Berserk Man Holds Three Hostages For Two Hours

An elderly man whose home is about three miles west of Woodville on the Chester highway gave local officers a long two hours of anxiety Monday morning when he went berserk and held a young mother and her two children, one a six months old infant, hostages in his home.

According to officers, the man had evidently become totally deranged during the night and had made several telephone calls in which he talked incoherently of somebody being after him, Monday morning.

Chamber Votes To Advertise In ET

Members of the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce voted at the meeting Monday night to take a half-page ad in the 1968 East Texas Heritage Trail Vacation Guide which will be published and distributed by the East Texas Chamber of Commerce.

It also voted to send the president, M. F. Alford, to an East Texas Heritage Trail-Hemifair meeting in Tyler later this month.

At the Monday meeting, Mr. Alford pointed out that persons going to the Hemifair from the Southeastern states, such as Georgia, Alabama, Florida, etc., must cross the Mississippi River at Baton Rouge on Highway 190, and that some concentrated effort must be made to keep them on Highway 190.

A committee was appointed to raise funds for the half page ad in the Heritage Trail Vacation Guide. David Feagin was named chairman, and other members are Florence Humphus, Noah Platt, R. E. Jackson, Harold Reppond, and James H. Dillon.

In speaking of Highway 190, Mr. Alford said that with the great lakes to the east, Dam B. Sam, Rayburn and Toledo Bend, the cities of Livingston, Jasper, and Woodville should begin work now in an effort to get Highway 190 made into a four-lane super-highway to take care of the enormous amount of traffic that it will carry. He said that the highway will need to be made into a four-lane highway from Livingston.

Senator Ralph Yarborough announced Monday in Washington that the Department of Housing and Urban Development had notified him that it has approved an increase of \$60,864 in the loan to the Woodville Housing Authority to rent the construction of 56 low-rent homes here. Sixteen of this number will be designed for the elderly, the senator said.

This brings the total of the loan to \$735,033, Yarborough said.

BRUCELLAS IS VACCINATION changes made. The minimum age for calf vaccination against brucellosis has been lowered from four months to three months, according to a United States Department of Agriculture announcement.

Research has indicated that acceptable resistance is induced with the strain if vaccine is given three months old calves. This early age vaccination also reduces the possibility of calves producing reactors that can confuse the brucellosis test.

The early age vaccinations are also expected to help the enter the producer because it will often fit better with his regular management practices.

The amended regulations also allow an official veterinarian as a female to administer the vaccine to calves of the age of three months or older.

If the calf is to be a beef breed or a range or semi-range type, it may be vaccinated from three to eleven months.
