### LAKE FEES TO BEGIN

Effective January 1, 1968, all individuals and organizations having private boat mooring facilities, duck blinds, ski-jump floats, diving or swimming platforms and rafts or any other similar installations on any U. S. Corps of Engineers reservoir will be required to pay a fee for them.

Previously owners were issued permits for private boat-houses and other similar facilities on the reservoirs free of charge. The change was made due to the heavy use of reservoirs by the public for recreational purposes which have increased the cost of administering and maintaining surveillance over such facilities.

The new nation-wide policy will charge \$10 per year for the first 200 square feet of area occupied plus 7-1/2 cents a year for each additional square foot.

Boats will not be charged under the new policy, which affects only boat-houses, buoys, docks or piers to which the boats are moored.

### Visiting Service Club Receives Sample Of Woodville Hospitality

There is always some reason for everything that happens, that is so in this instance. Almost every meeting that this newspaper's representatives have attended, mention of something or some things that will induce more people to come to Tyler County has been brought to the attention of those attending.

This, we feel, is the true and genuine way to feel, however, we have the suspicion that this is not true. With some of the business and professional people of this county.

For instance, a service club from our neighbor city west of here had confirmed reservations from the Dogwood Motor Hotel for the use of the Ballroom where the local Rotary Club meets on Thursday nights unless it has been engaged by some other group and then the local Rotary Club meets in another facility at the Hotel, which is large enough to accommodate the regular members.

According to the management of the Hotel, no one from the Rotary Club had informed him that they, too, had a larger than usual attendance scheduled for the same night. This was brought to the attention of the management only three days prior to the time of the two meetings, but almost two weeks after the Livingston Lions Club had confirmed their reservation and advertised the Dogwood Motor Hotel as the place for their annual banquet and the night they were to install new officers for the next year.

A meeting of the then reigning officers of the Livingston Lions Club and the Woodville Rotary Club and the manager of the Dogwood Motor Hotel was held. Result: the Rotary Club insisted they had priority over the visiting group of business men from Livingston because, as I recall the statement, "We eat here 52 weeks of the year," and that was the way it ended. It supposed they did have priority because the Rotary Club used the Ballroom while the approximately one hundred businessmen and women from out of the county used makeshift area that was partitioned off in part of the public dining room area.

Incidentally, Bill Dove of Livingston is the editor and publisher of the Polk County Enterprise, Livingston's only newspaper.

After being present and overhearing the discussion mentioned above, and then the statement made by the officer of the Woodville Rotary Club, we felt it was our duty to let everyone know what is happening and to defend your local newspaper when it is accused of something that is not true. We here at the newspaper feel that the accusation was unjustified.

Maybe a test should be run using these few self-minded people as guinea pigs: like closing these specimens up in a confinement and forcing them to do business with only those few and see how they get along without having so-called outsiders pry on.

This might be rather an amusing sight, huh? Let them have this all to themselves, possibly this is the way it should be since they would be there 52 weeks of the year.

So much for this thought. Maybe it won't happen, but it is food for thought. We have always thought of a city or community as sort of a large family that needed to work together to accomplish the goals set for them or maintain what they have. Some people work for and create goodwill with their neighbors in the nearby towns and counties but some people seem to have a different idea about what or should we say "who" GOODWILL is, maybe they think GOODWILL is their YES man that thinks the same way as they do. That is possible, you know.

When a group of business men from a neighboring county chooses our city or county as a place to visit and spend money, we feel that they should be welcomed and if there is any courtesy that can be extended them, it should be done. After all, there are a few more counties in this state other than Tyler county.

The Fourth of July holiday which started Friday night and ended Tuesday at midnight was relatively quiet in Tyler County. Traffic was heavy Friday night and Sunday night as most people hurried from the metropolitan areas to San Rayburn and Dam B Reservoirs and back home again Sunday.

Tuesday, Independence Day, was a real quiet day in the county. Traffic on the highways was extremely light until late in the afternoon, and no serious auto accidents had been reported as the Booster went to press Tuesday afternoon.

Friday two accidents occurred on Highway 190 east of Woodville. One near Woodville Lumber Company involved two cars and apparently no one was seriously hurt. Another about six miles west of town involved a car and a milk truck with no serious injuries reported.

In the accident involving the large milk truck, wreckers wrestled with the huge tractor and van trying to right it, finally getting into Woodville with it Friday night.

Another wreck Saturday on North Magnolia involved a car and pickup truck. The car was badly damaged although no serious injuries were reported.

Law enforcement officers reported that they had a relatively light weekend. One DWI and several speeding tickets were issued but otherwise the officers reported unusual quiet for a long holiday weekend. Highway patrolmen and sheriff's deputies patrolled the highways in the county to curb speeders and other violators of traffic laws but issued very few tickets.

Three drownings at Dam B Reservoir marred the otherwise safe weekend. Friday a 31-year-old Bridge City woman and her two-year-old daughter were drowned in the Henhouse Ridge Unit of the state park on the Jasper County side. She was Mrs. Mary Ann LaGrappe who was floating on an air mattress with her daughter, Lela Ann, when the child slipped into the deep water.

Monday afternoon a nine-year-old Jasper boy was drowned on the Tyler County side of the Highway 190 bridge, at the Cherokee Park Unit. He was given artificial respiration and rushed to a Jasper hospital where he died about 9 p.m. Sunday.

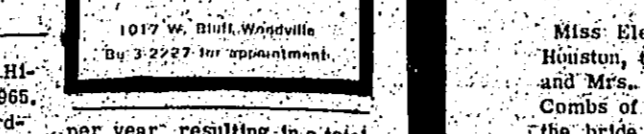

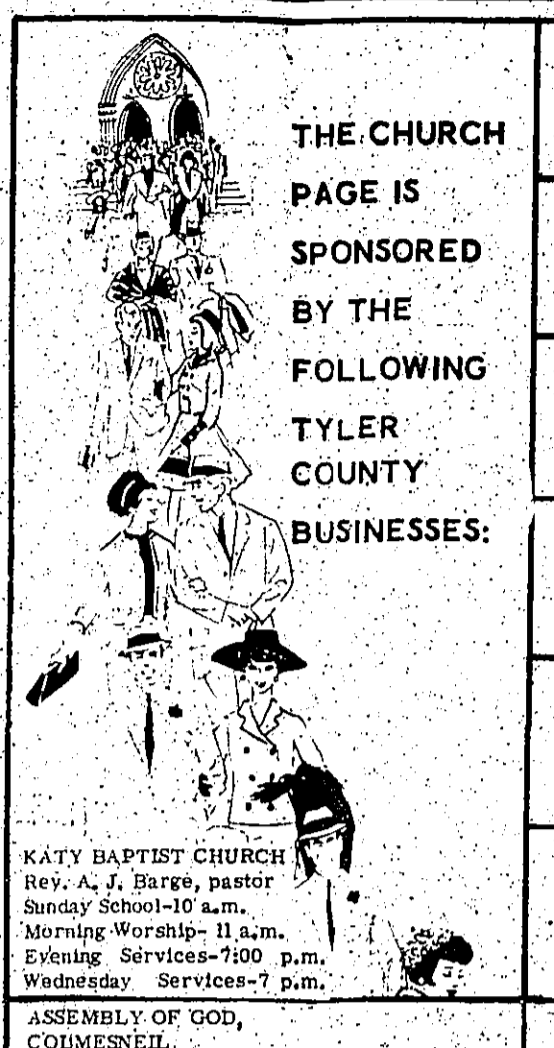

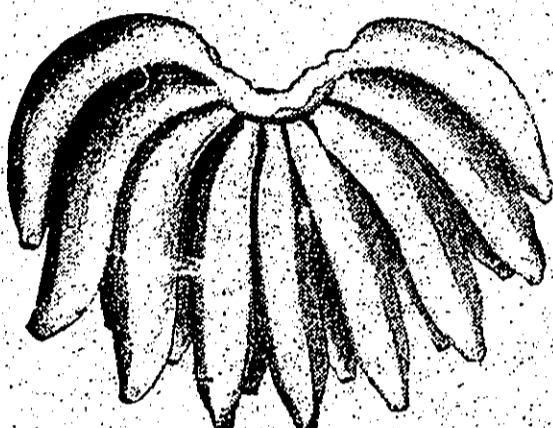
