## 200 Attend Annual Chamber Of Commerce Banquet

Marvin Hurley, executive vice president of the Houston Chamber of Commerce spoke at the annual membership meeting of the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce Friday night at Dogwood Motor Hotel.

Mr. Hurley's subject was "A Challenge to Community Action", and he said that a chamber of commerce organization was the only group in the community interested in the entire pattern of its development and providing the continuity of this effort.

He urged that all persons contribute to the "Four Horsemen" of community development: desire, work, money and time.

M. F. Alford, who is beginning his second year as president of the chamber, gave a report on the organization's progress in 1967. He said the chamber of commerce had an 83 percent increase in membership over 1967 and a 69 percent increase in dues. He gave a resume of the county's industrial, building and tourism projects on which the chamber of commerce had assisted.

At the conclusion of his president's report, Mr. Alford was given a standing ovation by 200 members and guests present.

Jack Risinger, master of ceremonies at the affair, introduced the officers of the chamber of commerce. B. M. Minter, incoming vice president, recognized the committee chairman and introduced the directors.

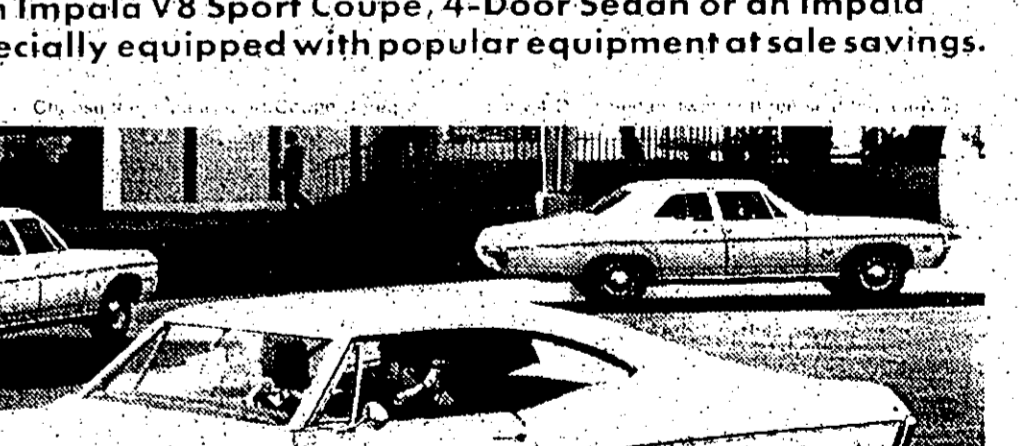
