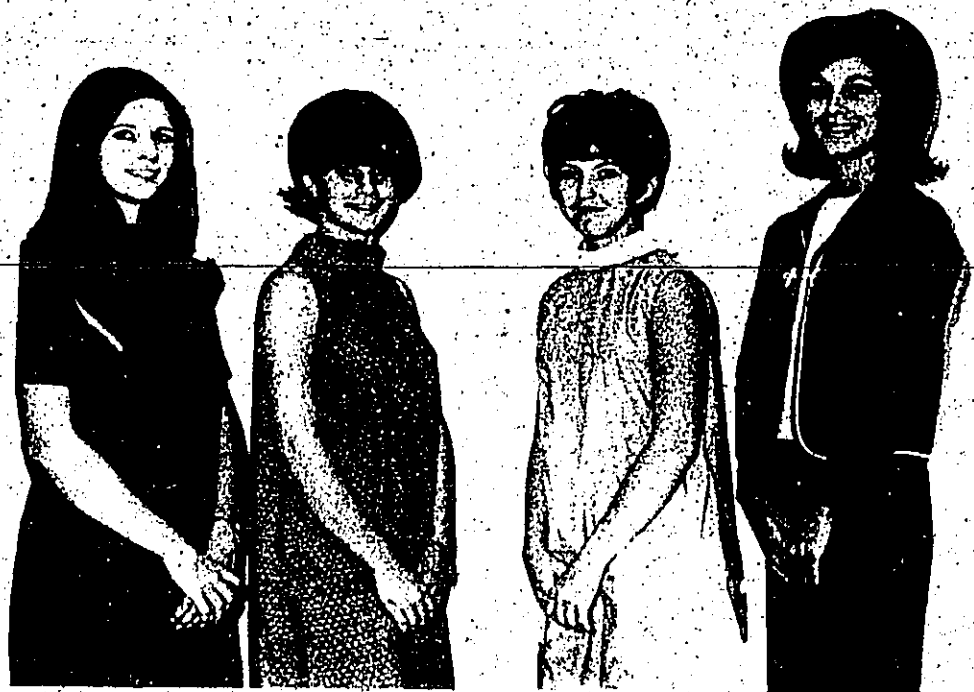

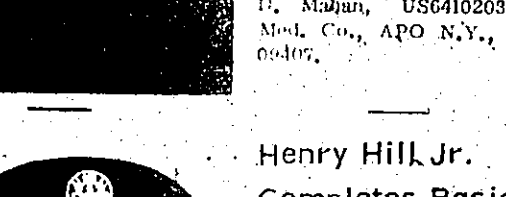
Otis Fortenberry Completes Military Police Training

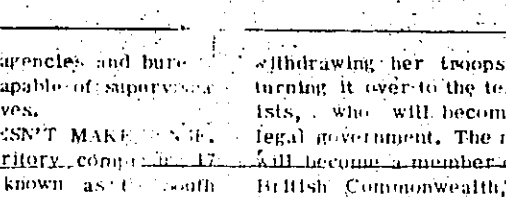

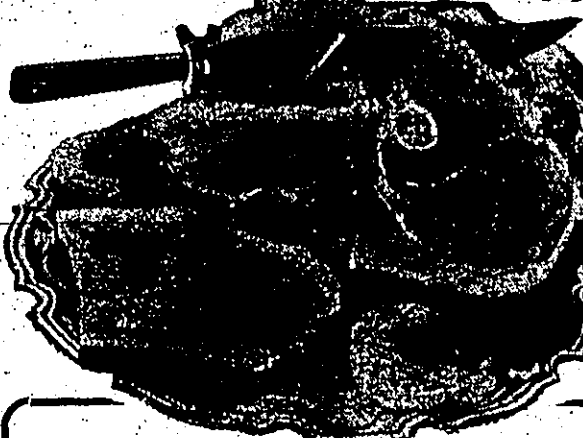
