Oil Field Accident Fatal To Man

A 58-year-old Corpus Christi man, Guadalupe R. Sienz, was killed Wednesday afternoon while salvaging pipe from an oil well at Joe's Lake near Spurger.

He was pronounced dead on arrival at 1:30 p.m. at Silsbee Clinic. Judge Rex Moore, Silsbee justice of the peace, held an inquest and is withholding a verdict until the results of an autopsy are available.

Mr. Sienz was a foreman for the Hub Oilfield Supply Co. in Alice.

He and three fellow workers, Alex Gonzalez, Juan Garza and Jesus Aranda, all of Corpus Christi, were working at the well site when the accident occurred.

OFFICERS RAID LIQUOR LAW VIOLATORS

Tyler County sheriff's deputies, city police and a liquor control agent made simultaneous raids on three suspected bootleggers Saturday night and charged them with illegal possession of liquor. Deputy Sheriff Webb Ashworth and George McKee arrested John D. Pickett, Assistant Police Chief Ed Sumrall and Liquor Control Agent Joe Whitmore took Tom Lacy into custody. Police Chief John Grammer and Deputy Sheriff Richard Cole raided Wilson Son Williams.

Pickett and Williams entered pleas of not guilty when arraigned in county court and bond for each was set at \$500. Lacy entered a plea of guilty and was fined \$100 and paid \$38.50 court costs.

The officers also made several other calls but the word had gone ahead of them and they found nothing incriminating after the first three raids.

Horned Owl Killed By Rattred School Teacher

WOMAN SHOOTS HORNED OWL WITH UNIQUE GUN

A huge horned owl was killed east of Colmesnell Saturday to add another to the list of unusual birds and animals killed recently in this area.

Mrs. Ruth Simmons, a retired school teacher, killed the large owl in her back yard with an unusual shotgun (but more about that later). The owl had been catching her chickens and was very tricky to shoot. However, by patience and perseverance she managed to kill it with a blast from the 16 gauge shotgun. It measured 4 feet, 8 inches from wing tip to wing tip.

Now about the shotgun. It is a 16 gauge double barrel gun, which belonged to her maternal grandmother, Moses Weaver, who died in 1914. She does not know whether it was handed down to him or whether he bought it, but it has an unusual feature—an insert for the left barrel converts it into a 32 calibre rifle. She says that her grandfather used the rifle side to kill hogs.

Used as a shotgun with the insert removed, one side is a 'pot' shot and the other is a 'scatter' barrel. By placing the insert in the left barrel, it will fire 32 calibre ammunition (or did for her grandfather, she hasn't tried it).

The breechblock of the gun is engraved on one side with the figure of a man aiming a gun at a rabbit, while on the other side is engraved a running dog. Engraved on each side is the name, T. Barker. Whether this is the name of a former owner, or of the engraver is not known. On top of the breechblock is stamped 'Belgium Laminated Steel.'

20 Inch Antlers Biggest So Far

Antlers measuring 20-1/4 inches at the widest part is the largest set so far entered in Johnny Gray's Sports Shop contest for the widest found on a deer killed in Tyler County.

This one was entered in the contest by Jerry Hanks of Silsbee, who killed the buck west of Warren. It had 11 points.

Of those brought in for measurement so far, the one has the edge by some one-half inch. Gray said that any hunter killing a deer with antlers measuring more at the widest point should bring them by for measurement. He is offering a Canadian Centennial model Winchester 30-30 Rifle as the prize for the winning set of antlers.

More Challenging Programs Arranged In Cub Scouting

When recent research showed that some of the achievements and electives for the Wolf and Bear ranks were no longer popular in the Cub Scout program, changes were provided that should give boys a richer experience in things they do.

Originally, the requirements for achievements and electives were the same, but Cub Scouts were expected to improve their performance as they advanced in rank. As the things they were called upon to do did not vary from year to year, some boys tired of the repetition.

Studies showed that 8-year-olds are interested in certain areas; 9-year-olds, in others," said R. E. Thompson, Beaumont Leadership Training Chairman of the Trinity-Neches Council.

The improved programs takes the activities that are popular with 8-year-old boys and geared up the Wolf program to them. Then they did the same thing for the Bear rank with things 9-year-olds like.

In the Wolf program only one achievement—Tying Things—remains as it was. The Scabbard achievement has been dropped, and two new ones—Conservation and Religious Activities—have been added.

Orders may be turned in at the Lewis Grocery in Chester, Dean's Grocery in Colmesnell, Spurger Mercantile in Spurger, Fred's Grocery in Fred, Hutto Grocery in Warren, Foxworth Grocery in Hillister, Gillespie Grocery and Service Station in Doucette, C. A. Williams Sporting Goods at Dam B, and Farmers Feed and Supply in Woodville.

The poison is specially priced at three pounds for \$1.25 when purchased through this program.

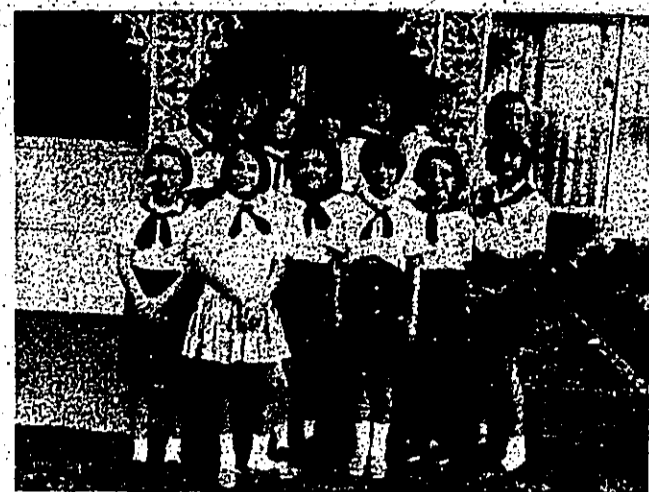
