

The names of the persons indicted were not made, public pending their arrest; Judge Coe accepted a plea, of guilty from Jimmy Charles Cowart and gave him to a four-year probationary sentence. ## JACK LANE RECEIVES FIRST SHIPMENTS OF FORDS SINCE STRIKE BEGAN

The first conveys of 1968 Fords began arriving at Jack Lane Ford, Inc., in Woodville Friday following, the threemonths strike against Ford Motor Company by the United Auto Workers Union.

Convoys of the new Ford models are expected to arrive almost daily from now on, Mr. Lane said.

While the first two convoys brought Lane only one each of a Thunderbird, Galaxie, LTD, Bronco and two plokup trucks, he said that by the time this is in print he should. have a selection of all models from which to choose.

Lane said that Mustangs and the new Torino model, which is causing much interest among sports car fans, will. be in this week.

"The strike is over and we are back in business," Lane said, "and we ve got, a lot ofcatching up to do. For that reason you can get a real

ning to relicense Doctors on a regular basis according to their specifications. I wanted to-inform-any one who may not know about the present controls that our State has over the license of a Doctor at the present time.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

First, all M. D's., after graduation from Medical School, have to pass the State Board Examination. If they pass this examination their license has to be renewed every year. Also their narcotics license has to be renewed every year. In addition to these things, each hospital board of trustees has

to reappoint each doctor to the medical staff once each year. If a doctor, is grossly violating any rules or regulations, or becomes a drug addict, or illegally uses narcotics, his Ilcense to practice can be rivoked, his narcotic license can be revoked, or he can be refused staff privilence on any hospital in the State.

This report from the tracesal government said that many doctors were not distributed properly in the United States. This is certainly true, but I do, not feel that I would want to be treated by a doctor who was "drafted", to practice in my town. He could be placed In a community even if he did not like It, did not like the type practice he was doing, or if he wanted to leave.

The real reason for this subject coming up now is the final club over the doctors head. Every time the government passes a new law they say they have no intentions of socializing medicine in the United States. This of course is a lot of nonsense. They have worked as fast as they could in this direction for years. In fact we are much further; along the line than

Could you blame a young man for not going into medicine when the federal government has this type of control over his life? was going up. The parity ratio, an index of whether farmers gain fair prices for their products in relation to their ; costs, is down to 73. Even adjusted for government subsidy payments, the index was down to 78. Farmers would be getting fair prices if the index were 100.

While wages and corporation dividends have soared during the past 20 years, the prices farmers are now getting for. their cotton, wheat and corn are actually less than in 1947. As a comparison, hourly earnings of industrial workers have increased 123 percent and corporate dividends are up '241 percent since 1947. But during the same period, farm prices are down 9 percent.

It is, certainly obvious that something has gone wrong with present and past farm programs that have failed tokeep farm income up to the lovel br other income. And this in spite of the billions and billions spent on price support. and many other farm programs. As I said, Senator Tower and

I both have introduced a number of bills and resolutions. intended to bolster sagging farm prices. One would ra-Ise CCC resale price on grains to full parity. Another would increase load slevels on corn and grain sorghum. We both are trying to get action on meat import bills, A bill with strong bipartisan support would set up a commission to study ways to contact the economic imbalance between rural and urban areas.
