

WOMAN SHOOTS HORNED OWL WITH UNIQUE GUN

A huge horned owl-was killed east of Colmeshell Saturday to add another to the list of unusual birds and animals killed recently in this area. . Mrs. Ruth Simmons, a retired school teacher, killed the large owl in her back yard. with an unusual shotgun (but more about that later). The owl had been catching her chickens and was very tricky to shoot. However, by patience and perseverance she managed to kill it with a biast-from the 16-gauge shotgun It measured 4 feet, 8 inches from wing tip to wing tip.

Now about the shotgun. It is a 16 gauge double barrel gun which belonged to her maternal grandamer; Moses Weaver, who died in 1914. She does not know whether if was handed down to him or whether he bought it, but it has an unusual feature--an insert for the left barrel converts it into a 32 calibre rifle. She says that her grandfather used the rifle side to kill hogs.

-Used as a shotgun with the insert removed, one side is a 'pot' shot and the other is a 'acatter' barrel. By placing the insert in the left barrel, it will fire 32 calibre ammunition (or did for her grandfather, she hasn't tried it).

The breechblock of the gun is engraved on one side with the figure of a man aiming a gun at a rabbit, while on the other side is engraved a running dog.
