Jim Freeman Elected Woodville Mayor

Woodville voters Saturday named Jim Freeman their mayor to succeed E. W. Gassiot, who did not seek reelection.

Freeman received 328 votes while his opponent, W. L. Brueck, Sr., received 133.

J. G. Anderson was reelected to the city council with 324 votes. Leroy Davis was elected to the other council position, receiving 347 votes. A total of 485 votes were cast in the election. Mr. Gassiot received three written-in votes for mayor, while in the council race he received 11, Pleckert and J. H. Brueck and two for Paul Thomas.

Parks and Galbreth Elected Trustees in School Vote

James C. Parks and Richard G. Galbreth were elected to the Woodville Independent School District advisory trustee Saturday.

The board of voters selected the trustees with a total of 271 ballots being cast in the election.

Parks received 135 votes to lead the 600-vote total, while Galbreth received 136 votes.

Carley L. Cruse received 359 votes and J. Wood Fain, 350. Cruse and Fain were incumbent trustees.

Three Trustees Named At Warren

T. A. McManus, incumbent, James Evans and Albert Reese were elected to the Warren school board of trustees at the election Saturday.

McManus received 116 votes and Evans and Reese each received 115 votes. The fourth candidate, K. L. Kimbrough, received 114 votes.

Boat Ramps Approved

Several boat ramps in the Southeast Texas area were approved by the Texas Highway Commission at its meeting in San Angelo for construction in 1968.

The 1968 boat ramp program

Included 58 projects in 42 counties at an estimated cost of \$624,400. Funds for construction and maintenance of the ramps comes from boat registration fees.

Area projects include:

Tyler County—Construction of a ramp on the south side of the Neches River adjacent to U.S. Highway 69 at Rockland.

Sabine County—Three boat ramps on Toledo Bend Reservoir. One will be adjacent to SH 97 at Six Mile Creek, one adjacent to FM 3121 at Palo Saucio Bayou and one adjacent to SH 21 on Carrice Creek.

Hardin County—A boat ramp on Village Creek adjacent to U.S. 96.

Jasper County—A boat ramp on the Angeline River west of FM 2798.

Newton County—Boat ramp on Toledo Bend adjacent to FM 3125.

STATE Capital NEWS

President Lyndon B. Johnson's decision to step aside in turning the 4 Democratic precinct conventions from the previous label of "chump" to a new one of "best contested".

Gov. John Connally, who had been slated to be the Texas delegation chairman in support of President Johnson, with little objection from anyone, took a flight on his hands.

Connally's forces launched a favorite son campaign for Connally at a meeting of the State Democratic Executive Committee. Senator Ralph Yarborough objected, and appeared close to a decision to challenge Connally in the county convention.

At first, the Connally candidacy seemed to be favored by Ward Vice President Hubert Humphrey, but Connally, who had earlier said he would not be a candidate for election.

By contrast, Republican Governor Mac Thornberry, a Republican, indicated the state Republican organization might be limited behind Senator John Tower's favorite son candidacy.

However, a challenge was proposed by a group of delegates led by Governor Connally's County Convention on May 11 and state convention on May 12 will follow. All the state seats decisions will be made by the more than 5,000 precincts in Texas on May 12.

HOUSE-MAYOR ELECTIONS AND EXTENDED TERM. The Supreme Court previously extended the term of office of the governor to four years.

Like legislation to be passed, wherever there are other governmental or other representatives in the member districts, the districts must be substantially equal.

Ruling was made by the Midland Mayor Hunt case to force Midland County Commissioners Court to reappoint. Dissenting opinion issued by "Ayala" of the Texas House of Representatives.

REPORT FROM DOWDY

THE COMMUNIST THREAT--A lot of people flap to the dangerous conclusion that there is no longer a threat from international communism because Russia and China have disputes; Russia not China, alone, could threaten our security. These conclusions should be discarded, because the Soviets and the Chinese, in spite of their differences, are apparently arming the Vietnam and North Vietnamese better than we have armed the South Vietnamese. And Red Russia, by herself, seems to have set off the war in the Middle East, and using it to Russia's advantage, Russia is building a large missile force.

CIGARETTE SMOKING DECLINING. Recent figures show a decrease in the number of cigarettes manufactured and removed from warehouses for the months of February and December, 1967 and January 1968, compared with the same months a year earlier. This is the first decline since the Surgeon General's report in 1964 that linked cigarette smoking with cancer.

DEFICIT SPENDING BURT'S BRITAIN. England is still having its troubles, despite the devaluation of its money. The British Labor Government has passed a new austerity budget, which includes a 10 per cent tax rise, coupled with an 18-month wage freeze. There is always a pay day when a family or a nation, insists on living on borrowed money.

POVERTY PROGRAM. According to a newspaper report, an employee of the U. S. Department of Agriculture states they have found people paying for television sets and automobiles at the same time they were getting food stamp loans. The report further states that the anti-poverty agency does not know this change. No comment seems necessary.

FRANCHISE DEBT SHOULD BE PAID. There was some hope that the European Common Market would agree on a plan to help the United States in a balance-of-payment problem, but France vetoed the plan before they were discussed. I am still of the opinion, that the resolution I introduced sometime ago, that it is the sense of Congress that the French debt to the United States be paid, should be adopted.

DESALINATION OF WATER. The Aluminum Company of America says it has developed a new water desalination system that will produce fresh water at one-third to one-half of the present cost. The company estimates purifying costs to range from 25¢ to 50¢ per thousand gallons, compared with present costs ranging to a dollar or more for conventional desalination facilities. It is not at all impossible that our water problems will be solved. There seems to be no bounds upon the abilities of the American scientists.

TOWER REPORTS

As all Texans know, this Saturday--April 6th--marks the opening of HemisFair in the 250-year-old City of San Antonio.

Much has been written and said, about the artistic achievement of our Fair of the Americas. Word has spread of its excitement, its beauty, its cultural sweep, and its architectural achievement.

During the summer, many hundreds of thousands of HemisFair visitors will enter our State. And, from within the state, I expect that every Texan who can will want to pass through HemisFair's gates.

I will attend the Fair on opening day and I urge all Texans take advantage of this opportunity to attend a real World's Fair--within our own State.

On a domain of 92 acres HemisFair visitors will for six months be treated to a colorful history lesson; and a review of the art, religion, social and economic development of each of the nations of this hemisphere. Commercial and foreign exhibitors will unfold, each in their own way, the story of Western culture and of life throughout the Americas.

Beneath the music and the gaiety, and behind the colorful facades of HemisFair lies a foundation of purpose and determination.

HemisFair's facilities are concrete testaments to the spirit of optimism in our state, particularly in San Antonio. In 1916, Texas leaders first conceived of an exposition to mark the 200th Anniversary of San Antonio. World problems at that time withered the idea before its fruition.

Then, about 1963, with a lead time of only five years, a handful of business and civic leaders revived the idea to coincide with the 250th Anniversary of the city.

Ahead of them then was the prospect of grueling organizational planning and effort. Before them lay the need to commit millions of dollars to a venture the outcome of which would depend upon many factors over which they could exercise little control. The failure of any one of a dozen essential factors could have made impossible the realization of their ambitious project.

Approval as a world's fair by the International Bureau of Expositions in Paris was necessary. Passage of federal legislation recognized HemisFair was needed, and a Congressional commitment to build a Federal Pavilion would have to be secured. Corporate leaders and foreign countries and foreign countries had to be persuaded. Sufficient financing had to be secured.

For my own part, I can recall the persuasion which was necessary in Congress to obtain legislative support for appropriations to build the Federal Pavilion at HemisFair as well as the gaining of federal recognition for the fair. Also I can recall the satisfaction which I and Senator Yarborough and our staffs felt when these goals were accomplished.

And now because of the superb organization and hard work of backers, the exposition is open on schedule. San Antonio now has realized all Texans can be proud. HemisFair has a message for Texans and for the world. To ourselves it says that, as Texans, few if any of us will remain unaffected by the economic impact of the Fair in the heart of San Antonio.

Texans from far West Texas to Deep East Texas will share directly or indirectly in the beneficial influx of U. S. and foreign tourists into the state. The impact of these customers from out of state will be great, and the increased spending in Texas will be felt in every sector of our economy.

To the visitors to Texas the message of HemisFair also is clear: Here in Texas exists one of the great economic centers of the world--a manufacturing center, a commercial relay point with enviable port and land transportation facilities, a ready labor market, a co-operative spirit, a consumer market of considerable potential, a very great reservoir of managerial skill and one of the primary financial centers of the country.

Even after the gates of HemisFair close this fall the image of HemisFair will continue to work for the benefit of our State. Those who visit and depart will have taken note of our state's cultural benefits, its beauty and its spirit. Some will even return to become Texans themselves.

Thus, for six months San Antonio will be in the world's spotlight as never before. It is a unique and rare opportunity for us to attract industry and friends both domestic and foreign. The ripples started in San Antonio five years ago will be felt far beyond this fall: HemisFair is here.

It is to be enjoyed as every fair is meant to be enjoyed. I hope to see you there!

A few days ago our fellow Texan Lyndon B. Johnson shook the world by announcing that he would not seek re-nomination in the Democratic Party for the Presidency. President Johnson's withdrawal leaves a wide-open situation in national politics that will no doubt bring on a very spirited campaign. But before the roar of campaigning engulfs us, let us consider the very productive four and a half years of this administration in terms of legislation and programs for the people. I believe the record shows that the Johnson years have been fruitful years for the United States.

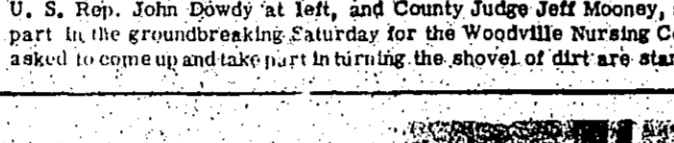

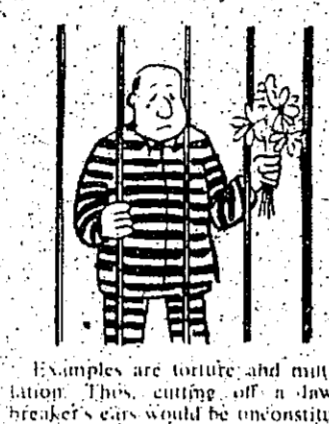

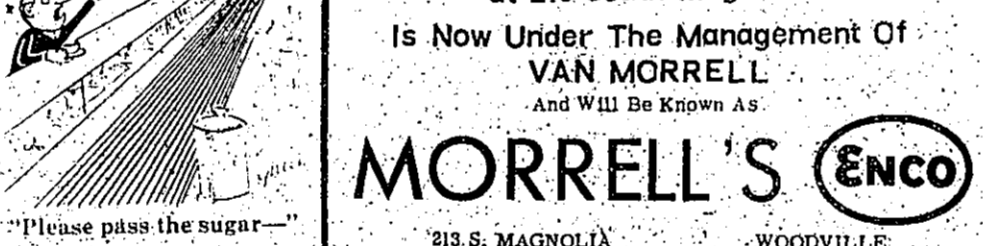
