#### THOUSANDS SEE PARADE AND CORONATION

It was Dogwood Time in Tyler County Saturday, and the annual affair was one of the most outstanding in its 25 year

The mile long parade of fioats, convertibles with the 34 pretty duchesses, the queen's float with reigning queen Jeaette McClure and the five princesses, the bands, the commercial entries, and all the others winded its way through downtown Woodville on a perfect Spring afternoon and was viewed by a crowd estimated at 15,000 persons.

The coronation ceremonies and the pageant Saturday night was seen by a sell-out crowd that jammed the 3500 seat outdoor amphitheatre, again in perfect Spring weather.

The spectacular throne area was centered with a huge golden tiara 5 feet in diameter and studded with larger rubylike jewels. The throne was 18 feet from the dais with the backdrop draped in red and gold. Flanking the throne area on each side and at graduated heights were three golden urns filled with large red

More than a hundred thousand handmade paper blossoms of dogwoods, azaleas, magnolias and other East Texas flowers were mounted and used in the decorations of the big stage. Girls of the court, with armbaskets filled with spring flowers, entered from the handsome two-story brownstone house typical of the 1920s. Josiah Wheat gave the wel-

come while speaking for his 81-year-old father, Judge J. E. Wheat, founder and president of the festival, who has always announced "It's Dogwood time in Tyler County.".








Front view of Lions Club's float which won first prize in parade



I have proof that my opponent made an attempt to secure detailed information regarding my retillement and Social Security benefits but since the information was to be used for political purposes, it was not turnished to him. His statement is just his conclusion, and opinion and SHOULD NOT BE CONSIDERED, as he is not the person or agency with the facts or authority to determine another's rights under our Judge's Retirement Act My Opponent has decided for me, and advised the public that I am not interested in being re-elected as District Judge in order to serve the people any longer, but that I am only interested in the retirement benefits I could receive upon my retirement. The method of holding court follows the laws of Texas and my opponent is not going to be able to deliver this promise. Smarter mention either of us have tried to improve on our procedures to save time, money and inconveniences to all persons taking part in trial of a case, but no better or more satisfactory way has yet been devised. We must have some new laws enacted by our Legislature before any relief from the present system and procedures may be expected.
