historical marker honoring former Governor Allan Shivers, will be dedicated by Governor John Connally at 1:00 p.m.

The afternoon session on Helmut Naeffler, executive director of the Fort Worth Children's Museum, will discuss methods of soliciting funds for museum maintenance and operation, proper inventory management, and how to receive donations of goods instead of money. This will be followed by a workshop with the faculty members serving as panelists.

On Saturday, those attending the institute will go to one of the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation Museum, a half-acre and tribal dances.

Some morning at 8:00 a tribal non-dramatized traditional music service will be held at the Dogwood Amphitheatre at the Woodville school campus. Following the services, the group will go to the Tyler County courthouse for dedication of a historical marker for Tyler County by Truett Lattimer, executive director of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee.

A tour of Heritage Garden at the west city limits will follow. "Old-time music" on the violin and guitar will feature Earl Matthews and Arlin Mathis. The group will go on to the Kirby Memorial Museum at Peach Tree Village near Chester where a basket lunch will be served on the museum lawn.

At 1:30 p.m., the Kirby Museum dedication ceremonies will begin. Speaker will be A. M. Pate, Jr., director of Texas State Historical Survey Committee, Josiah Wheat, Woodville attorney, will be master of ceremonies.

The public is invited to attend the Kirby Museum luncheon and dedication services. Local people attending are asked to bring a basket lunch.

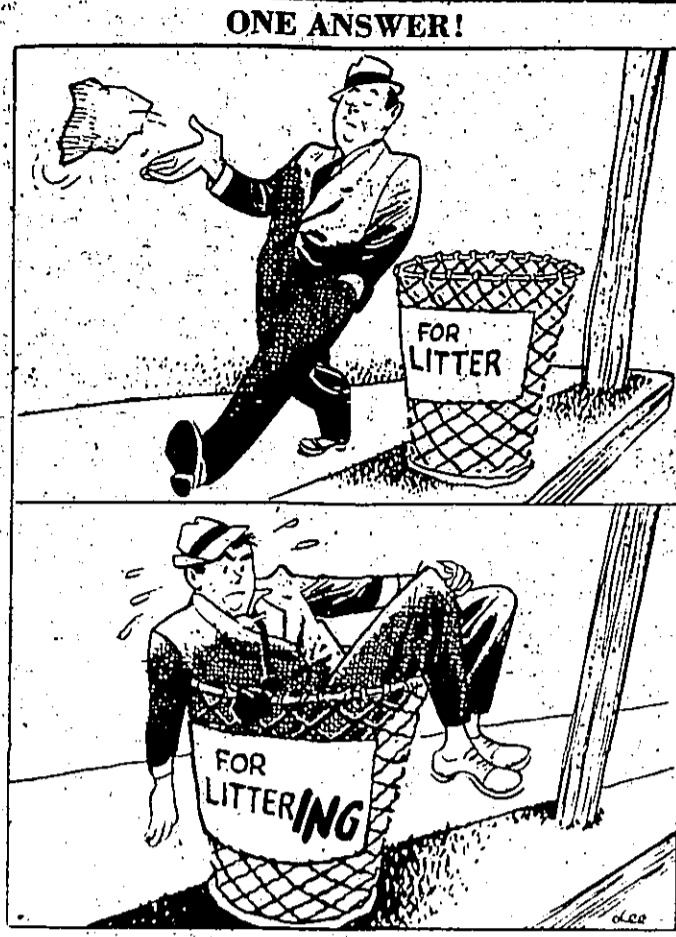

Health and Safety Tips

How can I know and family and friends and family? Are they just not talking loud enough for you to hear them? The chances are that the others are still the same, it's just that your hearing is becoming faulty. Do you notice someone in the family or a close friend who is often asking you to repeat words or sentences? Even when you are reasonably certain that you spoke distinctly? Perhaps this person is suffering a hearing loss. Your physician may find that the hearing loss is due to impacted wax in the ear canal or some other obstruction. He can block the transmission of vibrations inside the ear or affect the nerves of hearing. Certainly drugs and industrial chemicals can affect hearing. Mumps or scarlet fever, a cold or acute sinusitis, development of a swelling of the mucous membrane associated with the ear, a very loud noise or sharp blow may damage the eardrum. The physician can determine by a variety of tests whether loss of hearing is due to nerve damage or to an interference with the transmission of sound waves. If there is obstruction he can tell whether it is due to infection or another cause. He will determine what treatment will help or correct hearing problems. Several surgical procedures are used to help the deaf to hear, and there are also medical treatments. In many cases, however, treatment cannot restore hearing, and a hearing aid may be prescribed. There are many types of hearing aids on the market. Your physician will advise you in fitting the aid that gives best results for you. Or he may advise you that a hearing aid will be of little or no help in your case. In cases of severe hearing loss, it is frequently necessary to complement a hearing aid with lip reading to secure maximum communication. Most larger communities and many small ones today have therapists qualified to give instruction in lip reading. Your physician can help you find out. Many hard of hearing people find that they already are lip reading to some extent without realizing it.

By: Rep. John Dowdy Public works appropriations. The House of Representatives passed the 1967 Public Works Appropriations Bill a few days ago, and it is now pending in the Senate. Included in this bill are appropriations for construction, planning and investigations on the Trinity, Lytle, Neches and San Jacinto river basins. This assures that continued progress will be made toward the development of these river basins during the present (1967) fiscal year. All of these are Army Corps of Engineers projects. Reserve Forces Bill. The House passed a bill to strengthen the Reserve components of the armed forces. Among other provisions, it requires that personnel on the Reserve enlistment program after July 1, 1966, be sent a notice for training which includes the Reserve enlistment program. The bill gives the President, under certain conditions, the authority to call to active duty members of the Reserve who have not satisfied their Reserve military obligation. It also gives the President, after notifying Congress, temporary authority until July 1, 1968, to order to active duty certain members of the Reserve who have not satisfied the training requirements.
