Six Eagles To Compete In Regional Track Meet April 22

Six Kirby High School Eagles track men will go to the Regional Track meet on April 22 in Brenham.

They are the mile relay team of Henry Hill, Phil Tucker, Willie Gill, Jerry Thornton and alternate Richard Gill; Keith Kilgore in the broad jump and Richard Gill in both the shot and the discus.

Richard Gill has won two first places in the shot put and two first places in the discus this track season. He also has a third in shot put and third in discus. His best put in the shot was 50' 9 1/2". In the Buna track meet, his best throw in the discus was 155' 4" to set a new district record at Livingston.

Mobil TB Unit To Be Here For X-Rays Two Days

The Mobile unit of the Beaumont Tuberculosis Association will be in Woodville Tuesday and Wednesday, April 25 and 26, on the Kirby High School campus to do x-rays on positive test results of school children, school personnel and the public. The bus will be on the courthouse square Wednesday, April 26, from 1:00 to 5:00 p.m. for the convenience of the public. The x-ray charge is \$1.50.

Tyler Countians are urged to join in a concerted campaign to rid the county of the imported fire ant, which has reached an alarming incidence in some areas of the county. The campaign is sponsored by the commissioners court and the county extension Service.

Tyler County commissioners court has arranged for distribution of Mirex 4X, a safe poison which kills the ants, at a reduced price to farmers, ranchers and other landowners.

Through the county program, Tyler Countians can secure Mirex 4X at a fraction of its

usual cost. A 50-pound bag, the minimum size, is available for \$7, which figures out at 14 cents a pound.

Persons who will join in the effort to rid the county of the imported fire ant are asked to take immediate action since the ants will start swarming and start on killing crops, trees and other plants.

To secure the poison at a reduced price, Tyler Countians should treat their property as soon as they see the ants. Mr. Boyd will be in the county office and the county extension Service office to get the poison.

Cancer Crusade To Begin Here

With the reappointment of Rex Kemperly as Crusade Chairman, the 1967 Crusade Against Cancer got underway in Tyler County this week.

In addition to the urgent goals of getting information about cancer into every household in the county, and raising the funds needed to continue cancer control activities throughout the state, volunteers for the ACS will have a new and important assignment.

The Cancer Education Survey will be conducted in Texas for the first time this year; an estimated 600,000 replies will be collected from households in every section of the state.

Here in Tyler County, the Survey will be carried out by Crusaders during the House-to-House drive. After householders have been given the list of cancer's seven warning signals, they will be asked to fill out a brief, confidential form, asking questions about their own health practices. The completed forms can then be mailed back in the envelopes provided and will be counted by volunteers in the District Cancer Society offices.

Vet To Be In County Towns For Rabies Shots

Dr. W. S. Nichols, D.V.M., will be in Tyler county towns during the rest of April to vaccinate dogs against rabies in the annual rabies prevention program.

Vaccination of dogs will be made at a reduced price of \$2 during the program, with county Future Farmer chapters in each town receiving 25 cents for each dog.

Nichols will be in Colmesneer April 16 from 8 to 10:30 a.m., in Rockland the same day from 11 to noon.

On April 25 he will be in Spurlock from 8 to 10:30 a.m. On April 29 he will be in Warton from 8 to 10:30 a.m. and in Village Mills from 11 a.m. to noon.

last year's appropriation, Stephen F. Austin has had over 30 per cent growth since last year and certainly this should be taken into consideration when we provide teachers. If the Senate Appropriations Bill is not amended to reflect the present enrollment, then it is unrealistic and will make the quality of college training for the high school graduates of East Texas.

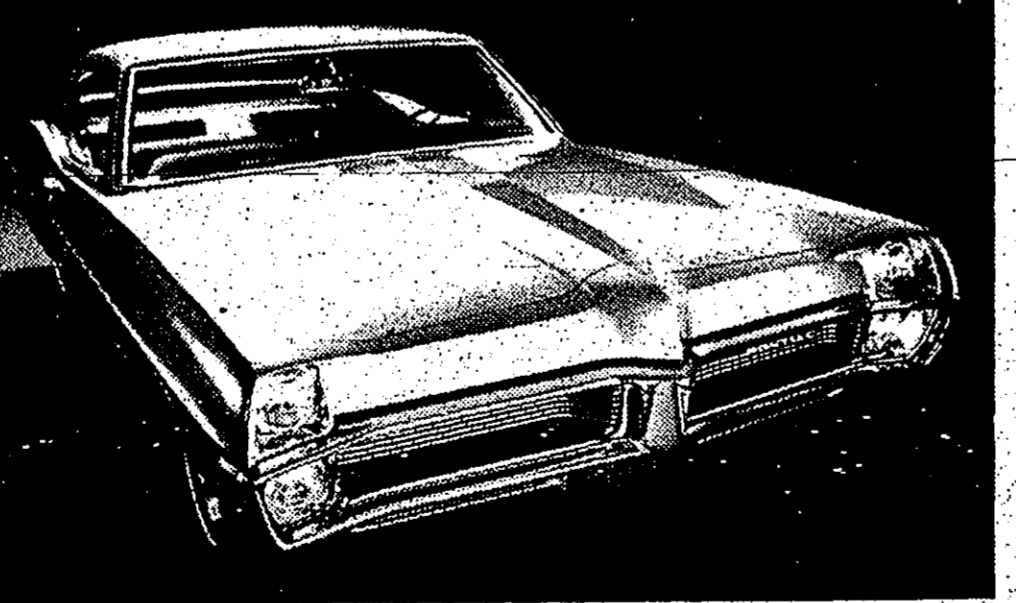

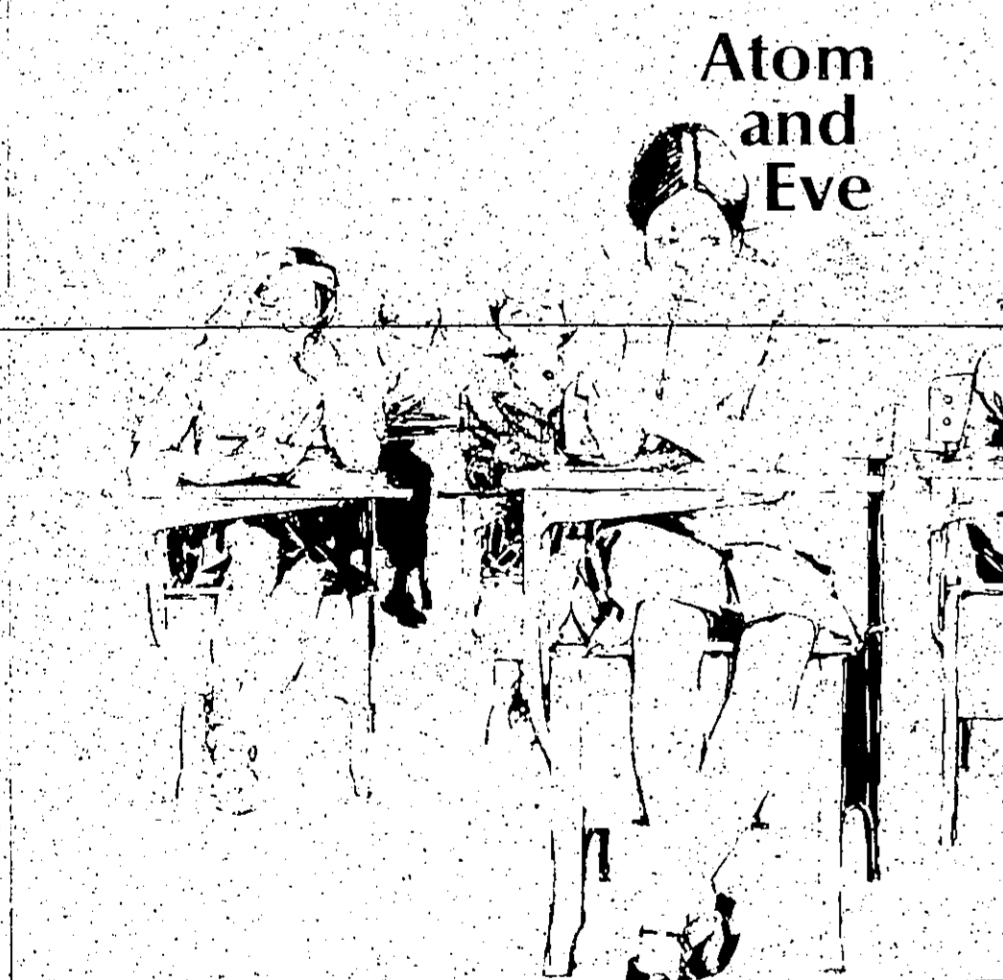

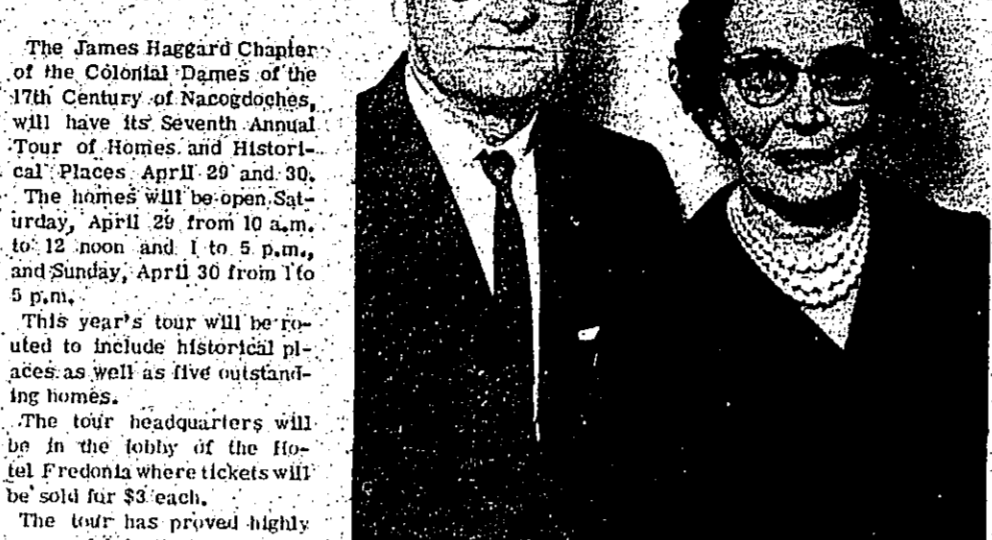
