DAMAGE SUIT TRIAL BEING HEARD IN DISTRICT COURT WEDNESDAY

A suit for damages as the result of a car-truck collision in June 1966, is under way in 89th District Court Tuesday following the selection of a jury. The case is a consolidation of several suits in the deaths of four persons in the accident which occurred south of Woodville on Highway 69 when a car occupied by four Hillister residents was in collision with a pole truck.

BIG THICKET PARK NEAR, SENATOR TELLS GROUP

Realization of the dream of a national park in the Big Thicket is near, U. S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough told members of the Big Thicket Association and guests at the annual Big Thicket Get-Together Saturday at Saratoga.

About 3,000 persons attended the day-long program. Guests in addition to Sen. Yarborough were U. S. Supreme Court Justice and Mrs. William O. Douglas, State Sen. Charles Wilson of Lufkin, Sen. D. Roy Harrington of Port Arthur and state representatives from El Paso, San Antonio, Dallas and all over Southeast Texas.

Sen. Yarborough, who is sponsoring legislation for creation of a Big Thicket national park said that the present plan for a 35,000 acre "chain of pearls" park spread over six counties is a modest one and should meet no opposition. He said it is a well studied plan and a good one. He said success is coming soon.

Mayor Dempster Henley of Liberty presided over the association business session. Mayor Pat Pace of Kountze delivered the welcoming address and Judge Emmett C. Lack of Kountze read a resolution which was approved, praising Sen. Yarborough for his work as a U. S. senator and for his efforts on behalf of conservation of the Big Thicket.

Miss Brenda Gee of Sillsbee was selected Miss Big Thicket from 11 contestants. Judges were Mrs. Gilbert Adams of Beaumont and Mrs. Carl Hansford and Mrs. James Breaux, both of Liberty. Justice Douglas autographed copies of his recently published book, "Farwell to Texas," the first chapter of which is about the Big Thicket. The Supreme court

justice visited the thicket last year.

Several hundred trail riders led by Otis Munson of Schwab City, made the trek to the meeting and participated in the activities.

The Indian dancers from the Alabama-Coushatta reservation between Woodville and Liberty performed, and a special dance was presented by Holly Henley and Gay Warren.

The Big Thicket Ladies Auxiliary was in charge of food, decorations and arrangements.

Farm Road 3065 Work Approved By Highway Department

The Texas Highway Department has approved development of 7.3 miles on Farm Road 3065 in Tyler county at an estimated cost of \$180,000, according to District Engineer John C. Keller. The work will be under the supervision of A. J. Cortez, supervising resident engineer at Woodville.

The road will begin two miles north of Doucette (near Boyett's store) and run 7.3 miles to Farm Road 256 at Colmesneil.

Farm and Ranch Road construction authorized by the highway department totals 940.3 miles with 288 projects in 166 counties. Of this mileage, 623 miles is new construction not previously designated.

The department said that cost of farm-to-market roads has almost doubled in the last 15 years and maintenance costs have climbed 80 per cent in the same period. This is due to increased traffic and the necessity of designing roads for heavier vehicles.

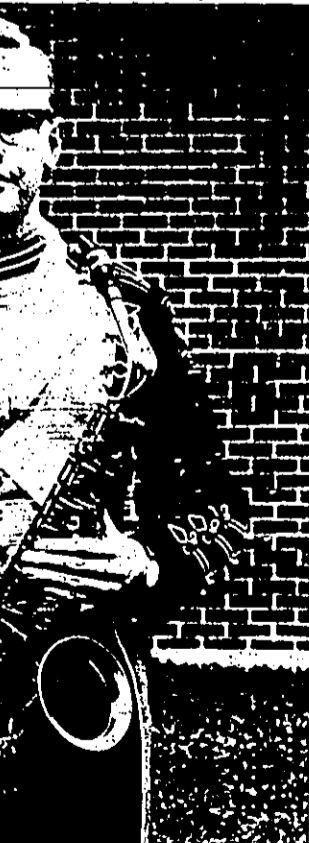
County Leads In Southern Pine Tree Plantings

Tyler county led in the number of southern pine tree plantings in Texas last year with 1.4 million seedlings, according to the Texas Forest Service Indian Mound Nursery at Alto. Montgomery county was second with 750,000 seedlings, and Newton county was third with 648,000.

Tree seedlings for reforestation of more than 6300 acres of forest land were sold at the nursery last year. The trees were purchased by more than 1250 tree planters in 174 of Texas' 254 counties. More than 3-3/4 million tree seedlings were distributed - an 18 per cent increase over the previous year.

State-of-windbreak seedlings decreased 7 per cent because of a shortage of some species, however, Southern pine seedlings sales jumped 23 per cent over the previous year.

LEGISLATIVE AND SENIORITY EDUCATION ACT. By amendments adopted in the House of Representatives, that act was revised in several respects. Two of the amendments to Mrs. Green, Democrat of Oregon, would require compliance officers in the Office of Education to file legal authority for each provision of the guidelines they set up, and to make all such regulations apply equally in all 50 states, and would give the state board authority of certain educational service programs now run by the United States Commissioner of Education. An amendment by Rep. Gibbons (R-Tx.) would give more power to the parent school districts, which spend less than the national average on education, to conduct a formal hearing before withdrawing funds from a local school district.

Another amendment by Mrs. Green would allow high funds now controlled by the federal commissioner of education, and included the amount to the funds authorized for grants to strengthen state departments of education. Mrs. Green's bill would also eliminate the funding of the Middle East by the United States. She said she believed it would lead back down to a situation. I hope this is right. If not, our nation would have a choice of testing the Middle East by default, or else if by taking sides against the Arabs. HIGHLIGHTS & SIDELIGHTS

From Your State Capital by VERN SANFORD

Six proposed changes in the Texas Constitution were approved by the 60th Legislature for submission to the voters this fall—November 11. These proposals are as follows:
SJR 6 authorizing counties to pay medical, doctor and hospital bills to county law enforcement officers injured in line of duty.
HJR 12 providing for a \$74,000,000 parks development fund bond issue.
HJR 17 reviving the Veterans' Land Program, authorizing a total of \$400,000,000 in bonds.
HJR 3 allowing counties to put tax money in one general fund.
HJR 27 permitting state officers and employees to hold other non-exclusive positions under the state or U.S. governments where there is no conflict of interest and where the state might actually benefit.
HJR 27 allowing cities and other units within hospital districts to levy taxes for participation in mental health and mental retardation community centers.
Forteen additional amendments were approved by the legislature for voters consideration on November 5, 1968. These include the following:
SJR 4 giving the legislature power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds to build industrial plants for operation by private concerns.
SJR 3 revising provisions for investment of the state employee retirement system and changing provisions for its administration.
SJR 4 providing for contributions to teacher retirement system on the basis of full salary of members (contributions now are limited to \$504 a year).
SJR 24 permitting the legislature to exempt from all taxes, except taxes on land, air or water pollution control.
SJR 32 abolishing the state property tax by 1976.
SJR 37 allowing Dallas County to issue road bonds on vote of a majority of property taxpayers.
SJR 41 raising state welfare spending ceiling from \$60,000,000 to \$75,000,000 a year.
HJR 10 permitting the legislature to temporarily custody at a warehouse.
HJR 20 altering investment procedures for University of Texas permanent fund.
HJR 22 specifying that legislators will not be ineligible for other offices because their terms extend a few days into January.
HJR 49 eliminating the requirement that the governor, secretary of state and comptroller approve contracts for printing and paper.
HJR 50 authorizing the legislature to provide for the fund of tax on cigars and tobacco products sold at retail in Texas.
HJR 60 permitting consolidation of offices and governmental functions in El Paso and Tarrant counties.
HJR 61 raising legislators' salaries from \$4,800 to \$4,400 a year and extending per diem expense allowance from 120 to 140 days of the regular session.

GRAM APPROVED—A \$140,774 program to develop community programs of direct service to the aged in Lubbock, Big Spring, Fort Worth, Marpedez and San Antonio have been approved by the Governor's Committee on Aging.
Contracts went to Texas Tech College, Lubbock (\$4,760); Big Spring State Hospital Volunteer Advisory Council, Inc. (49,182); Tarrant County Community Council (\$2,000); Hidalgo County Committee on Aging (\$14,948); and Senior Community Services, Inc., San Antonio (\$44,820).
AIRPORT FUNDS AVAILABLE—Legislature appropriated \$95,000 for building and improving small town airports. Big Bend National Park will get \$150,000 plus federal aid for new airport; Lake Whitney State Park, \$40,000, and \$25,000 will go to aviation research at a higher education institution.
Texas Aeronautics Commission Director Charles Murphy estimates that 40 per cent of those applicants for state aid will share in available funds:
Abernathy, Aransas Pass, Atlanta, Bay City, Brady, Brownwood, Bryan, Canton, Center, Cleveland College Station, Dumas, Elmendorf, Elgin, Eagle Pass, Edinburg, Emis, Fairfield-Teague, Folkert, Georgetown, Giddings, Gilmer, Granbury, Graham, Gregg County, Hamilton, Harlingen, Hempstead, Hillboro, Honey Grove, Kainer County, Kerrville, Knox City, La Porte, Levelland, Littlefield, Livingston, Llano and Lockhart.
Also, Madisonville, McGregor, Marlin, Miami, Morton, Mt. Vernon, Navasota, Oviatt, Paducah, Pecos, Port Mansfield, Ranger, Rockwall, San Benito, Schulenburg, Sherman, Silsbee, Slaton, Smithville, Stamford, Stanton, Sulphur Springs, Tahoka, Temple, Vega, Warrington, West Columbia, Wharton County, Westaco and Willis Point.

INTERIM COMMITTEES—A record-breaking list of interim committees, some 70 in all, have been appointed to serve until the next special or regular session of the Legislature begins. Committees will deal with about everything the Legislature considered during its recent session. In fact, there are more interim committees than there were standing committees during the 60th session. Total then was 44 in the House and 24 in the Senate.
Among the special committees are those dealing with state and local tax policy, law enforcement and crime prevention, state Constitution, general investigating, slum problems and clearance, causes of poverty, renovation and maintenance of Governor's mansion, parking problem around state capitol, state college faculty pay and benefits and unassisted state government expenses.
Others relate to the importation and grading of eggs, prices of fruits and vegetables, industrial entertainment promotion, safety regulations for school buses and home improvements contracting.
Also, selection of a state poet laureate, and return of the Alamo flag from Mexico.

What is it you discover that a dollar bill, recently acquired by you, is a counterfeit? Your quick reaction might be: "This thing is a hot potato, I'd better unload it onto somebody else as fast as I can."
