## Dogwood Festival Theme Is The Lawless Years

### Western Weekend Termed Success

The Tyler County Dogwood Festival Western Weekend parade Saturday had over 1500, horseback riders, a number of chuck wagons and other horse-drawn vehicles to make it a huge success and a crowd-pleasing spectacle.

Bob Bell, director of the Western Weekend activities, said that the large number of trail riders and the large crowd of spectators surpassed everyone's expectations for the first western weekend to start Dogwood Festival activities. In previous years the trail riders have participated in the original festival parade, and the success of the first weekend devoted to western activities heralds even greater such events in the years ahead, Bell said.

Parade winners in Saturday's western activities were:

In the trail riders division, the Voth Night Riders, first; Carter Trail Riders of Camden, second; and Dogwood Trail Riders of Livingston, third.

In the equestrian division, Triple D Guest Ranch of Warren, first; Southeast Savages and Loah Association of Woodville, second; and rodeo staff of KVLL of Woodville, third.

In the special groups division, the Orange County Junior Posse was first and the San Augustine 4-H Club Riders was second.

Special events winners, according to Harry Stafford, who was in charge, were:

Barrel racing, less than 10 years of age, Martha Benfield of San Augustine, ages 10 to 15, Kent Mullis of San Augustine, and 16 and older, Wayne Adams.

Pole bending, less than 10, Cissy Cartwright, 10 to 15, Kent Mullis, and 16 and older, Diane McBride of Baytown.

Thousands of visitors are expected here Saturday for the final weekend of the Tyler County Dogwood Festival which will feature the coronation of the queen, a pageant depicting the roaring twenties, and three dances including the queen's ball.

Activities will start at 2:30 p.m. Saturday when the two-mile long parade will wind its way eastward down Hwy. 10 through the business district and north on Magnolia to Charlotte. Bands, duchesses in convertibles, the princesses' float and other floats and entries will make this one of the longest and most colorful of the parades in the 27-year history of the festival.

The coronation of the queen will begin at 7 p.m. in Dogwood Amphitheatre where a capacity audience of at least 3000 will await the identity of this year's queen as the coronation ceremony unfolds. The queen was chosen by the Kings Men at the final judging Tuesday night but her identity will not be known until the coronation.

Duchesses and escorts from 14 cities and towns will be introduced and take their places on the stage. The princesses and escorts will be introduced except for one, the queen. Only then will she and the audience know her identity.

Princesses from whom the queen was chosen are Roschelle Durham of Woodville, Leff Jordan of Spurger, Sheila Benton of Colmesnell, Diane Franke of Chester, and Virginia Davis of Warren.

Also on the program is the introduction of "Mr. East Texas 1968", who this year is Glen Richard of Beaumont. This is the second year that the festival directors have selected an outstanding man from outside Tyler county for special recognition.

The queen will be crowned by Ben Barnes, speaker of the Texas House of Representatives.

Following the coronation of the queen, the traditional pageant will be presented in the amphitheatre stage. This year the theme is "The Lawless Years", depicting the roaring twenties.

The pageant will be in six scenes. The first, entitled "Little Brown Jug", will feature Bob Bell and Malcolm Redford as the wine makers, and boys in the scene are Rod-

## Four In Family Die In Collision

An automobile-truck crash in a blinding rain Thursday of last week claimed the lives of all four members of the Robert (Rex) Kennerly family. The accident occurred at the west city limits on Highway 190 about 6 p.m.

Mrs. Kennerly was dead at the scene of the accident. Mr. Kennerly and their two children were carried to Tyler County Hospital where he died later. The two children, Laura Ann, 6, and Lisa, 18 months, were carried to Baptist Hospital in Beaumont where they died from their injuries.

Mr. Kennerly was office manager for the Soil Conservation Service and was active in civic affairs. He was a member and was secretary of the Woodville Rotary Club, and was chairman of the cancer crusade for a number of years.

He was high priest in the Church of Christ of Latter Day Saints and was president of the Woodville branch. He was a 32nd degree Mason and was a member of the Masonic Lodge in Giddings, where he was born. He operated a cleaning and pressing shop in Houston and LaPorte for 30 years before moving to Woodville.

Mrs. Kennerly was native of Natchitoches Parish, Louisiana. She was associated with a sister in the 'N Teen Shop here. She was a past president of the Woodville Garden Club and the Tyler County Hospital Auxiliary.

Joint funeral services for the family was held at 2 p.m. Sunday in the chapel at Edwards Funeral Home. Burial was in Magnolia cemetery. Pallbearers were J. Wood Fair, Dr. R. E. Swearingen, Morris C. ## Tour Friday Features Homes, Church

The Tyler County Historical Association is sponsoring a day of tours on Friday, March 29, leaving the Shivers Museum promptly at 10 a.m., going east on Highway 190 to Dam B Lake, taking right turn to boat ramp for a view of the bridge spanning the Neches river.

Making a U turn it will proceed to Highway 92, going south to Camper's Cove, where it will follow the Lake Shore to the next exit. This route will bring it back to Highway 92 near the Fairview Church. It will stop at the church and the Rev. John Spanhans and members of the congregation will give the history, show the minutes written when the church was organized July 8, 1858-1909. A large bell is being erected in the church yard, supposedly the first in the area, and brought in by boat.

Nearby is the Hicks home, built with square nails, 85 years old, with an open hallway through the center. It is well preserved, and the wood has mellowed to a gray satin finish. Huge cedar, crepe myrtle and other trees testify to their longevity. One of the most interesting articles on display is a baby's suit and bonnet, made of homespun material, sewn by hand, and made in 1850.

# Capital NEWS

First surries of activity on the 1968 presidential campaign front remind that it is going to be a long, long political year.

Entry of Sen. Robert Kennedy into the contest for the Democratic nomination set off more speculation than action.

Less than a week after Kennedy's announcement, however, a Houston college teacher announced he had accepted an invitation from the senator's office to head up his drive in Texas.

Democratic or Republican primaries or conventions.

State Democratic Committee, meanwhile, has emphasized its support of President Johnson.

Gov. John Connally has announced he intends to head a Texas delegation to the national convention committed to the president's renomination.

To date, there is little evidence of any major effort to take the Texas Democratic convention away from Johnson.

## TOWER REPORTS

For the last couple of weeks the Senate's Housing and Urban Affairs Subcommittee, on which I serve, has been holding hearings on the housing needs of our citizens.

The problems of our cities are many, but in my opinion the overriding problem needing a solution is that of providing decent housing for the many low-income families that live in our cities.

Both with respect to existing federally-assisted housing programs and the new proposals now under consideration, I feel that we should strive to do the most good where it is most needed. That is, we should give priority to lower income housing over so-called moderate income housing.

Approximately 28 percent of our families, these families are by any measure the families who are least able to provide for their housing needs.

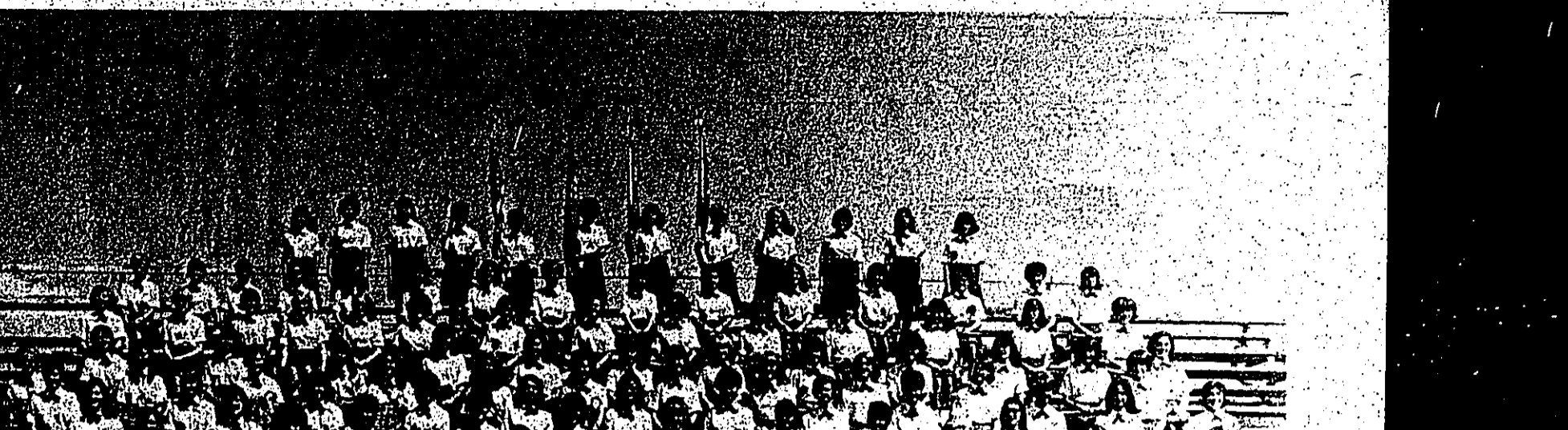

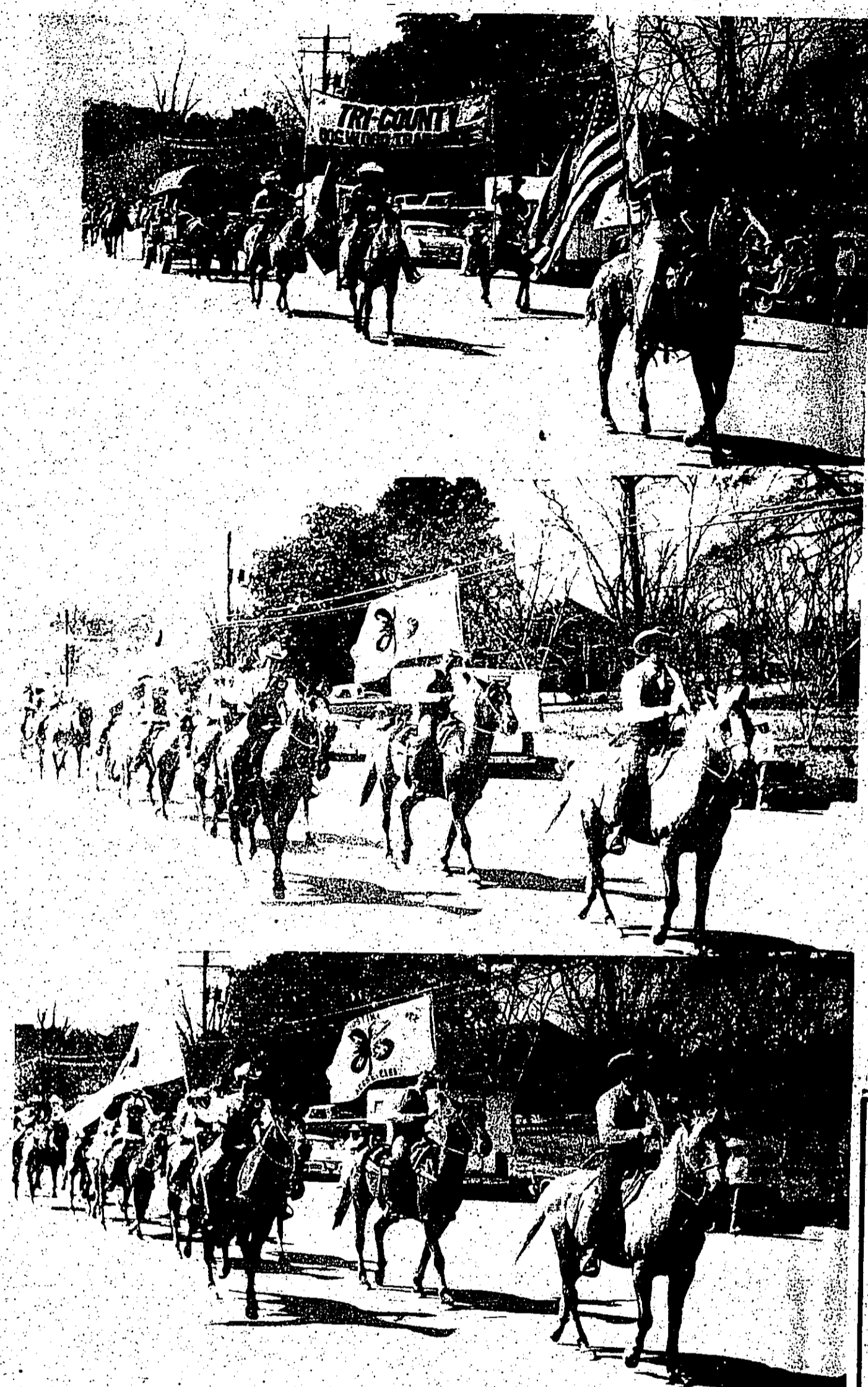

THE FAMILY LAWYER. Enact the Ten Commandments? Not long ago a secular lawyer proposed the enactment of the Ten Commandments as part of the state's criminal code. The proposal did not pass. But it did put into sharp focus the relationship between moral law and criminal law. There are striking differences between the two systems of law. For one thing, moral law usually deals in generalities; criminal law in specifics. While the Sixth Commandment says generally that "Thou shalt not kill," the criminal law specifies the various ways in which a person may be held liable for his death. This is a reflection of the fact that moral law is a higher level of standards than are the laws of the state. It is not to be enforced by criminal penalties. It is to be enforced by the conscience of the individual. "Thou shalt not covet" - by fines or jail sentences. Yet, in a deeper sense, criminal law must at least be in harmony with moral law if it is to be acceptable to the community. It is so the moral law that mankind looks for its direction and its inspiration. And if moral law has the disadvantage of being general, it has the advantage of being enduring. Poet James Russell Lowell put it this way: "To vote is to call old springs fountains; And bend our conscience to our dealing." The Ten Commandments will not budge. And dealing will continue stealing. Also, because moral law speaks directly to the conscience, it may influence conduct in a way that no mere legislative enactment ever could. In one case, a farmer posted a "NO TRESPASSING" sign in an effort to stop repeated thefts from his apple orchard. But apples continued to vanish. One day he changed the sign to read "THOU SHALT NOT STEAL." The thefts stopped at once. A public service feature of the American Bar Association and the State Bar of Texas. 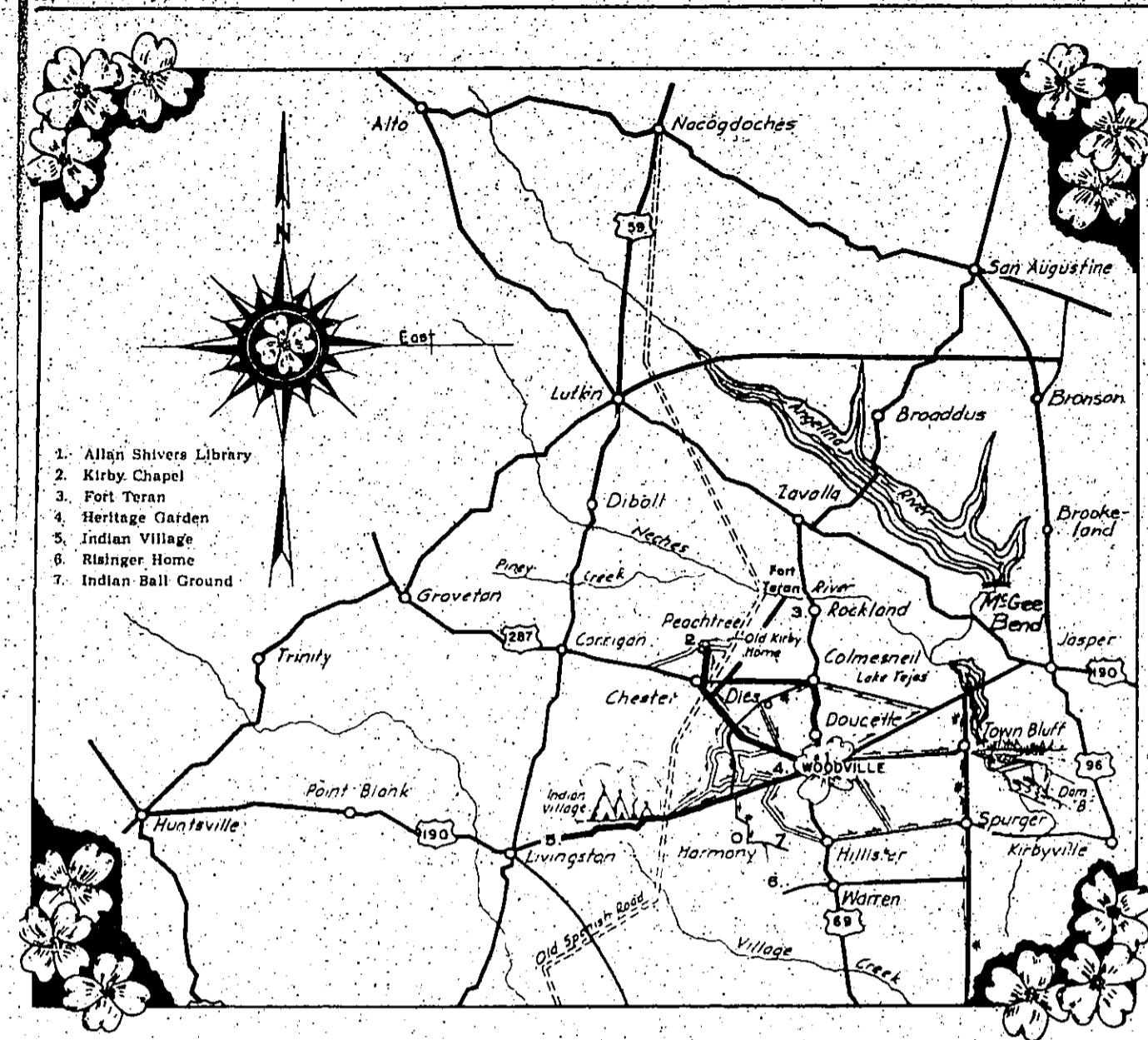

Homeowners Urged to Join Drive; Spruce Up Homes, Throw Out Trash

Homeowners across the United States and Canada were urged by the American Insurance Association today to join in Spring Clean-Up activities by sprucing up their homes and throwing out trash and clutter which may have accumulated during the winter. Old newspapers, oil cans, and other rubbish are a fire hazard and create fuel upon which fires feed, the Association cautioned. Spring Clean-Up Week serves as an annual reminder to make homes fire-safe and protect both lives and property by disposing of such trash. In most communities, provisions are made to put trash on the curb at designated times, to be picked up and carted away in sanitation trucks. Don't underestimate the importance of this annual clean-up program, urged L. Lawrence Jones, president of the Association. "In fact, let us hope it will serve the purpose for which it was designed, to remind Americans that homes should be kept clean and free of clutter, which may be a fire hazard," he said. "Every second fire breaks out in some home in 1967, but in the United States took 12,200 lives and caused property losses aggregating more than \$1.7 billion. 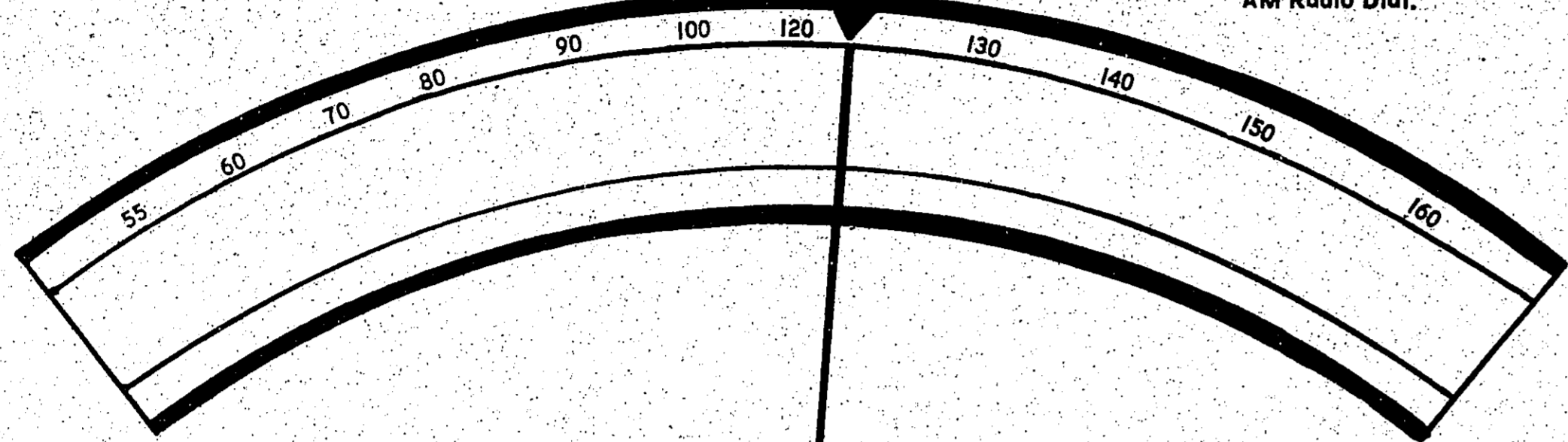

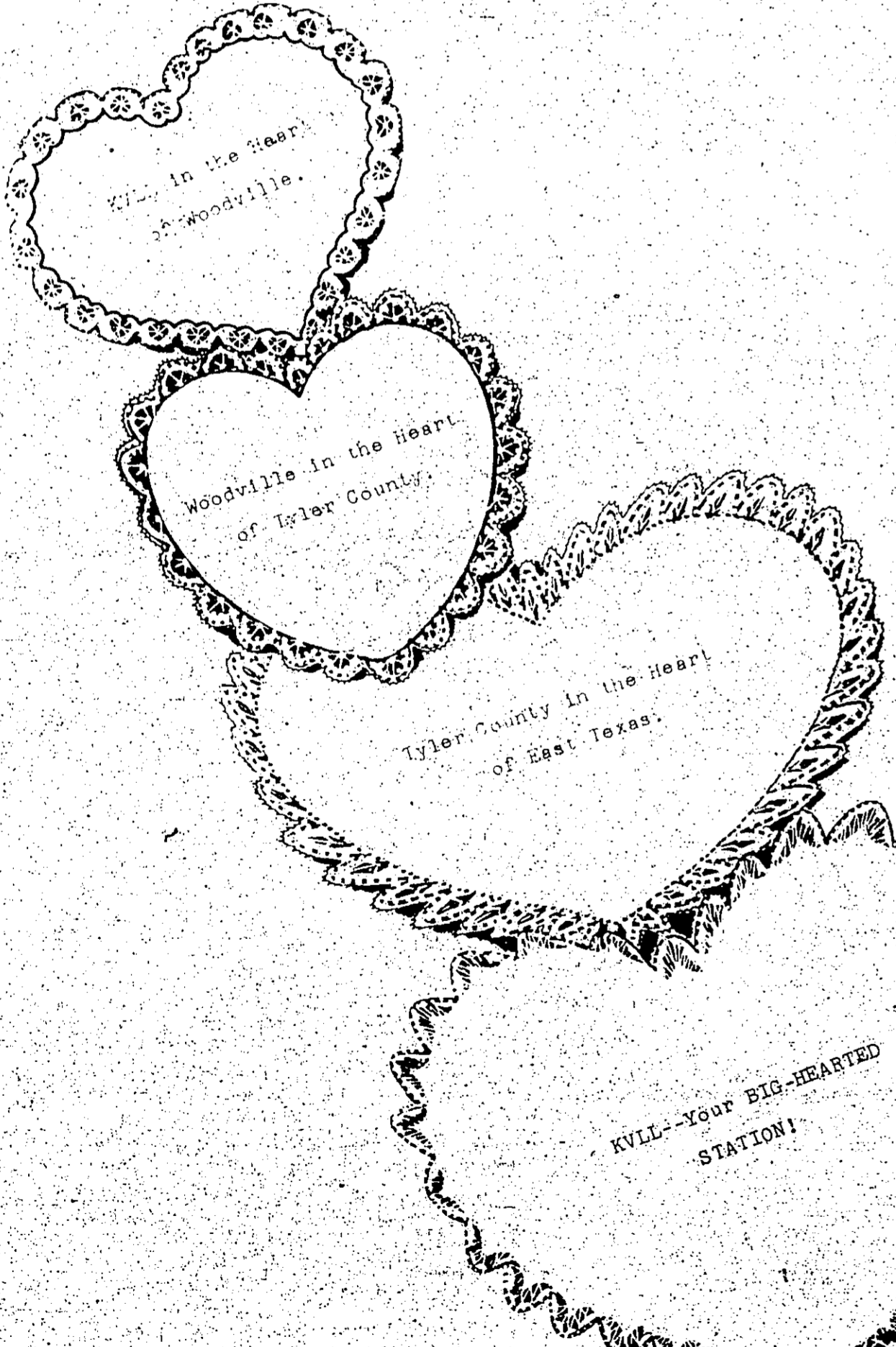
