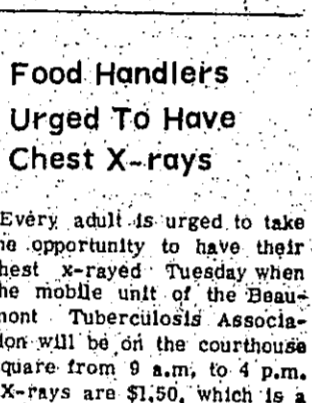

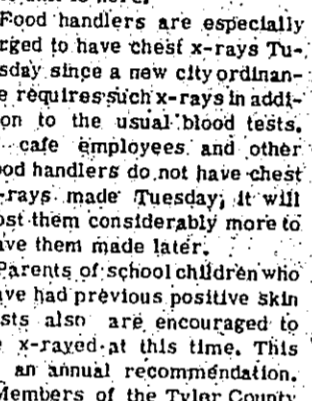
FHA Members To Receive State Degrees

How To Mark Your Ballot

Voters in the May 4 Democratic primary are reminded that the last session of the state legislature changed the method of marking ballots to placing an X in a square beside the name of each candidate for whom a voter wants to vote.

In other words, if you want your vote counted for a candidate who has no opposition, you must also place an X in the square before his name, just as you do in races where there is more than one candidate.

Remember—for every candidate for whom you want to vote there must be an X in the square before his name. And do not scratch or mark out any names—you will only nullify your ballot and it will not be counted.

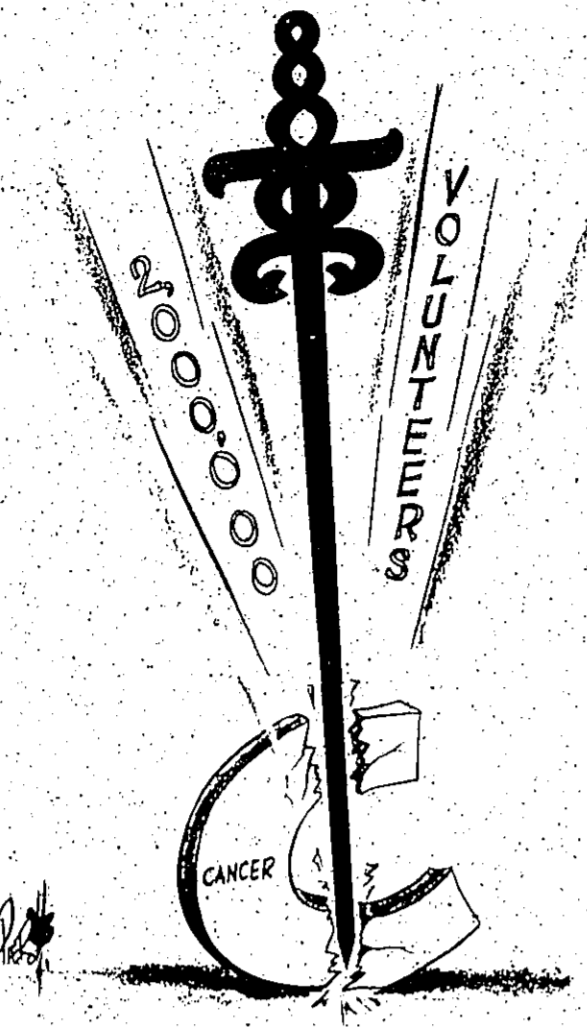

No one can determine for himself what is law. No man can responsibly preach violence and, at the same time, advocate defiance of law or of court orders for to defy law is to invite first violence, then chaos and finally tyranny. I am certain that I express the view of all responsible Americans in stating that the murderer of Dr. King must be brought to justice. I am also confident that just as there can be no compromise in bringing the murderer to justice, neither can there be any compromise in the maintenance of law and order in our streets. As a representative of a state which has itself lived through an emotional post-assassination period, I feel strongly that something must be done this week in defense of the vast majority of responsible Americans.

Those who claim racism rules here are wrong. Those who claim Americans are indifferent either cannot or will not take any action which has been and is being made.

There is in responsible America a massive desire to do right what inequities still exist. There is a demand for progress. And that progress will be obtained not by the militants but by those Americans who reject crime, violence and hatred.

It is certainly time for the American people to insist that their government deliver to all Americans the best, equal justice and certain order.

REPORT FROM DOWDY

RIOTS IN THE NATION'S CAPITOL, Thursday, April 11, and order broke down in Washington. About 7:00 p.m., as the rioting mobs began breaking store windows, and looting and burning the radio and television stations in Washington. The rioting was a part of a nationwide rioting which has been going on since the assassination of Dr. King. Television cameras on the scene showed looters coming from stores, laden with merchandise, including some who had appropriated hand-dollars and were moving large items, such as refrigerators. As they emerged from the stores with their stolen goods, they were laughing and waving on the television cameras. Police, stood by, and the cameras showed them keeping the traffic moving. From clothing stores, thieves brought arm-loads of garments to the sidewalk, tried them on to find a fit, and cast the other items aside on the streets.

The public showings of these scenes of looting could only have served to bring other looters to join in the stealing. More than 40 blocks of the business district of Washington were looted. Arsonists set many fires, and several whole buildings were gutted by fire and collapsed. In many of the blocks, windows were broken in all buildings in other areas, the burning, looting and wanton destruction was more selective. Lawlessness and chaos prevailed.

Troops were finally brought in, and after several days, order began to be restored. After the rioting calmed down, I requested to be driven through

the areas of the riot. It has the appearance of a war-torn city, solid blocks of buildings destroyed as though bombed, with the debris of destroyed property littering the streets. For nearly a week, the Capitol City of the United States was a garrison city, with troops patrolling the streets, and road blocks at street intersections. Curfew kept the streets empty from late afternoon until morning. No one was permitted to enter or leave the District of Columbia during those hours. It could not happen in the United States. Why I oppose Gambling

When I was a young man working my way through college in San Diego, California, one of the more unusual jobs I had was working for the family that controlled gambling in Agua Caliente, across the border in Mexico. My job was to pretend to be a rich college boy who gambled on weekends.

The owners supplied me with money and instructions on cheating so that I could watch for collusion between the dealers and their confederates who were constantly cheating the casino. I had occasion to spend one entire winter watching the results of gambling by prominent American businessmen who came across the border for the "sport."

What I saw convinced me to fight legalized gambling wherever I could. I saw fortunes lost and learned of men being indicted for stealing from their own firms in order to try to "get even" talked to professional gamblers and heard their sneering, contemptuous remarks about the "idiots" and "suckers" who were "too dumb" to know the odds.

Since then, through my association with show people who are knowledgeable about gangster type ownership in Las Vegas and other gambling cities, I have also become fully aware of the tie-up between gambling and gangsterhood, with all its ramifications, i.e., dope, prostitution, etc.

I can only say that where gambling goes, trouble follows, and I will always be on the side of any group voting against legalized gambling. I am practicing what I preach, and I will always talk to professional gamblers and always gamble, and the element of taking a chance for gain can never be eradicated, but that is no reason to encourage it.
