Bank Opening Sunday Draws Crowds

He was assisted by the bank's president, Robert A. Mann, who made the welcome address previous to the ribbon cutting. Several hundred people, an unusually large crowd for Sunday afternoon, attended the ceremonies and toured the bank's new facilities. Refreshments and kiddie rides were provided on the bank's new 64-car parking lot.

The Citizens State Bank's open-house and formal dedication of its enlarged banking facilities, Sunday afternoon, was an outstanding success from every angle. E. D. Mahan, vice president, said Monday.

Before the 2 p.m. opening and continuing throughout the afternoon the bank and parking lot area was thronged with people. A large number of visitors from Beaumont, Port Arthur, Houston and other towns in the area mingled with hundreds of Tyler citizens who came to see the modern banking institution which is beginning its 48th year in business.

Of course, for the youngsters the parking lot with its free rides, including a merry-go-round and ferris wheel, and the trained monkey were the feature attractions. For the adults, the drive-in TV bank (where everyone can be on television), the enlarged main banking building and the huge parking lot, plus the richly decorated interior were minutely inspected by the huge crowds.

State Senator Charles Wilson of Lufkin, assisted by Robert A. Mann, the bank's president, cut the ribbon at the new entrance from the parking lot area. Previously Mr. Mann had welcomed the visitors and introduced the bank's directors, officers, and dignitaries in the crowd.

And just to quiet that old question asked of banks, "Don't you give any samples?" a bright shiny penny on a card was given each visitor as a sample.

At 3 p.m. a drawing was held to determine the winners of the bumper sticker prizes. H. P. Brewer won the \$100 first prize and Allen Fortenberry the second prize of \$50.

The door prize drawing at 4 p.m. was won by Grover Mison, \$100 first prize, and Jim Galney, \$50 second prize.

Bruinsma Given 20-Year Sentence

Ray Nelson Bruinsma of Beaumont appeared before U. S. District Judge Joe J. Fisher in Beaumont Saturday and was sentenced to 20 years in prison for the burglary of the

Chester State Bank last January 18.

Jimmie Charles Cowart, who had previously entered a plea of guilty, was assessed a five-year sentence.

A U. S. District Court jury found Bruinsma guilty on both counts in a trial last week in Beaumont. He is a jail in Beaumont in lieu of a \$100,000 bond.

In the trial, Bruinsma entered a plea of not guilty to both counts. He and Jimmie Charles Cowart were charged with breaking into the bank by using a sledge hammer. They unsuccessfully attempted to get into the vault by removing bricks from the wall surrounding the vault. Cowart entered a plea of guilty on June 3 before Judge Fisher. He has not been sentenced, and is free on \$5,000 bond. He testified in the trial of Bruinsma that the latter accompanied him when the Chester bank was burglarized. Bruinsma tried to establish an alibi that he and his mother, Mrs. Lollie Bruinsma, went to a Beaumont cemetery that night to visit the grave of a brother who had burned to death a year before. His mother also testified that they visited the cemetery that night which was the first anniversary of the death of another son.

Representatives of the large land companies with extensive holdings in Tyler county appeared before the commissioners court sitting as a board of equalization Monday.

The representatives agreed with the commissioners that Tyler county needed more money to operate in the black and indicated that they would go along with an increase that was equalized among all taxpayers. However, some of the representatives wanted to come back when the oil companies with producing property in the county have their hearing, which will be held at a later date.

O. R. Crawford, vice president of Eastern, Inc. said that he would like to be notified of the date of the hearing for the oil companies and that his company might ask for an observer to be present.

Mr. Crawford complimented the commissioners on operating one of the most conservative county governments in East Texas. And while he has no quarrel with the oil companies, he said, he would like an opportunity to know that these companies did not transfer part of their tax obligations to the people of the county.

Dudley Stone, representative from Kirby Lumber Corporation, asked the commissioners if a budget had been prepared or worked on. County Auditor John Hickman said that no budget was ready, but would be ready by August 15. A budget hearing will be held after that date, he said.

Contract Let On City's Elementary School Building

The Thomas and Thompson Construction Company of Lufkin was low bidder on the elementary school construction project in the Woodville Independent School District. Seven bids were received by the Board of Trustees at its meeting July 13, and the bids ranged from the low of \$141,880.00 to a high of \$189,875.00, according to Supt. B. H. McGuire.

The elementary building project will begin during the present week and the bid calls for a completion date of 168 days.

The new construction will be part of the present Wheat Junior High School Building. When completed, the total elementary complex will consist of classrooms, library, science room, administrative and faculty rooms, nurse's office, and music room. The new building will contain about 18,500 square feet.

Demolition of the old elementary building should begin about August 1. On the site of the old building, a new classroom structure will be built to house the junior high school pupils, McGuire said.

Take It Easy This Summer

You can't really beat the heat. Whether it's the heat or the humidity or both, it's hot in almost all of the United States in July. After weeks of sweating and steaming, it's not uncommon to find the heat is beginning to wear you down.

You can't do anything about the outside temperature. You can avoid it if you're fortunate enough to work and live in air-conditioned comfort, but it still will be hot outside.

The American Medical Association points out that there are some things you can do to be more comfortable—things that can help you beat the heat.

Stay out of the sun as much as possible, especially during the middle of the day when rays are hottest. Wear light, loose clothing. The ladies have an edge over the men in this respect. Drink more liquids than usual, but take extra salt only on your physician's advice, particularly if you have liver or kidney trouble or a heart condition.

Take a shower or dip in the pool once or twice a day to cool off. Get plenty of rest and sleep. Eat your regular diet and don't go overboard on cold cuts and salads, unless you like them anyway.

Get up early in the morning to do your heavy work on the lawn or garden. Or work at dusk in the evening, but try to avoid heavy exertion during the hottest hours of the day. There is a sound physical reason behind the idea of getting up early.

You need exercise in the summer as well as in the winter, but don't overdo it, especially on extra hot days. Don't overdo physical exertion, whether at work or at play. The more relaxed outdoor life of the summer months has many advantages to compensate for the heat. Stay relaxed and use common sense and you can beat the heat—at least somewhat.

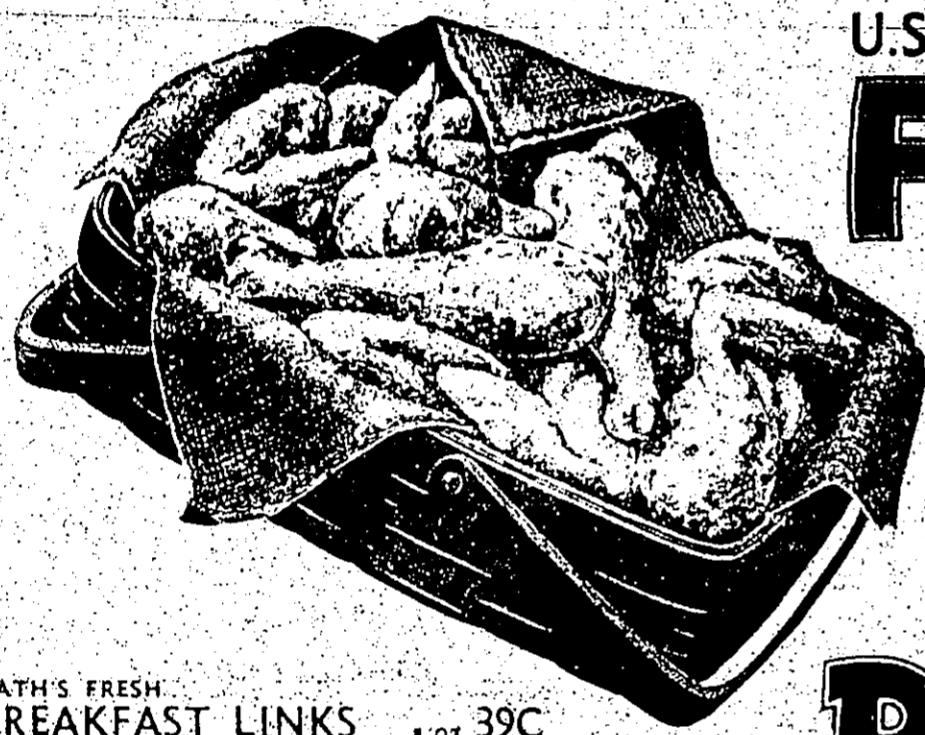
