KHS Band To Go To Music Fete

RIVER FESTIVAL DUCHESS



Jeannette McClure, Kirby High School, will be the Woodville duchess to the 19th annual Neches River Festival in Beaumont today through Sunday. Jeannette, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tommy McClure, is queen of the Tyler County Dogwood Festival for 1967, sweetheart of the Woodville Lions Club, and holds many honors at Kirby High. She is a member of the Future Farmers chapter, cheer leader, class officer for four years, member of the student council, and the National Honor Society. She has been a class officer for four years and an officer in the Future Homemakers for three years. She was named best actress in the district one-act play contest.

The Kirby High Band will leave Thursday morning, April 27, for the Annual Buccaneer Music Festival in Corpus Christi. About 75 bands have entered the contest this year from Texas, Oklahoma, and Louisiana. The band will participate in the concert contest on Friday, April 28, individuals will compete in the solo and ensemble contest on Saturday, and then the band will again compete in the Buccaneer Festival Parade Saturday night in which outstanding bands will be chosen.

The Buccaneer Music Festival has the reputation of being one of the hardest and most competitive band contests in the South. The band will meet chartered buses in Livingston and be housed at the Sheraton Marina Hotel in Corpus Christi. Perfecto Cleaners has donated a van in which to carry the band uniforms. The trip is being paid for by the Kirby High Band Boosters Club. The band will return early Sunday morning, April 30.

FOUR VICA MEMBERS ATTEND STATE MEETING IN HOUSTON

Four members of the Vocational Industrial Club of Kirby High attended the state meet in Houston last week. They were Ruby Skinner, Patsy Harvey, Sadler Celestine, and Steve Harris. Each of these students competed in contest in their training fields against students from all over the state.

Ruby Skinner won a superior rating in break-ins and theft and was school dropouts, and had been handled several times by officers. Roschelle Durham, Gail Phillips, Amanda Stryker and Beth McGee are four students of Kirby High School who will receive State Homemaker Degree's Awards at the State FHA meeting in Dallas on Friday, April 21. The State Homemaker Degree is the highest achievement an FHA member can obtain.

The State Homemaker Degree includes many opportunities for individual improvement and for developing leadership. To attain this degree, each student must hold a junior and chapter degree of achievement, and have established goals to help develop greater maturity (1) as an individual, (2) as a member of the school, (3) as a member of the community, (4) as a member of the chapter, (5) as a member of the home and family, (6) as an interpreter to the community of the goals of a broad homemaking program. Each state degree is checked by an area degree committee and approved. This is the final level of the degree program.

Roschelle Durham is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. M. Durham and is a junior three-year homemaking student at Kirby High. She is first vice president in charge of programs of the Kirby High FHA chapter. She is a member of the National Honor Society, the junior play cast and won first place in U. L. L. District Debate. President Judith Ann Sturrock, will officially open the meeting assisted by the other state officers with the opening ceremony Friday morning. At this general session platform messages will be introduced including several from Woodville - Mrs. Jewel Sturrock, state FHA mother, Mrs. Marjorie Tidwell, state FHA sponsor, Supt. B. H. McGuire and principal, L. C. Lowery of Kirby High School. Honorary memberships will be awarded to 35 adults who have contributed to the growth and development of the Association. Mrs. Jewel Sturrock, State Mother, and Supt. B. H. McGuire of Woodville will receive this award during the ceremony conducted by state officers Judith Ann Sturrock, Susan K. 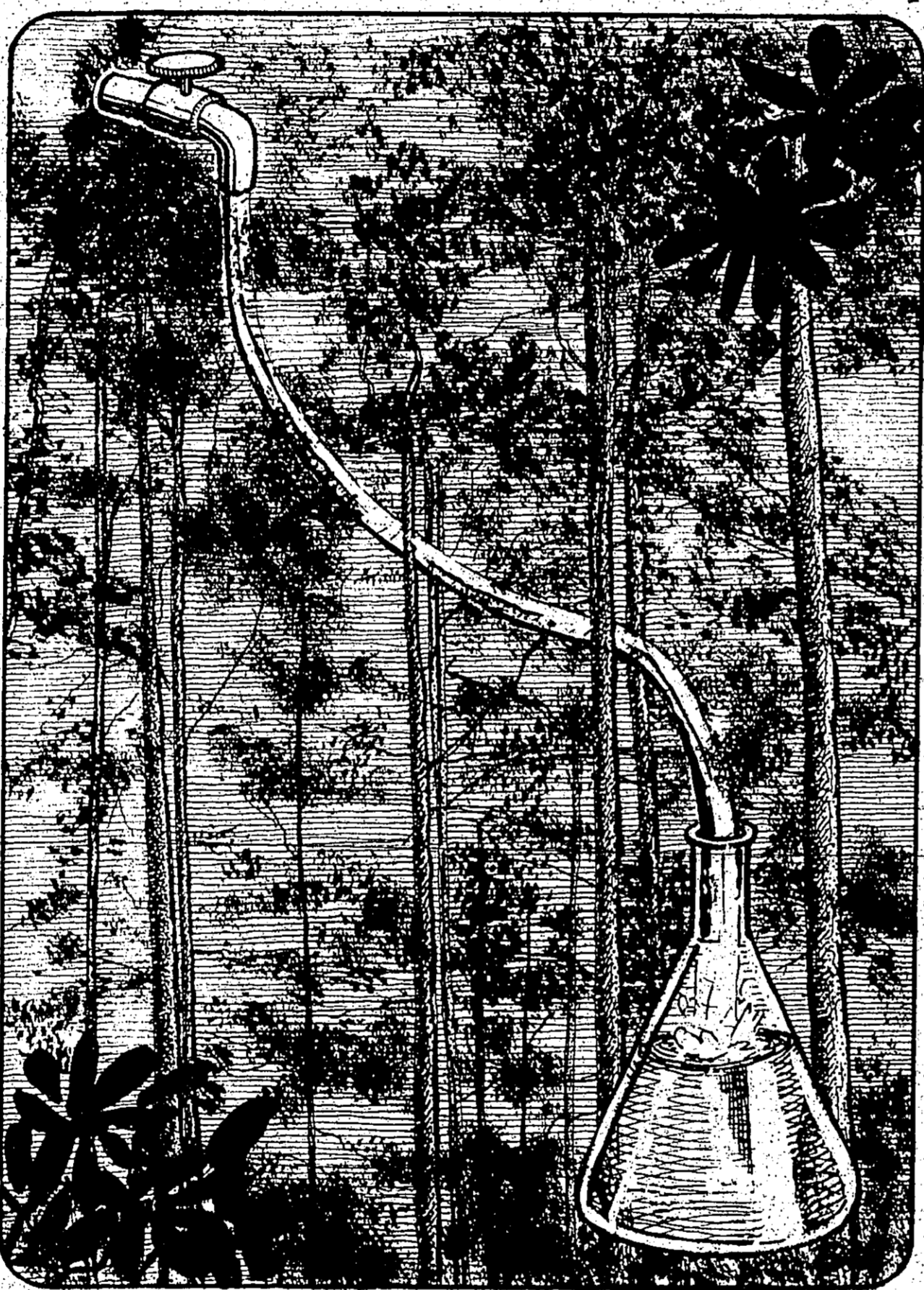

WATER & SOUTHLAND



Yes, Science IS Working On Wood-Colored Water.

Since 1950 alone, Southland has spent more than \$3 million for effective waste water treatment at its Lufkin mill. The water is being treated to remove tiny wood particles that could settle on the river bottom. And it's being treated to restore dissolved oxygen needed for fish life. But we still have a problem—the dark appearance of the treated effluent. Science has not yet found a practical way to remove the coloring from the water. But they're trying. Great sums of research money are being spent and experts are devoting long hours to the subject. Fortunately, the coloring is harmless. It doesn't hurt fish or cause growth in the river. And it dissipates as it travels and mixes with the river. What causes the color? It comes from the wood's contact with water during papermaking operations—not from anything added by Southland. 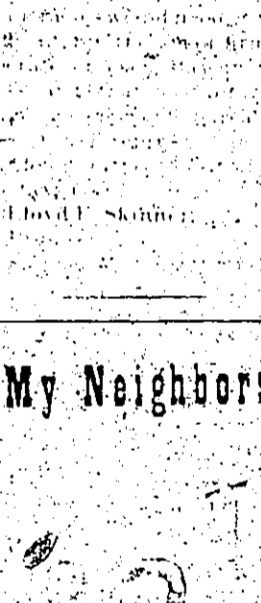

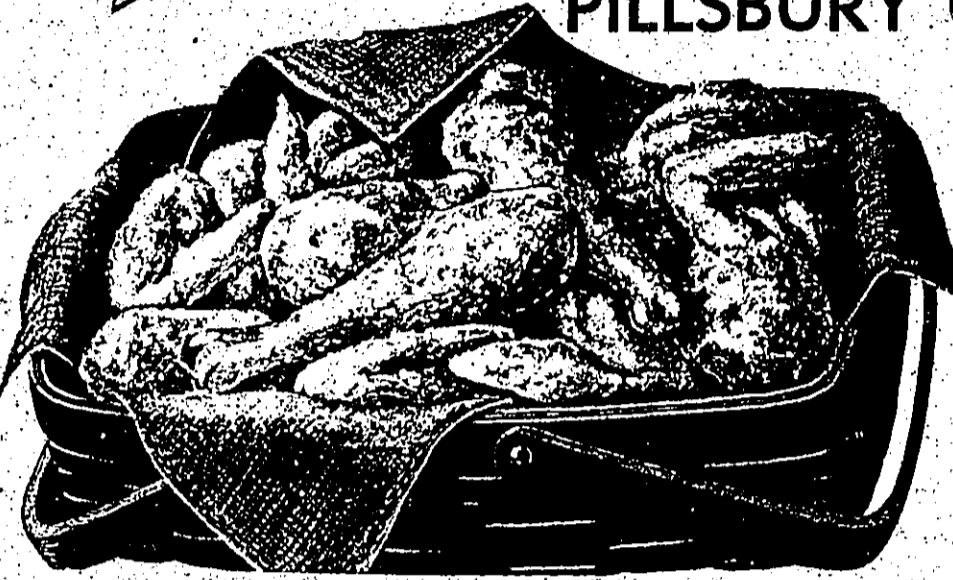
