## Out Of Shells, Sue Finished Off Big Buck With A Short Stick

Everyone who knows Sue Brackin is aware of the fact that she is not one to let that big buck deer get away.

Even if she has to beat it to death with a club.

And that leads us into one of the best stories of the recent deer hunting season. Sue was with her son, Billy Brackin of Kountze, and others who were hunting in the Barnes pasture near Chester. She was on a stand in the afternoon which had proven unproductive as far as deer passing it until about 5:00 p.m., when a big buck with a fine set of antlers came racing by.

Sue let go with her rifle, and could tell by the gait of the big buck that he was wounded. But he didn't fall. She raced from the stand and followed the buck, firing when she had a clear area. But he kept going, and so did Sue. He wasn't making too much speed now and she was able to keep him in sight.

The only trouble was that she was out of ammunition. It had been a warm afternoon, and Sue had taken her jacket off at the stand. . . and her extra ammunition was in it. In her haste to take out after the deer, she had left the jacket at the stand. She had fired all the shells in her rifle during the chase.

However, she kept the limping deer in sight and finally he came down in a patch of briars. He didn't fall—just sort of sat down. And as she came trotting up, he set a baleful glare on her.

Sue had grabbed a piece of pine about two feet long, or maybe a little longer. From now on began a period of woman against deer—and the woman armed with only a short club.

The buck would occasionally try to get to its feet, and that is when Sue would club him over the head with the club. This went on for a good two hours. The deer would make an effort to get on his feet, and Sue would club him with the club. And each time she hit him, he could see it coming and thrust his antlers forward as if trying to reach her past the short club.

Sue says that during the time she and the deer battled, they must have cleared a good half acre of ground for each time he tried to rise and she hit him she shifted position.

Well, by this time the other hunters had gone to camp. Billy noted that his mother hadn't come in, and told the

others that the old jeep she was driving probably wouldn't start. He would go and start it for her.

He was a little surprised and worried when he got to the stand. The jeep was there, but his mother's jacket, not his mother. He took out to find her, and finally she heard his yell and answered.

If Billy had been surprised to find his mother from the stand, he was astounded at the sight he came upon when he reached her. There she was, see, with this club, and there sat that big buck, still trying to get up. And his mother still clubbing it when it did.

Billy took his knife and slit the buck's throat. And it still had enough life left to fight at him with its antlers.

They found that the deer had been hit in both front legs. The left one was broken, and the muscle in the right leg

had been severed. That was why it couldn't run very fast after she shot it, and why Sue was able to keep up with it.

And that was also the reason she was able to keep it beat down with the club. The antlers had at least 10 points. She can tell that she knocked off at least two during the two-hour battle. She wants to go back to the spot and see how many points she had clubbed when it did.

Billy says the buck was one of the largest, if not the largest, killed in the Barnes pasture during the season. The Chester area abounds with deer, and many large bucks are killed each season.

But few are finished off by a woman with a club. Of course, Billy missed at his mother about taking that kind of chance. But what can you really say when she got the deer in the end?

## Singing Convention Shapes Up As One Of Largest Ever Held

The Tex-La Neches Valley Singing Convention which will be held in Woodville January 20 and 21 will be one of the best attended in its history judging from the response received from quartets and singing groups and followers of the nation's greatest gospel song festival.

This is the prediction of Burl Carter, president of the convention, who has seen as many as 11,000 persons attend sessions in other places. He said the one in Woodville is attracting widespread attention in this area as well as in the state, the nation, and even some from Canada have indicated they will attend.

The largest crowd so far was at Lufkin in 1961 when some 11,000 persons attended the two-day event. Crowds of 4,000 up are common at the group's twice-yearly singing sessions.

Carter said that many of the nation's leading gospel music composers, music teachers and song directors will attend the session in Woodville.

Singing will start at 6 p.m. Saturday, January 20, and at 9 a.m. Sunday, January 21. There is no admission charge.

"It is not a show, not a concert," Carter pointed out, "it's just an old-fashioned gospel singing convention where thousands from across the nation and Canada, of all faiths, meet and worship the Lord in Gospel song."

Carter said that the Tex-La Neches Valley Singing Convention is operated differently from others and that many others have copied it. But the Tex-La Neches Valley group holds the record for attendance, for most music directors, and special groups who participate on the

program. Besides Carter, who is president, other officers are J. V. Sexton of Bunkle, La., first vice president; Tom Pale, Nacogdoches; Second vice president; J. J. Rish, Pineville, La., third vice president; Levey Causery, Port Arthur, fourth vice president; Mrs. Jackie Harper, Jasper, financial treasurer; Miss Irma Duncan of Monroe, La., Louisiana secretary; and Mrs. Dellah Mayo of Houston is Texas secretary.
