As our county and community grows, it becomes increasingly harder to keep it clean and free from unsightly spots. I urge that you consider the highways and the country-side as your own front yard, and keep them free of unsightly tin. litter, so that our entire com-

munity will be a bright spot to visitors passing through, and also to us who live here and see it every day. Your Sheriff's office has been receiving an increasing number

of calls recently protesting the dumping of trash along the highways and near cemeteries. I would like to take this means of requesting, as a matter of

civic pride, that this practice be. stopped, and also to give you the law which makes it an offense to dispose of trash in this way.



Levels Are Raised

By Spring Rains

The Corps of Engineers report that both Dam B and Sam Rayburn lakes are in tip-top shape

The rains during March and the first week of April have supplied a large quantity of run-off in the upper reaches of the Neches and the Angelina rivers.

This run-off has raised the level of Dam B to 82.44 and the Corps of Engineers were forced to open the gatesto make room for the new water entering the lake. At Sam Rayburn, the water level has risen to an all-

time high of 158.14 feet above sea level as of 8 a.m. Aoril 5. With the new level at Rayburn, the Corps reports that

the lake is now at 78 percent of capacity with 2,234-361 acre feet of water impounded.
