Christmas has come to mean many things to many people. To the children, it is the time when Santa comes bearing gifts. To adults, it is a time for the giving of gifts, also, and a time of festivity when friends visit friends, families get together in both body and spirit, and the devout celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ.

However, it may be that we too often forget the true significance of the day. In today's highly commercial and fast-paced society, the Spirit of Christmas may be there albeit nearly buried under social and business activities. Recently William J. McCormick of Philadelphia, in an address before a group of Catholic laymen, told of the humble origin and life of Christ which is of interest to members of all denominations. We thought you might like to read it:

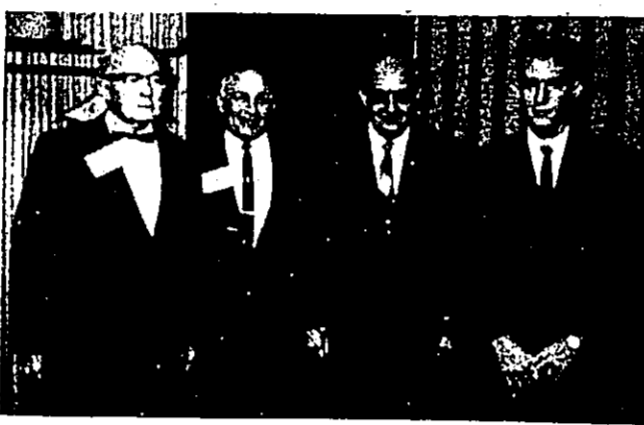
The fulfillment of the revelation to man came in the person of Jesus Christ. In Him we find, at the loftiest and best, all the highest qualities of humanity, with none of the degrading elements of evil that are a part of the personality of ordinary men. By coming on earth He showed to what a height of perfection human nature might be raised. He showed us the only thing in the world that we possess is our knowledge of truth and He also showed us that the only thing on earth that can determine itself is a human soul.

He was born in an animal shelter—a stable, amidst the dumb creatures of His own creation, in an obscure village, the Child of a young simple peasant Jewish maid—the spouse of a carpenter. His relations were inconspicuous, unimportant and had neither training nor education. He grew up in another village where He worked in a carpenter shop until He was thirty; then for three years He was an itinerant preacher, but in truth He was teaching the gospel of love. He never visited a big city nor traveled two hundred miles from the place of His birth. He never held an office. In infancy He started a King; in childhood He puzzled the learned doctors; in manhood He ruled the course of nature by walking upon the waves as if pavement and hushed the sea to sleep. He, Himself, had neither wealth or influence, but possessed countless courage, which faltered only once, in the Garden of Gethsemane, and then for only a moment when He cried "Abba, Father, all things are possible to You. Remove this cup from Me, yet not what I will, but what You will." His only weakness was human sympathy and, if He ever faltered again, it was on the side of mercy and pity. He never had a family or owned a house. He didn't go to college but all the schools put together cannot boast of having as many students. He never wrote a book, and yet all the libraries of the country could not hold the books that have been written about Him. He never wrote a song and yet He has furnished the theme for more songs than all the song-writers combined. He never practiced medicine but He went around healing the multitudes without medicine and making no charge for His services, and He has healed

more broken hearts than all the doctors that ever lived. He did none of the things one usually associates with greatness—He had no credentials but Himself, yet every seventh day the wheels of commerce cease their turning and multitudes bend their way to worshiping and to pay homage and respect to Him. The names of the past proud statesmen of Greece and Rome have come and gone; but the name of This Man abounds more and more. Time has spread 1900 years between the people of this generation and the scene of His crucifixion; at the time He was thirty-three years old and the tide of public opinion had turned against Him because His teachings of righteousness were contrary to their ideas. He was betrayed by His own disciples. His friends ran away. He was turned over to His enemies and went through the mockery of a trial. The thirty shekels for which Judas sold Him were worth \$18.33, but, don't forget, we have often sold Him for less. At the instigation of the Jews, the Romans nailed Him to a cross between two thieves. While He was dying, His executioners gambled for His clothing, the only property He had on earth. When He was dead He was laid in a borrowed grave through pity of a friend, and rose on the third day from the dead, and ascended, as St. Luke has put on record, from the summit of the Mount of Olives, in a cloud into the infinite expanse of the Heavens. Nineteen hundred years have come and gone and today He is the Central Figure of the human race and the Leader of mankind's progress. All the armies that ever marched, all the navies that ever sailed, all the kings that ever sat; all the things that ever reigned, put together, have not affected the life of man on this earth as much as That One Solitary Life.

Night Hunting.

Game wardens filed four charges of hunting deer at night during the past week, one charge of possession of a buck deer without a pronged horn, and one charge of hunting wild ducks with a shotgun not permanently plugged to three-shell capacity.

This brings to 14 the number of game law violations this month filed in county court.

Parks and Wildlife Department headquarters in Austin reports that most hunters are complying with hunting regulations throughout the state.

Would You Believe A 9-Point?



Derold James, 11 year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. J.D. James of Woodville, was the owner of a good many adult hunters as he displayed this 9-point buck which he killed Sunday afternoon in the Walding Hunting Club lease west of Livingston. Derold brought the fine-looking buck down with one blow from a .30-gauge shotgun, sporting a close range. The animal after being field dressed weighed 102 pounds. Mrs. James says that Derold now adds the family deer hunting records—his father has yet to bring in a buck during the 20 years he has been hunting.

47 PERSONS PREDICTED TO DIE ON HIGHWAY

Captain L.C. Moore, commanding officer for the Texas Highway Patrol in the Beaumont area, reported today that the Texas Department of Public Safety predicts that 47 lives will be lost in Texas motor vehicle accidents over the Christmas holiday period and 34 more will die over the New Year holiday period.

He stated, "The traffic problem in the State of Texas has reached a critical stage. The Department of Public Safety is constantly changing its traffic supervision program in an effort to stop this needless loss of life and we feel that the time has come for each driver to take a new look at an old program. We still have drivers that think they can safely operate an automobile after having a few drinks. In spite of the fact our records show that over 60% of the fatal accidents in the Beaumont area involved a drinking or drunk driver. Years ago, slowing down for a stop sign was considered a minor traffic violation, but with our increase in speed and our increase in traffic, this is a very hazardous violation. We know that each driver is an individual case with its own problems and limitations and we feel that by self evaluation and self improvement a majority of accidents will be eliminated."

Captain Moore pointed out that additional patrolmen will be obtained from the License and Weight and Motor Vehicle Services. By using the Selective Enforcement method the Department of Public Safety will be able to patrol all problem areas.

"The fact that we have already killed 170 people this year in the 16 county Beaumont area compared to the 129 killed last year, should make even the most hardened traffic outlaw realize the need for strict enforcement of our traffic laws in order to prevent further loss of life," Moore said. "We are aiming our enforcement effort for the holiday periods at drivers that refuse to obey traffic laws. We will attempt to remove this type of driver from the highway to protect the lives of responsible drivers. As in the past, we are asking

Most stores in Woodville will close Monday and Tuesday for the Christmas holiday. Local stores have taken both Christmas day and the day following in order to give employees two days off for the past several years. However, with Christmas falling on Sunday this year, Monday will automatically be observed as a holiday throughout the county, and Tuesday will also be observed in Woodville.

Civil cases were resumed the third week, and this week the court is in recess for the Christmas holidays.

Woodville Police On 24-Hour Duty

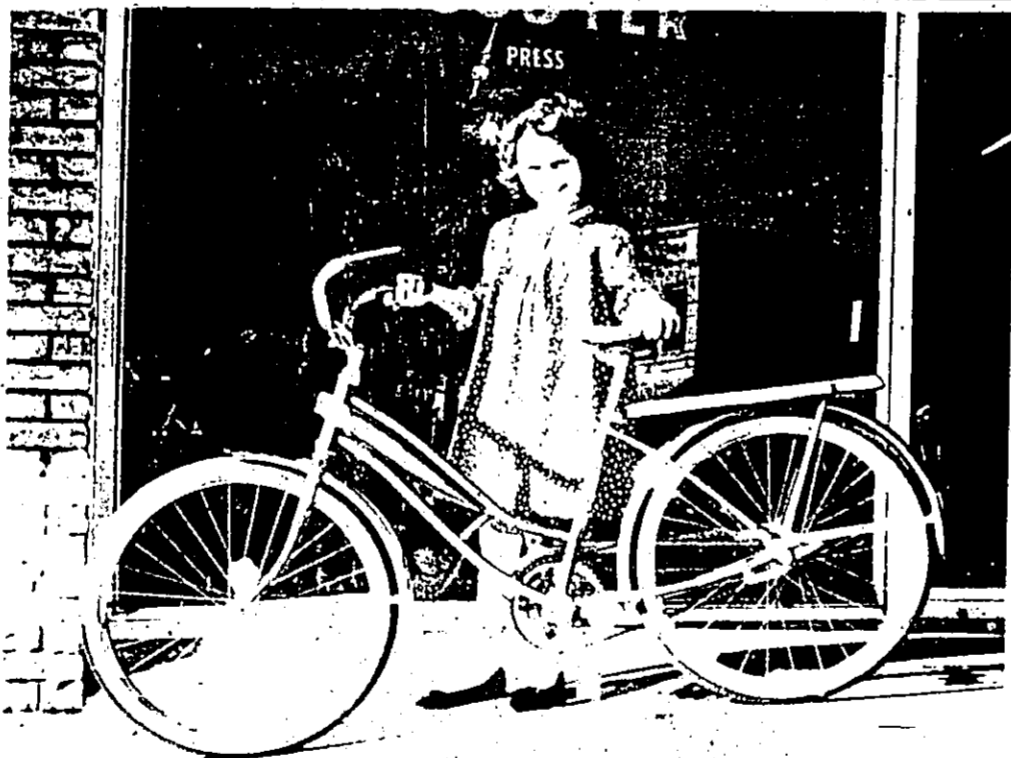

Police Chief John Grammer said that he and Assistant Chief Ed Samrall will be on practically around-the-clock patrol of Woodville streets in an effort to assist in reducing the speeding and other violations which lead to accidents during the period of heavy holiday traffic.

In addition, the sheriff's department under Sheriff Grady Ray will also be on patrol duty in county areas to assist the highway patrol with the unusually large flow of traffic expected if the weather remains good.

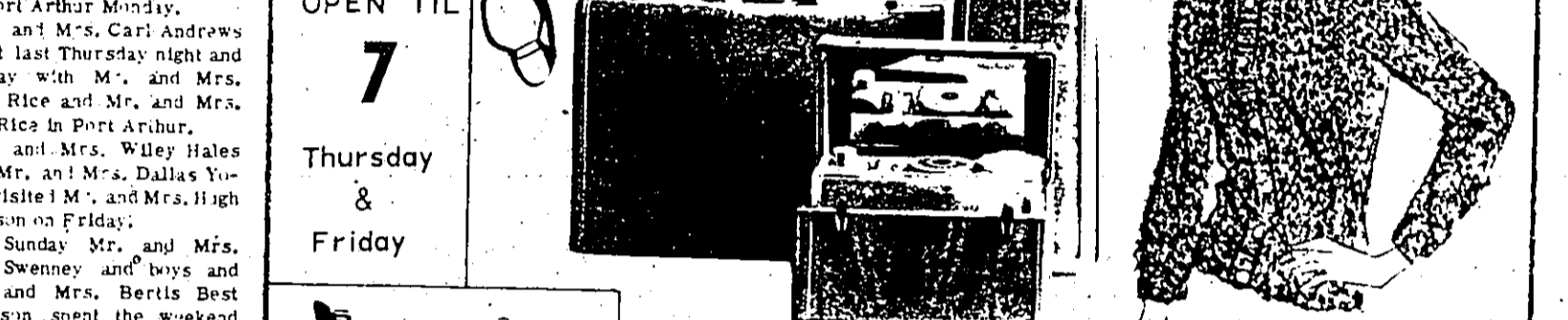

Health And Safety Tips From AMA

Are you up on your winter driving tips? Today's health, the magazine of the American Medical Association, offers some pointers that may save you considerable trouble and possibly help prevent a serious accident when snow and ice and freezing rain makes driving extra hazardous. Good defrosters are essential. If yours aren't in top shape get them fixed. Get a scraper with a blade on one end and a snow brush on the other, and keep it ready under the front seat. And keep several large rags handy for wiping windows, headlights, and taillights. Do your tires have good treads? Keep tires at full, recommended air pressure. Tire chains are useful for severe conditions. Keep a set in the trunk of your car for emergencies. Have your brakes equalized; a little difference can twist you into a skid on ice. Have muffler and tail pipes checked for leaks that might be deadly. Equip your car with a small shovel, box of sand, traction mats and tow rope, for emergencies. In a snow drift or on ice, start in second gear and power up just enough to avoid spinning the wheels. If you hit an unexpected ice patch, don't try to brake, accelerate or steer. Maintain speed and let your car "roll" through the slippery area. Steer in the direction of the skid. That is, if your car's rear end skids right, steer right. Attempts to jerk the wheel back straight will only make the skid worse. And, no matter what the weather, buckle your seat belt tight. It might save your life.

There are a couple of things just as good as money in the bank, and one of them is the privilege granted us to harvest a portion of the wildlife resources of the state each year. This is a bank deposit worth a great deal to all of us, and one that deserves our attention, protection and wise use. It's a wise man who knows there's a very little pleasure in hunting if you sit in your blind and worry about not having a license.

Fishing is free. A fishing license is needed to determine you are fishing on the day the individual receives his 17th birthday.

Dressing A Duck Easier Than The Undressing

When Mr. or Mrs. Nourse (this old girl gets blamed for a lot of things) put gaudy winter plumage on the wintertime, it was probably a lot easier than taking it off. Taking it off is your job after a m-m-m-m in the duck blind.

But there's an old rule of sportsmanship that says "if you kill it, dress it." This doesn't apply to boats.

Undressing a duck need not be the m-m-m job that most people like to make of it. There are several ways of doing it that are just as easy (and a little messier) than snipping a zipper.

Let's look at a couple of them, then look a little further at what to do with several pounds of pretty good meat.

First of all is the plucking that must be done if you plan to roast or broil the bird. If you plan on another method of cooking, possibly skinning is the answer.

To skin a duck, place the bird on its back, place a handful of feathers between the lower leg bone and the vent, slide the vent deeply with a sharp knife, then lift our intestines in one handful. Make a few stitches slit to allow you work the skin away from the body, down over the legs, and cut away skin and feathers with a couple of snips. All it needs now is washing in clear, cold water.

To pluck the bird, ready for grilling or roasting, but a bucket or large container if water, dip the bird just as you would a turkey or chicken. Remove from the water, place up bird on several thicknesses of newspaper, roll up tightly, twist ends of paper, and allow it to steam for three minutes. Unroll the paper, remove the bird, and you'll be delighted now with just your fingers. This is much easier than the method of dipping the bird in molten paraffin, which is a pretty messy job at the very best.

The last stage before preparing the meat for cooking is to remove the skin without removing the flavor. This is done quite simply by placing the bird in salted water for several hours. Change the water several times.

With no more preparation the meat is ready for cooking. Here a hunter gets the duck fever, his boss, but always is to drop by his local sporting goods shop first.

Proper clothing isn't an expensive item, decoys aren't exactly given away, but then most of our ducks will depend in only a few plastic decoys. There are others, of course, that should be decoyed with flocks of 40 to 75 decoys. We just don't have large populations of that type of duck through this part of Texas. Mallards are the most common to come in to a dozen decoys and sit right in the middle of them and make absolutely no sound if it is up north, and wags on the mean for tonight.

Ducks may appear dumb, but say a person under knows they are just about as dumb as Albert Einstein, and fooling them isn't just part of the fun of the game.

This is the time of the year when duck hunters begin to honestly count their blessings and disinterestedly see the sports they fire.

And don't forget your license if you need one and that duck stamp that's for sale at the post office. They help kill ducks.

Use them once, and you'll likely stay with them.

Place one of the birds, either one large one or two smaller ducks such as gadwall, blue-wing teal or even tiny-birds, in a large pot. Use game shears or poultry shears, but a sharp knife is just as good.

After cutting into quarters, place each quarter in foil wrap. Salt and pepper to taste. Place one pat of butter and one ounce of wine on each quarter. Pat the rest of the wine back in the oil-board. Incidentally, this should be either a domestic or imported white wine—never red.

Wrap tightly. Place on the grill, cooking 20 minutes on each side. Keep 8 inches above the heat. Cook about one half hour of sweet white wine, salt, pepper to taste. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Place ducks in large pan, cover breast with butter and mix above ingredients and place around the birds. Baste with sauce. Cook about one and one half hours for old birds, or about one hour for younger ones.

Not all lakes are good duck lakes, but some of them seem to be one third water and two thirds ducks. These are lakes that offer both food and hunters soon learn to recognize the ideal duck habitat. The premise is to have our large and small reservoirs. Too often overlooked is the small farm lake or pond that may be overlooked at certain times of the day.

Most ducks have eyesight equivalent to the man wearing a pair of binoculars. To attempt luring in birds without proper concealment and some type of decoy blocks leaves the hunter in the position of trusting to luck.
