Clyde E. Smith, Jr. Seeks Election To District Judgeship



Clyde E. Smith, Jr. has announced his candidacy for the office of District Judge of the 88th Judicial District, which is comprised of Hardin and Tyler counties. Smith, 50 years of age, is married to the former Miss Peggie Carraway and they reside in Woodville, Texas. They are the parents of six children, two of whom, 10 and 12, are living at home. The Smiths are members of the Baptist Church.

Smith received his high school education at Woodville. He served for 4 1/2 years during World War II. Smith worked his way through the University of Texas, holding down two part-time jobs, and earned his BBA degree, then finished his law training at the University of Texas Law School, where he earned his LLB degree. After returning to Woodville, Smith entered the private practice of law. Later, he was elected to the office of County Attorney, continuing his private practice, until January 1, 1968, when he resigned the office of County Attorney, leaving a clean docket in both the Justice and County Courts.

Smith stated that if elected to this high office, he would treat each one, attorneys, litigants and officers of the Court, with equal consideration as to law and equity; that he represented no particular individual, or faction, or special interests, or group of people, but all of the people; and that he is running on his own initiative. Smith is asking for the support of the people of Hardin and Tyler counties, which comprise the 88th Judicial District, and that if elected, he would not permit politics to enter into his procedure of jurisprudence, nor in the rulings of the Court; that he would be governed strictly by the law prevailing; and that he would administer justice to all, equally. Smith stated further that he would work diligently to save the taxpayers' money by conducting his Court systematically and continuously, as occasion dictated, at all times.

Why Isn't Tyler County A Bonanza?

Sorry to be late again with the "Bonanza" column, but between KVVU, The Pineywoods Press and the Booster, it just seemed like we couldn't do it all. Now here we are, guilty of the same thing we have been yelling about since we started Bonanza... When we left off this last time, we had published a letter from Mrs. W. A. Drake, and since that time, Mrs. Drake and the Booster has had a lot of comment from folks that are vitally interested in our growth and progress. From the somewhere near a hundred calls Mrs. Drake received, only about three or four of them were critical of what she had written and the rest were in agreement with her. We were in complete agreement with her on one specific point, and that was that she had the fortitude to stand up and be counted as to what she thought. In a later column we will have some more comments that we have received from Mrs.

Drake in which she brings out some fine points that make good sense. Our Editorial staff is working on them now and they will be ready for print soon. This column is aimed toward a special group of people. Usually when you say a "special group", you are referring to a group that is hindering progress, or a special group that control the purse strings of a community. Now the special group that we have in mind is not that kind. We have in mind a group of people just like you and me, average folks that work hard through the week, go to Church on Sunday, make a few civic meetings during the week and figure that is all that we are suppose to do. Then when we do have a few minutes to do a little thinking on our own, what do we think about...we think in terms like, "I would like to do something for the progress of Tyler County, but there isn't a thing I can do. That bunch that controls all the money and the land are holding us down"...or "I'm afraid if I stand up and say something, speak out for progress or against the so called powers to be, they will ruin me financially or cause me to lose my job or hurt my business". In other words, you are just

plain SCARED. And also let us say that if you are afraid to speak out because your business, your job is dependent on a few people that might have a little power in a community, then you have already been trading on mighty thin ice all the time and didn't know it. I have known people with real know-how and ability that would give anything to go in business because they could offer a good service, but were afraid to do so because they would be in competition with someone in the same type of business, and their competitor had the blessings of "the powers", and little did the "would be" businessman know that "the powers" owned the competitor, lock, stock, and barrel.

So...maybe the powers to be got there because you let them, maybe sometimes back there in the past you didn't stand up for your rights and let them bulldoze you into going their way. So just remember this, just because you happen to be honest and would like to see a natural growth and progress, there are some that will skin you out of your eye teeth if they thought there was a dime or an ounce of power in it for them. Speak up and out man.

He opened his office in Kountze, Texas for private practice of law in 1950, where he has enjoyed an enviable record in both the defense and prosecution of criminal cases in Hardin and Tyler counties. Dick Richardson Asks Re-election To Office Of District Attorney



R. A. (Dick) Richardson, District Attorney for the 88th Judicial District, composed of Hardin and Tyler Counties, announced today that he will again be a candidate for nomination to that office in the forthcoming May Democratic primary.

He was elected in 1960 over the then District Attorney B. A. "Cliff" Hanger, beating out his opponent by a slim majority of 188 votes in the two counties. He was re-elected over the same opponent in the 1964 primaries by a decisive margin of over 1000 votes.

Richardson (more familiarly known to his friends in the two counties as "Booger Rod") is an overseas veteran of World War II, having served 33 months with the U. S. Navy in the Southwest Pacific. He was honorably discharged from that branch of the service as a Gunnery Mate, First Class. He served as County Attorney of Hardin County from 1947 to 1955. He is licensed to practice law in all the courts of Texas, the U. S. District Court for the Eastern District of Texas, the U. S. 5th Circuit Court of Appeals, and the Supreme Court of the United States.

Richardson is married to the former Catherine Robertson. They have two children, a daughter, Martha, 16, who is in the 10th grade, and a son, Rusty, 12, who is in the 6th grade. Both children attend school in Kountze. The Richardsons re- (Continued on page 4)

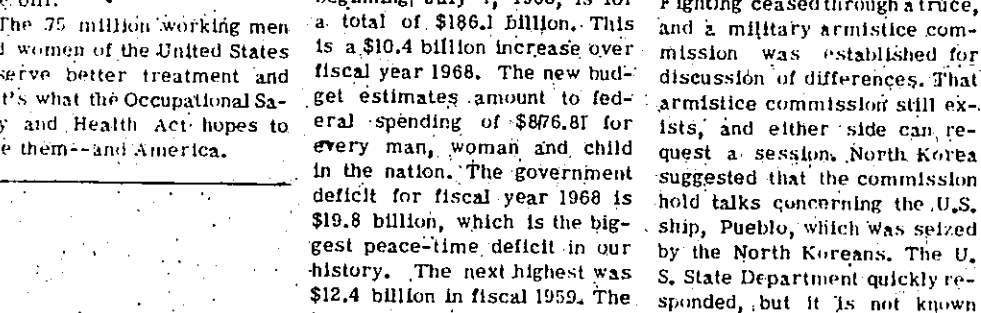

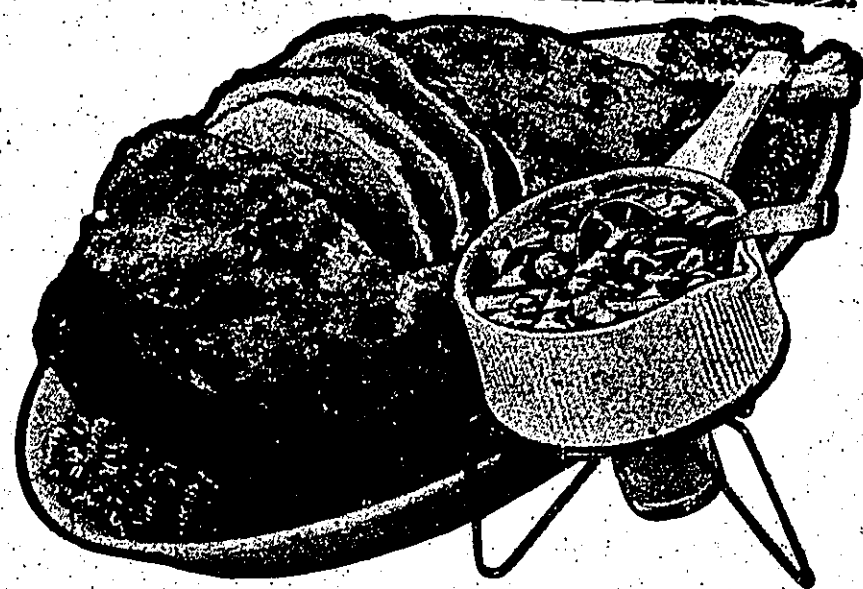

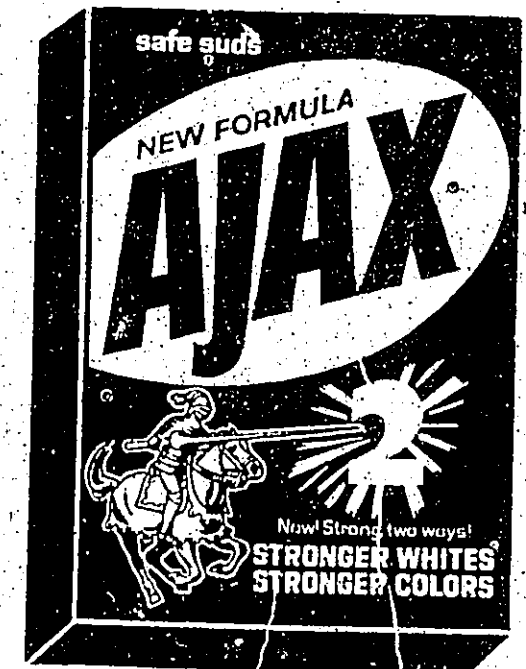
