Launder slipers and skip iro eplacing them slightly damp, hen smoothing them over the urniture. Next, provide attractive frames from wreathis or other decorations by washing all curtains and windows. A little ammonia added to the suds will make glass panes sparkle.

To make this, combine packages soap or detergent with a little warm water and beat with a rotary or electric mixer until the suds form stiff meringue. It will dry overnight to provide eye appeal and enjoy ment throughout the holidays.
