County One Of 13 In EDA Aid District

Tyler County is one of 13 East Texas counties which is included in the new Deep East Texas Economic Development District approved Tuesday in Washington by the Commerce Department's Economic Development Association.

Other counties are Angelina, Houston, Jasper, Nacogdoches, Newton, Polk, Sabine, San Augustine, San Jacinto, Shelby, Trinity and Walker.

Approval of the district provides the area's eligibility for loans and grants under the EDA program for economic expansion through overall area planning to improve economic opportunities and raise income and employment levels, the announcement said.

First step is to establish a district development commission made up of local government officials, labor and business representatives and a cross-section of community groups. Congressman Jack Brooks, who announced the approval of the district, said. The district commission will cooperate with federal and state officials on overall planning and the EDA will provide staff assistance in getting the programs underway, Brooks said.

Establishment of the economic development district has been one of the projects of the Deep East Texas Economic Development Association. The group will hold a regular monthly meeting Friday at 10 a.m. in the Farmers State Bank at Center, and one of the items to be discussed will be the district.

Nearing 65? Then Plan Ahead For Retirement

All East Texas residents approaching their 65th birthday are urged to visit their local social security district office approximately 3 months before their 65th birthday. This advice comes from L.R. James, social security district manager in Lufkin.

James said that 120,000 Americans reach 65 each month. He estimated that 130 of these live in the Lufkin area, and are vitally affected by the medicare enrollment provisions.

According to James, the enrollment period for signing up for the doctor-bill insurance part of medicare is a seven-month period spanning 3 months before the month in which age 65 occurs through 3 months after the 65th birthday month. However, James warned, persons will not have medical insurance coverage effective at the earliest possible month (65th birthday month) unless they sign up in one of the 3 months before the month of their birthday. Those signing up in the month they become 65 or in one of the following 3 months will not be protected for 1 to 3 months after they enroll.

It is not necessary to retire in order to enroll in the medicare program, James emphasized. However, he said, an application is a necessity. He stated that many persons nearing age 65 are continuing to work and are therefore not getting in touch with their local social security district offices.

DPS Reports Few Autos Have Been Inspected

The Texas Department of Public Safety reported today that very few Texas have taken advantage of the early inspection period.

Parliament Bob Smith of the Department of Public Safety Motor Vehicle Inspection service at Lufkin stated that their records reflect a very small percentage of vehicles have been inspected compared to the same period a year ago.

The patrolman also pointed out the need for early inspection. If all owners were to inspect their vehicles on time, the Department of Public Safety would not have to deal with the backlog of vehicles that are now waiting to be inspected.

Inspection stations are open from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. on weekdays. Most station owners do not have a waiting list, but it is advised that owners who are not sure of their vehicle's condition should have it inspected as soon as possible.

Governor Connally To Speak At Teacher's Convention

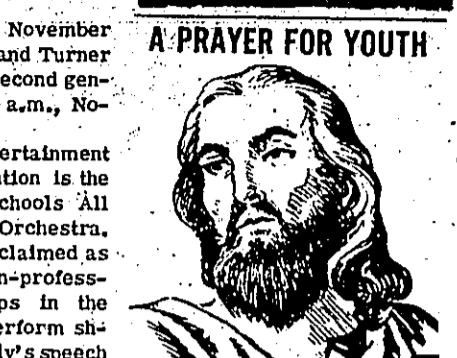

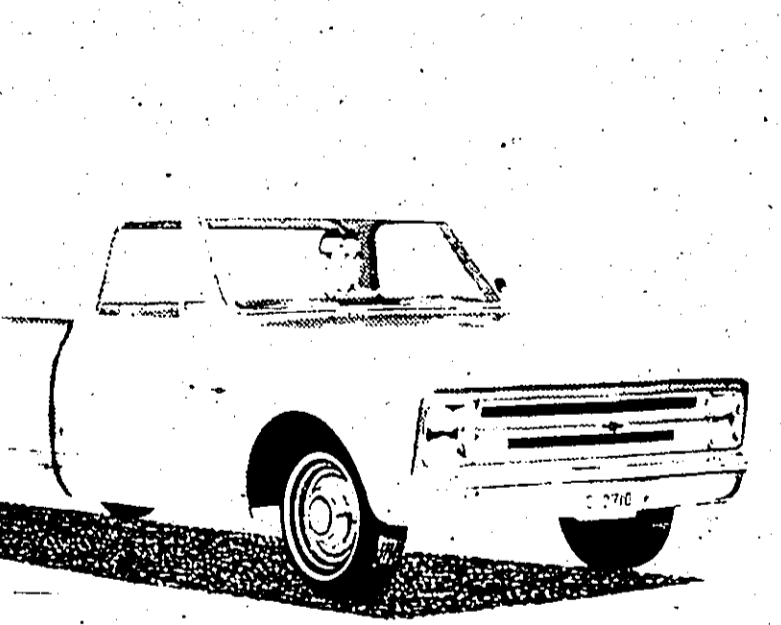

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Permanent Press Fabrics

Fabrics with unflattering memories offer a new dimension in styling for the decorative fabric field.

Because of the application of permanent or durable press to the decorative fabric, fabric furnishings are on the threshold of a revolution in design. Several decorative fabric firms currently experimenting with durable press in the home furnishings area anticipate that the process will open new and unexplored vistas for styling. The durable press process positively lives up to claims of absolute no ironing after machine washing and drying. Durable press makes its debut on the markets in the curtain and drapery fields. Tufted curtains and bedspreads will be the primary targets in the durable press collection. A 50-50 blend of polyester and rayon will be featured in a broadcloth.

Consumer acceptance of durable press in the home furnishings field is expected to be positive and immediate. Before the innovation of durable press, homemakers have not reacted favorably in accepting ruffled bedspreads and curtains because of the care factor involved.

Now ideas for the use of durable press are popping up everywhere. A few of the possibilities include ruffles or pleated ruffles on curtains; draperies with cartridge or knife pleats; folding doors using fabrics that hold their shape; bedspreads and dust ruffles; sheets with accordion pleated accents; and Roman shades, shower curtains, lamp shades, table cloths, slip covers and upholstery.

Permanent press fabric furnishings may cost slightly more, but they are anticipated to be worth the difference in easier maintenance and continued good looks.

Jelly, Jam, Conserves, Marmalade And Preserves Described

When you see the labels for jelly, jam, conserve, marmalade, and preserves, do you really know the difference?

Here's a brief description of each, as given by foods and nutrition specialists with the Texas A & M University Agricultural Extension Service. Jelly is made from fruit juice; the product is clear and firm enough to hold its shape when turned out of the container.

Jam is made from crushed or ground fruit; it tends to hold its shape but generally is less firm than jelly.

Conserves are jams made from a mixture of fruits; usually including citrus fruits; often raisins and nuts are added.

Marmalade is a tender jelly with pieces of fruit distributed evenly throughout. A marmalade commonly contains citrus juice and slices of peel.

Preserves are whole fruit or large pieces of fruit in thick syrup, often slightly jellied.

Preserving fruit with sugar is one of the oldest forms of food preservation. Not all fruits have the properties needed for making satisfactory jellied products, but with commercial pectins now on the market, the homemaker need not depend on the jellifying

Library Friends To Have Tea For Membership

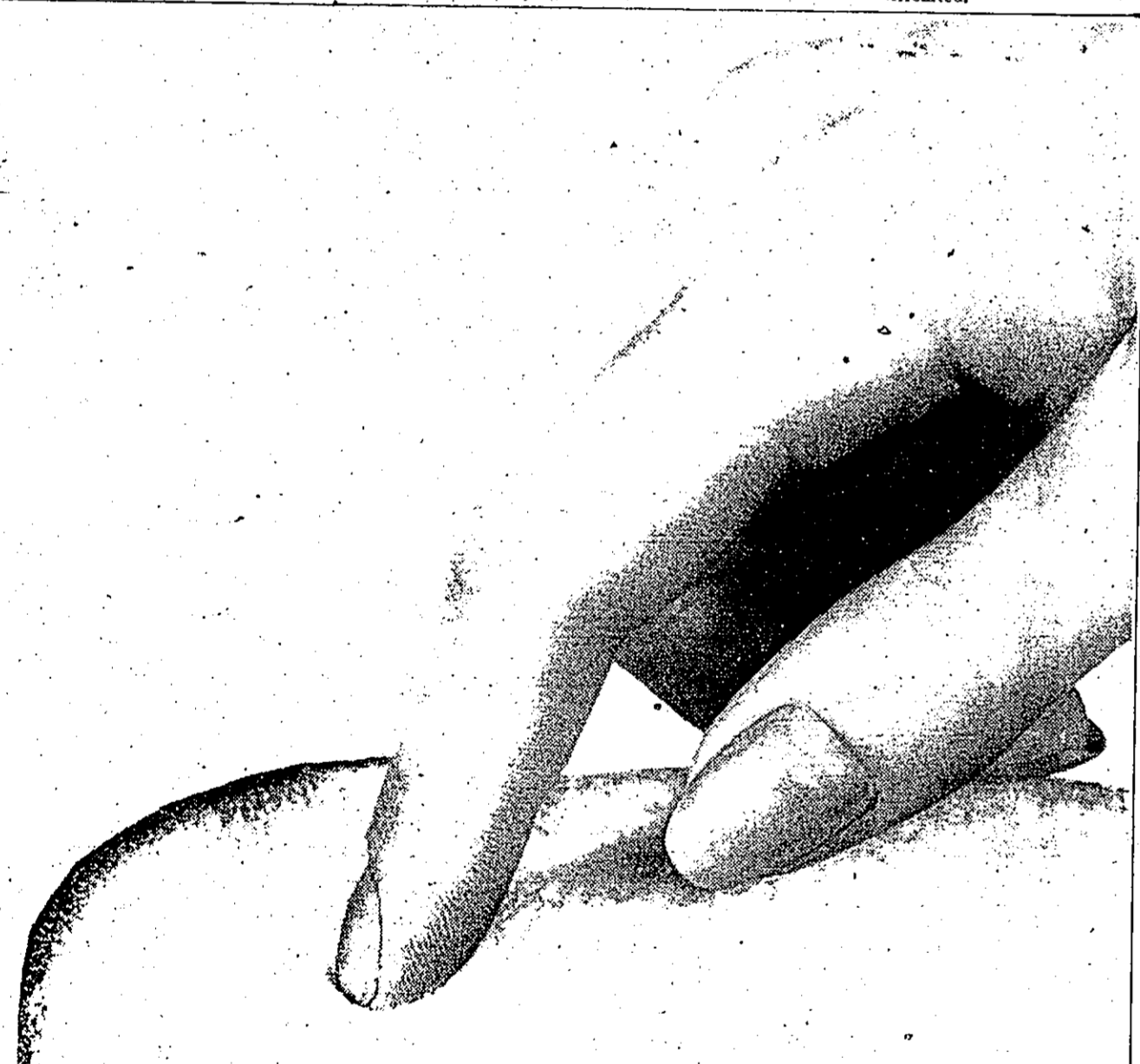

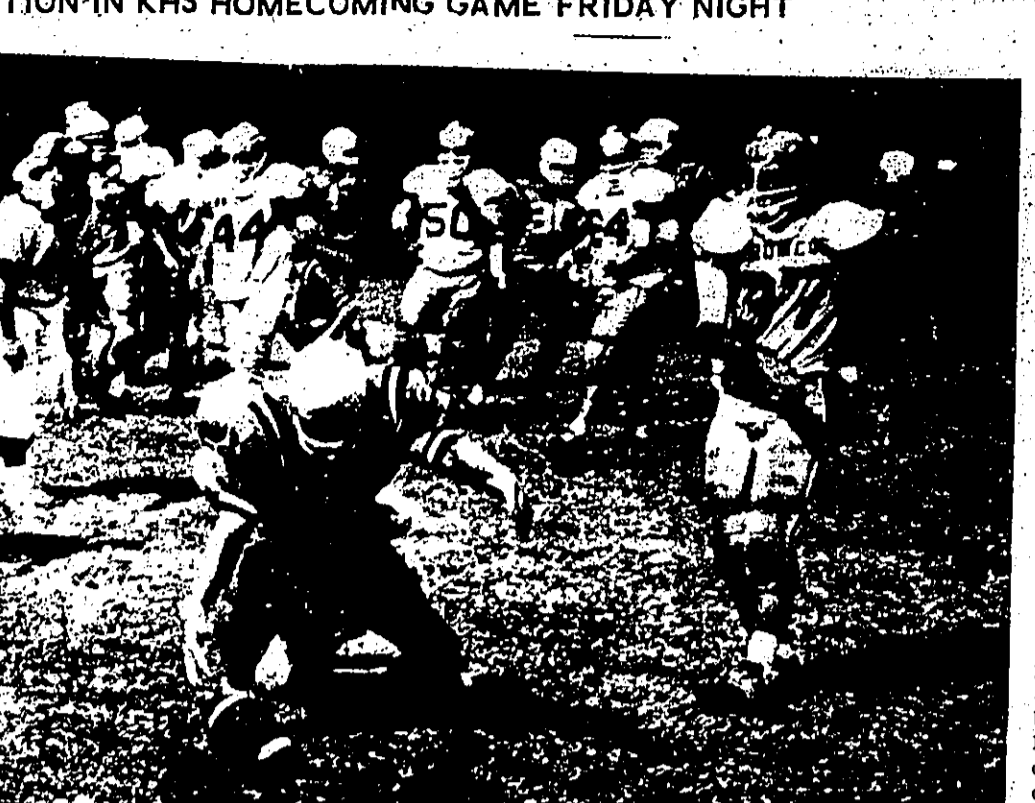

Crockett has compiled an impressive record this season with seven consecutive victories against no defeats. They were pre-season favorites to win the district championship.

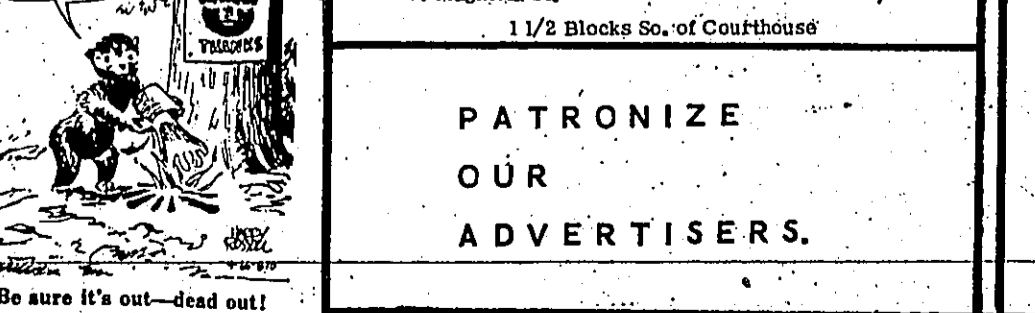
