Alford Takes Helm Of C Of C For Year

Over 225 persons, including members and guests, attended the annual membership banquet of the chamber of commerce Friday night in Dogwood Motor Hotel where they heard an inspirational address by Luman W. Holman of Jacksonville, received a report on the past year from the outgoing president George E. Tubb, and a brief outline of the new year's work by the incoming president Major F. Alford.

The membership in a brief business meeting presided over by Mr. Tubb adopted a new set of by-laws which changed the name of the organization to the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce. Mr. Tubb and a committee had drawn up the new by-laws which, in addition to the name change, streamlined the procedures of the chamber to act more quickly through committees.

Mr. Holman, prominent Jacksonville businessman and civic leader, delivered a masterful talk using the four points of the compass as an outline. Entitled "Field Notes For Engineers", the address was based on the theme that to accomplish goals, it was necessary to start from a point and chart a course in the straightest line to the goal. Using the initials of the four points of the compass, he outlined the plan of action as Navigate, Enlist, Serve and Work.

Starting with navigation, he said that it was necessary to determine where you are and where your goal is in order to plan the steps necessary to accomplish anything. Then you must enlist yourself and others to carry out the program, serve and work toward the accomplishment of the goal.

Harry Stafford was master of ceremonies at the banquet. Introduction of special guests was made by Morris Clemmons, Jr. In addition to town guests, these included Judy Sturrock, state president of the Future Homemakers, escorted by John Gilchrist, and Miss Paula Allison, national plantist of the FHA, escorted by Kenneth Weaver.

Miss Barbara Clark provided the music for the banquet. The Rev. Edias Comeaux, minister of the First Christian Church of Woodville, brought the invocation. The benediction was by J. Everett Kennerly, elder of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints.

In his report of the year's activities, Mr. Tubb said that in his opinion the rewriting of the organization's by-laws was one of the major accomplishments. Other activities included the co-sponsorship of the Texas Institute for Small Museums, a dinner for Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas, and another for Will Odom, chairman of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission.

Mr. Tubb also commended the work through the years done by J.B. Coffman, and awarded a life membership in the chamber of commerce to Mr. Coffman. He also introduced Mrs. Marjorie Landers, who has retired as secretary of the organization, and presented her with a

Vernon Glass, head of the coaching staff at Lamar Tech in Beaumont, will be the speaker at the annual athletic banquet at Kirby High School which will be held in the school lunchroom Friday night. Tickets at \$1.50 per plate are available at the school office and at Jarrott's Pharmacy. The banquet will begin at 7 p.m.

Coach Charles McCarty of KHS said that the school was fortunate to be able to have Mr. Glass for the speaker. Glass has a varied career in junior and senior colleges, and became head coach at Lamar Tech in 1963. His previous experience had been as assistant and head coach at Del Mar Junior College, Corpus Christi, and backfield coach under John Bridgers at Baylor for three years.

C of C Meets Monday Night

A meeting of the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce was held at Dogwood Motor Hotel Monday night with 12 directors present. The meeting was presided over by the president, Major F. Alford. Members voted to purchase a flag for Cub Pack 37 and it was announced that the pack will use the community room at Citizens State Bank as its regular meeting place. Discussion of house numbering and the fixing of responsibility for numbering houses was discussed. Mr. Alford appointed R.E. Jackson as representative of the chamber to work out an arrangement so the assignment of house numbers may be handled at the City Hall.

Dr. John G. Gilchrist made a motion seconded by Tom McCullough to change the meeting date of the chamber to the first Monday following the first Tuesday. This will allow a monthly financial report to be made. The motion carried. The group also voted to take a \$25 ad in the East Texas Vacation Guide which is published by the East Texas Chamber of Commerce. The group set March 1 as the date to begin a membership drive to enlist new members.

In 1964, Glass coached the Lamar Cardinals to their first football title, and they played in the Pecan Bowl, losing 17-19 to State College of Iowa. He was named small college coach of the year for Division VII. In 1965, the Cardinals won their second title in a row, and in 1966 they were Lone Starland Conference co-champions.

Glass was all-state quarterback at Corpus Christi Millor High School in 1946. He attended Rice University and in 1949 was quarterback on the Southwest Conference and Cotton Bowl champion Rice team. While in the Air Force, he was quarterback of Carroll Air Force team that won the 1951 national service championship.

Scout Week Observed Across U. S.

Local Cubs, Scouts and Explorers will join with the 5,831,541 active in Scouting throughout the nation in the celebration of Boy Scout Week, February 7-13. Wednesday, February 8, marks the 57th anniversary of the Scouting program in the United States. Hundreds of special events are being marked on calendars as the 8,700 Scouts in the 12 county area of the Trinity-Neches Council plan for the observance of Boy Scout Week. "During the week, Scouts will demonstrate how Scouting rounds a boy out," Council President George Morgan explained, "and will show how boys who receive Scout training will be prepared to become the better men needed for a stronger America."

All Cubs, Scouts and Explorers are being urged to attend the church of their choice in full uniform during Scout Week. Sunday, February 12 has been designated as Scout Sunday. Many churches are using a special Scout Sunday bulletin on February 12.

Cub Scout Packs will celebrate the anniversary with Blue and Gold Banquets. Both parents and Scouts will attend these Banquets. Special ceremonies are planned recognizing the achievement of the Cubs.

On Tuesday, February 14, all Scouts who earned the Eagle Rank during 1966 in the Trinity-Neches Council will be invited to a special Banquet to be held in Beaumont.
