Jury Verdict Opens Roads In County

An 8th district court jury Thursday of last week returned a verdict in favor of the plaintiffs in a trial involving public use of several roads through land owned by timber companies in southern Tyler County.

Plaintiffs in the case were members of the Jasper, Newton, Tyler and Hardin Counties Ditch and Wildlife Protective Association. The defendants were four land companies with holdings in the area.

The suit was originally filed against Eastex Wildlife Protective Association, with headquarters in Sillsbee, and the timber companies from whom Eastex had land leased for hunting and fishing rights for its members. However, Judge H. A. Coe granted Eastex a request to transfer their case to Hardin County for a trial at a later date.

The trial, which involved roads through timber company land in the Neches River bottoms, had taken three weeks to try. Bulk of the testimony involved three roads known as Joe's Lake Road, Bush Lake Road, and Sandy Creek Loop Road. The defendants contended that the roads were private roads and could be closed by them at their determination. The plaintiffs contended that the roads had been used by the public for as long as living man can remember and that through use and maintenance by the county they had become public roads.

Plaintiffs were represented by Gene Barrington of Kountze and Sillsbee. B. F. Wilworth of Jasper, Josiah Wheat of Woodville, and Joyce Cox and Jim Packman of Houston represented the timber companies.

TO NATIONAL 4-H FORUM... Two From Here Are Delegates

Mrs. L. A. Wardlaw, Jr. and Rev. R. C. Tillery, Woodville 4-H adult leaders, have been selected as two of the delegates representing District 9 Extension District (composed of 22 counties in East Texas) to attend the National 4-H Forum in Washington.

The group, made up of two representatives from the twelve extension districts in Texas, will join delegates from other states for the Washington forum.

The group leaves College Station on March 29 and will return April 6. The purpose of the trip is to give training in 4-H club work and citizenship. They are to visit many historical places between Texas and Washington. They will visit shrines and historical sites in Washington. Also they will visit the Senators and Congressmen who represent Texas in Washington. Mrs. Wardlaw has been an adult 4-H leader for 6 years. She assists with two 4-H clubs in Woodville. She has been project leader for Food and Nutrition; Clothing, Beef Cattle, and Horse Care and Training. She has assisted in regular club meetings, food shows, projects, record books, in clubs and county events.

Mrs. Wardlaw has had six children in 4-H club work—three boys and three girls. So she has had wide experience in project work. She has served as an officer in Tyler County Adult Leaders Association. She helped to organize the District 9 Adult Leaders Association. She is presently serving on the Publicity Committee in District Association, plus reporter from Tyler county to the district.

In 1967, Mrs. Wardlaw attended Texas 4-H Forum in Austin. At this meeting she participated in workshops and meetings to better prepare her for the work in the district and county.

Texas University Report OKs Branch Banking

Branch banking for Texas was endorsed in the latest research paper from the Bureau of Business Research at the University of Texas. The Texas constitution prohibits branch banking by forbidding a bank to conduct business at more than one place. The research report by Dr. William A. Townsend, now a member of the Florida State University faculty, contends that the Texas banking structure "could become more viable and competitive with the adoption of branch banking."

Whooping Cough - - Vaccine Is Available

Whooping cough is an acute infectious communicable disease which involves the respiratory tract. The characteristic cough accompanied by a whooping sound is almost diagnostic. The American Medical Association's fact sheet on whooping cough reports that the disease was known as early as 1678 and occurred in epidemic form in England in the 17th century. The organism responsible is a rod-shaped bacterium known as Haemophilus pertussis, which is found in the discharge coughed from the respiratory passages by a victim of the disease. The organism does not survive for an length of time outside the body and is quickly destroyed by drying and exposure to heat and sunlight.

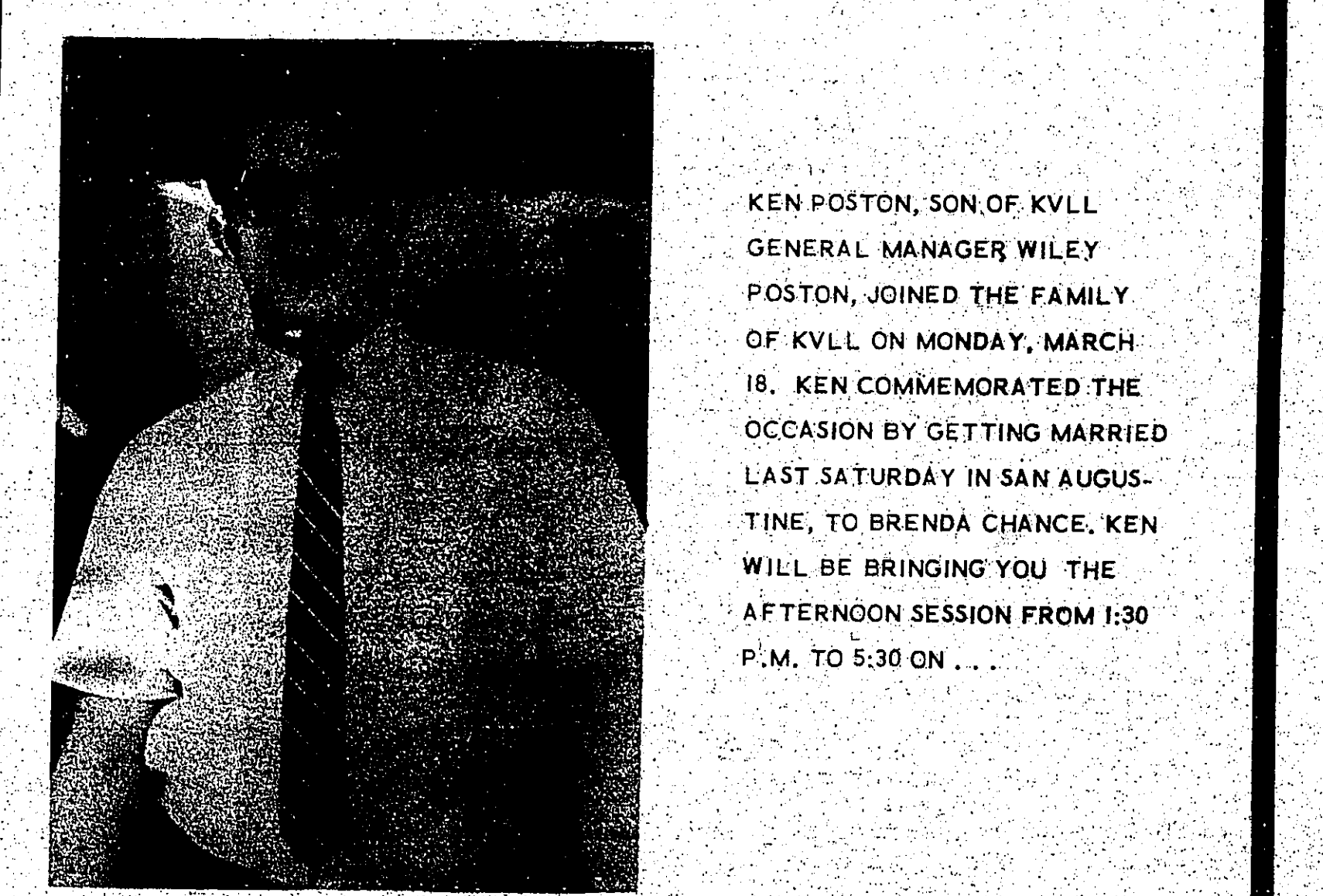

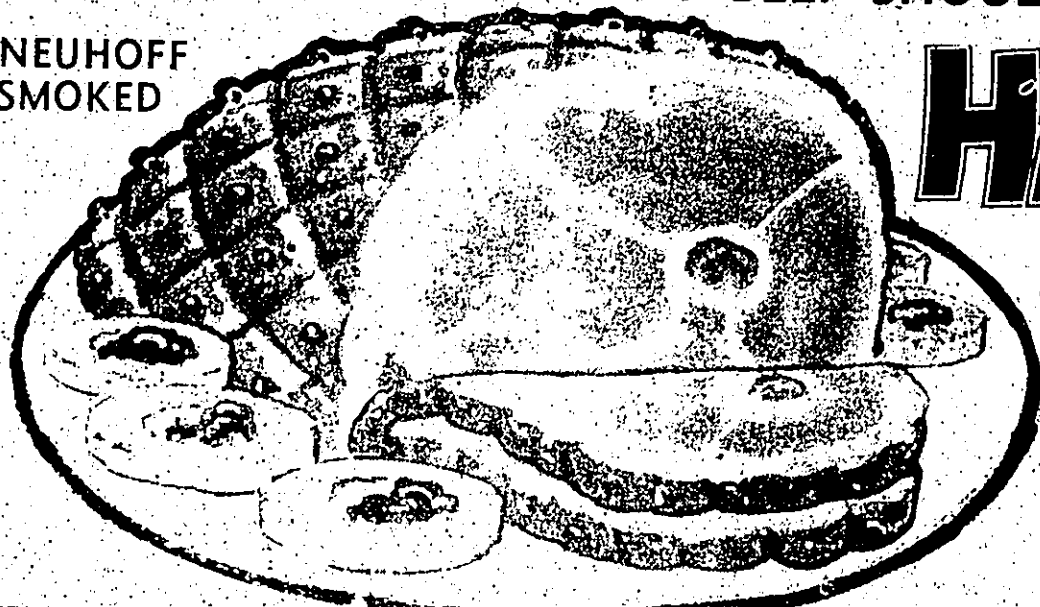
