Woodville was the proud and happy host city to the very first Texas Institute for Small Museums, held on September 30, October 1-2, of last week. This was sponsored and directed by officials of the State Historical Survey committee, deeply interested in preservation and conservation of historical places, papers, documents and individual persons who pioneered Texas progress and culture more than a hundred years ago.

And it is fitting and heartening that the descendants of these pioneers are carrying on the ideas and ideals of those who took the first steps to make Texas the great state that it is today. The high points of the three day session were the workshops, or seminars, conducted by such eminent scholars and specialists as Dr. Frank Taylor, director of the Smithsonian Institution, Director of the U. S. National Museum, Washington, D.C., Dr. Joe Franz, director of University of Texas Research in Texas History Department, Austin, Texas, Dr. John E. Anglin, Director of Exhibits of the National Museum, Mrs. Helen Boyd, accession registrar of the Fort Worth Children's Museum, and Dr. Helmut Naumer, director of the Institution. Other prominent speakers conducted question and answer sessions. Every session was crammed with interest and instructive directions for the setting up and operation of museums, both large and small, and how to best acquire the materials and the media for preserving such for posterity. But aside from these valuable study courses, the big events of the week were three dedications, the unveiling of three historical markers, the participation in these ceremonies by Governor John Connally and ex-governor Allan Shivers and other noted Texas persons. The entertainment features of the three day session were varied. Our Miss Tyler County, Miss Judy Pavla, pleased the audience by singing several numbers, accompanied by Mrs. Lionel Reese, and at Heritage Gardens old time music was furnished by Earl Mathews and Arlin Mathis, with violin and guitar. A most enjoyable feature was the tour to the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation where the fascinating tribal dances were part of the program, all dressed in their typical deer-skin garments, and gorgeous feathered head-dresses. The large museum was a great point of interest, with its hundreds of lovely handcraft articles, baskets, leather and bead work, and large showcase filled with articles and documents of their past life. Here the virgin pines, threaded thru with natural trails, gives a glimpse of this remnant of the Forest Primeval, the Big Thicket. Here a marvelous barbecue supper was served, that would have done credit to Lady Bird Johnson herself. On Sunday morning a non-denominational service was held in the Dogwood amphitheater, and following this a historical marker was unveiled and the dedication service on the courthouse lawn conducted by Truett Latimer, executive director of the State Historical Survey Committee. Mr. Latimer was over-all supervisor of the entire session.

The last event was dedicating a historical marker at the John Henry Kirby Chapel at old Peach Tree Village. This service was conducted by attorney Josiah Wheat, of Woodville, and his father, James E. Wheat, father and originator of our now famous Dogwood festival. A brief talk was made by Jim Wiley, a faithful old helper and friend of John Henry Kirby since early boyhood. Barbecue was also served at this time, in addition to a sumptuous old time "dinner on the ground" reminiscent of old Camp Meeting days. The food was abundant and delicious, fried chicken, salads, vegetables, pies and cakes. It was a wonderful occasion for Woodville.

## Dedications Honor Shivers

Tribute was paid Allan Shivers as one of Texas' most progressive governors by Governor John Connally at the dedication of the Texas Statesman Marker and the Allan Shivers Library and Museum here Saturday.

The governor said that Shivers was author of the state old-age pension law, that he upgraded education, made great improvements in the state prison system, hospitals, water conservation and schools for the deaf. He briefly reviewed Shivers' career, starting as the youngest state senator in Texas history at the age of 31 in 1937, lieutenant governor and governor from 1949 to 1957.

An Associated Press story from Hempstead said that Sgt. Pete Grimmett of the Texas Highway Patrol saw the plane nose diving straight down from the heavily overcast sky. Cause of the crash was not known here early this week. Both Miss Clemmons and Anderson were graduates of Kirby High School. They were king and queen of the Tyler County Dogwood Festival in 1963. They were active in school activities while students at Kirby High School here.

Anderson participated in athletics in high school, was an Eagle Scout, and won awards in University Interscholastic League literary events. He was an experienced pilot and was president of the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics. He was majoring in aerospace engineering at A. M. U.

He was a member of the First Christian Church. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. James E. Grimes, prominent in civic and church activities. Miss Clemmons had been attending Texas Christian University, but was spending a semester at home. She planned to return to TCU for the spring semester to complete work for a bachelors degree in Spanish.

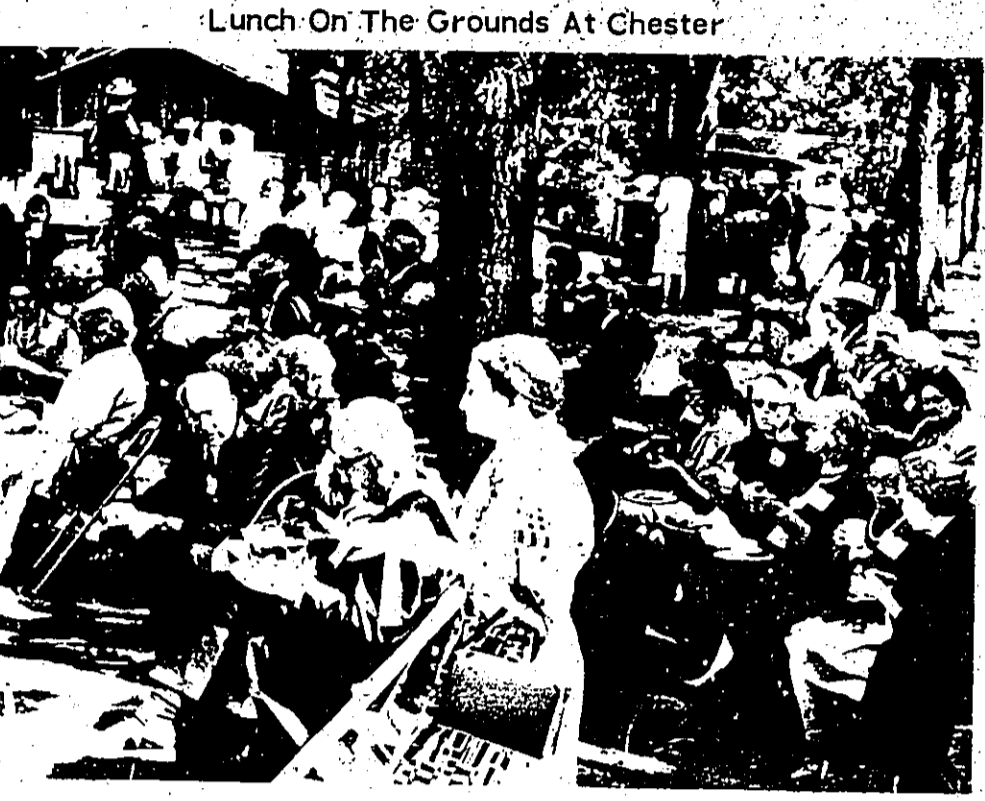

### Highway Projects Are Approved

The Texas Highway Commission has approved the spending of \$47,000 for highway safety and betterment and improvement of the farm to market road system in Tyler County during 1967.

The safety and betterment program will cost an estimated \$17,000. This will include the widening of the Thevins Creek bridge east of Woodville at a cost of \$7,000 and additional surfacing on U. S. 190 west from the Southern Pacific railway for .4 of a mile.

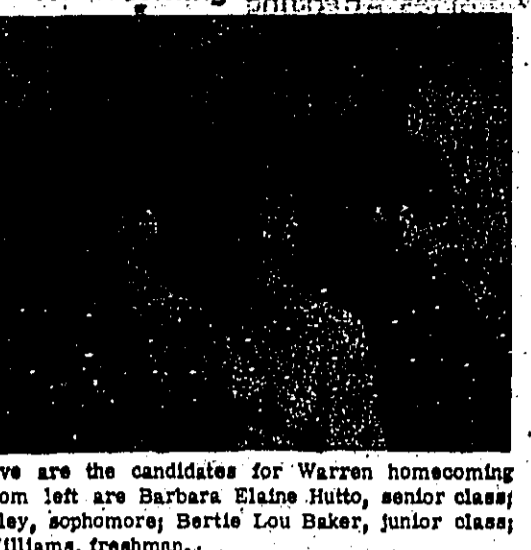
