## EAGLES GO TO LIVINGSTON FOR DISTRICT GAME

This is the week that Kirby High School Eagles defeat Livingston and stay out of the District 21-AA cellar, or vice versa.

The Lions have a pretty weak team this year considering what they have had in some years past. However, on the record we think that they will play hard against the Eagles in an effort to pull an upset. The Eagles are hungry for a victory, too, and will play one of their best games.

Last Friday night the Eagles and the Lions ran into the one-two teams in the district. Woodville played Crockett at home, losing 34 to 0, while Livingston went to Rusk for their district loss. While Livingston and Woodville are battling to stay in contention, Crockett and Rusk will be engaged in a struggle at Crockett for the top spot.

If Crockett beats Rusk, as they are favored to do, and Woodville can win over the Lions, then the following week the Eagles will have a chance at Rusk and the second place spot in the district standings. We believe that the Eagles can beat Livingston and with a supreme effort can take Rusk, whom they play here.

Of course, Livingston will have a shot at Crockett November 11, but it will likely be a walk-away for Crockett.

Chester is the only county team that came out victorious last Friday. They defeated Sabine Pass, 22 to 14, while Colmesneil, Warren and Woodville were losing. Warren lost to Orangefield while Colmesneil was defeated by Coldspring.

In this week's games, Warren will journey to Barbours Hill, Colmesneil will be at Sabine Pass, Chester at Evadale, and Woodville, as stated above, will be at Livingston.

The only game in Tyler County will be in Woodville where the Scott Panthers will host Madisonville. The game will begin at 7:45 at Kirby Field.

## VOTERS TO DECIDE ON 16 AMENDMENTS IN GENERAL ELECTION

Sixteen proposed constitutional amendments will be on the November 8 general election ballot.

The amendments are important and should be studied by each voter before going to the polls Tuesday. A brief summary of the pros and cons of each amendment are given below.

Proposition 1: For or against the constitutional amendment to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use.

This amendment would give farmers a tax break on their land valuation.

If land has been used for farming continuously for three or more years preceding the property valuation, this amendment would require tax payment only on the basis of the land's use for farming or ranching, not for its value as speculative or real estate property.

The land, however, would be assessed in terms of its real value. If the land is sold or diverted to the other than agricultural use, the owner would have to pay the difference between what he had paid and the assessed valuation.

A lien would be imposed on the land to secure payment of the tax.

Those favoring the amend-

ment argue it would help keep the family farm as a wholesome part of the state's makeup. Also, it would protect farmers against being forced out of farming by high land values accompanying urban growth, over which they have no control.

Opponents say all people should be taxed equally, and farmers already get too many favors. Also, they argue, this would remove ad valorem tax revenue from state and local treasuries at a time when all levels of government need more revenue to deal with modern problems.

The Texas Municipal League board of directors opposes the amendment. Others charge many real estate agents would become "farmers" and hold land on the fringes of urban areas for speculation.

Proposition 2: For or against the addition of Section 12 of Article IX of the Constitution, authorizing the Legislature to provide by law for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of airport authorities composed of one or more counties, and authorizing the district to levy a tax not to exceed 75 cents on the \$100 valuation of all taxable property if voters in the district approve.

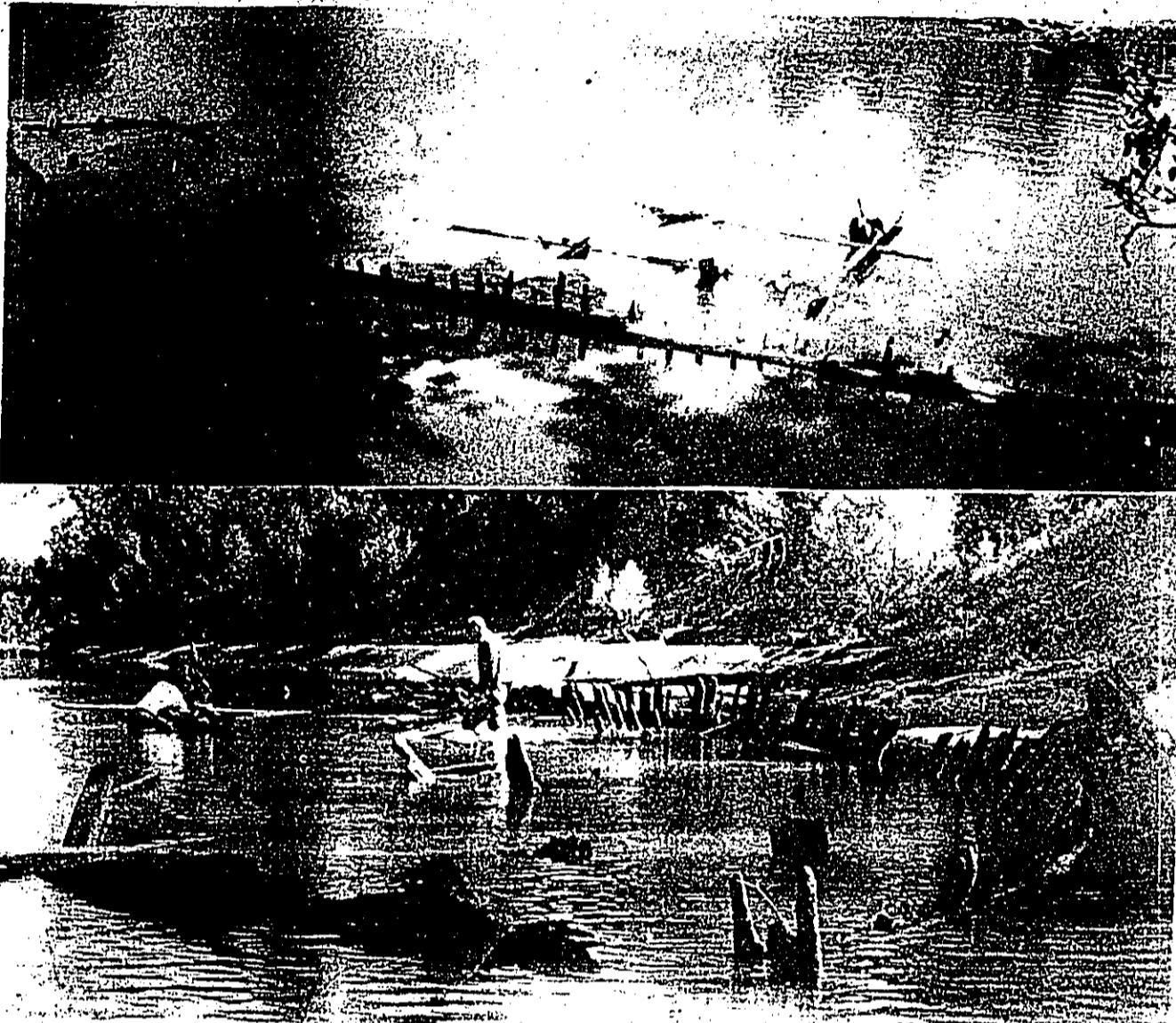
This would allow one or more counties to create a regional airport authority via three steps. The legislature would first have to provide for the creation. Next, at least 5 percent of the qualified taxpayer voters in each county concerned would have to petition for an election on the issue. Finally, the project would have to get a majority vote in each county to be included in the authority.

If a vote fails, a subsequent vote could not be held in the county concerned for at least a year, and then would require petitioning by 10 percent of the voters.

Proponents say such authorities are needed to get federal money under the Federal Airport Act. Also, they would allow all those benefiting from an airport in an area to pay for it proportional to the worth

## OLD STEAMBOAT RESTS IN WATERY GRAVE IN NECHES AT TOWN BLUFF

The wreckage of an old side-wheel river steamboat resting in a watery grave about one-half mile below the old Barlow Ferry at Town Bluff recalls the early days of South-east Texas when its rivers were thriving avenues of transportation.

The shell of the old boat below Town Bluff is thought to have sunk about 65 or 70 years ago. Joe Barlow, whose father ran the ferry at the Neches River crossing, recalls that the boat went down when it rammed a log and began taking on water while coming up the river. Cleets Overbee, also of Town Bluff, said that the boat pulled to the shore and unloaded its cargo when it started to sink following the accident involving the floating log.

Judge James E. Wheat, who has made a study of the early history of the county and has researched its various steamboat landing places in old records, inclines to the belief that the boat is of earlier vintage and that it is a different boat than the one recalled by Barlow and Overbee.

Starting in about 1833 or before, Town Bluff was a thriving port on the Neches River. Steamboats plied up and down the stream, bringing a cargo of food, clothing and other supplies on the trip up the river and hauling bales of cotton and other products of the land on its downstream voyage. There were landings, or loading and unloading points, for which operators of the boat were required to secure permits. McQueen's landing, on the Jasper County side of the river, is near the point where the old boat's wreckage rests near the Tyler County side.

Barlow says that his father was operating the ferry at the time the boat sank, and that later some of the gear and

engine was pulled up the river to the site of the ferry. During World War II the metal was salvaged and sold for scrap iron.

The wreckage of the old steamboat is hidden by the waters of the Neches except when the river is very low. Last Thursday, Judge Wheat, Bill Brown, a reporter and Project Engineer Victory of the Corps of Engineers and John Letney of the Dam B office of the Corps of Engineers made an exploratory trip to the wreckage. The water had been lowered in the river by closing the gates at Dam B on Wednesday and while the water was not down completely, Brown and Letney ventured on to the decks of the old steamboat for a closer examination. They found bricks from the furnace and parts of the steam boiler, and long bolts that fastened the bulkheads in place. They reported that the heart pine of the decks and sides was still in good condition.

Barlow said that he and others had removed some of the lumber from the wreckage and used it around their places at Town Bluff. He said the captain of the boat was Nap McQueen, for whom McQueen's Landing was named. Brown and Letney estimated that the boat was around 90 feet long and from 30 to 35 feet wide. Since the Neches is not a large river compared to the Sabine and Trinity, it is possible that this is about as large a boat as could navigate the stream.

Judge Wheat would like to salvage the wreckage of the old steamboat if it is possible. During its long stay in the water, it is filled with silt and sand below decks, and this would have to be pumped out. Whether the old boat could be raised is problematical, but the possibility will be considered, Judge Wheat says.

### Absentee Voting Ends Friday

Persons who plan to cast an absentee ballot in the general election next Tuesday are reminded that Friday is the final day that a ballot application can be made at the county clerk's office.

Tyler Countians will go to the polls Tuesday in a general election which will determine the United States Senate race between John Tower, the incumbent, and Waggoner Carr, presently Texas attorney general.

Governor John Connally and other state officers have Republican opposition but are expected to win easily.

The contest between Tower and Carr is going in to the final days at a dead heat, according to observers throughout the state. The size of the vote and any last-minute development favoring either candidate could swing the election. A turnout of one and one-half million voters has been predicted by some political pundits while others think the vote may go over two million.

In Tyler County, the turnout is expected to be relatively light unless voters are more interested than they have shown so far. However, every eligible voter is urged to cast a ballot because of the senate race and because there are 16 proposed constitutional amendments on the ballot. This is the largest number of proposed changes in the Texas constitution ever submitted to the voters at one election.

Besides the Republican candidates, the Constitution party has candidates for the state's highest offices including U.S. Senator. Voters are warned that where there are three candidates in a race, two of them must be scratched in order for the vote to count.

In the governor's race against John Connally, Democrat, are T.E. Kennerly, Republican, and Tommye Gillespie, Constitution party.

Running for United States senator besides Carr and Tower is John Barker Holland, Constitution party candidate. Lieutenant Governor Preston Smith is opposed by Republican Kellie Dibrail and William A. (Bill) Johnson, Constitution party.

Other candidates appearing on the ballot who have opposition are: Attorney General: Crawford C. Martin, Democrat; Robb Stewart, Republican; and John C. Williams, Constitution party.

Commissioner of Agriculture: John C. White, Democrat; Jack Garrett, Republican; and Derek C. Bownds, Constitution.

Commissioner of General Land Office: Jerry Sadler, Democrat; Albert Fay, Republican; and Joseph L. Tiller, Constitution.

Comptroller of Public Accounts: Robert S. Calvert, Democrat; Rudy T. Garza, Republican; and Wilma McDaniell, Constitution.

State Treasurer: Jesse James, Democrat; Lawrence Duffan Gilmer, Republican; and Jesse Lee James, Constitution.

Railroad Commissioner: Byron Tunnell, Democrat; and David E. Clark, Constitution. Without opposition on the ballot are Robert W. Calvert, chief justice, Supreme Court of Texas; and Associate Justices Clyde E. Smith and Voe Greenhill; Jack Olson for judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals; and other district and county officers nominated in the Democratic primaries.

Planning and implementation of Texas water programs must remain, in large measure, the responsibility of Texas government and Texas people.

Mushtrooping cities, rapid industrialization, and a thirty agriculture long ago brought the average Lone Star citizen around to appreciation of the vast role that such programs will play in the future of this commonwealth.

The "additional \$200 million" could be issued by the Nov. 8, would double the state water development fund by authorizing the Water Development Board to issue \$200 million more in bonds to finance or assist water conservation projects with approval of the Legislature.

Although it has a bearing on the statewide water plan now undergoing further study and revision, Amendment II is a proposition that can stand on its own merit. It is needed regardless of what the future holds in the way of water programs.

Besides, future decisions on expenditures will have to be made by the Legislature and the people, so the voters have no grounds for fearing that Amendment II would automatically catapult the state into uncharted and unapproved programs of a more extensive nature.

Enactment of Amendment II would enable the Water Development Board to loan proceeds of the bonds to acquire, build or develop water filtration, treatment and transportation systems.

With this provision in our State Constitution, future legislatures or State Administrative Boards will be powerless to enact laws or provide plans for removal of substantial quantities of water from the Neches or Sabine Rivers to other areas of the State. All of the East Texas delegation in the Texas Legislature worked hard and uncompromisingly to insert this provision in this Amendment and unanimously supported the Act.

Frost and freezing weather will soon be widespread and with the change in weather the growth of all members of the Sorghum family, including Johnsongrass, Sudan, millet, sorghum and all hybrids, is stopped by frost, sometimes develop a high frost and content and a hazard to grazing livestock. Certain chemical changes occur in the frost-killed plants, and are responsible for the prussic acid development. The prussic acid can be saved depends upon how long the damaged plants are left in the field. Johnsongrass or Sudan should not be grazed until the damaged plants are cut or for at least a week after the frost. If it is ready to cut for hay before the frost, it may be cut immediately. Johnsongrass cutting time is about 10 days before frost. Johnsongrass should be cut as soon as the frost comes. Johnsongrass cuttings should be stored in a shaded place, as the prussic acid develops in the cuttings. 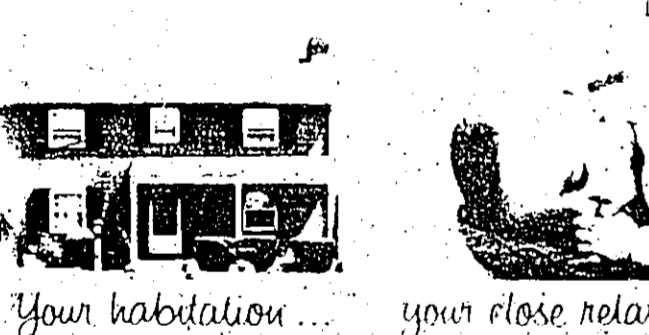

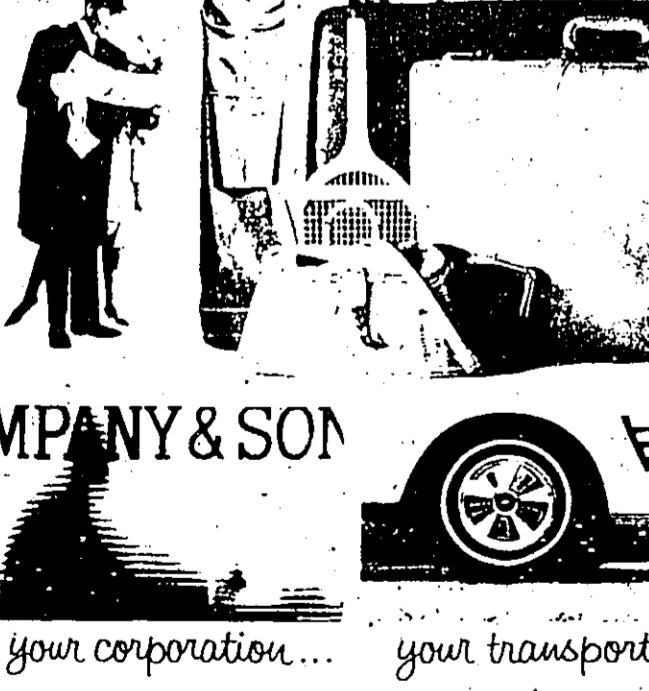

wilted plants. Pastures are almost a year-round growing crop and will be making money after other crops are harvested. Therefore, pastures should not be neglected during the busy harvesting season.

Each season's pasture needs its own fertilization and care. Farmers or stockmen who did not plant enough winter grazing early still have time to plant wheat, oats or ryegrass or mixtures of these for winter and early spring grazing. A soil test recommendation should be followed in making fertilizer application.

The fertilizer applied at planting time may not all be utilized during the winter but it will not be wasted. It will be there next spring for early use.

The fall and winter seasons is the time to check and decide whether replacement plants are needed in the home landscape.

Maybe a rose bush has died or failed to live up to expectations. There is a gap in the shrub border where a new plant is needed. Was shade needed in the outdoor living area?

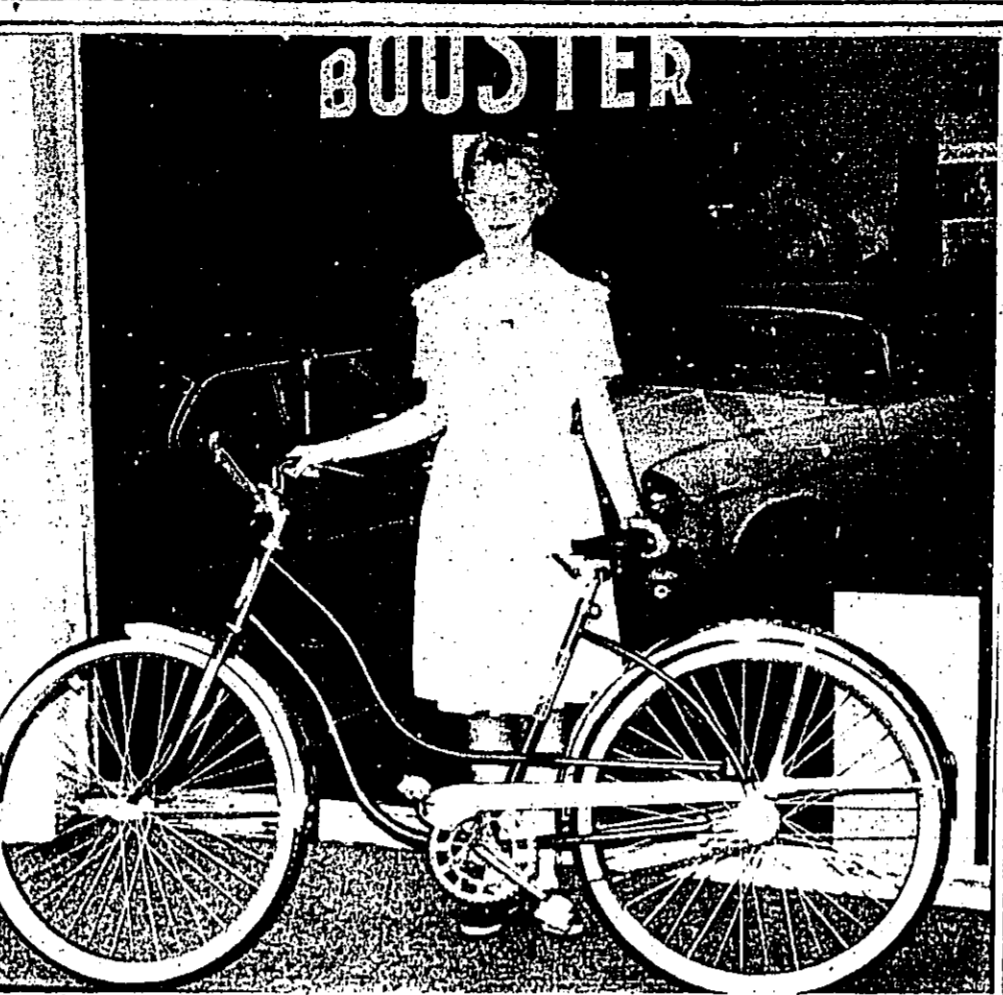
Make a list of your landscape needs and be ready to take advantage of the selections offered by nurseries and garden centers.

The natural inclination is to plant in bloom. Then suddenly comes the urge to plant trees and shrubs and a rush to the nursery or garden center for plants only to find picked-over stock remaining.

Failed and haphazard plants and those grown in containers can be transplanted any time of the year. Many of the desirable plants, those that lose their leaves each fall, can be more easily handled or transplanted in a bare root condition.

For best results, bare root plants should be set out in the late fall and winter from mid-November through February in most areas of Texas. With proper care, bare root plants can be set out as late as March and April. Their success is dependent upon condition of the nursery stock used and the care they receive for six months after planting.

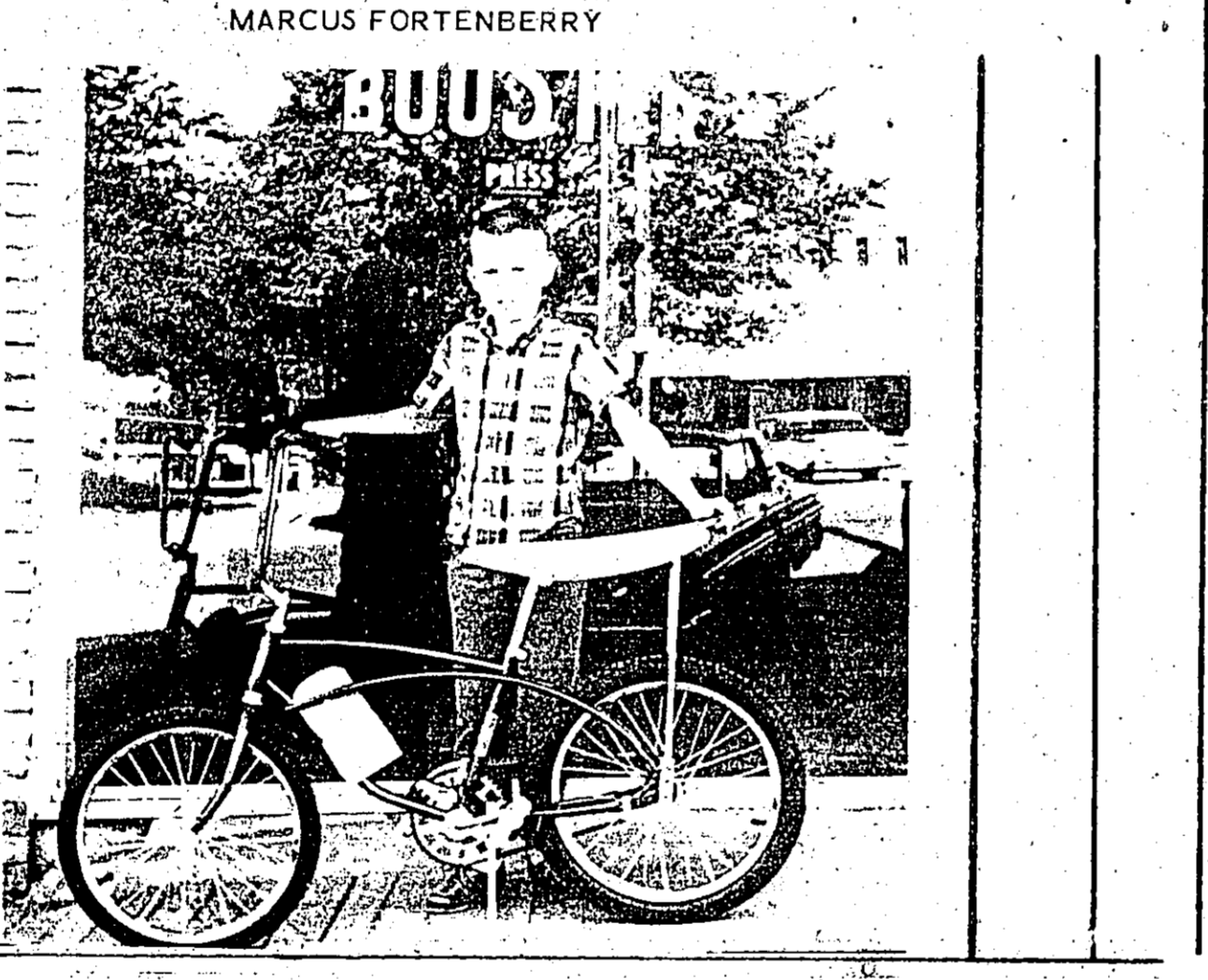
For ease of maintenance and to reduce the amount of disease and insect damage, landscape plants which are native or adapted to the area should be selected.
