2380 Tyler Countians On Social Security

Social Security benefits paid to residents of Tyler last year totaled \$830 million, up 12 percent from the year before. Tyler County residents were well represented in these payments, according to figures released by L. R. James, Social Security district manager at Lufkin.

At the end of 1966, a total of 2,380 men, women, and children in Tyler County were receiving benefits at a monthly rate of \$140,317, James reported. Of these, 1,685 were older people receiving benefits as retired workers, the wives and husbands of retired workers, and as the surviving widows or aged dependent parents of workers who have died.

"But social security is not just for older people," James pointed out. Five hundred sixteen young widows and children in Tyler County were receiving monthly benefits amounting to \$18,658 at the end of December, and 203 disabled workers and dependents were receiving benefits at a monthly rate of \$7,756.

"Practically every young family has survivors protection under social security that can be worth \$75,000 or more, and equally valuable disability insurance protection," James said.

The average worker can expect to collect more than the value of his social security tax contributions just in the benefits payable to him and his wife in retirement, if he does not live to retirement, his family stands to collect far more than the contributions he has paid, and the same will be true if he should become totally disabled for work before 65.

Social security survivors benefits, James said, can be paid to the family of a young man who has worked and paid social security contributions for as little as a year and a half during the three years before his death. Benefits to the mother and children continue until the youngest child reaches 18, or indefinitely, if the child has a disability which began before his 18th birthday and makes it impossible for him to work and become self-supporting. Under a change in the law enacted in 1965, a child's benefits can be continued up until age 22 if he or she continues in school.

Monthly payments to the family of a worker who dies, leaving two or more children, range from \$66 to \$368 a month, depending on the worker's average earnings under social security.

SECOND DISTRICT UNCHANGED BY REDISTRICTING BILL

The Congressional redistricting bill passed by the Texas legislature leaves the Second district unchanged, represented by Rep. John Dowdy.

Federal yardstick as laid down by the courts requires that districts be within 5 percent of the norm. Below are the 23 Texas districts and the amount they vary from this yardstick.

District 1, represented by Rep. Wright Patman of Texas: Plus 4.7 percent.

District 8, represented by Rep. George Bush of Houston: Unchanged. Plus 2 percent.

District 9, represented by Rep. Jim Wright of Dallas: Unchanged. Plus 5.3 percent.

District 10, represented by Rep. Jim Wright of Dallas: Unchanged. Plus 5.3 percent.

District 11, represented by Rep. Charles Kraybill of Lufkin: Loses Childress and Cottle counties and a greater portion of North Dallas. Minus 5.3 percent.

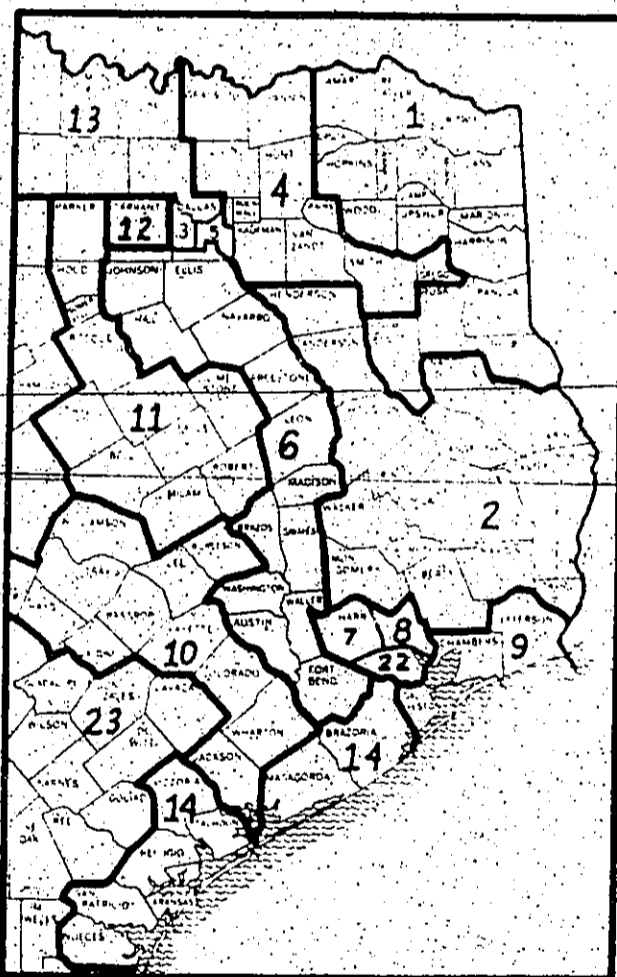

OPEN MEETINGS MANDATORY BY GOVERNMENTAL BODIES

Gov. John Connally on May 22 signed into law "Open Meetings" bill which he proclaimed a "great step forward for the people of Texas."

It was referring to Senate Bill 84 approved by Sen. Clay Brooks of Pasadena. Similar legislation was introduced in the House by Rep. Bill Hays of Raymondville.

Passage of the "Open Meetings" legislation at the 1967 session constituted a date that began some 20 years ago. It was the result of a long struggle to open the doors of government to the people.

At the bill signing ceremony, Governor Connally made the statement regarding the importance of the legislation. "Senate Bill 84, commonly known as the open meetings bill, provides basically that all meetings of governmental bodies and public affairs."
