We thought we had a pretty good series of photographs last week—a hunter who killed a 11-point buck, one who got a rattlesnake, and another who killed a bobcat.

But over the weekend, four hunters from Vidor, who were stalking deer 11 miles west of Finoland in the Sam Rayburn reservoir area, came up with a 400 pound black bear. So far, none of the hunters in this area have come top with a bear, although Jeff Griffin did bring in a big wolf which he killed at his place in the Dies community. It was a female, and Jeff says that a larger one, possibly the male, got away. Sorry we didn't get a picture of it.

The Beaumont paper had a story recently about two squirrel hunters, Mike Webster and W. T. Holland, who came up with a monkey instead of a sixth squirrel while hunting in the area between Woodville and Sillsbee. A soldier from the area, while overseas, picked up a couple of small monkeys and brought home with him. One of them escaped, and it is possible this is the monkey the Beaumont men killed for a squirrel.

Willie Hoffman, nephew of Mrs. Rayford Gore of Warren, brought the two monkeys to his home six miles east of Village Mills about six months ago, and one escaped a few days later. This probably explains the "Big Tikcett" monkey which puzzled everyone, since this is the first instance of monkeys in the area. However, it wouldn't surprise us to learn that anything is in the Big Tikcett. So far, no elephants—but who knows?

All kidding aside, there is usually a logical explanation in a case like this, and Hoffman's monkey is probably the answer.

While we are on the subject, we might as well recount the experience of Mrs. Oliver Gore and her son, Mitchell. They recently checked out of a bedroom at their home in Hardin County, which evidently came in through a window in which one of the Gore's grandchildren had broken a pane.

It seems Mrs. Gore, who had sat down at the kitchen table for a cup of coffee, glanced into a back bedroom and what she saw there caused her to set her coffee cup down, real quick. A bobcat well, she had presence of mind enough to ease over and close the door. Just then her son Mitchell, 17, walked into the house (the bobcat was in his bedroom). Mitchell got a pole, opened the door and started poking at the bobcat with it. The bobcat climbed the wall and crossed half the ceiling before falling on the bed and turning on Mitchell, who vacated the room in a hurry and slammed the door.

Mrs. Gore had gone outside and raised the bedroom window, and the cat saw the window and bounded out, much to her relief (and Mitchell's).

The Gores had seen the bobcat around their place before, but he was outside and would take off when they appeared. They are gone from home most of the time, since they operate the Honey Island Inn.

We don't know, but we can imagine that the Gores lost up time in replacing that broken window pane.

This is the time of year when we usually begin to urge citizens to pay their poll tax. However, now we urge you to register—the poll tax is no longer valid. Junior High Student Dies In Wreck

A 18-year-old Town Bluff boy was instantly killed Saturday afternoon when the pickup truck in which he was riding overturned and rolled over as it was driven across a dam at a lake on the family property.

Johnny Allen Bunn was pronounced dead on arrival at Tyler County Hospital. His father, J. W. Bunn, Jr., was admitted with lacerations and shock. Another passenger in the pickup truck, Joe Ariego of Fort Arthur, who has a camp near Dam B, was not injured and managed to unfasten the older Bunn's seatbelt and get him from the overturned truck, which was resting upside down in the partially filled family lake.

Johnny was a seventh-grade student at Wheat Junior High School in Woodville and played football and participated in track. He was a native of Lufkin.

The accident was investigated by Deputy Sheriffs Richard Cole and George McKee. They said that young Bunn was thrown from the truck, and was clear of the water. He suffered a broken neck, according to Dr. John Q. Gilchrist, who was on duty at the hospital.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Monday in Edwards Funeral Chapel with the Rev. B. B. Read, pastor of Fairview Baptist Church, officiating. Burial was in Fairview cemetery.

Pallbearers were Jimmy King, Jeff Sturrock, Dale Pullin, Thomas Daniel, Larry Meeks and Paul Boudreaux. Johnny is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Bunn, Jr.; a sister, Brenda; grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Bunn, Sr. of Town Bluff and Mr. and Mrs. G. T. Minter of Cushing, and great-grandmother, Mrs. J. A. Satterwhite of Cushing.

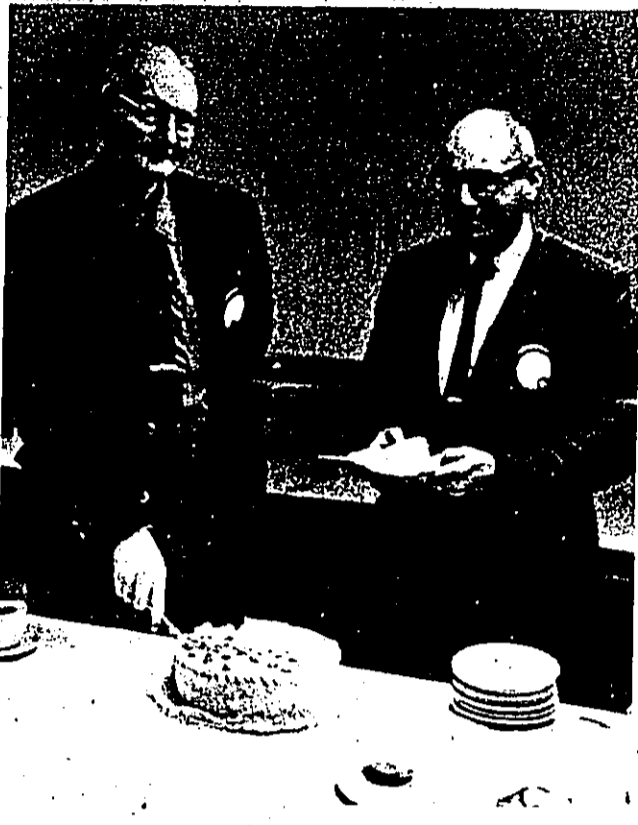

Felony Cases Set For Trial Here Monday

Ordinary felony cases are set for the second week of 88th District Court beginning Monday. Several civil suits were on the docket for this week.

Set for trial Monday are two drunk while driving charges, two cases of forgery and passing against one individual, one murder charge, and one theft charge. Some civil cases are also set subject to the above felony cases. Nine lawsuits, mostly insurance cases, were set for the first week of court which began Tuesday. As the Booster went to press early Wednesday morning, none of the cases had started.

Monday Judge H. A. Coe was here for the usual fourth Monday hearing of uncontested divorce cases and any motions on other cases that might be made.

Voter Registration Open To Jan. 31

A. L. (Pete) Thornton, tax assessor-collector, this week said that persons who want to vote in any 1967 elections must register during the period ending January 31, as in past years. However, there is no poll tax fee.

At the general election in November, an amendment to the Texas Constitution was approved which repealed the poll tax, already voided by Federal courts, and authorizes the legislature to set an annual registration system for voters.

However, since the legislature cannot act until its next session, the old poll tax paying period remains as the present voter registration period.

Since there is no charge for registering, all eligible voters are urged to do so before January 31. There may be one or more important elections in 1967, and it will also entitle voters to participate in an bond or school and city elections during the year.

Voters may register at the tax collector's office in Woodville, at the school tax office in Warren, Fred Gorecery at Fred, Spurger Mercantile store in Spurger, Riley Insurance Agency office in Colmesneil, or Ray Trimble's store in Chester.

Thornton Asks For State Audit Of Office

A. L. (Pete) Thornton, county tax assessor-collector, said Wednesday morning that he had requested State Comptroller Robert Calvert to have his books audited at once by the state to ascertain if his accounts were in order.

This was the latest development in a chain of events that has the usually placid Tyler County Court House buzzing.

Tuesday afternoon the Tyler County grand jury returned an indictment against Thornton, charging that on or about June 28, 1966, he had embezzled \$16 from the county. No other details or word about the alleged taking of the \$16 was given in the indictment, or any clue as to how the amount arrived at, was given.

Thornton surrendered to Sheriff Grady Ray shortly before 4 p.m. Tuesday and made \$1000 bond on the charges.

Rumors were circulating around the court house Monday that the grand jury was investigating the tax office, and at least two former employees were known to have ap-

peared at the grand jury room. Some records from the office of County Treasurer J. F. Boyd were said to have been subpoenaed by the grand jury. However, Thornton said following the return of the indictment that no records were subpoenaed from his office, nor was he asked to appear before the grand jury. He said that no present employee of the tax office appeared before the body.

Thornton said that besides asking the state to make an immediate audit, he was also notifying his bonding company of the indictment so that they could make an investigation.

Thornton is completing the second year of his second term as Tyler County Assessor-collector. Whether the grand jury is investigating any other alleged irregularities in the tax office were unknown, since the work of the grand jury is secret. While the rumors circulated Monday and Tuesday that the office was being investigated, the return of the indictment came as a surprise to court house offi-

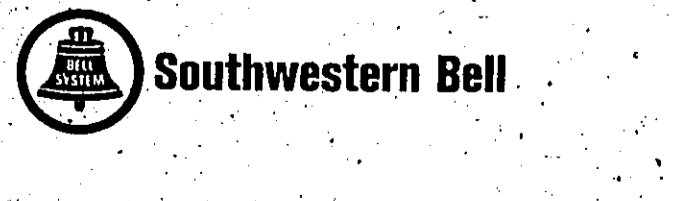
Southwestern Bell announces \$6 million rate reduction for Texas Telephone customers

The original color charge was reduced from \$10 to \$7.50 on April 1, 1965. And a new Residence Service Charge will benefit most residence customers who will be arranging for new service and additional service requiring installation.

At a time when prices for most goods and services are continuing their upward spiral, Southwestern Bell has announced a voluntary reduction in rates that will result in annual savings of \$6 million for Texas telephone users.

Included in the reduction are both Long Distance rates (effective January 1, 1967) and a series of miscellaneous telephone charges, effective December 1, 1966.

Texans will also enjoy savings on other telephone services, effective December 1, 1966. These include the one-time charge for telephones in color (from \$7.50 to \$5). This is also the second reduction in the color charge in the past two years.

NURSERY NOTES

Not more than ten days ago we had a beautiful array of colored leaves—as pretty as I have ever seen. Now many of the leaves are gone and we are aware that fall is here. And fall is the ideal time for planting. We have been blessed this year with more frequent rains than usual so planting will be ideal.

If plants are set out in the fall they get a good root system before the top starts to grow in the spring.

If you care enough to buy plants, go one step further and plant them right. It may take a little pot moss or leaf mold or a little extra water but your reward will repay you. Your plants will grow quicker and be more healthy. You need to dig a hole much bigger than the ball of the plant and add some humus in the form of peat moss, vermiculite or some kind of muck so the soil will retain water in the summer and the roots can have friable soil in which to grow. Not only will the plants be healthier but you will cut down on your water bill during the summer. In the summer once a week is usually enough to water. If you water deep, plant out your garden and the plants will be able to take care of themselves.
