Citizens Over 60 Are Exempt From Voter Registration

A. L. (Pete) Thornton said Tuesday that until the legislature comes up with the voter registration law approved by Texas voters in November, the same regulations on registration will apply as it did on poll taxes except that there is no charge.

The question had arisen as to whether persons over 60 years of age are required to register to vote. Thornton said that according to the present regulations, persons over 60 are not required to register if they live in towns of 10,000 population or less. However, all others will have to register by January 31 in order to cast a ballot in any elections held in 1967.

The legislature, now beginning its session, is expected to pass legislation setting up an annual registration period and other rules as authorized in the amendment approved by voters in the general election.

New Parcel Post Rates, Zip Code Sorting To Begin

Use of ZIP Code will make it easier to mail packages after January 15, Postmaster H. M. Durham of Woodville said today.

New rates and a new system for identifying parcel post zones will go into effect on that date as provided in legislation signed into law by President Johnson on September 20, 1966; the postmaster pointed out.

The rate increases will average about 10 cents a parcel. Starting July 1, the law provides for a series of size and weight increases on packages mailed between first-class offices. Woodville is a first class office. The size and weight increases will be in five annual steps, the last coming on July 1, 1971.

Use of ZIP Code in the recipient's address will enable the sender of a mail clerk to quickly determine the proper zone, and thus the rate, for the package. The zones will be based on the distance a parcel travels between the 552 sectional centers in the country.

By consulting a simple chart, which is available at all post offices, the zone can be readily identified because the first three numbers of the ZIP Code represent the sectional center. This replaces a method in which a directory often had to be consulted to locate the proper zone for each of the nation's 33,000 post offices.

The new rates will range from 40 cents for a three pound parcel destined for local delivery to 60 cents for the same parcel to zone 3 (150 to 300 miles) to \$1.05 to zone 8 (over 1,800 miles). The new zoning method will also apply to air parcel post, catalogs and topublishers who pay zone rates on the advertising portion of their periodicals.

Postmaster Durham noted that all parcels mailed between post offices within the Lufkin Texas sectional center will be charged at the first zone rate. There are 31 post offices within the Lufkin Texas, 75979, sectional center.

The new rates are expected to provide an additional \$74 million a year for the Post office Department. The later size and weight increases will add another \$32 million a year. The additional revenue is to help keep the Department within 4 percent of costs on parcel post as the law requires.

All members of the court were present including James R. Jordan, newly elected commissioner. E. proclmer four holdover and re-elected members are County Judge Jeff H. Mooney, Commissioners Joe L. Boyd, proclmer 1; E. H. Powell, proclmer 2; and Leo Foster, proclmer three.

Routine business, including payment of current bills, was first attended to by the commissioners before getting into the questions of salaries and other matters for the year.

Elected county officials have been drawing \$6700 a year with the exception of District Clerk Hilda Crats and Treasurer J. E. Boyd, whose salary has been \$6000 for the past year.

Warden Of Youth Unit Is Speaker At Hospital Aux



Kenneth S. Coleman, warden of the Ferguson Unit of the Texas Department of Corrections, was the speaker at the meeting of the Tyler County Hospital Auxiliary Tuesday morning in Kirby High School auditorium.

Mr. Coleman described the purpose of the Ferguson Unit, which is for first offenders in the 17 to 21 age bracket. He told of the grim side of prison life, what a prison is, and corrected many misconceptions about prisons.

Besides the auxiliary members and guests, about 275 Kirby High students were present for the talk.

Mr. Coleman told of a survey among youthful offenders as to why they committed the crime for which they were convicted. Many were running with the wrong crowd, some said they needed money, and at least one said that he committed an offense because he just didn't have anything else to do.

"He has something to do now," Mr. Coleman said. "Ten years."

The Ferguson Unit was opened in March 1962 for first offenders from 17 to 21 to keep them from older and more hardened criminals, and in order to carry out a program of rehabilitation. In order to make useful citizens of them on their release.

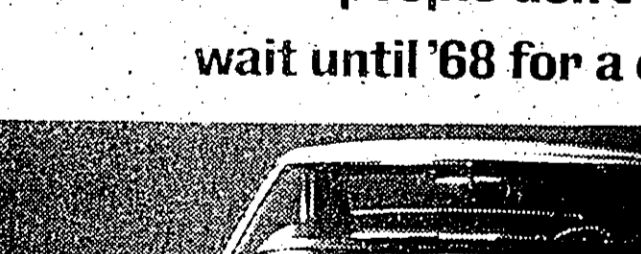

THE FAMILY LAWYER

John, alone with Edward in an elevator, says to him: "You are a crook."

Assuming that Edward is not a crook, could he collect damages for defamation of character? No, because nobody else heard what John said.

Generally speaking, the "defame" someone is to injure his reputation. If no one hears the accusation except the accused person himself, then his reputation has not suffered at all.

While a private, face-to-face insult might occasionally amount to a criminal offense, it is not grounds for a defamation suit unless there is a third party in the picture.

This applies not only to oral defamation (slander) but also to written defamation (libel). For example:

A man writes a hostile letter to the widow next door, accusing her of stealing his car. It happens to be wrong, and she sues him for defamation of character.

The court denied her claim, because the matter was made the subject known to anyone else that her.

Suppose that such a letter, although mailed to one particular individual, is also read by a third party. If the writer should have foreseen that possibility, then he may be held responsible for making his accusation public.

The wholesale grocery salesman, Ikkel at one of his customers, wrote him a scurrilous letter. But the customer's secretary opened the letter and read it before passing it along to her boss.

Was the salesman liable for defamation? The court said yes, because he was familiar with the secretary's habit of checking the mail. The court said he should have foreseen that his accusations would become public just one day later.

But there is no liability if the third party, even though he sees or hears the accusation, cannot understand it. In one case, a virtuous woman was accused of immorality in front of her very young children. A court found no defamation, since the children, not to mention what the words meant.

As the essence of the injury is the hurt to the victim's reputation, it is the effect upon the minds of the hearers. And here there was no effect at all.

Postmasters Warn Damaging Mail Boxes Is Offense

Mailboxes are protected by Federal law, and pranksters or vandals who damage or destroy the boxes and their contents may be in for a heavy fine or imprisonment. Postmaster Durham, quoted from the law, "Whoever willfully or maliciously injures, tears down or destroys any letterbox or other receptacle intended or used for the receipt or delivery of mail on the post office, or breaks open any mail route, or breaks open the same or willfully or maliciously injures, defaces or destroys any mail deposited therein, shall be fined not more than \$1,000 or imprisoned not more than three years."

Motorists Asked To Have Autos Inspected Early

Col. Honor Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, reminded Texas motorists today that most vehicles have not yet been inspected for their 1967 vehicle inspection stickers.

"The inspection period is two-thirds over and only about one-third of the vehicles have been inspected," said Garrison. "This means that during the 14 weeks remaining before the April 15 deadline for inspections, more than twice as many persons each week must have their cars inspected to avoid long lines forming at the end of the period."

In urging motorists to have their vehicles inspected at an early date, Garrison pointed out that official inspection stations are easily identified by the standard sign displayed at or near the service entrance of the garage.

"It is advised that inspection stations are being urged to request permission to inspect any vehicle brought into the garage for repairs or regular service."

"In this way," Garrison pointed out, "stalls will be saved for the motorist as well as for the inspection station."

"And if you have not had your vehicle inspected, take it to one of the 5,500 authorized inspection stations for a complete check-up and start the new year off right with a safe vehicle."

He attended Delticker (I.) High School and completed his high school education through the General Educational Development Test.

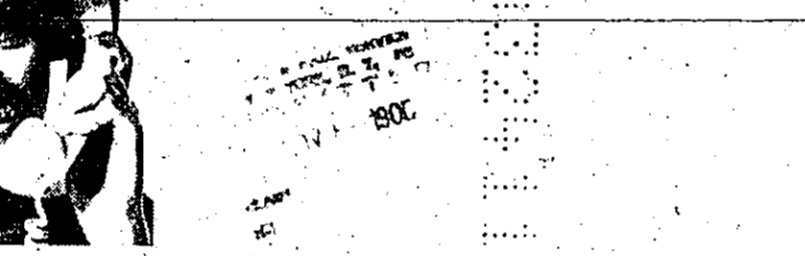
Major H. E. Erwin Decorated For Vietnam Action

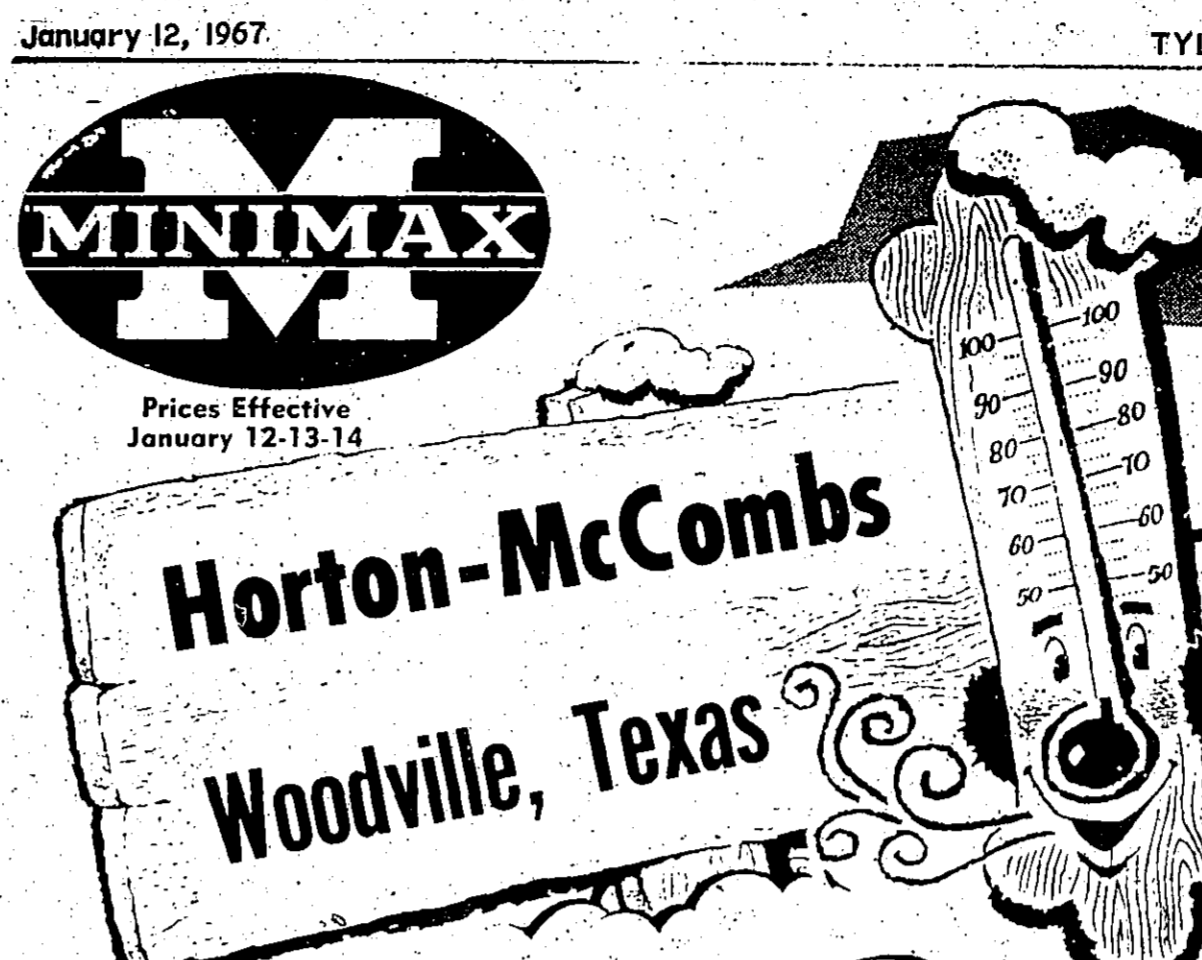
