

EASTEX EXPANSION TO CREATE NEW JOBS IN SOUTHEAST TEXAS AREA

Completion of a \$41 million purchases wood, chemicals expansion program by Eastex and many other supplies lo-Incorporated at the company's Evadale mill will create 200 new. Jobs and will generate "millions of dollars in added payroll which will be spent in the area," the Silsbee Kiwants Club was told Wednes-

Eastex Secretary-Treasurer Clyde E. Cole spoke to Ki-. wanta Club members during their meeting in the Bluebonnet Cafe.

Report," illustrated by color slides of Eastex operations. Cole said the expansion program nearing completion "is, in reality, a complete new mill -- another \$41 million investment, and another 33 per Cole said Eastex' new facilities, when they go into operation in December, will boost production of paper to 1200 tons per day. "For the first time," he said. "Eastex

will offer what we call 'fine paper' for printing and business use." The Eastex executive noted that "the latest pollution abatement devices available to

our industry are as much a part of the new facility as the machinery required to produce paper. We have been working with experts for over two years to utilize everything known to us in this area, and the equipment will be in operation by the end of this year." The new Eastex facility con-

tributes to reduction of air pollution in the entire East Texas area, Cole noted, because equipment in it processes sawdust purchased from East Texas and Western Louisiana mills heretofore burned. He noted that Eastex will spend approximately \$2 million annually to purchase sawdust. Tracing the growth of Eas-. tex, Cole said "initially, the mill provided jobs for 350-

people who put \$2 million in
