christmas and New Year holidays. Highway Patrolman Joe Willmon said Tuesday that during both holidays he had investigated only one accident. This occurred Monday night when a car overturned near Colmesnell. There were no injuries in the accident, Willmon said. The driver was charged with driving while intoxicated in county court Tuesday morning and released on bond.
This was the second driving while intoxicated charge filed over the New Year weekend. The first charge was filed Saturday and the driver was also charged in justice court with driving without a license. The two charges of driving while intoxicated filed over the New Year holiday period brings the total number of such charges filed in December to ten, according to Patrolman Willmon. Five persons were charged with DWI during the Christmas holiday. In the city of Woodville, several fender-bending accidents were reported over the New Year's holiday but no serious accidents occurred. Patrolman Willmon and other officers said that the traffic through the county was much lighter than anticipated over the New Year holiday period.

County Officials Are Sworn In Tuesday

Tyler County's officials who were elected at the elections in 1966 were sworn into office Tuesday morning with J. Allen Mooney performing the ceremony in the county court room.

Only two new faces will be in Tyler County's official family for the new four year term. They are Otha Miles, who was elected county clerk to replace Tom Sawyer, who did not seek reelection, and James Jordan of Spurger, new commissioner of precinct four who will succeed F. C. Hicks. Others sworn in at the ceremony were re-elected to office. They are Clarence Woodrome, precinct two justice of the peace; Jeff R. Mooney, county judge; H. H. Powell, precinct two commissioner; Hilda Coats, district clerk; J. F. Boyd, county treasurer; B. M. Minter, county school superintendent.

Joe Loggins, precinct one justice of the peace who was re-elected, was unable to be present at the mass swearing in and was sworn in later. Hicks and Sawyer, the two retiring county officials, had held office longer than any others in the court house. Sawyer had been county clerk for 16 years and Hicks had served as commissioner for 14 years.

Warden To Speak At Hospital Aux

Kenneth N. Coleman, warden of the Ferguson Unit of the Texas Department of Corrections, will be the speaker at the meeting of the Tyler County Hospital Auxiliary Tuesday at 9:30 a.m.

The meeting will be held in the Kirby High School Auditorium instead of at the hospital in order to afford room for the general public to hear Mr. Coleman. The auxiliary urges that parents and others interested in the welfare of young people attend the meeting.

The students of Kirby High School will be special guests for the program. The Ferguson Unit was built for the purpose of segregating the young first offenders 17 to 21 years old from the older and recidivist inmates (repeaters). It was opened March 2, 1962, with facilities available to develop and maintain a modern rehabilitative program.

Mr. Coleman became warden of the Ferguson Unit in 1965 after serving as assistant warden beginning in 1963. He is a native of Huntsville and received a bachelor of science degree from Sam Houston State College, where he is presently working on a masters degree. He was employed by the Department of Corrections in 1959 and returned to the department after a short tour in the Armed Services in 1961.

Dear Vicki:
I turned out to be the lucky GI who turned up with your Christmas ditty packages, and thought I'd give the portfolio a first tryout by writing a note of thanks this afternoon while I have a little free time. I've already read a bit into the book that was included, "The Russians Are Coming", and find it enjoyable reading. As a matter of fact, I enjoyed and can use virtually everything sent in your gift. More though, I, and a lot of others like me, appreciate the thought behind the Christmas gifts. It's a gift in itself to know that there are obviously many people at home that do care about this war and the cause for which it is being fought. Most of the packages that arrived for this battalion were from towns in Texas, which pleased both myself (from Albuquerque, New Mexico) and our battalion commanders, Lt. Col. Rhodes, who is from Texas originally.

In case you're wondering, the 19th Engineer Battalion is located about 7 miles west of Qui Nhon. We are technically classed as a combat engineer battalion, and indeed have spent most of the last three months in combat support of the 1st Cav. Division on Operation "Tiger." However, we have been in the past and are now presently engaged in heavy construction, and have built everything from POL tank farms to airfields.
Today (Christmas) turned out sunny and warm (about 90 degrees), a welcome relief from the rains that have plagued us for the past several months, and your gift certainly helped to make it pleasurable. I hope you also had a good Christmas. Keep your support behind us, things may seem a little confused at times (they are), but we're fighting for a principle which I'm sure is both right and just.

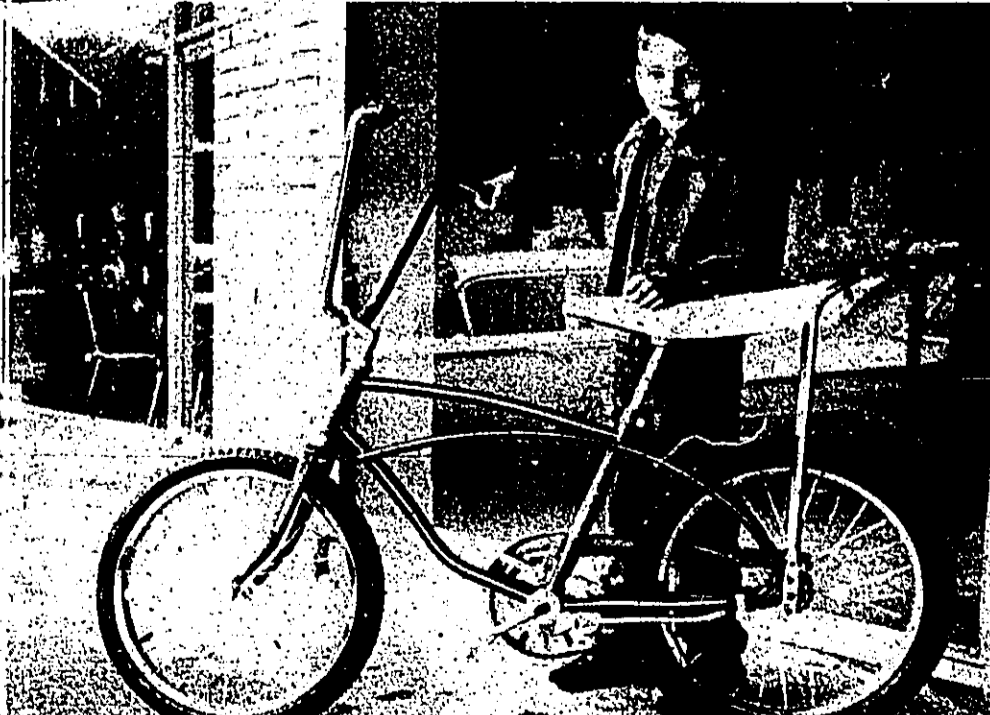
Man Drowns At Dam B Thursday On Fishing Trip

Orlando Walters, 41, was drowned at Dam B Reservoir Thursday of last week when he evidently fell from his fishing boat while trying to pour gasoline into the motor. He was reported missing by his wife, Mrs. Marilyn Williams Walters, when he failed to return from a fishing trip Thursday night. Jasper County officers and the Jasper County rescue unit, aided by Tyler County officers and game wardens, searched for the body Thursday night, and it was found Friday morning near where his boat was found. Ray Ellis, Jasper County justice of the peace, ruled that death was due to accidental drowning.
Mr. Walters was a native of Village Mills, but had lived in Liberty most of his life. He was an oil field worker, and retired in 1950 due to an accident. He was paralyzed from the waist down.
Walters was a Baptist. He was a member of the Disabled Veterans, having served in World War II.
Funeral services were held Sunday in a Dayton funeral home with burial in the Dayton cemetery.

Farmers Income To Remain About Same, Profit To Be Less

Higher production costs have caused farmers' net income to drop in 1967, and the outlook for 1968 indicates more of the same. The 1967 net income per acre of the average farm in the United States was \$10.50, down from \$11.50 in 1966, according to a report by the Agricultural Research Service.

The report, based on data from the 1966-67 season, shows that the average farmer's net income per acre was \$10.50, or 10 percent of the total value of the farm's output. This is a decrease from 11.5 percent in 1966.

The report also shows that the average farmer's gross income per acre was \$100.00, or 100 percent of the total value of the farm's output. This is a decrease from 110 percent in 1966.

The report notes that the decrease in net income is due to higher production costs, particularly for fertilizers and pesticides. It also notes that the average farmer's net income per acre is still higher than in 1965.

At the end of 1966, there were fewer farms in this part of the county's district, which comprises Trinity, Polk, San Jacinto, Tyler, Jasper, and Newton counties, than at the beginning of the year, and a large number of acres were taken out of agricultural production for roads and lakes, housing developments and other uses.

The use of technology increased significantly here during the year, Mr. Jones said. Despite tight money, farmers in the area are investing more and more in new farm machinery and equipment each year, and spend more on fertilizers, herbicides, insecticides, and other chemicals.

Life on the farm continues to improve for those who still remain there, though every year the farm and ranch population decreases somewhat in the cities and suburbs. In 1966, net farm income per acre in the U.S. was \$4,900, an increase of 65 percent over 1965. But there were 17 percent fewer farms at the end of 1966, so the real per-acre increase was probably closer to 3 percent.

Where do American farmers go from here? As indicated by developments of the last couple of years, the next big breakthrough on farms will be the sophisticated use of calculators, and computers. "Farms are becoming bigger and bigger and more mechanized," says the report. "They will be run by business men, who will show them what crops can be planted most profitably, how and when to use capital, what kinds of livestock to buy and when to sell them, and so on."

HOMEMAKING HINTS

By Mrs. Maurine J. Mooney, County HDA

Mortgage loans to buy homes are becoming more difficult to obtain. Therefore, many people find it easier to get loans to improve their present homes than to buy new homes. Lenders get a better return on home improvement loans than on mortgages.

There is a considerable variation in rates on home improvement loans, but the charges currently run from 6 to 8 percent and over in many areas. This may be a discount loan and the rate charged on the full amount of the loan for the entire period of repayment.

The actual rate is about twice the stated rate or about twice the rate charged when interest is paid only on the unpaid balance. Many lenders require repayment in 12 months, while others permit a more liberal extension of time.

While the actual annual rate on a loan for home improvement is higher than on a mortgage, the dollar cost to the borrower may be lower because of the fast repayment. Suppose a family secures a home improvement loan of \$1,000 at a 12 percent rate. If the loan is repaid in 12 months, the actual rate is 9.3 percent. This is true if the interest is paid on the full amount of the loan for the entire repayment period. The total dollar cost of the loan would be \$100.

If you add \$1,000 to a 20-year mortgage at 6 percent, the dollar cost of the loan would be \$718. These more loans that range from 4 1/2 to 6 pounds are coming to market. Since improvement loans to buy homes are becoming more difficult to obtain, many people find it easier to get loans to improve their present homes than to buy new homes. 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Burton Hensarling Helps Air Force Unit Win Trophy

Airman Third Class Burton L. Hensarling, who is the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Hensarling of Woodville, provided essential support to help his organization win the coveted Smith Trophy as the best air defense ground unit in the U.S. Air Force.

Airman Hensarling is a member of the Air Defense Command's (ADC) 30th Air Division, which received the trophy during ceremonies at Scott AFB, Texas, November 19. The Airman is assigned at Pickett Air Force Station, Texas, as an administrative specialist.

His division station at Scott AFB is equipped with the latest electronic equipment, maintains air surveillance over the U. S. central plains with the Semi-Automatic Ground Environment (SAGE) radar system.

Airman Hensarling and other personnel on the Smith Trophy for the best defensive combat capability during the year by scoring 6,300 of a possible 6,500 points. The phase of the stiff competition included a computer-simulated enemy air attack, in which the unit's operational readiness to detect, identify and, if necessary, intercept and destroy approaching aircraft.

The rotating trophy was originally sponsored in 1963 by the Joint Chiefs of Staff to promote through competition the efficiency of isolated Air Defense Ground Units. The 30th, then known as the Sioux City Air Defense Sector, was the first to win the trophy.

Employment in County Up 32 Per Cent In Year

Employment in Tyler County rose 32 percent between March 1965 and March 1966, according to figures compiled by the Bureau of Economic Analysis of the U. S. Department of Commerce.

The figures are included in the bureau's recent publication, "County Business Patterns, 1965-1966." The 1964-1965 period is the latest for which figures are available.

County business patterns are gathered from payroll information for the first quarter of each year, submitted from the Social Security Administration and other employment agencies. In most cases, the figures are based on existing government and agricultural workers and the self-employed.

According to the information compiled by electronic computer for Tyler County, the number of employees in business owned by the report in the county in March of 1965 was 1455. The number of employees a year earlier, in March 1964, was 1091. Firm quarter payrolls for 1965 totaled \$12,211,000, as compared with \$9,770,000 in 1964.

Manufacturers were the largest group of employees in the county with 713 employees in March 1965 and a 31 percent payroll of \$4,870,000. Retail trade was the second largest group with 388 employees and a quarterly payroll of \$3,900,000 for the same period.

Tyler county ranked 131st among the 177 counties in Texas in the number of employees in business as reported by the report for March 1965. Harris County was first with 481,655 employees. Jefferson county was fifth with 68,897 persons employed. Employment in Texas as a whole rose some 5 percent between March 1964 and March 1965. Business patterns reported a total of \$18,881 million in the latter date.

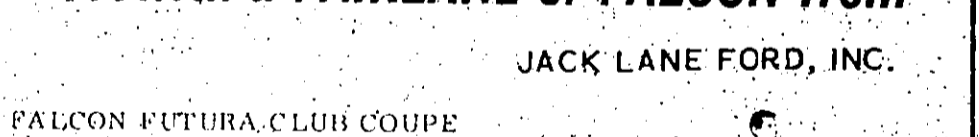
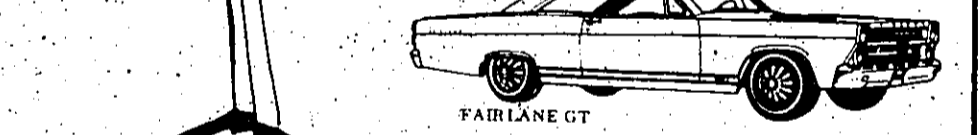

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County Agent Reports

By Clinton R. Currie

The end of the growing season is a local time for taking and getting soil tested. Don't wait until the spring rush of field work to do this important job.

Soil sample boxes, information sheets and tips on how to take soil samples are all available from the office of the county agent, C.S. and A.S.S. A soil auger of probe is the best tool for taking soil samples; however, a spade is acceptable.

A good soil sample is a moist 1 1/2 inch diameter ball of soil. It is to be taken from the actual plant root situation in an open field. Several samples should be taken at different depths over the field and then mixed into a composite sample for the field.

Each composite sample should be numbered and the information sheet covering the field completely filled out. The information on the sheet is valuable to the soil scientist when they make their fertilizer recommendations.

By taking soil samples as soon as crops are harvested, time can be saved and the areas of the state the fertilizer of those crops applied when the soil is prepared for next spring's crop.

Stored Gasoline

While it is convenient to have a can of gasoline for lawn mowers and other small engines around the home and garage, the fuel should not be stored longer than 7 months. Gasoline is made of a mixture of several hydrocarbons, and the lighter parts evaporate and the heavier parts settle to the bottom. This causes the gasoline to become unusable for the engine.

Gasoline that has been stored for a long time should be used in a small engine, such as a lawnmower, and the engine should be run for a few minutes before use. If the gasoline is to be used in a larger engine, such as a car, it should be replaced.

Safety

These prescriptions are for the use of the farmer and the home owner. They are not to be used as a substitute for the professional advice of a physician.

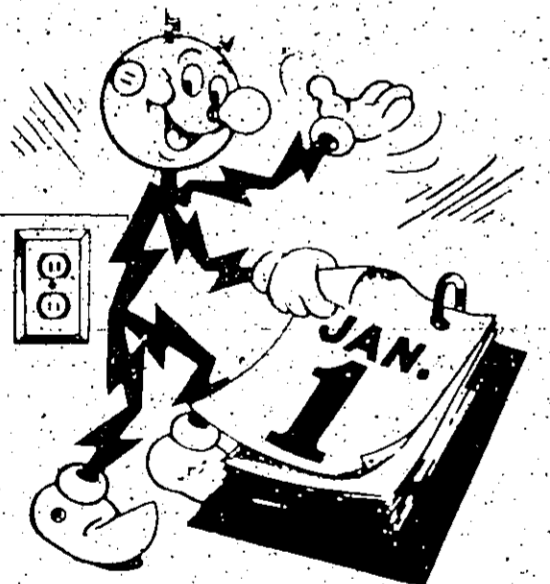

Use caution when using ladders, and make sure they are on level ground. Do not use ladders for anything other than their intended purpose.

Tips On Cattle Feeding

Feeding cattle is a science. The amount of feed should be based on the animal's weight and the quality of the feed. It is important to provide a balanced ration that includes protein, energy, and minerals.

Use high-quality hay and concentrate feeds. Avoid feeding moldy or spoiled feed. Provide clean water at all times.

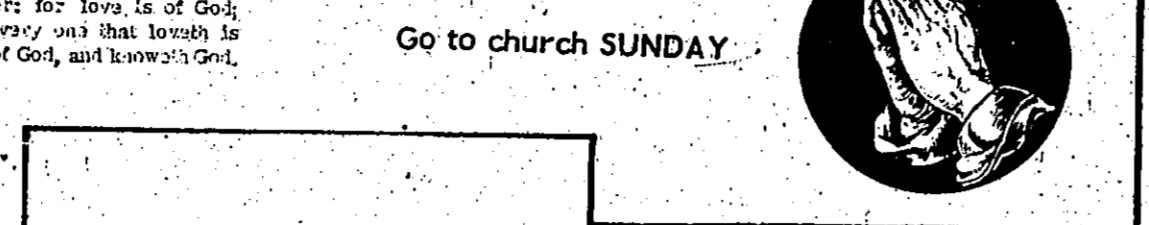
