MAN CONVICTED OF ROBBERY ASKS NEW TRIAL

A man who has served eight years in the penitentiary for robbery of the Chester State Bank asked for a writ of habeas corpus in district court here Monday on grounds that he had not been properly represented by legal counsel when convicted. William Lee Meadows was sentenced in 88th district court here for the robbery with an accomplice of the Chester bank. The hearing here Monday before Judge H. A. Coe was to certify the evidence presented at Meadows' trial, and it will be sent to the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals with his application for a writ of habeas corpus. If granted, the case will have to be reset for trial in district court here.

GRAND JURY IN FINAL SESSION INDICTS SIX

The December term of the Tyler County grand jury completed its term Monday, returning eight indictments in its final session and making a final report on its work to Judge H. A. Coe of 88th district court. Two felony indictments were returned against William Konegny for aiding two prisoners to escape from the Tyler County jail. Also indicted twice for the same offense was Frank Ervin Williams. They are accused of aiding the escape of David Wilson and Jerry Von Turner, who were recaptured floating down the Neches River the day following their escape from jail. Wilson and Turner were each indicted for forgery and passing. Two indictments, one for forgery and passing and the other for worthless checks, were also returned by the grand jury. Parties indicted are still at large and their names were not released. The grand jury in its final report made several recommendations. Full text of its report follows: (Cont'd on page 6)

TWO WATER DEPARTMENT MEN RECEIVE STATE CITATION

An official State Health Department citation for work proficiency has been awarded to William W. (Walt) Davis, assistant water and sewage superintendent for the Woodville water system, and to L. E. Greenwood, plant operations specialist for the utility system.

Signed by the State Health Commissioner and authorities of the Texas Water and Sewerage Works Association, the certificate of competency is awarded only to those utility plant operators who have successfully demonstrated their skill and knowledge in modern principles of plant management.

To qualify for certification, a plant operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience. He must also have attended both regional and statewide short schools at which the techniques of water treatment and waste water disposal are taught, and must have passed an examination given by State Health Department sanitary engineers.

State law requires that at least one operator per shift be certified for competency by health department engineers; but many operators seek certification on their own time and at their own expense to increase their efficiency as key public servants to their community and state.

The engineers said the attainment is evidence of the men's efforts to better prepare themselves for the duties of their profession.

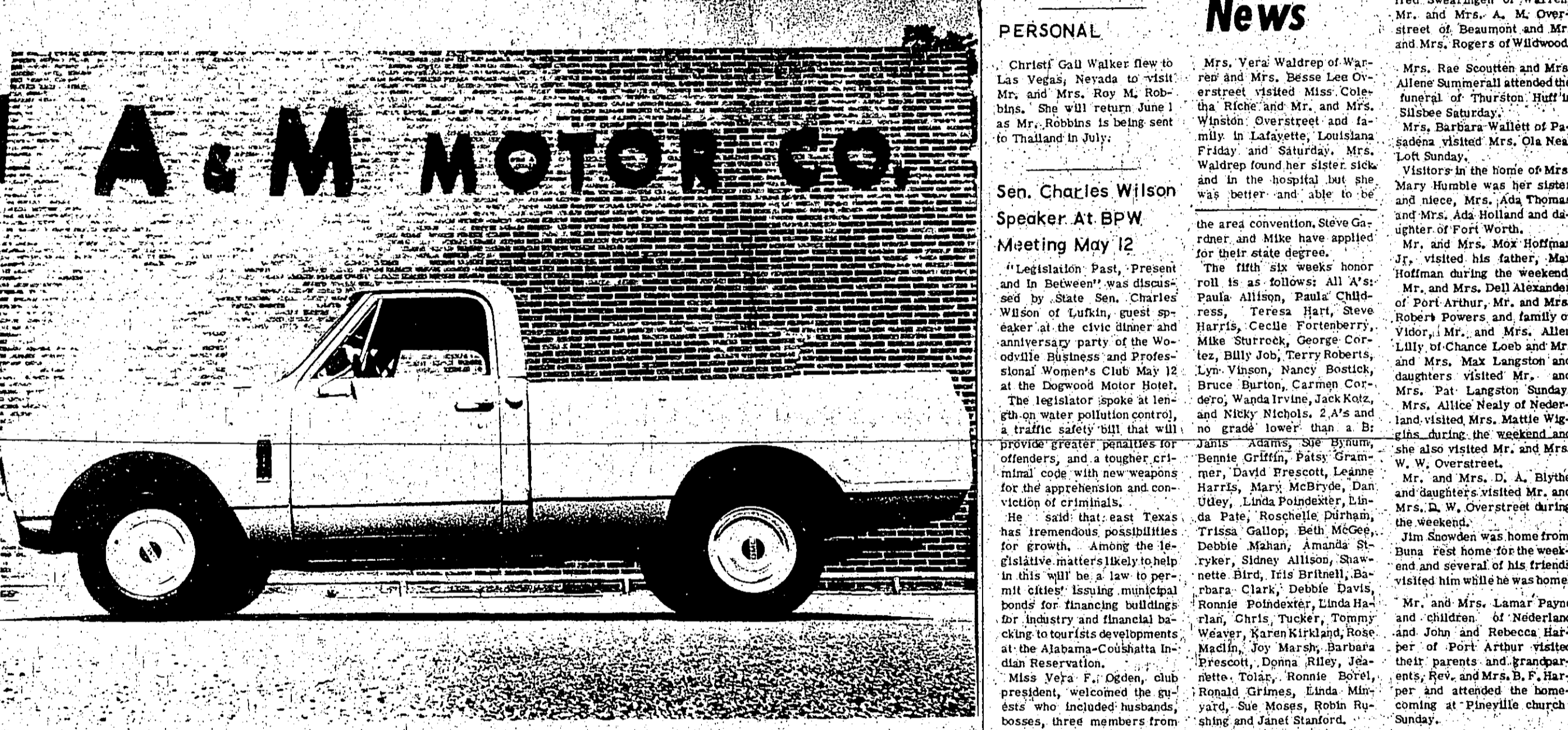

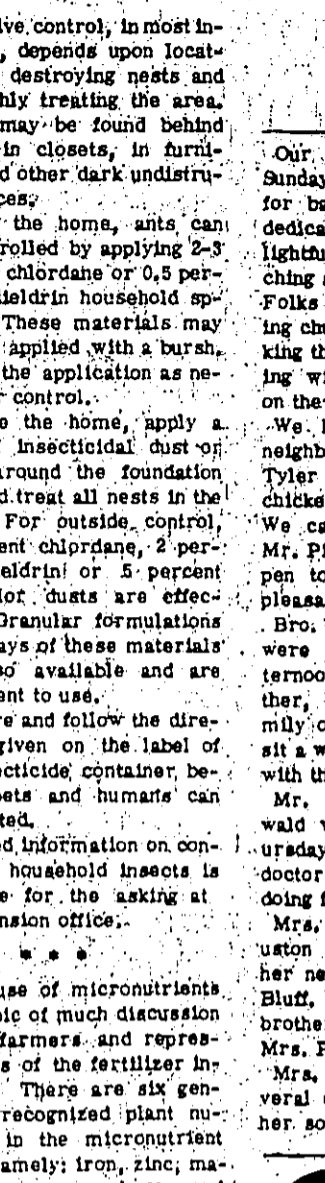

Grand Jury Report (Cont. from Page 1)

To the honorable H. A. Coe, District Judge of the 88th Judicial District:

Comes now your Grand Jury for the December Term, A.D. 1966, and wish to make to the Court the following report of our activities for the term.

This jury has diligently inquired into and investigated all law violations that have been brought to our attention. We have been in session six days and have returned five indictments, 18 true bills, and passed six cases to the next grand jury. Of these last six cases passed to the next grand jury, four of them were only received May 22, 1967.

We recommend that any untried cases on our docket should be attended to without delay.

The jury respectfully recommends that the files, papers, work, tickets, complaints, etc. presented for its consideration and action be better organized and handled in more orderly fashion, in order that the jury's work can be expedited and adequate attention can be given to all available and pertinent information relating to cases before the jury.

The jury further recommends that the jail and its facilities be thoroughly cleaned and kept in safe condition. Furthermore, more careful attention should be given to the cleanliness and sanitation of the prisoners.

Livestock Survey Cards To Go Out On Chester Route

Postmaster T. A. Barnes reminds rural patrons of the Chester Texas 75936 Post Office to be on the lookout for June Livestock Survey cards. Next week, mail carriers will have survey cards to a sample of boxes along their routes.

Survey cards will be forwarded to Cary D. Palmer, State Agricultural Statistician, in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the State's milk production, calf and pig crops, lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets.

Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decisions," Mr. Barnes concludes.

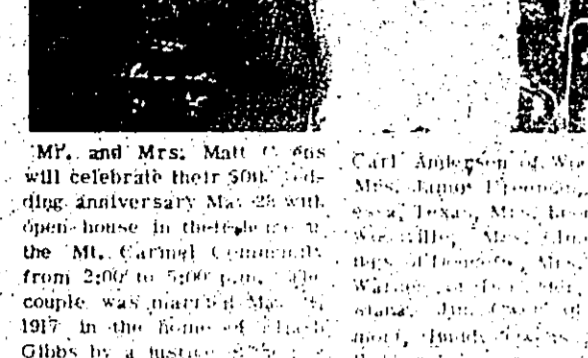

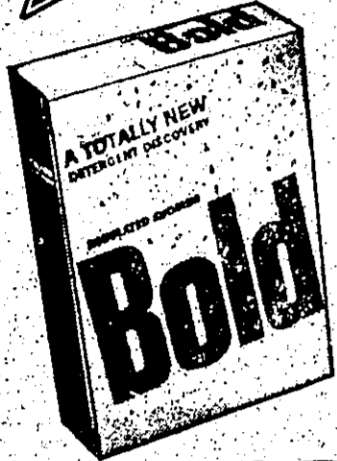

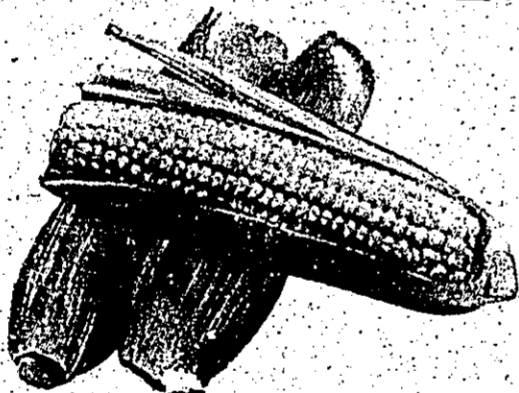
