

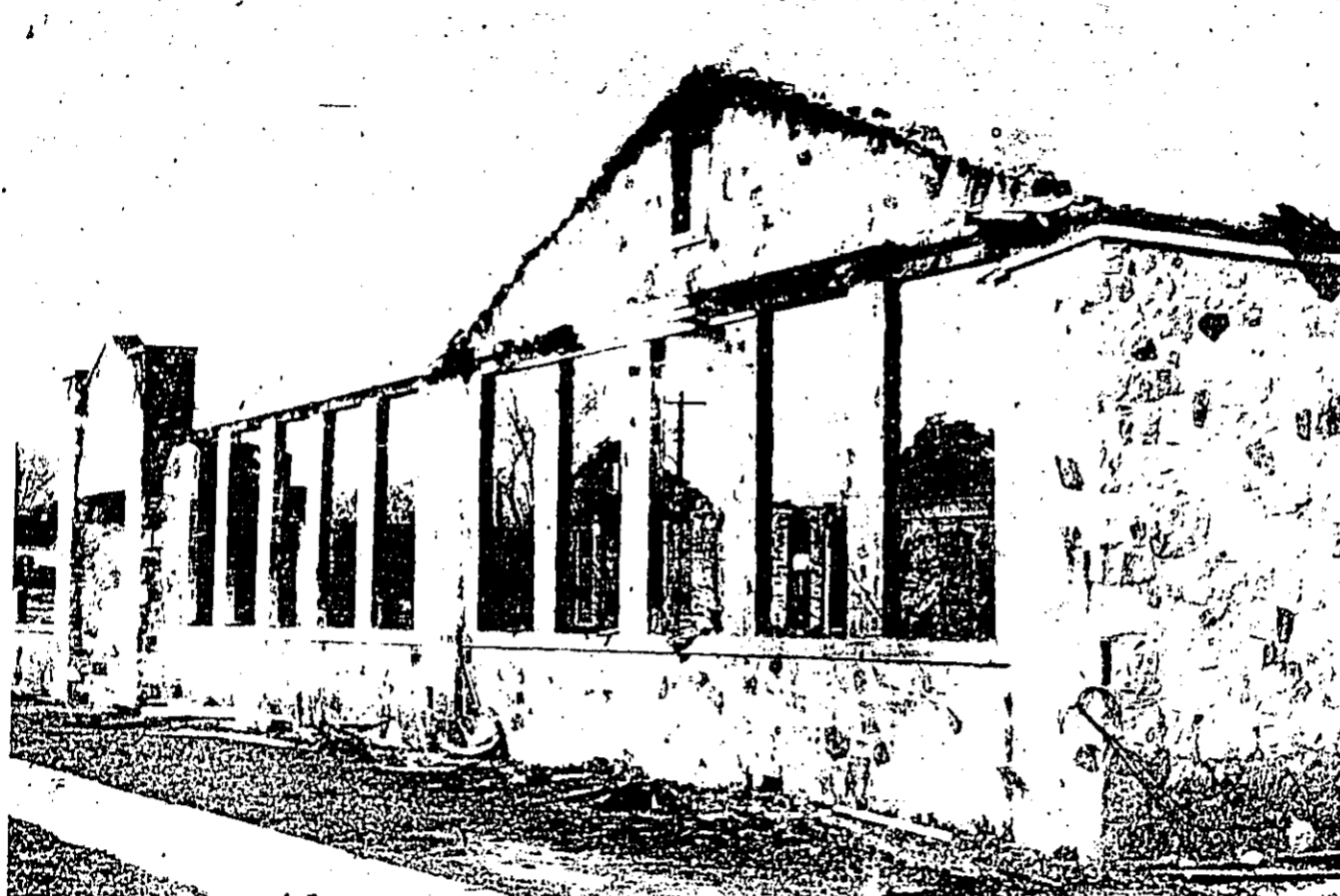

## "Old Rock Building" Goes Up In Smoke



"The Old Rock Building" as hundreds of Woodville school children have known it since 1937, went up in smoke December 14 as one of the top news stories of the county in 1966. Used as an elementary school building, the structure was constructed in 1936 and 1937 under the Works Progress Administration project. When it burned, it housed the third and fourth grade

classes numbering 176 pupils, who have been holding classes in other parts of the school system since the fire. In the picture, just the walls of the building, made of rock quarried at Rockland, are shown as they stood following the fire. The building got its name from its rugged rock walls, which were knocked down following the fire as a safety measure.

The long Christmas holiday period passed without a serious traffic accident in Tyler County, according to Patrolman Joe Wilmon.

Traffic was heavy, and Monday was wet and damp with highways in dangerous condition most of the day. Most drivers observed safety rules and in spite of the heavy flow of traffic few violations were reported.

The highway patrol in Tyler County was on an alert from 6 p.m. Friday until midnight Monday. Patrolman Wilmon reported that there were five arrests for driving while intoxicated during this period. The Department of Public Safety had predicted 47 traffic deaths during the holiday period. Latest county Tuesday showed a total of 48 traffic deaths, one more than the DPS prediction. The number of fatalities were running below the prediction until Monday when rain and fog made driving conditions in the south and southeast part of the state dangerous and fatal accidents picked up sharply.

## GRADY JAMES AMONG '80 EASTEX EMPLOYEES WHO ARE HONORED AT DINNER

Eighty employees of Eastex incorporated were honored at a Service Awards Dinner December 19 and received service awards reflecting their length of service with the company.

The Service Awards Dinner was held at the Royal Masonic in Houston. An outstanding program was presented for this occasion, and a number of Eastex officials were present also.

Service awards were presented annually to Eastex incorporated employees upon the completion of five years of service, or of some "longer" increments of service.

The highest award this year went to W. C. Weathersby, who received a gold watch in recognition of thirty years of service with the Southwestern Timber Division of Eastex. Twenty-year service pins were presented to R. P. Hicks, G. W. James and M. M. Wilson, also of the Southwestern Timber Division. ## News Of The Year In Review

A brief review of the news in Tyler County in 1966 is compiled from the files of the Tyler County Booster.

**January**--Building permits in the City of Woodville totaled \$34,470 in 1966, according to reports in the city hall. Largest was to Woodville Methodist Church for \$10,000 for the new educational building.

E. H. Casper was announced as the new manager of First Christian Church in Woodville. He came here from Welch, Louisiana on December 23, 1964.

Rabbi Fred A. Ben-Tovim of the Texas Forest Service totaled 37.3 inches in 1966. This was about the same rainfall that fell in 1965, which was 37.3 inches. The 1966 average is 41.85 inches annually.

The Women's Auxiliary Club recently presented the Woodville Volunteer Fire Department with a check for \$1,000.

Tyler County Commissioners' Council set Monday as the date for a bond election to provide \$10 million for \$10 million in State Highway Department's planned road building program in the county.

Davis District 2-4-1 held its mid-winter conference here with a catered lunch of 300 members from this area. Federal Judge Joe Fisker was speaker.

George E. Tibb was installed as president of the Woodville Chamber of Commerce at the annual banquet January 23. Wyatt Bell is new vice president.

Federal services for James Alexander (Cecil James) Dickens, Tyler County's oldest citizen at 106, held at Midway, January 22.

February--Sue Lerway of Woodville, Amanda Haralson of Colmesneil and Lela Mul-

ins of Warren were selected as Good Citizenship award winners for their respective schools. The awards will be presented by the Daniel Walker chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution. Advance tickets for the 1966 Tyler County Dogwood Festival will be on sale February 3. Flower market for the festival began February 7. Chapter membership drive for Pine Hill Residential Development, Inc. began February 5.

A total of 2100 poll taxes were sold in county, according to Tax Assessor-Collector A. J. Thornum. Rose Frasier was named "Home-maker of Tomorrow" at Scott High School.

Clyde Gray, chairman of the Tyler County Tourist Development Commission, announced that 175,000 brochures have been printed and are

ready for distribution. Of these, 100,000 are in full color and 75,000 are visitor guides for local distribution to visitors. The full color brochures will be distributed throughout the area, state highway information centers, etc.

The March of Dimes campaign in Tyler County raised \$12,111, according to Walter Haskel, county chairman.

J. W. Tubb, 82, longtime business and real estate man, died March 2 after an extended illness.

George John Connally landed at Tyler County airport March 18 and made a landing in his biplane, which he officially opened the 1966 tourist program in the Indian Reservation.

County voters in a special election March 12 rejected the proposed right-of-way bond issue.

Amanda Haralson was elected the 1966 Tyler County Dogwood Queen March 25 by Mayor Lewis Wagoner of Sargent. James Paul was chosen by Mrs. Haralson to serve as king. A capacity crowd saw the coronation and parade at Tyler County Under-Market.

April--A curious incident was added to the April 4, 1966, and 107 persons from Southeast Texas received certificates of appreciation which were presented by Rev. John Dowdy.

The county's retired people held a meeting April 1 to organize a Retirees Club. W. L. Burch was named president; Roy Sturrock, vice-president; Max Lolla, Sturrock recording secretary; and A. G. Thomas, chairman. The club is sponsored by Citizens State Bank.

The Indian Reservation tourist season opened April 8 with facilities open on weekends.

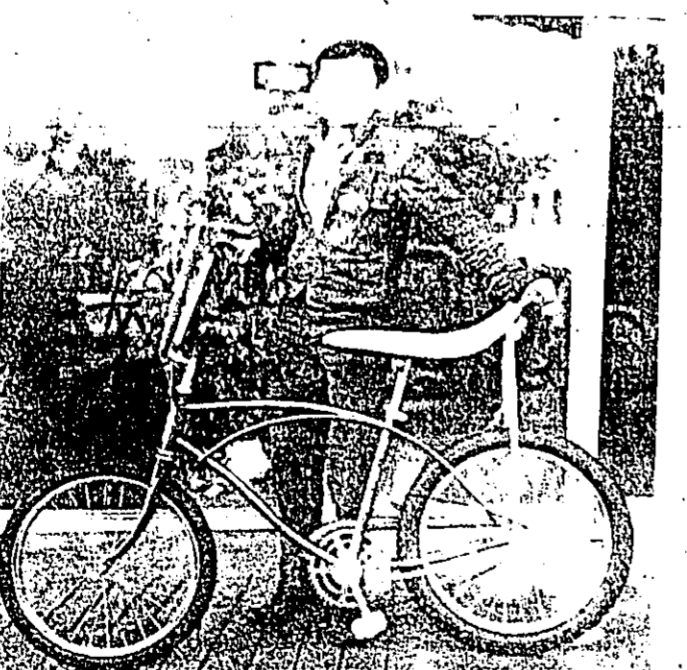
### Winners Named In Home Light Decorations

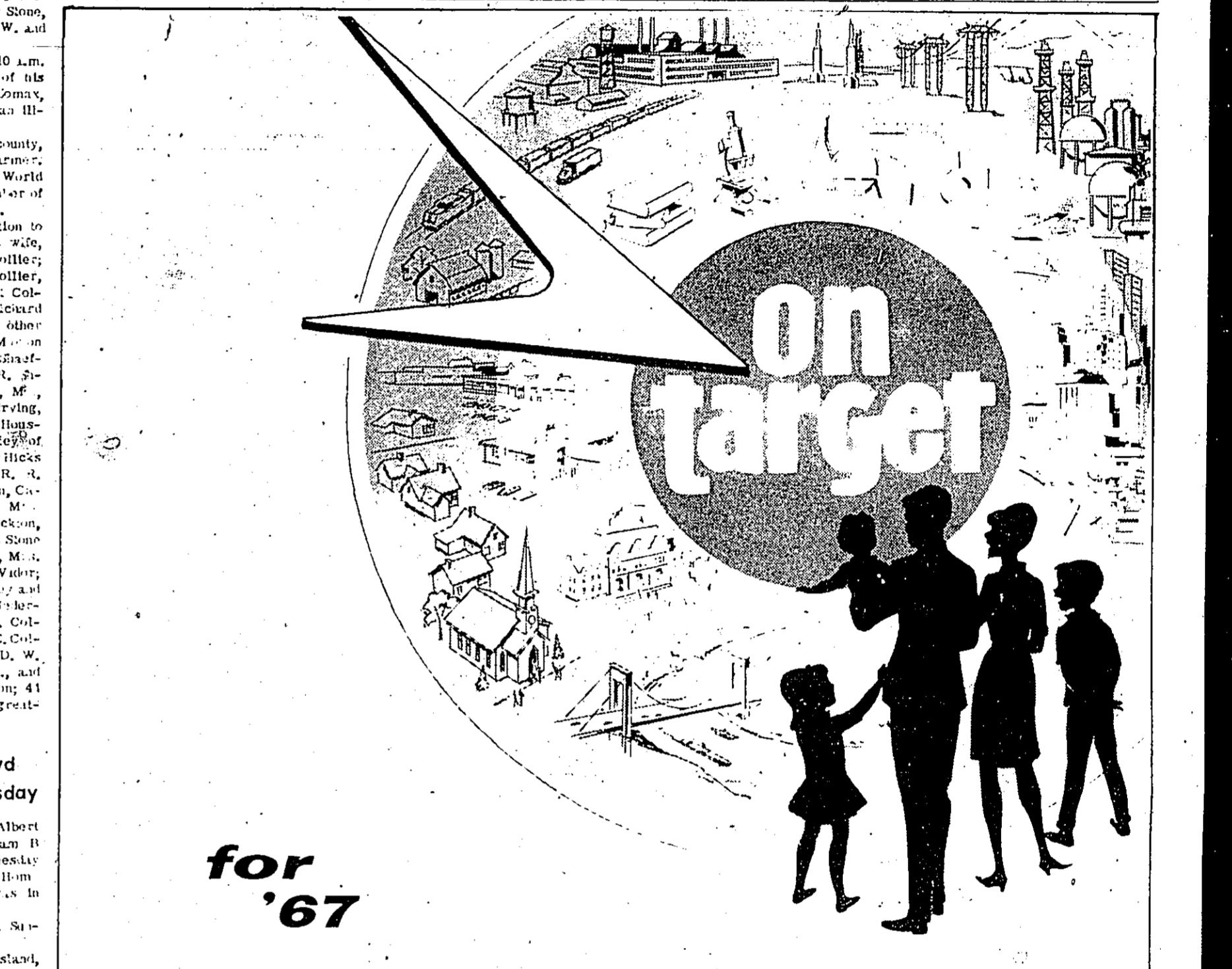

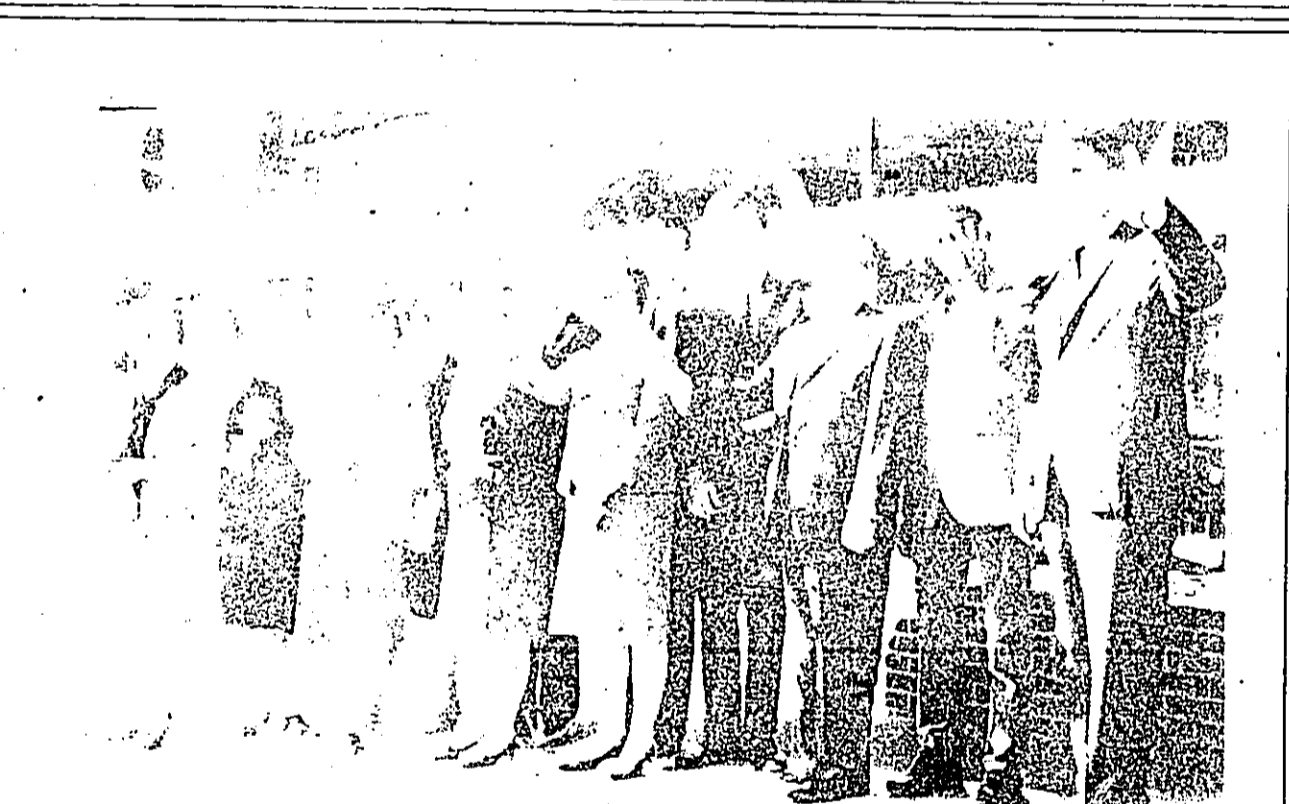
