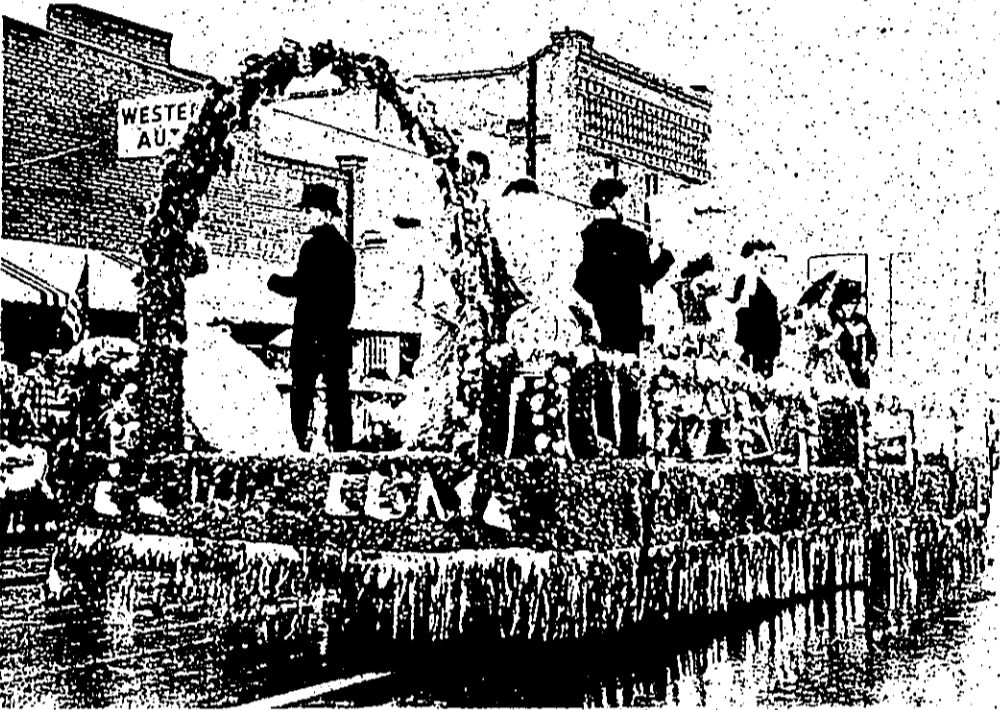
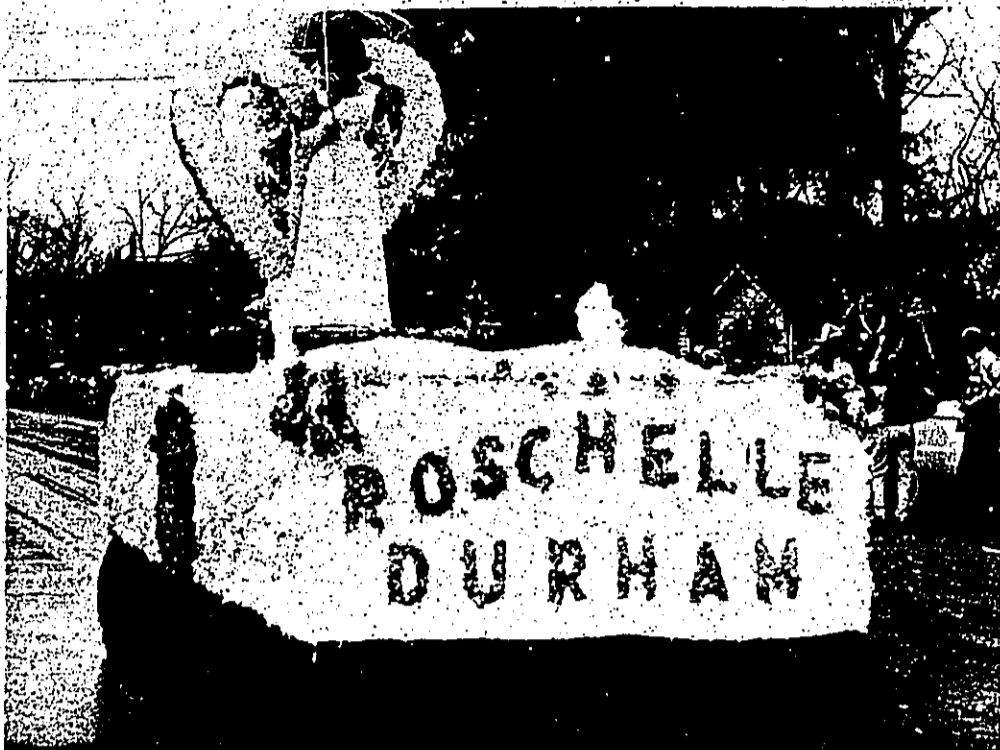

The pageant presented at the Tyler County Dogwood Festival Saturday night was in four scenes showing some aspects of life in Tyler County during the time of the Republic of Texas.

The pageant was again narrated by E. Harrison Preston of Houston, who has been the voice of the festival pageantry for some 15 or 16 years.

The first of the four scenes in the pageant showed the plantation home of Wyatt Hanks, who was played by Dan Bynum. Mrs. Arthur Green played Mrs. Hanks, and the children were portrayed by Amy and Cella Sundin and Jamie and Chris Bynum. It depicted the beginning of a day with work around the plantation beginning and the children leaving for the nearby one-room school, which was shown in the second scene.

In this scene, J. C. Clark, Jr., was the schoolmaster who had to apply the rod to two unruly boys, played by Malcolm Radford and Bob Bell, to begin the school day. Others in this scene were Mary Jo Carter, Jamie and Chris Bynum, Gerald and Stephen Hinz, Amy Sundin and Suzette Hinz.

The highlight of the pageant was the arrival of the steamboat Laura in the third scene. The captain of the Laura, Andrew Smythe, was acted by

his great-grandson, Dr. William Seale of Lamar Tech in Beaumont. Judy Walker and Carolyn Morchant were girl singers, and other boat passengers were played by Mr. and Mrs. Jack B. School Bond Election Set For Saturday

A bond election will be held in the Woodville Independent School District, Saturday, April 1, for the purpose of issuing the Kirby Auditorium and \$400,000.00 in schoolhouse bonds. The election will be held in the Kirby Auditorium from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

The following qualifications apply to persons voting in this election: (1) a resident of the district; (2) a registered voter; and (3) an owner of property in the school district with such property duly rendered on the school tax rolls.

The bonds are being voted for the purpose of supplying funds to construct an elementary school building, to repair and reconstruct other buildings on the Kirby campus that were damaged by the recent storm, and to provide equipment and furniture.

Insurance funds collected because of the fire and storm and the funds derived from the sale of the bonds will be sufficient to put the Woodville school plant in good condition for a number of years.

Architects have been employed to prepare plans and specifications and the job will be bid according to state laws only the amount of bonds necessary to finance the project will be sold.

FHA To Observe Special Week Beginning Monday

Texas' 72,000-plus Future Homemakers of America join their half million sisters in chapters throughout the United States, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands in celebrating their twenty-first birthday this year.

Public attention will focus on the organization during FHA Week, April 2-8, as the girls plan a different activity for each day to emphasize their high ideals.

This national youth organization of homemaking education students in junior and senior high schools officially is sponsored by the U.S. Office of Education and the American Home Economics Association. The Texas Association is sponsored by the Homemaking Education Division, Texas Education Agency, Austin. Local high school homemaking teachers serve as advisers to the 1,514 chapters in Texas.

Under the supervision of these advisers FHAers enjoy opportunities for developing individual and group initiative in planning and carrying out homemaking activities. They have set for themselves two very ambitious objectives: (1) To help each family member recognize his abilities and strive for their full development in projects for family, community and world improvement.

Today these enthusiastic young women are responsible members of their families, learning to be creative leaders in the homes they will have in the future. They are determined to establish secure, stable homes in this complex, unsettled world.

Jeannette McClure Crowned Queen Of Dogwood Festival Here Saturday

Governor John Connally placed the queen's crown on the Tyler County Dogwood Festival on the head of Miss Jeannette McClure, Kirby High school senior, Saturday night in the Dogwood Amphitheatre in the climax of the coronation ceremonies before a near capacity audience.

Miss McClure thus became the twenty-fourth Tyler county

beauty to reign as queen of the festival.

Rodney Fortenberry had previously been crowned king by the governor. Miss Sharon Hatten of Spurger was runner-up and was Princess of Tyler county.

Other princesses are Miss Jeanne Hebert of Colmesneil and Miss Connie Slau of Warren.

Miss Hatten, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Hatten, was escorted by Jerry Mueller. Miss Hebert, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Silas Hebert, had as her escort David Comte. Miss Slau, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Thacker, was escorted by Randy Martin.

The princesses of 12 towns and cities in the Southeast Texas area were introduced by Josiah Wheat, master of ceremonies, and with their escorts formed an arc on the stage before which the Tyler county royalty stood during the crowning ceremonies which were performed by Governor Connally.

Miss Ida Cihar, reigning queen of the Cav-Oil-Cade in Port Arthur, was chosen from among the visiting duchesses to serve as the queen's lady-in-waiting.

Miss McClure is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tommy L. McClure of Woodville. She is a cheerleader at Kirby High School, sweetheart of the Future Farmers chapter, student council representative, member of the National Honor Society, and an officer in the Future Homemakers chapter for three years. She recently won the best actress award in the district interscholastic League one-act play contest in Livingston.

Others in the queen's court included Clyde Davis Hicks, Jr., of Spurger, crownbearer to the king, Mark Harris of Warren, bearer of the ring which is presented to the queen by the festival association; Pamela

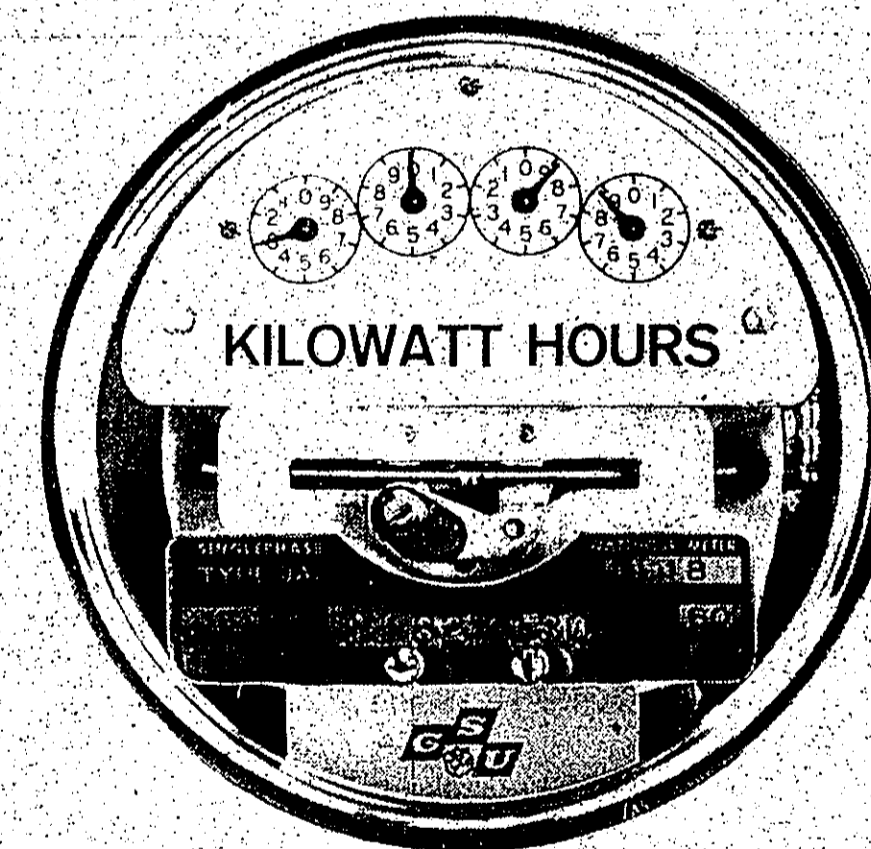
The Valley girls went to the state meet on Tuesday, March 21, and won a state title in the 100 yard dash. They were the first girls to win a state title in the season.

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Report from The Legislature

By J. E. Miller, Jr., State Representative

Ed Clark, from San Augustine, addressed a joint session of the Texas legislature this week. He is now the U. S. Ambassador to Australia. Ed Clark has had a colorful career to say the least. In his talk he referred to his boyhood days in San Augustine several times and he has never lost his East Texas accent. He emphasized that the countries of Australia and the U. S. have much in common even if they do drive on the wrong side of the road down under. Ambassador Clark is a popular man here in Austin. His address was enjoyable and well received.

The big excitement here in the legislature this week came from the hearing on the 11-quorum-by-the-drink bill. The "House floor and gallery" were filled for the six hour hearing. Many speakers were filibustered with applause from time to time. Arguments for the bill and against the bill were given. Including great heat for and against. The bill was finally sent to what is commonly called a friendly committee by Chairman Tom Arwell. However, there is much speculation yet as to whether the bill will come out of the committee or not. If it does come out the membership of the House of Representatives will vote to defeat it. If this liquor-by-the-drink bill gets to the House floor, it will vote against it.

Amendments to the governor's recommendations on the farm-to-market road funds program was held in the House. The amendment would specifically allot the same money for farm-to-market roads as has been in the past. It would also provide for the general revenue fund. The Texas House of Representatives passed a resolution which in effect calls for Washington to "rehabilitate" 10 per cent of the revenue derived from income taxes back to state government.

I voted for two bills this week in the House authorizing school districts to pay for workmen's compensation insurance for its employees and also to provide for certain group insurance on its employees. It looks like Texas will have another opportunity to

FROM STATE CAPITOL: Wilson Report

Two weeks ago at the request of the Trinity Improvement Association Representative Rayford Price and I introduced H. B. 831 and S. B. 414 which remove the restrictions on navigation negotiations from the Trinity River Authority. When the authority was first created in the 1900's, the Texas Railroad Association was able to place a "defect" in the legislation which prohibited the authority from having anything to do with navigation. This restriction works in direct conflict with the interests of East Texas and especially Navarro, Henderson, Anderson and Polk counties. It is very critical to our development that the Trinity be navigated, and as a result of you know, the Federal Congress has authorized this navigation; however, with the law as it now stands the Trinity River Authority, which is the state agency for the river, can have no negotiation with the federal government regarding this authorized navigation. Therefore, the State of Texas has nothing to say about the proceedings.

The Vietnam Veterans legislation introduced by Representative Humm in the House and myself in the Senate has now passed both Houses but in slightly different forms. This is the legislation that gives free tuition to Vietnam veterans and to children whose fathers were killed in Vietnam. The H. B. had a little broader coverage than the Senate bill, so it will now be necessary to work out the differences in conference committee. The fact that both bills have passed makes it certain that we will achieve this needed veterans' benefit, and it is certainly deserved by the brave men who are sacrificing so much for our country in Vietnam.

Unless Texas passes a law exempting itself from daylight savings time, all clocks will be turned back on April 30. The latest ceremony is scheduled at 9:30 a.m. in the local board office, Room 87, Post Office Building, Livingston, at the meeting of the board.

FROM WASHINGTON, D. C.: Dowdy Reports

CUBAN BALLISTIC MISSILES - Cuban residents are reporting the movements of intermediate range ballistic missiles to Cuba. These reports became more frequent about six months ago. The reports are much like those received during the missile build-up in 1962. Witnesses say communist Cuba is being converted into a base for nuclear missiles. The State and Defense Departments dispute it. A re-run of an old show? FOREIGN AID - We are presently spending large sums of money in Germany. The Germans are being asked to pay U. S. government bonds with this money, in order to get our money back into the United States. This effort particularly appeals to Washington officials as providing a source of money to finance the growing deficit in our domestic budget. It is another example as when we borrowed money from Italy to give to Italy, and is merely postponing a problem. URBAN RENEWAL - Cleveland, Ohio, has found federal urban renewal to be a tax drain and a serious political problem. The city has in excess of 6,000 acres (more than any other city) in projects started within the last 10 years. No project has ever been completed. Large acreage has been removed from the tax rolls. Many homes have been uprooted and their homes demolished, with no knowledge of where they are relocated. Budgets have been overpriced. MOVING TO THE CITIES - Many Americans and Europeans seem to believe that the migration from rural areas to the cities is happening only in the rich industrial nations. Statistics show that this is a world wide happening. During the last 100 years,

All of our neighboring states have now adopted Daylight Savings Time, and as far as I can find out, only North and South Dakota have exempted themselves. 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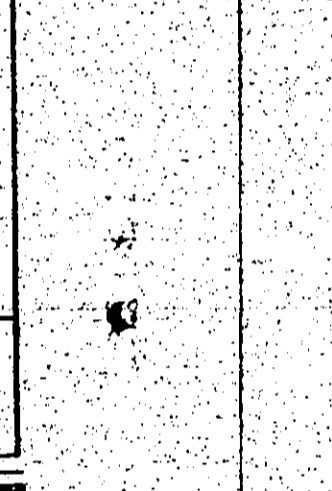

Southland Opens New Plant To Treat Waste Water

A \$2.5 million waste-water treatment plant—the largest ever built in central East Texas—has gone into operation at Southland Paper Mills, Inc. here.

The plant was shown to the public last Friday during an open house.

Joe Teller of Austin, project director for the Texas Water Pollution Control Board and one of the speakers for the open house, praised Southland as "an industry that has accepted its responsibility to better the streams of Texas."

It includes five acre-size treating basins, 10 aerators, a two-mile canal designed to divert the water and sophisticated control, sampling and measurement devices.

Southland also operates, in addition to the new plant, a fiber-reclaiming facility, a chemical recovery plant, a water re-use equipment, and two sedimentation ponds as part of its effluent treatment program.

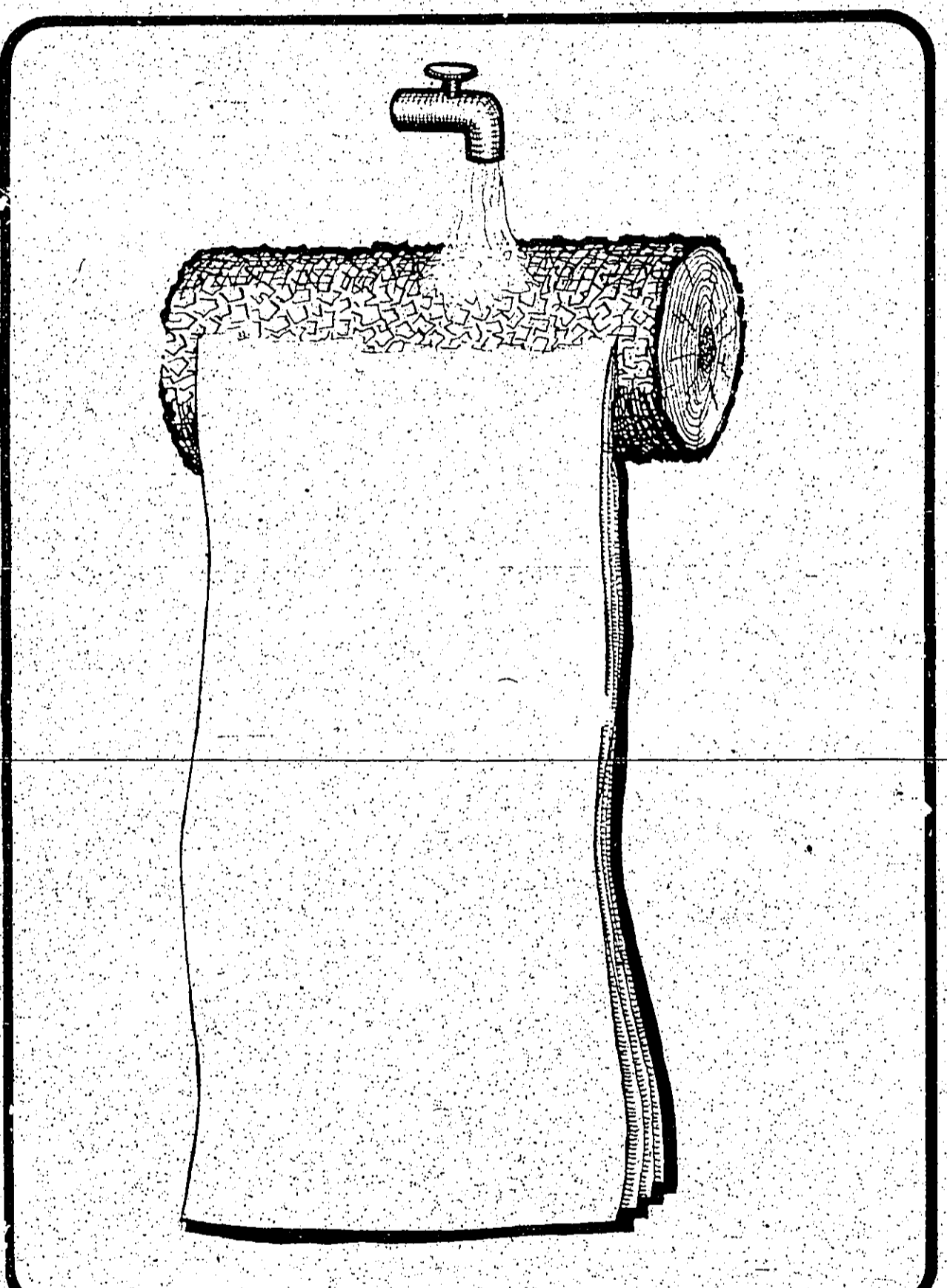
Southland's waste-water is released into Mill-Creek and eventually enters the Angleton River several miles above San Rayburn-Reservoir. Water experts say the water will not harm fish life in the lake.

The water contains a harmless dark coloring, Wortham noted, but scientists have found a practical way to remove it. Southland is now financing by itself and with near relatives through the National Council for Stream Improvement, research in 20 colleges and universities aimed at finding a solution to the color problem.

You Can't Do Without Water . . . Neither Can We

Water is as essential to a paper mill as seed is to a farmer. For example, here are some of the uses at Southland's Lufkin mill:
• To cool off grindstones that grind sticks of wood into pulp.
• To separate wood particles from chemicals after chipped wood has been reduced to another form of pulp in a cooking process.
• To float pulp from one operation to another.
• To thin pulp before its transformation into paper on large papermaking machines.
• To screen pulp, to make steam for drying paper, and in dozens of other operations.
Just as important as the use of water is its treatment after being used. Tiny wood particles can be removed from the water by screening, but some of them—often smaller than a pinpoint—can escape the finest of screens and, if permitted to reach the river in large quantities, could settle on the bottom.

When wood chips are cooked, the portion of wood that binds the fibers together is dissolved, adding two substances to the water:
• A harmless coloring.
• An oxygen-depleting substance which, if released in large quantities, can reduce the river's dissolved oxygen content below the amount needed for fish life.
Southland, in waste water treatment, takes great care to remove wood particles and the oxygen-depleting substance from its effluent. Unfortunately, research hasn't found a practical method of removing the color. But scientists are at work and, someday, we hope to be able to release a color-free effluent. (Next week: Southland's treating facilities.)

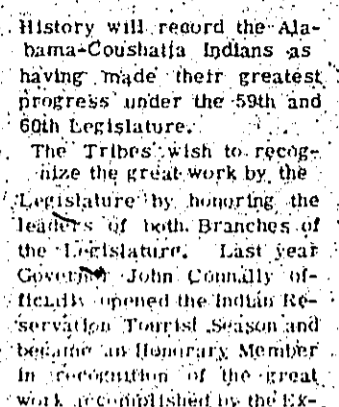

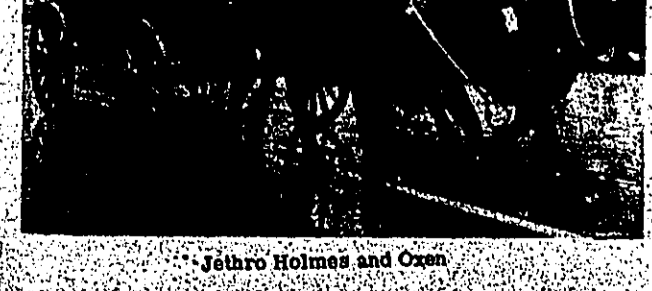

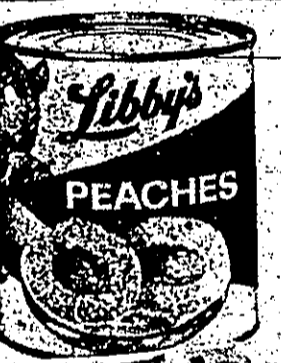
