Four juveniles, three boys and a girl, were arrested by Sheriff Grady Ray and Police Chief John-Grammer and charged with eight recent burglarles in Woodville, A large amount of merch-

andise stolen from two of the places entered was recovered rom the four juveniles.


The arrests solved two burglaries of John's Restaurant, two at Peoples Gulf. Service Station, and one burglary of Minimax, Birdwell's, Tyco Feed and Roy Pate's Grocery. They also are charged with the attempted entry of J. B. Best and Company and the oin box at Tolar Washateria. The juveniles had taken \$72 In money at Birdwell's and \$100 from Peoples Service Staffion, None of the money was recovered,

Merchandlise recovered had been taken from the Birdwell and Minimax burglarles. It included clothing, cigarettes, shoes, and other items.

All the burglaries except one had taken place during the past two months. The mostrecent entry had been at Minimax, where a small amount of money was taken in addition to merchandise.
