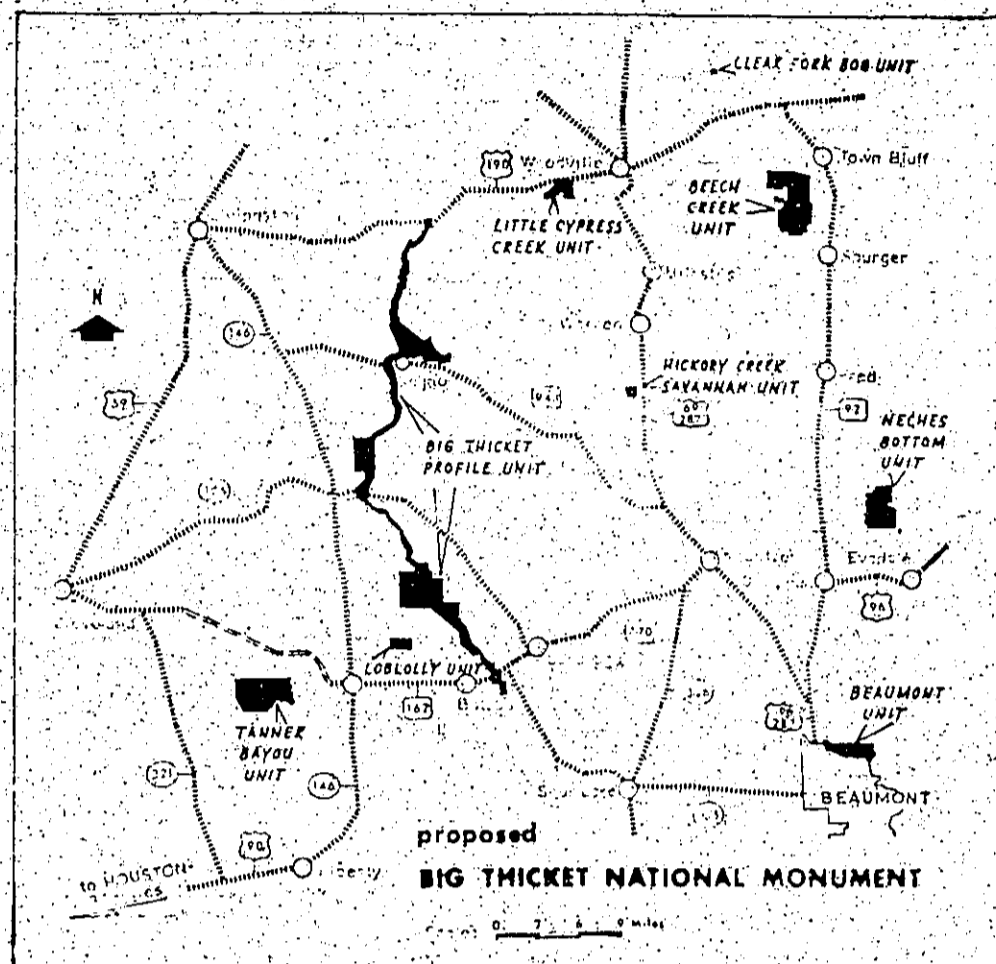

Nine Big Thicket Areas Are Proposed As National Monument

Details of a 35,500-acre "string of pearls" Big Thicket National Monument announced by Interior Secretary Stewart Udall contains four units in the Tyler County area. Interior Department specialists who inspected the area last year made a report which if accepted will preserve the areas of the Big Thicket as shown in the map above whose boundaries are general and may be revised slightly.

The national monument would include nine parks or "pearls" ranging in size from 50 acres in the Clear Fork Bog to 18,000 acres in what is described as the "Big Thicket profile" of both upper and lower Thicket areas. Running north from east of Saratoga through Segno, this unit starts just west of Tyler County at Highway 190 and the Indian Reservation.

Other units include the Neches Bottom as an example of hardwood bottomland forest, 3040 acres; Tanner Bayou unit, a virtually untouched flood plain forest and oxbow swales, 4300 acres; Beaumont unit, along Pine Island bayou, virgin forest and streambank community, 1700 acres; Loblolly unit, an example of the best stand of East Texas pine and mixed hardwood, 550 acres.

SHIVERS, OFFICIALS TO CONFER IN EFFORT TO KEEP LIBRARY OPEN

Former Governor Allan Shivers, who with Mrs. Shivers presented the Allan Shivers Library and Museum to the people of Tyler County, will be here today to discuss the financial problems of the library with officials involved. The library faces the probability of being closed if the county withdraws its support from the cost of its operation. The costs have been borne by the county, the City of Woodville, and the Woodville school district.

Cecil Smith, longtime civic leader and one of the first boosters of a public library for the county, Tuesday gave the following statement to the Booster: "I am deeply disturbed by the report that due to lack of finances, our county library will in all probability be closed. This is particularly disturbing to me when I recall what a terrible struggle we had setting up a county library of any kind when I recall our first library in the small M & P building on the county property to the East of the hospital, with only a hand full of books. I recall how hopeless I looked when we met to discuss the possibility of securing the erection of some kind of small permanent building. I remember when a group of us hesitantly asked Governor Shivers if he and Marialice could give us a little financial support in obtaining permanent quarters. I also remember the thrill we all experienced as well-stened

almost indistinguishable new building later when Allan and Marialice told us they would contribute a library building to the people of Tyler County, paying the entire cost of the building. And now it appears that this wonderful gift is to be abandoned for the lack of a few dollars. This is particularly distressing when we realize what great hopes we had for our library and when we think about how many larger counties would be delighted to have the fine library we are now enjoying and which, in addition to being a great asset to our people is also such a fine recommendation of our county. I have been told that the difficulty results from the feeling that the County is paying too much of the cost of operating the library. However, I also understand that the City of Woodville and the school district are contributing to its operation and that the total contribution of the City and School amounts to at least fifty per cent of the total. That is, that the County is paying one-half and the School and City are paying one-half. While it may be true that the people living in the Woodville School District have greater access to the library, it is also true that they are paying half the cost of operating the library through their School and City taxes, plus the contribution they are making through their county taxes they are paying. At least 40% of the people of Tyler County live in the Woodville School District (4,

"USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey," Mr. Durham explains. "It is important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the carrier. This way, USDA gets a representative sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings. Survey cards will be forwarded to Cary D. Palmer, State Agricultural Statistician, in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the State's milk production, calf and pig crops, lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets.

With only about two more weeks to go, the 60th session of the Texas Legislature will have several major bills to consider and many bills of lesser importance.

The Senate and House versions of the Appropriation bill are different and a conference committee will attempt to work these differences out.

The House this week held a hearing on the teacher pay raise. Two bills were heard. One of them was the T.S.T.A. proposal and the other was the 5% pay raise recommended by the Governor.

Other bills that have been personally introduced in the House include a bill to amend the Texas Constitution to allow the Governor to appoint and remove judges.

There are still many bills to be considered and many more to be introduced. The session will be a busy one.

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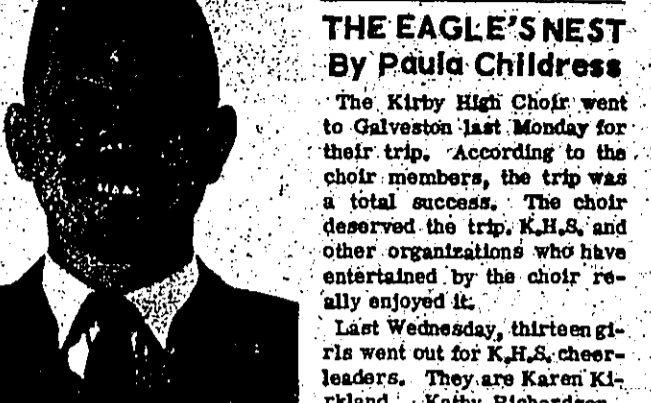
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Husband Of Former Warren Girl Promoted

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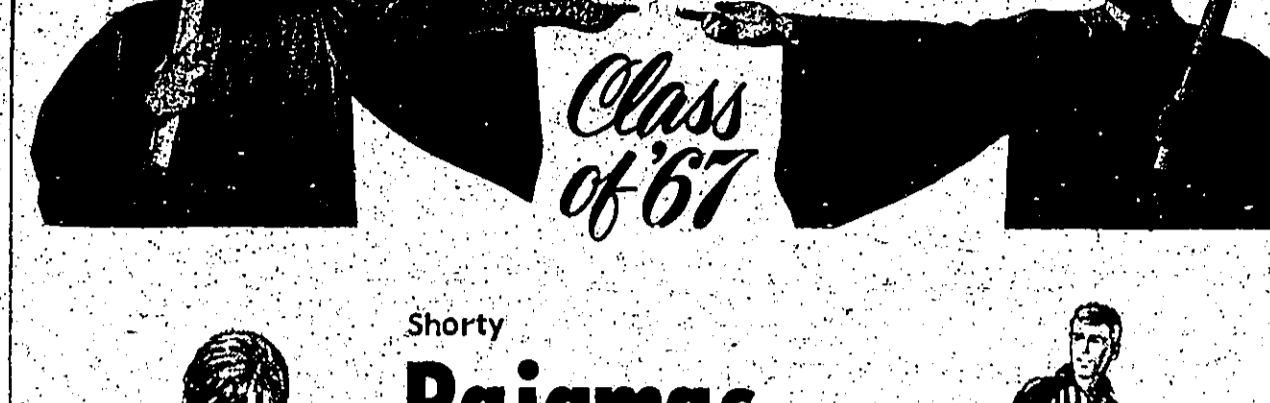

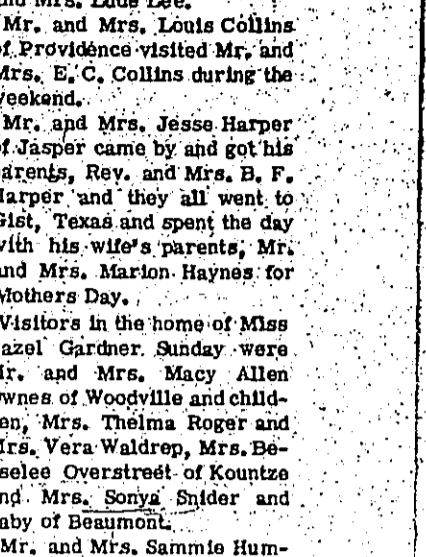

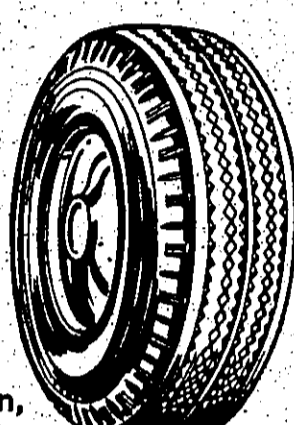
FOUR GENERATIONS

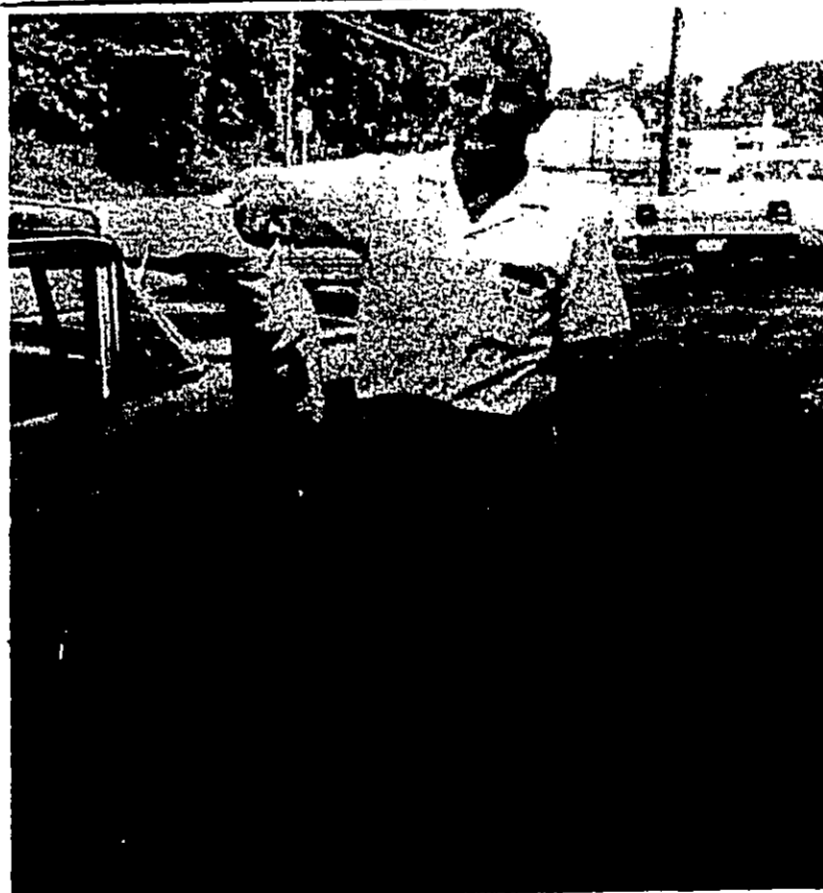
Citizens in the community of Romayor are busily engaged in organizing a volunteer fire department to protect the homes and property of themselves and their neighbors.

Fish Gain To Shadow Moon Shot

Along about the time America hopes to ceremoniously put a man on the moon, a moon-eyed fish hopefully will be confounding the landlubbers.

The piscatorial celebrity would be the walleye, a recent Texas Parks and Wildlife Department importation from northern waters that is responding to Texas hospitality.

It is responding so well in experiments underway in Lake Meredith, huge Panhandle impound-

ment, that explorations are inevitable toward introducing the glassy-eyed scrappers deeper into the state's deep, cool, sandy-shoal waters.

Although the Meredith beauties have been only two years in the making, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department explorations in this potentially prolific area have taken up several years. And the tests have not always been as rewarding as those at the Panhandle's newest large reservoir on the Canadian river.

Fisheries authorities are interested beyond merely providing exciting new fresh-water angling. Actually, the impact of thriving walleyes on the overpopulated waters is the promi-

ing possibility that impresses management people.

This is because walleyes are such voracious predators. Using its large canine teeth, the largest member of the perch family can eat its way through layers of unwanted fishes. Scientists have determined that aquatic insects ranked second to fish in diet importance, accounting for the fact, no doubt, that live minnows are the prime walleye bait.

And bait is something the sports should bone up on when and if the walleye tide arrives. Because catching the prized fish sometimes is more than a challenge. Other states have noted fishermen's frustrations at not being able to hook walleyes although net tests proved conclusively that they were definitely abundant.

Fisheries personnel at Lake Meredith's first Texas walleye concentration are more concerned now about their immediate effect on the big reservoir's population since more than two-thirds of the available fish are classed as undesirable.

only does this inclination wreak havoc with succeeding generations, it does the fisherman little good when faced with a hungry horde of bait-fishing dwarfs.

With the bluegills bedding and pumpkinseeds proliferating, the prudent angler can do a good turn for both himself and the brim, claim the fishing authorities at Mercury outboards.

To exploit the clammy ways of nesting sunfish, thoroughly explore the shallows. Seldom are beds found in water over eight to ten feet deep. These beds may consist of a colony of several dozen nests, yet they may not take up an area eight feet square or circular.

Since it's sometimes difficult to pinpoint them in larger bodies of water, drift slowly while casting a worm or small minnow methodically on each side of the boat's path.

At the first nibble, ease down the anchor and work the area with care. You may load a stringer at that very spot.

Best ammunition for brim on the beds is worms. Take plenty and fish them on the bottom.

Rarely is it possible to overfish brim populations, even when fishing the beds. The females see to that — they can lay more than 60,000 eggs and may spawn up to three times in a season. Since the male is responsible for guarding the nest, he's the one most likely

to get caught. So, do the fish a favor, urge the Mercury folks. Catch a mess of brim. A plasterful on the table will convince you that you've done a favor for yourself, too.

THE FAMILY LAWYER

What Price Beauty?

Skin deep or not, beauty is precious to most people. Both men and women, as a rule, are acutely conscious of their physical attractiveness—or lack of it.

So it is not surprising that people hurt in accidents often seek damages not just for injury to their limbs but also for injury to their looks.

Should that kind of compensation be awarded at all? The law's answer is yes. Even though a scar is not disabling in the same way as a limp or an ache, disfigurement can be a real and serious handicap.

The biggest problem lies in deciding how much the damages should be. How do you put a price on the harm done by a scar?



The courts generally take into account both the characteristics of the victim and the characteristics of the scar itself. Thus, in particular cases, the following factors have lent weight to a damage claim:

1) that the victim was a girl ("scars on the face of a female are ordinarily regarded as more objectionable than on the face of a male");

2) that the victim had a job (as an actor) in which appearance mattered a great deal;

3) that the scar had an unpleasant side effect (distorted a young man's smile).

On the other hand, damages will be less if the scar can be mended by simple plastic surgery—or if it is in a place where it would not ordinarily be seen.

What if the mere display of a scar to the jury would be shocking or obscene? That could improperly inflame the emotions of the jury. Such a display may be forbidden, usually at the discretion of the trial judge.

However, in most cases, the judge will rely on the jurors to draw fair conclusions from what they see.

In one case, involving an injury to a young woman's knee, the defense attorney objected to an inspection by the jury. He noted that the plaintiff was young, charming, and beautiful—and that the jurors were all men.

But the court overruled his objection, commenting: "She is entitled to resort to the same proofs that she might have resorted to if she had been aged, ugly, and repulsive."

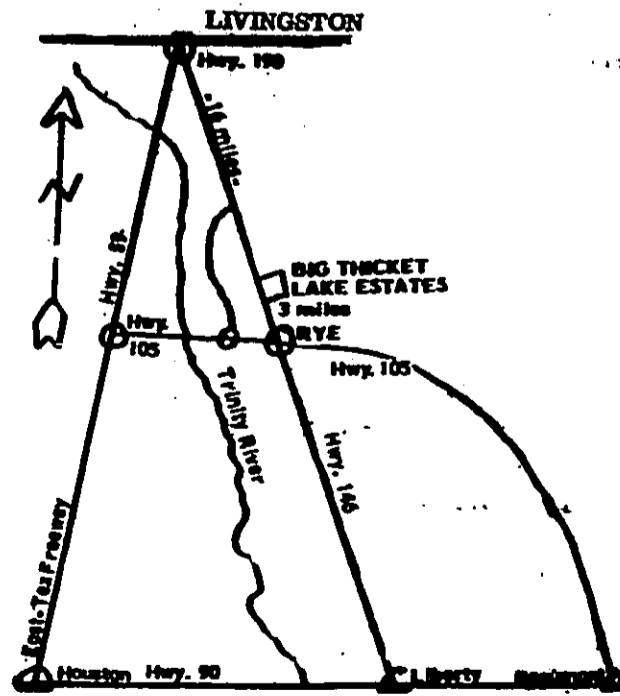

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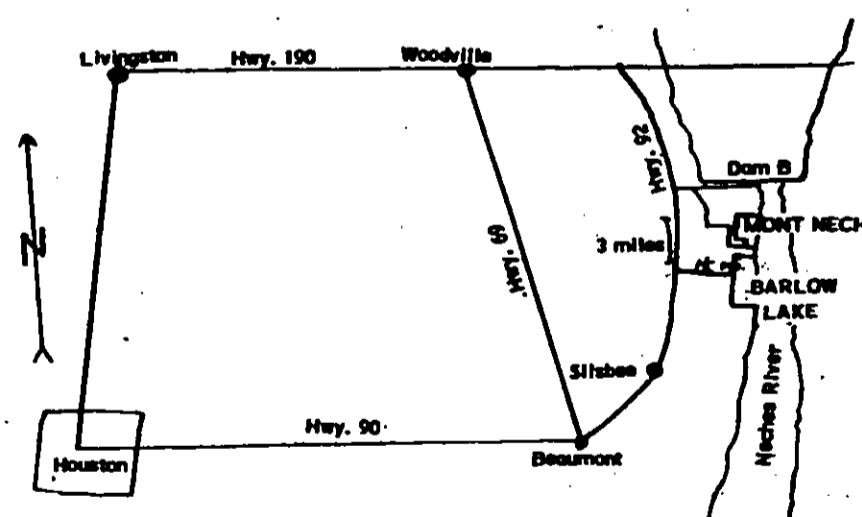

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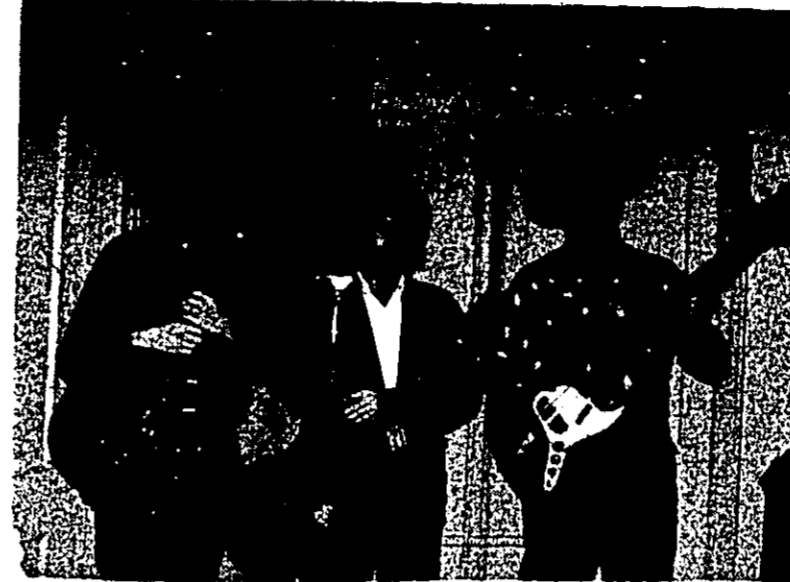

SALESMAN ON GROUND 7 DAYS A WEEK

Caddo Lake was created by an earthquake in 1811. For almost 160 years it lay practically unchanged under a blanket of water hyacinths.

Today the entire area is an unspoiled wilderness. Its 50,000 water acres sprawl across the Texas-Louisiana boundary in a network of bays, ponds, and twisting sloughs.

Formerly the home of the Caddo Indians, the Caddo area was a great swamp of stagnant pools and heavily wooded islands. It was explored by the early-day Spaniards on their westward push. However, they made little use of their find, and the swamp remained as it was for many years.

Then came the New Madrid earthquake! For days it shook the southern states in a series of violent tremors. Finally the

floor of Caddo Swamp sank from sight.

When the "rolling water" finally settled, the present Caddo Lake was formed. It's a twin sister to Tennessee's Reelfoot Lake, born of the same tremors.

Thanks to modern improvements, travelers now can explore this mysterious swampland with little discomfort.

Caddo Lake is approached and partially surrounded by a number of fine highways. It's only 16 miles from Marshall and 27 miles from Shreveport.

On the lake shore are more than 50 camps and motor courts capable of caring for at least a thousand guests. These places range from modest "rough-it" camps to comfortable motels.

With an average mean temperature of 66 degrees, Caddo Lake compares favorably with

any vacation spot.

Spring is the best season to visit Caddo. Then the water hyacinths cover the lake with a pale-violet blanket, and water lilies spread their petals between yard-wide pads.

Cypress trees, Spanish moss, violet-purple water hyacinths, and picturesque boat roads form a beautiful backdrop for the recreation you will find on this unusual lake. Almost from the moment your boat leaves camp the swamp closes in on you.

Twisting through the acres of purple blooms, over winding boat roads, you pass under great cypress trees gray with Spanish moss. As your boat slides through the narrow passages to reach quiet, bass-filled pools a big alligator occasionally may be seen, sunning himself on some remote mud bank, or cruising open water searching for food.

Here the vacationist will enjoy some of the best freshwater fishing in America. Chain pickers are active from November to March; largemouth and white bass in the spring and early summer; and white crappie, bream, and catfish the year around. So, no matter what season of the year you visit Caddo, you will find good fishing of some sort.

Furthermore, there are no restrictive laws on game fish seasons in either Texas or Louisiana.

One of Caddo's most sought after fishing has been the alligator gar. This battling monster, often reaching 7 feet in length, has aptly been called the "freshwater tarpon." He is a real tackle-buster and will give even the rugged sportsmen a lively scrap.

Although easy to reach, and requiring no great physical exertion to explore, Caddo Lake is no place for a stranger to navigate without a competent guide. This because of its many sloughs and "passes."

For the most part Caddo guides are picturesque. Most of them were born to the traditions of the lake. They know where to find the best fishing and hunting spots. And they will take you there for a reasonable fee.

Fishing predominates but there is lots of hunting, in season, on and around Caddo. Since the lake is situated near the Mississippi, flyway sportsmen from all over the country arrive in the fall to enjoy Caddo duck hunting.

Government statistics show that Caddo Lake has one of the largest sustained duck populations of any body of water

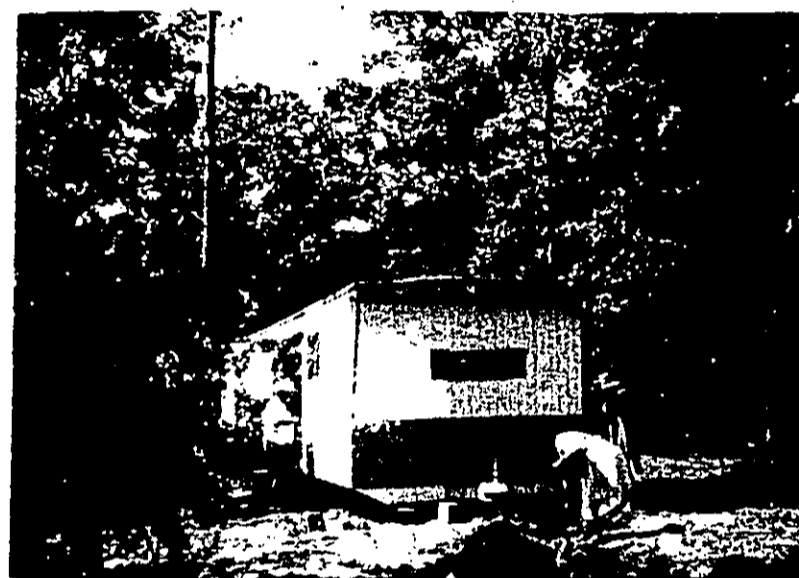
its size. Mallard, teal, and black ducks are plentiful, with many flights of the beautiful wood ducks.

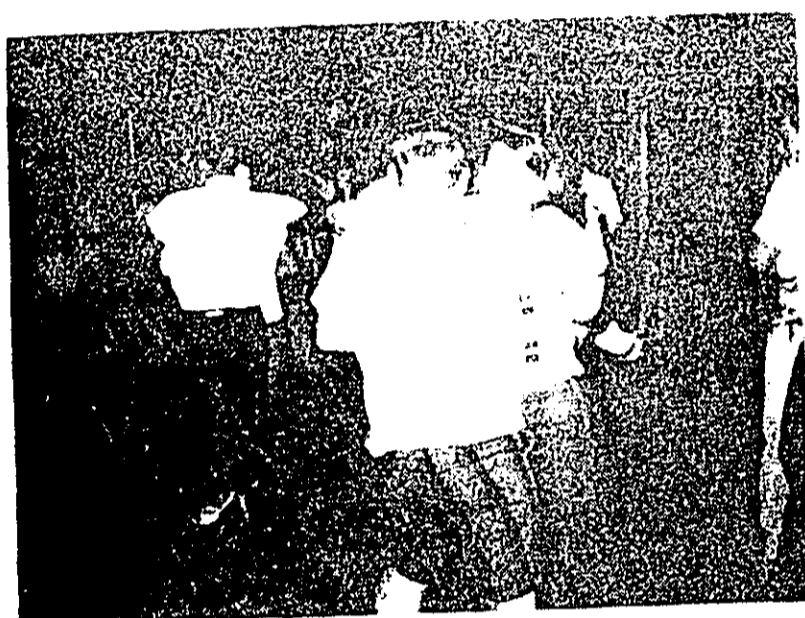

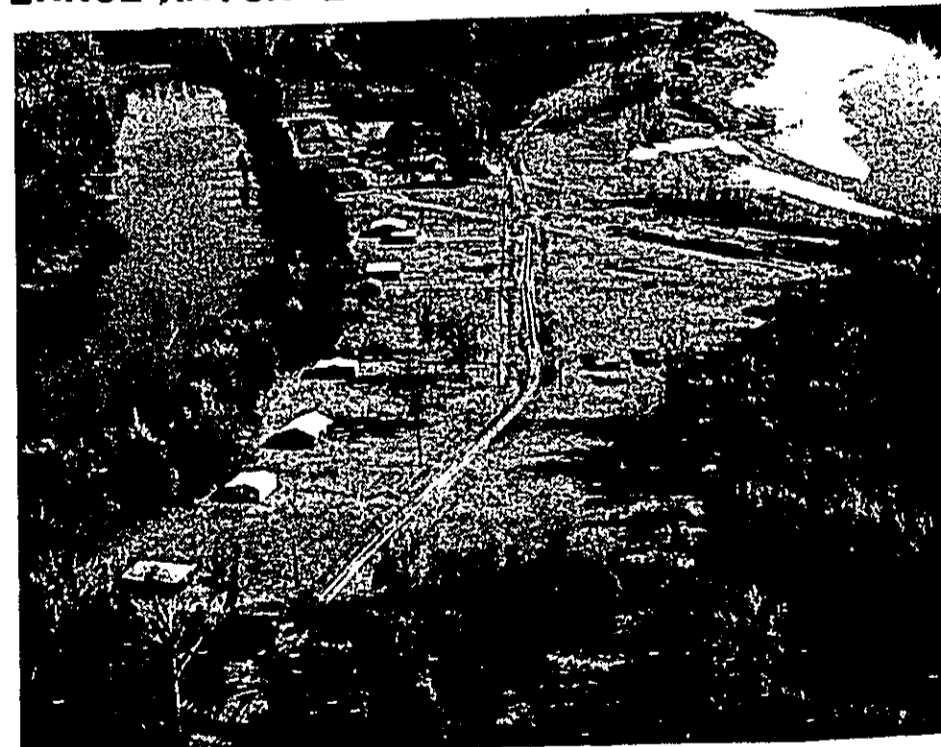

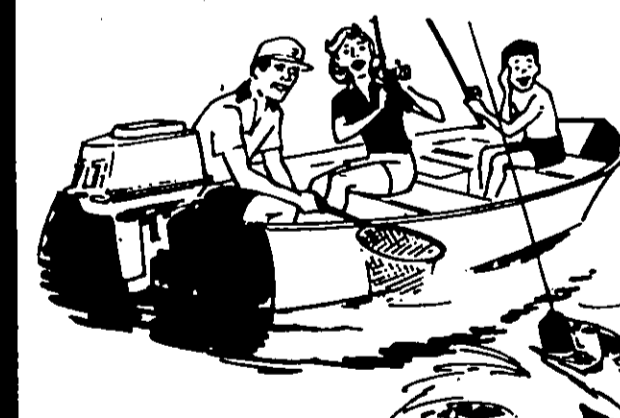

Test Area Readied To Drop Hook

The Engeling Wildlife Management Area, thought of as a research and management area for game, also offers the public fishing, reports the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. Small spring fed lakes provide good angling for bass and sunfish. One lake was drained

and renovated in readiness for stocking channel catfish and bass. An estimated ten miles of Catfish Creek running through the Area has at least ten species of fish, said Ray Hart, project leader. And it's all open to the public. There are few requirements for fishing in the Engeling Area, other than state license requirements. Fishing spots are closed only during the public squirrel and deer hunts. All but one area is closed to night fishing. One improved camp ground may be used at night, Hart said, and there are numerous unimproved places where the public may camp. So, Mr. Angler, the welcome mat is out.

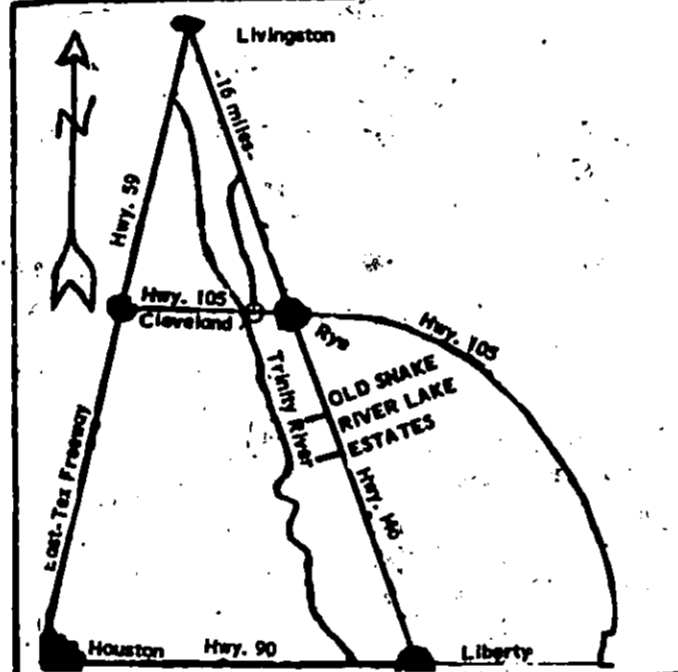

Better Deer Food Tested For East Texas

Biologist Dan Lay of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is in the market for a practical plant that could be used by both hunting clubs and landowners to increase or supplement deer food supplies. This, he says, would logically increase the potential deer harvest. Simply, Lay wants to know what might be the best thing to do to benefit both deer and sportsman.

Under a program begun in 1963, Lay is researching more than 20 browse and mast-producing plants, first planted near Buna in

East Texas, and now extended to various other sites to gain more information. Annual growth rate, and age at first fruit-production, is being noted with the thought in mind of planning long range wildlife benefits, rather than just for one or two years as he usually does. Many types of farm grain plantings for deer are good, Lay says, but a more permanent species is highly desirable to anticipate periods of food shortages and be prepared for detrimental food factors that may affect the supplies of available food plants. A yampon orchard, properly managed, may yield a ton of excellent browse per acre. Japanese honeysuckle can exceed even this figure. Getting them established in the presence of deer is being tested at Boggy Slough Hunting Club in Trinity County, and on the Allison Ranch near Carthage.

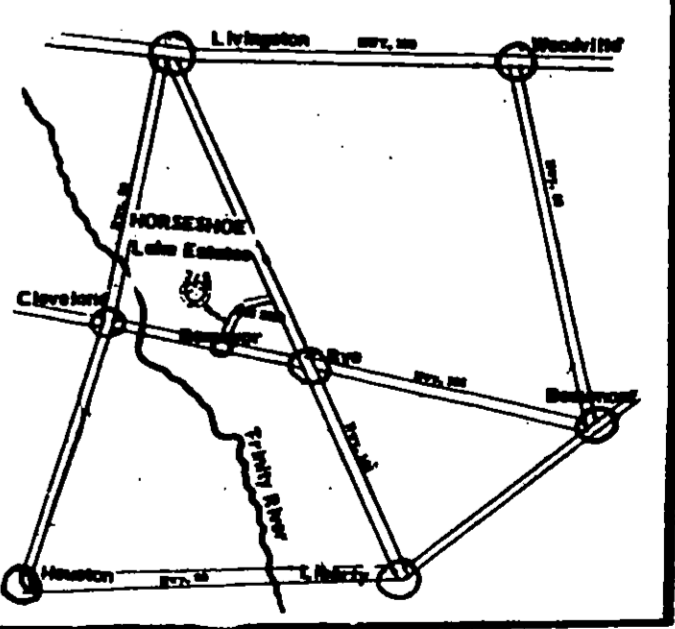

A Polluted Anti-Pollution Party At Northshore

Since I don't often receive an invitation from a Congressman for anything, I decided to accept the one received from Bob Eckhardt. It was no formal or top hat affair. The Congressman and his staff were sponsoring a party (the word should be 'party') in the Northshore high school to inform us smog lunged citizens on Washington's approach to clear air and water. That's not General Washington, but a word meaning the Big Hill where Federal laws are occasionally enacted. If General Washington had attacked the British in 1776 as our Congress is attacking air and water pollution, we'd still be paying homage to the Queen Mother.

The school at Northshore is a northern extension of the Galena Park system and is about the center of Congressman Eckhardt's eighth district in Harris County. The buildings are of contemporary construction and located north of the ship channel in the east-northeastern part of the county.

Each person entering the cafeteria was asked to register and then directed to a book table where members of the congressman's staff distributed a dozen pamphlets in a packet labeled, "Community Action Program for Air Pollution Control." These publications proved to be about the most interesting items of the party.

Perhaps 350 people were present and as I took a chair in hand to sit I noted the large room already heavy with blue smoke from the puffing patrons. Harris County Commissioner V. V. Ramsey was introduced. Then followed the heavenly host of officials from Galena Park, Jacinto City, Houston and Harris County State Representatives Lindon Williams, Rex Brown and Curtis Graves. School board members were introduced. Evidently no school custodians were present; this was a night of all chiefs and no Indians.

Transplants Eyed By Fisheries

Harris County's darling of clean air and water, Dr. Walter A. Quebedeaux, was first speaker and introduced the congressman.

Congressman Eckhardt's subject was 'Pollution' and he told us there were two fields of pollution: (1) Air, (2) Water. There were some other impressive statements by the congressman and I struggled to record them correctly. Try these: "Buffalo Bayou Water is worse than it used to be." And "Government works on the system of people getting what they must have from whatever source they can get it," and I really liked this one, "If people keep pushing on this, we'll get something done and I think in this session."

The building's air conditioning system wasn't producing properly and mid-way into the Congressman's speech it became fashionable among the ladies to use the pollution booklets as fans. A good East Texas un-

dertaker could have really cleaned up with his cardboard wooden handle fans. Dr. Quebedeaux repeatedly loaded his pipe with weed and fired up and each time his clean air disciples would follow.

As the congressman spoke on, the room filled with smoke. A light smoker could have saved his own and just breathed the room air. A man sitting near jumped to his feet, grabbed his chest and said, "I can't take this any longer." And so having expressed himself left in a trot for the industrially polluted air outside.

About one-third of the crowd moved to the refreshment tables with the congressman still speaking. Their noise was grating and they were only drinking punch.

The question session began and the refreshment noises grew in volume. Two Galena Park women approached the speaker's stand carrying wilted flowers and shrubs. They had gathered the little victims only hours before and served them to the crowd as visual demonstration of what those mean industrial chemicals do to flower gardens.

Pollution is like the weather. Everybody talks about it and nobody ever does anything about it. Talk is cheap. The only expensive items at the polluted anti-pollution party were cookies and punch. If we were to get clean air and water, look at the fine parties we would miss. Long live pollution!

Houston is not even among the nation's 20 most polluted cities according to a government report. We've lots of parties to attend yet. From the string of north bound traffic on highways 59 and 45 on Friday afternoon, I'm not by myself.

Now, I must sincerely confess, I am a better citizen since going to that meeting on pollution. I can even list the points of betterment: (1) I learned it is less offensive to breathe industrial pollution in the great outdoors, (2) You must visit Reeds bakery in Crosby. Those cookies are out of this polluted world.

A few Texas lakes have been selected as release sites for exotic fish species, reports Regional Fisheries Supervisor Charles Gray of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

He said the question is often asked: "Why not stock such fish as the walleye, redbass, striped bass, flounder and other exotic in all the waters of the state?" The answer is simple, says Gray. According to the biologists, information gained from these selected lakes will enable the fisheries people to compare habitat requirements with other lakes. Then they may reasonably judge if introduced species will thrive, the degree of competition to native species, and what the exotic may contribute to the creel of the sportsman.

There are many questions. Answers are slow. But they do come.

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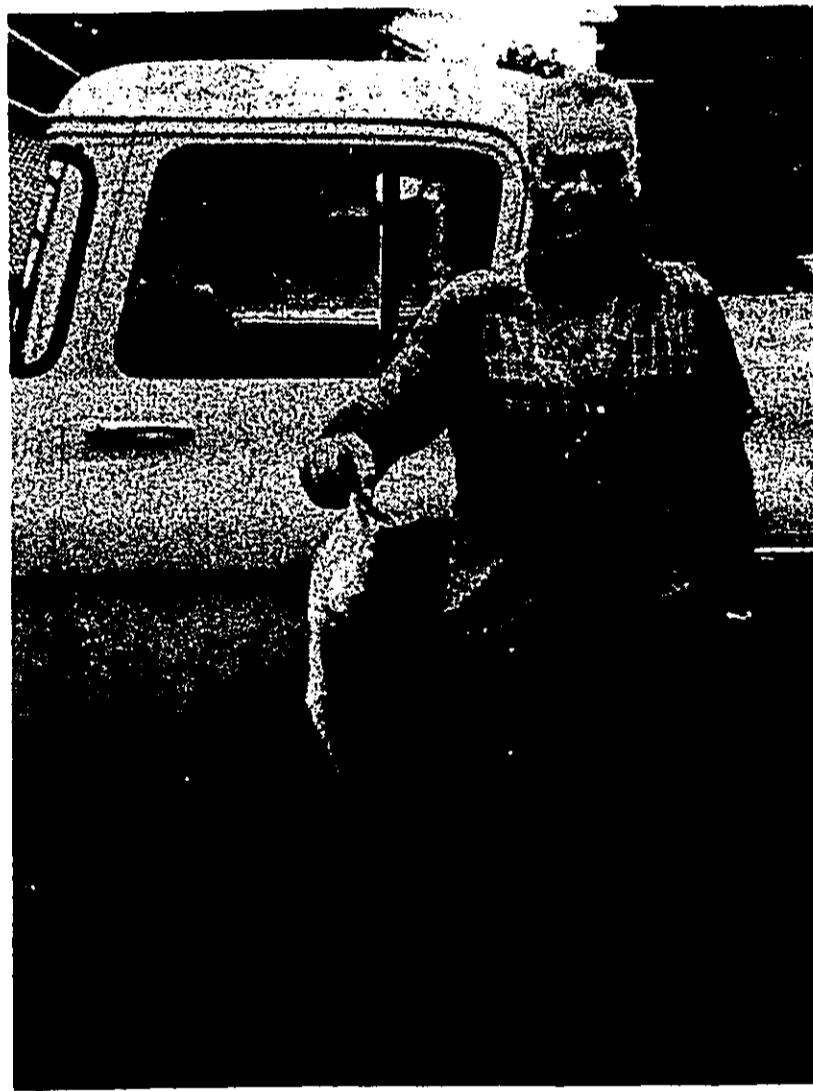

Doves Boom For Westex Is Puzzler

Texas' abundant wild game species are now divided among areas ordinarily short changed in the general distribution, according to new reports to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The latest example of this share-the-natural-resources wealth centers in far West Texas where mourning doves remain in unusually good numbers after the high population reported during the 1966 harvest.

While biologists right now see very little relation between the favorable Trans-Pecos count and the robust flocks in other parts of the state. The area affected comprises a stub extending westward beyond the surrounding state boundary and

would not be affected by the doves' traditional north-south migration routes.

It was noted during the 1966 dove season that hunting continued exceptionally good in many West Texas places, particularly in the sandhills near El Paso. Scientists are searching for possible new food that naturally would be a prime attraction because the other leading lure for doves--water--is naturally not too abundant in this part of the state.

Biologists have determined that one personal dove concentration south of Marfa results from the food available from a small plant, resembling the croton weed, a favorite of doves elsewhere.

While this bonus for Trans-Pecos wing shooters is being probed, the dove researchers report

their new trapping program has produced a mystery of its own. Two thirds of the caged doves are males. Why? Are males not as smart as the opposite sex? Are they more aggressive and fight off the females around the baited devices? Or are there simply more male than female doves?

Sports appraising 1967 prospects for the state's favorite upland game bird there may be assured somebody's doing the worrying about maintaining a supply.

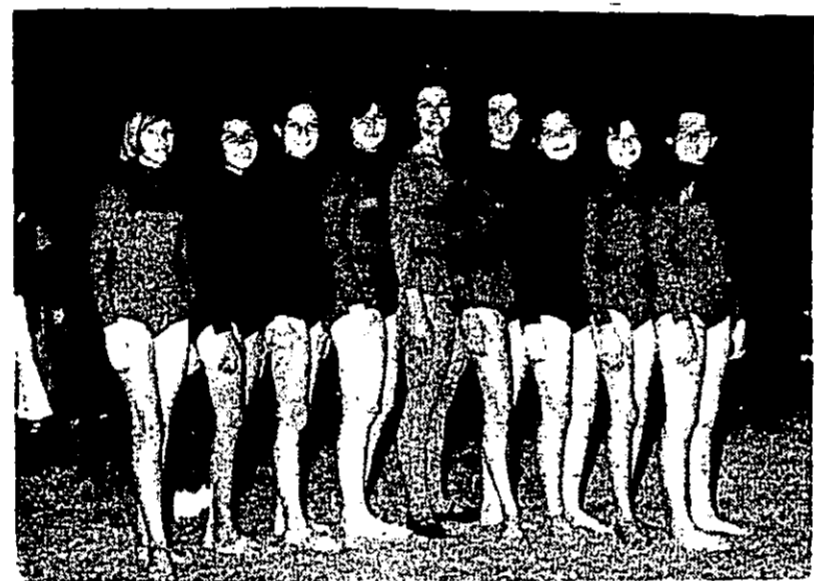

Dawn patrol has a special meaning for wildlife personnel working the Permian Basin turkey ranges for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

They are up before daylight conducting gobbler counts during the courtship rituals signified by the males' hearty, guttural love calls.

Supervisor Jack Paisons said the idea is to determine the location and relative number of gobblers to indicate breeding status on a year to year basis.

Port Aransas Reef Gets Face Lift

The artificial reef, located in the Gulf about six miles from Port Aransas, toast of sports fishermen, is being enlarged. Again the Port Aransas Boatman's Association and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department are sharing efforts in a joint undertaking that charter boat skippers credit for lengthening the offshore fishing season an estimated two months to that area.

About 600 tons of assorted rubble now are being dropped on the reef, according to Tom Moore, regional director for the Department.

The reef was established in 1959 when about 400 old car bodies were sunk there at a cost of

\$12,037. Hurricane Carla tore it up but in 1964 the persistent 600 tons of donated concrete rubble and tile pipe for the underwater angling bonanza.

The process was repeated in 1965.

After the Boatman's Association gathered the rubble, the Parks and Wildlife Department financed the cost of transporting the latest addition to the reef totaling \$2,950.

Drivers under 25 years of age continue to compile the worst traffic records of any age group, according to a report from The Travelers Insurance Companies. Young drivers were involved in almost 32 per cent of highway deaths last year.

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
