## Juveniles Charged In Burglaries Here Motorcade To Go To Sour Lake



Part of the merchandise recovered with the arrest of three juvenile boys and one juvenile girl is shown in the above picture. The arrests solved eight recent burglaries in Woodville (see story).

Four juveniles, three boys and a girl, were arrested by Sheriff Grady Ray and Police Chief John Grammer and charged with eight recent burglaries in Woodville.

A large amount of merchandise stolen from two of the places entered was recovered from the four juveniles.

The arrests solved two burglaries of John's Restaurant, two at Peoples Gulf Service Station, and one burglary of Minimax, Birdwell's, Tyco Feed and Roy Pat's Grocery.

They also are charged with the attempted entry of J. B. Best and Company and the coin box at Tolar Washateria.

The juveniles had taken \$72 in money at Birdwell's and \$100 from Peoples Service Station. None of the money was recovered.

Merchandise recovered had been taken from the Minimax and Peoples burglaries. It included clothing, cigarettes, shoes, and other items.

All the burglaries, except one had taken place during the past two months. The most recent entry had been at Minimax, where a small amount of money was taken in addition to merchandise.

The arrests were the culmination of investigations of the burglaries by Sheriff Ray and Chief Grammer. The three boys and girl, all Negroes, will be arraigned in juvenile court Friday.

## Should Dam B Lake Name Change?

How many residents of Tyler County know where R. A. Steinhagen Lake is located? Look at your map of East Texas and see if you can locate this West Lake. Now, if after you have completed your search for R. A. Steinhagen Lake on your local area maps and could not locate it, look for Dam B. For approximately twenty long years Dam B has appeared on these maps. These maps have been printed at the expense of private individuals, companies and many government agencies. Check with anyone in the printing business and see what tone of these maps, brochures advertising Dam B cost. Now multiply that times the estimated thousands of copies that have been printed, some already used and some still to be circulated. If you have taken into consideration the total number of pieces of literature that has been printed and circulated all over the United States and other parts of the world, then you have quite a large expenditure. This is why the money that has been spent in publishing Dam B, decades (30 years) time ago, is still in building road bill and publicly by the many businessmen and women in the Dam B area.

We are aware of the fact that a name change will not remove this lake from its location here in East Texas. After this lake was filled with water, where was the water used? The placement area, of course. You might say that it was also used by the local people, and you would be right to a certain extent, but where did the water go during the summer and fall of the year when the people in the Dam B area called for water? This left the local people, from which the land was taken, some in condemnation, with a little water within the banks of the Neches River and a few mud-holes nearby. Year after year this same thing happened, and now after fighting the battle of being without water and lake during dry times, local people still built places of business near this lake and invested millions in time and money publishing Dam B.

Now after the consideration of this matter, after losing the land, someone also using the water, and having the use of the lake for recreation only part of the time, do you think it is justice that the local people should lose even more in sacrificing the advertising and publicity advantage built up over the past twenty years. This, our good friends and fellow East Texans is what has happened through the action of a congressman that does not even represent the people of Tyler and Jasper county.

## Fire Loss Set At \$125,000

The sawmill of Stephens Lumber Company south of Woodville was destroyed by a fire which was discovered by an employee about 10:45 a.m. Friday. The Woodville Volunteer Fire Department sent two trucks to the mill and kept the fire from spreading to the debarker and green chain and the lumber sheds.

R. L. Stephens, owner of the mill, estimated the loss at \$125,000. He said it was partially covered by insurance.

The fire is thought to have been started by an electrical short in wiring in the mill, which was powered by electricity. When discovered the fire was spreading out of control and the fire department concentrated on saving adjoining buildings.

The Stephens mill cut mostly hardwoods into rough lumber, and had been in operation for about four years. At last report, no decision had been made on rebuilding the mill. Insurance coverage amounted to only about a fourth or perhaps a third of the loss sustained in the fire.

The Kirby High School Eagles bombed the Jasper Bulldogs Friday night, 35 to 8 in a team effort that made them the hottest football squad in the area.

Wayne Simmons, Kirby High's sophomore quarterback, rifled four touchdown passes to End Willie Gill and scampered around left end and down the sideline for 36 yards to pay dirt for brother.

The Eagles began their scoring spree in the first quarter when Simmons passed to Gill in the end zone for a 37-yard touchdown. Simmons kicked the extra point.

The Eagles scored twice in the second quarter after the Bulldogs had gone ahead briefly 8 to 7 as the period began when Robert Sparks, Jasper quarterback, drove over for the score and then ran over a two-point conversion.

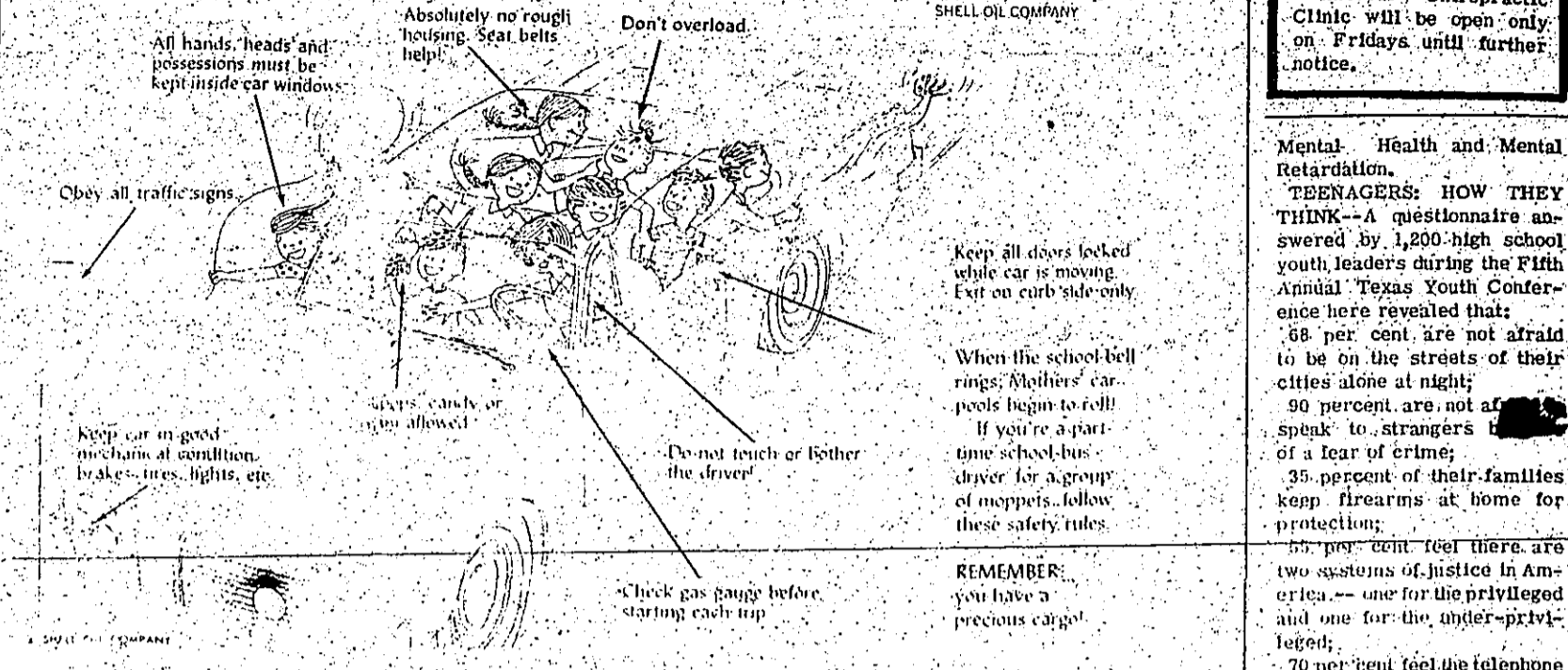

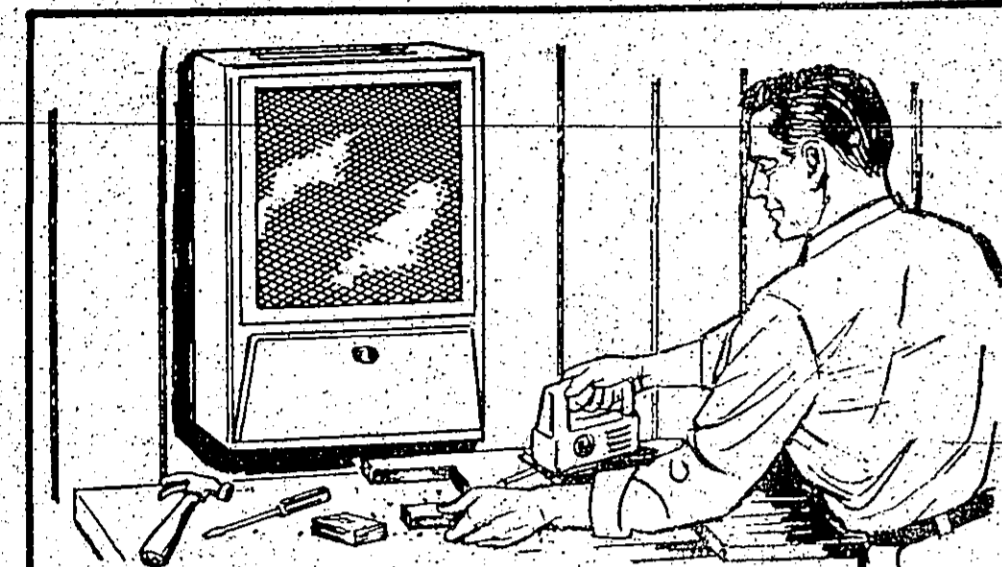

ence and peaceful uses developed by NASA. Of course, there is much overtaking equipment — a camera, for example — developed by NASA may turn out to be valuable in satisfying Defense requirements. In addition, and equally important, there is free interchangeability of technology between the military and NASA and the Defense Department. As a member of the Armed Services Committee here in the Senate, and being concerned about the military posture of the United States, I am especially interested in assuring that the United States has the ability to operate effectively defense units in outer space.

As a matter of fact, there is a strong reason for believing that observation from space is the most significant development in man's space experience. Historians may look back and agree that observation satellites are among the most important machines ever created by man.

Not only can these satellites help us watch crop and forest growth, to forecast weather, to improve our maps, and to assist navigation, but they can also tell us how many nuclear warheads an enemy has. They can "see" from orbital altitudes of some 200 miles, objects as small as postage stamps. By 1970 we can expect to be able to literally "hook into" the ocean, observe a big advantage to the fishing industry — and to the detection of enemy submarines. In fact, it is difficult to imagine a technical development with more military importance than the ability to see into the oceans.

One of the more significant space surprises of recent years is that a comparison of "photographs" made in several different parts of the electro-magnetic spectrum reveals far more information about the situation on the ground than any single camera ever would. The ordinary camera shows small objects, but other sensors, such as infrared, complement our knowledge by showing temperature, reflectivity, and color of the objects. Altogether these
