Captain Jimmy Chapman Writes Of Experiences

(The following excerpts from a letter written by Capt. Jimmy R. Chapman, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Chapman of Spurger, to Mr. and Mrs. Estes Smith will prove of interest to Booster readers and especially to friends of the captain.)

19 January. My fire team (two armed helicopters) was supporting an operation about six miles west of Saigon. During the operation I spotted three VC hiding in a tree line. We were targeting the ground forces toward them when they (VC) started to moving out. So we opened up on them and they came out of the bushes everywhere. When the shooting stopped and dust settled about 2-3 hours later, we had 108 VC dead, 10 captured, 30-40 weapons captured. We only had one friendly Vietnamese. Killed a few wounded and no Americans scratched.

My fire team captured four of the VC as they were trying to get away through the swamp. We caught them out in the water hiding under some weeds. We also made several medical evacuations out of the area and took a few holes through our helicopter but nothing serious.

20 January. I went to an award ceremony at a Vietnamese post and was awarded the Viet Nam Cross of Gallantry. They say it is almost equal to the American Silver Star.

21 January. My fire team was to take a CBS-TV news crew out to film some of our flying. It was to be a training mission but it didn't turn out that way.

Shortly after take-off we received a radio message that a slick helicopter (one

without machine guns and rockets, a troop carrier) had been shot down and the two armed helicopters, escorting it, were also shot up. We went to the scene and picked up the down crew and equipment. While there we received fire out of a nearby tree line so we made a couple of quick and accurate fire runs on the tree line and stopped that.

When a security force arrived to secure the downed helicopter so it could be recovered for repair, then we were released to go home. On the way home we spotted these two VC hiding behind a rice paddy dike. When we made a run back as they started running for a small grove of woods. While my wing ship covered them, we landed and captured three of them. Then returned home. I had a CBS-TV lady correspondent riding in my ship all this time. Her eyes were a little big a couple of times. The cameraman was in my wing ship and he took over 1200 feet of film. He said he thought he got his money worth. He said the film of the helicopter he took were of my ship. I was doing all of the flying so if you have any comment, I will have to take the blame.

They think the TV special will be shown sometime in March but I don't know exactly due to scheduling.

You can tell our helicopter by a big red pig painted on each front door. We are called "Razorbacks" and my real sign is "Razorback 31".

22 January. My room mate, Capt. Rogers, helicopter was shot down and the entire crew of four were killed. We were

Silver Star Award Received By Parents Of Hollis A. Walker

Mr. and Mrs. E. B. Walker have received the Silver Star Award presented to their son, Pfc. Hollis A. Walker, which was forwarded by Col. Carroll W. Anderson, assistant chief of staff at Fort Polk, La. In deference to the parents request, the award was not presented publicly.

The award of the Silver Star was made for heroism in going to the aid of a wounded tank commander under intense small arms fire without regard to his own safety. It was in this action that Pfc. Walker was mortally wounded.

Bids For Gas, Oil Accepted By County

Tyler County Commissioners Court at its regular monthly meeting Monday accepted bids on funds and grease for the county's equipment and for a chain-link fence for precinct one barn.

Gulf Oil Corporation was low on the bid for gasoline, oil, grease and diesel fuel to be used during the year. Their bid was \$23.43 per gallon plus 10 cents per gallon.

Other business before the court included the purchase of a county depository at Colmesneil State Park, Woodville. The court also accepted the order of District Judge H. C. Cline appointing Johnnie Hickman as county auditor.

The bid of J. W. Wheat, Woodville attorney, for the purchase of delinquent taxes was accepted at the meeting. The court also voted to pay \$27 monthly for a caretaker of Kirby Memorial Chapel beginning March 1.

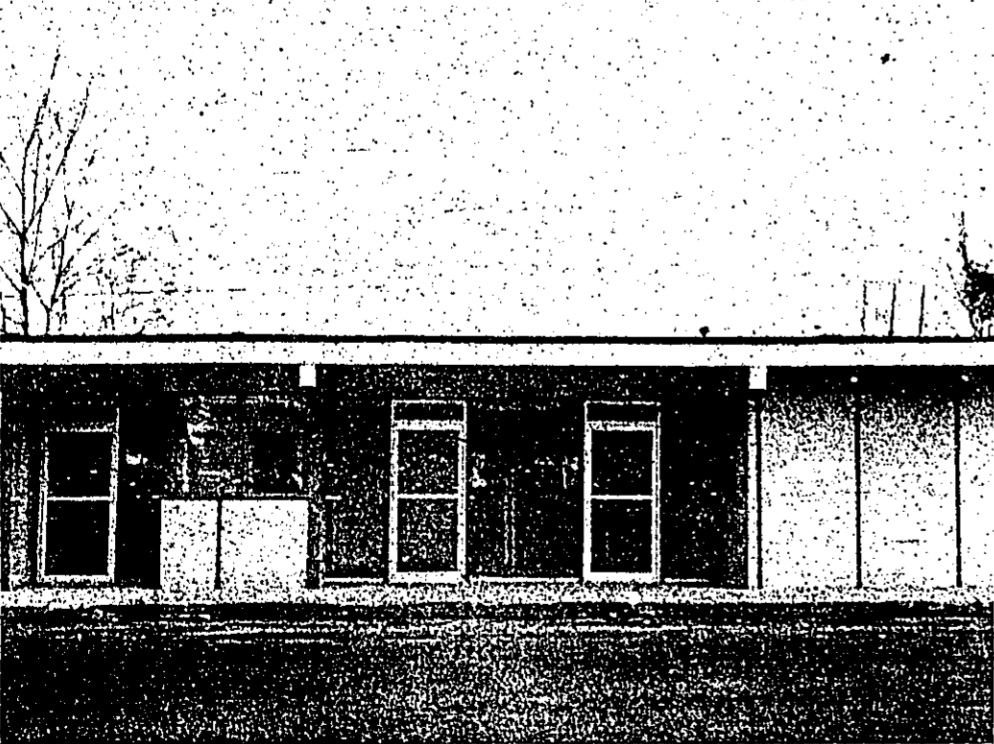

Fain Theater To Reopen Next Wednesday



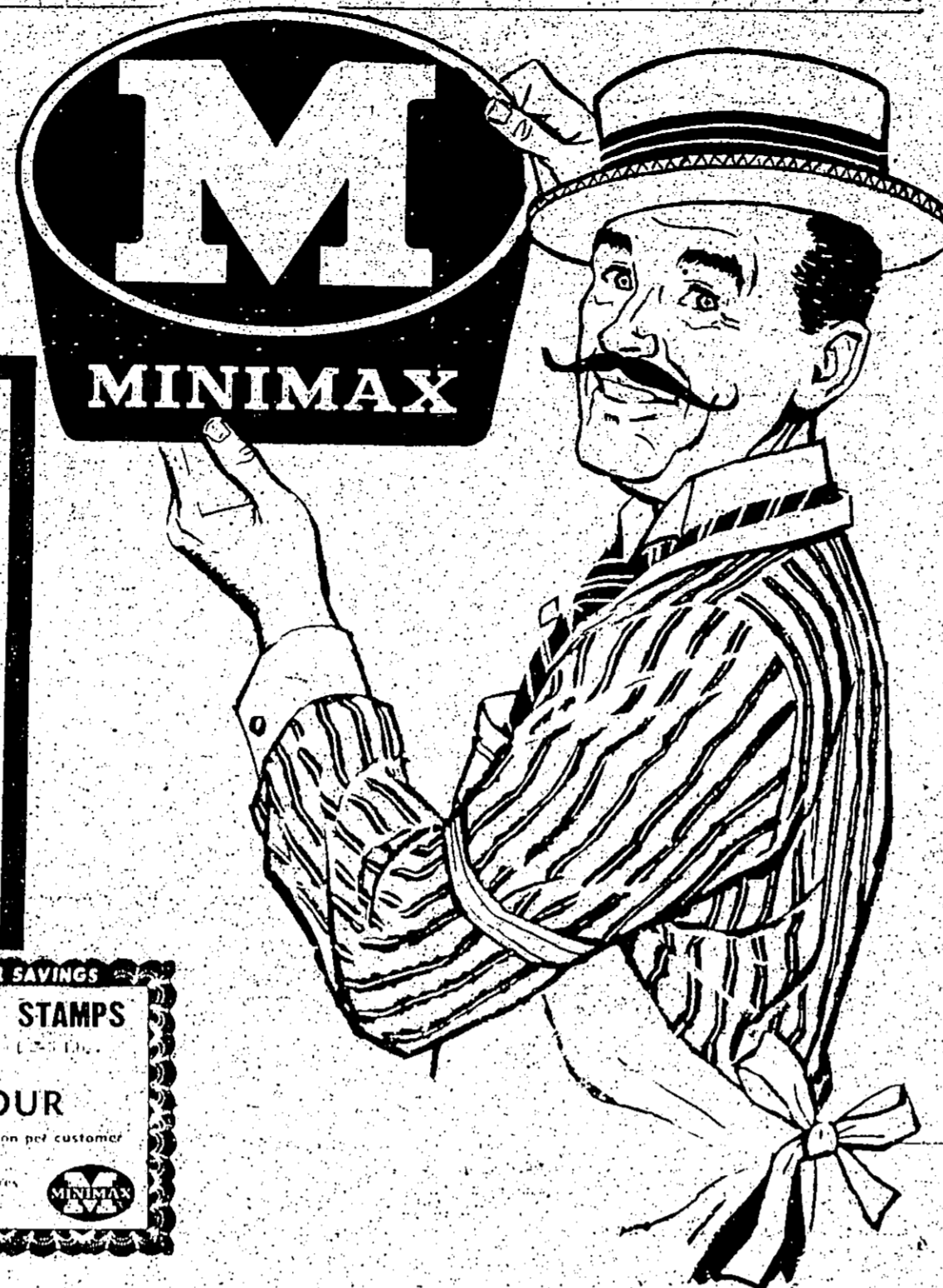

Date action: 24 June 1966
Theater: Republic of Vietnam
Reason: For gallantry in action: Private First Class Walker distinguished himself on 24 June 1966 while serving as a medic in a platoon during a search and destroy operation in the Republic of Vietnam. While moving toward their objective, Private First Class Walker's armored unit became engaged by a large Viet Cong force employing antitank weapons, small arms, and mortar fire. During the course of action, one of the tank commanders received a serious wound in the neck. Private First Class Walker, with complete disregard for his safety, left the armored personnel carrier in which he was riding and exposed himself to the intense hostile fire in an attempt to aid the tank commander. As Private First Class Walker was climbing up on the tank, he was mortally wounded by a burst of Viet Cong small arms fire. His extraordinary heroism in close combat against a numerically superior Viet Cong force was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflects great credit upon himself, his unit, and the United States Army.
