Voters Approve Three Amendments

Texas voters Saturday approved all six of the pa posed constitutional amendments in an extremely light turnout at the polls. . County voters approved amendments two; three and four and voted against the other three. The vote was light due to both voter apathy and the opening of the deer season. In all the state only a little over a quarter of a million voters turned out for the el-

-ection. The amendment tabulation in 254 countles, 208 complete: 1. Consolidating county funds: For 135, 252, against 133,998, 2. Permission for mental health services: For 166,865, against 101,088: 3. Veterans land bonds: For

159,277, against 113,793. 4. Medical and pay aid for injured police officers: For 177,644, against 93,574. 5. Bonds for improved parks: For 147,907, against 121,479. 6. Allow state employes to serve on certain boards. For 137,138, against 129,163. No. 1 was designed to permit overnments to put all their

The mental health amendment allows counties with hospital districts to spend money for various purposes. It will allow a greater participation in federal programs. The veterans land proposal, ity and friendliness of all finally passed by the voters after two rebuffs previously. Permits the state to issue \$200 million in bonds and thus lend money to veterans to buy land at low-interest, longterm conditions.



It offers many suggestions for prepar ing delicious dishes of venison as well as other wild game

The farmer who still figures he can walk across a field or pasture and determine its fertilizer needs can't expect top yields. There are too many factors in determining soil fertility that can't be detected by the eye, therefore a surer method must

be used. That's where the soil testing laboratory comes into the picture. Soil scientists have knowledge of the amount of nutrients 'removed from the sold by a given yield on a crop. By making certain soll tests they can ottermine how much of the crop's need can be supplied from the soil and how much must be added through fertilizer appli-

Alert farmers test their soil before planting to determine its ability to supply the necessary nutrients for top yields. If the soil test shows the soil is short on a certain nutrient, fertilizer of the recommended kind can be supplied before deficiencies show up in the growing crop and yield is reduced.

Low production means a higher per unit cost and less otential profit while high yields have the opposite effects upon crop production.

Soil testing, is a necessary part of today's agriculture. Maximum yields produced at the lowest per unit cost are a must and the basis for both is a fertile soil.
