

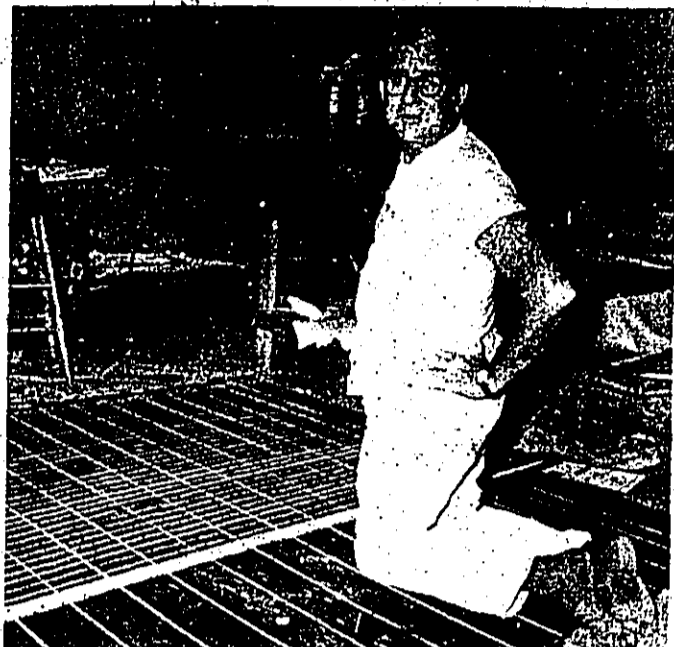

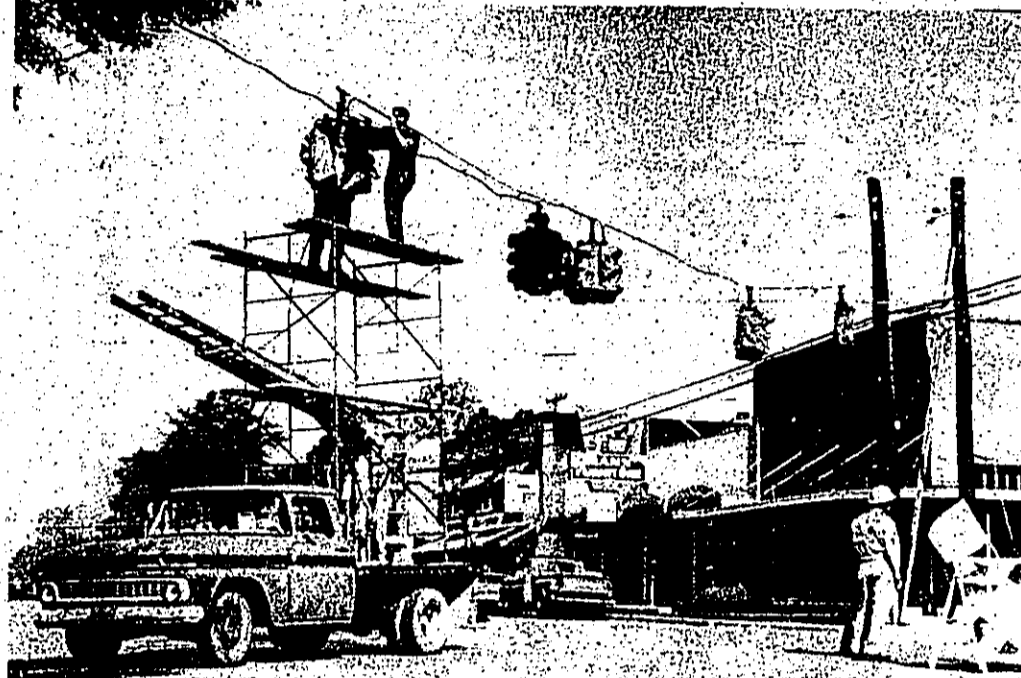

Tyler County voters will choose between two top candidates in races for sheriff and tax assessor-collector as the result of Saturday's first primary.

The run-off election on June 1 will pit Sheriff Grady Ray against Lewis E. Craven, 996, and Webb Astworth, the third candidate, 917 in Saturday's Democratic primary.

In the race for tax assessor-collector, A. L. (Pete) Thornton will be opposed in the run-off primary by Tom Sawyer. Thornton polled 1502 votes, Sawyer 1330 and Mrs. Audrey E. Hall 627 in the first primary Saturday.

Besides the two races in the county, voters in the second primary will help choose nominees for state representative and for Governor of Texas. In the race for state representative and for Governor of Texas, Don Adams of Jasper received 7432 votes in the four counties of the district to lead the three candidates, J. E. Miller, Jr., the incumbent, polled 7096 while John Kar-cher tallied 2041.

In Tyler County, Miller led with 1318 while Adams received 1240 and Karcher 686 votes. The two candidates in the Governor's race in the run-off primary, Don Yarborough and Preston Smith, were also the high men in Tyler County voting. Yarborough received 801 votes and Smith 727 in Tyler County. Statewide, latest returns gave Yarborough 408,166 and Smith 372,287 votes.

In the district attorney's race, Stanley Coe was nominated over R. A. Richardson in a real cliff-hanger with the Woodville box, where counting was not completed until after 1:00 a.m. Sunday, deciding the winner. Coe carried the Woodville box and thus the nomination, although Richardson carried Tyler County with 1684 votes to Coe's 1585. In both counties, Tyler and Hardin, Coe received 5561 to Richardson's 5376.

H. A. Coe, incumbent, district judge, won the nomination for that office by defeating Clyde E. Smith, Jr. of Woodville by 6075 to 5185 in both counties. Smith carried Tyler County with 1820 votes to Coe's 1577.

In precinct one, voters chose a new commissioner when J. Carl Shepherd polled 1058 votes to 712 for the incumbent, Joe L. Best.

J. H. Collier was named constable in precinct one over Harley Kimbrough, Jr., 824 to 684.

In precinct three, Leon Fowler, incumbent commissioner, tallied 688 votes over Frank S. Grimes who got 115, and Harley Crews was nominated for constable in precinct three with 402 votes to 218 for Joe Hughes and 155 for Delbert Harris. Leslie Dubose defeated Jack Bunn for justice of the peace in precinct three with 523 votes to 173 for Bunn. Congressman John Dowdy, who won an easy victory over Dempsey Henley in the 18 county second district, carried Tyler County 1984 to 1276.

Rolls Brockman, candidate for his first elected term as county attorney, was unopposed in the primary.

The Tyler County Democratic executive committee met at the court house Tuesday at 10 a.m. to certify the returns in Saturday's first Democratic primary.

Only a few errors were found, none serious, by the committee. Nine votes cast for John Hill in the Rockland-box were added to his total and two other small additional errors were found.

Morris Clemenmons, Jr., county chairman, congratulated the election judges and clerks in the various boxes for their accuracy and efficiency in handling the record vote cast in the county Saturday.

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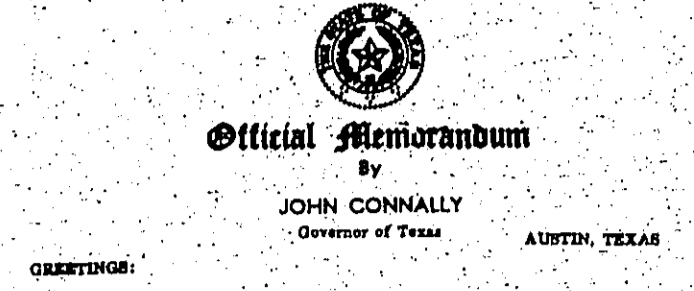

This week I will discuss with you some facts about education for Cold War veterans, and the amendment I introduced a few days ago to my Cold War GI Bill of Rights.

After World War II, Congress passed the GI Bill, and under that bill about 2 million veterans—or half the returning GIs—went back to school or into job training.

That bill was duplicated for Korean veterans. In all, about 11 million American veterans of World War II or the Korean War could have gone to school under the GI Bill, including on-the-job training, flight training, and on-the-farm training.

I worked and fought eight years in the military, and I know it paid off for our country but after World War II and the Korean conflict, and I know it would be a great boon to our nation for veterans of the Cold War. Placement Test To Be Given

For Peace Corps

Tyler County area residents interested in putting their skills to use in developing nations around the world are invited to take the Peace Corps Placement Test at 1:30 p.m. on Saturday, May 18 at Post Office, Room 214, Federal Building and Customhouse, 501 Austin.

The Peace Corps uses the Placement Test to determine how an applicant can best be utilized overseas. The test measures general aptitude and the ability to learn a language, not education or achievement. The test requires no preparation and is non-competitive. An applicant can neither pass nor fail.

Persons interested in serving with the Peace Corps should fill out an application. If you have not already done so, you should present it to the tester before the test. Application forms are available from post offices or from the Peace Corps in Washington, D. C. 20525.

Thirteen thousand volunteers are currently serving in Asia, Africa, Latin America and the Pacific Islands, working with the people of those nations in self-help projects ranging from agriculture and nutrition to mechanics, education and health. Many volunteers are needed for programs which will begin this summer and fall.

Most Americans are currently aware that our federal government is in a serious fiscal crisis.

And in 1968 the alarm is again being sounded about the instability of the dollar; about the imbalance of American national bank accounts; and about the unworkable situation of the dollar.

What's at stake here is quite simply the future worth of our dollar.

William McCuskey, Chairman of the Federal Reserve System, and essentially our top federal banker, calls the current situation the "worst financial crisis since 1931." I think he knows what he's talking about.

Texas Liquor Control Board is heading for an early showdown test of its new go-to-policies on advertising private clubs.

Some club operators, who already were complaining indignantly about an earlier LCD directive prohibiting managers, members from issuing guest cards to walk-in customers, were hard hit. One promptly filed a lawsuit here to enjoin the Board's regulations.

Next result of the cash sale requirement will be to eliminate the casual guests, since operators wouldn't want to run the risk of granting total strangers a month's credit for a highly-perishable commodity.

Hotel-motel clubs who expect to solve the problem by putting cash charges on room tabs may find the Board's definition of a cash sale quite restrictive.

"It shall be deemed that a cash sale has been made if payment for a service is made in whole or in part by check, money order or cash at the time of purchase of the goods or services."

Clubs also received a long list of new instructions for keeping records and auditing books according to by-laws and through boards of directors.

More rules are expected to be forthcoming from the LCD. They may be hard for all but strictly-private and proper clubs in the near future.

LCB Attorney Lynwood Elliott said he thinks the cash sale directive will register clubs "feel, quite frankly, that when you prohibit a club from making a cash sale it will be less inclined to serve the public at large and will start serving properly screened members."

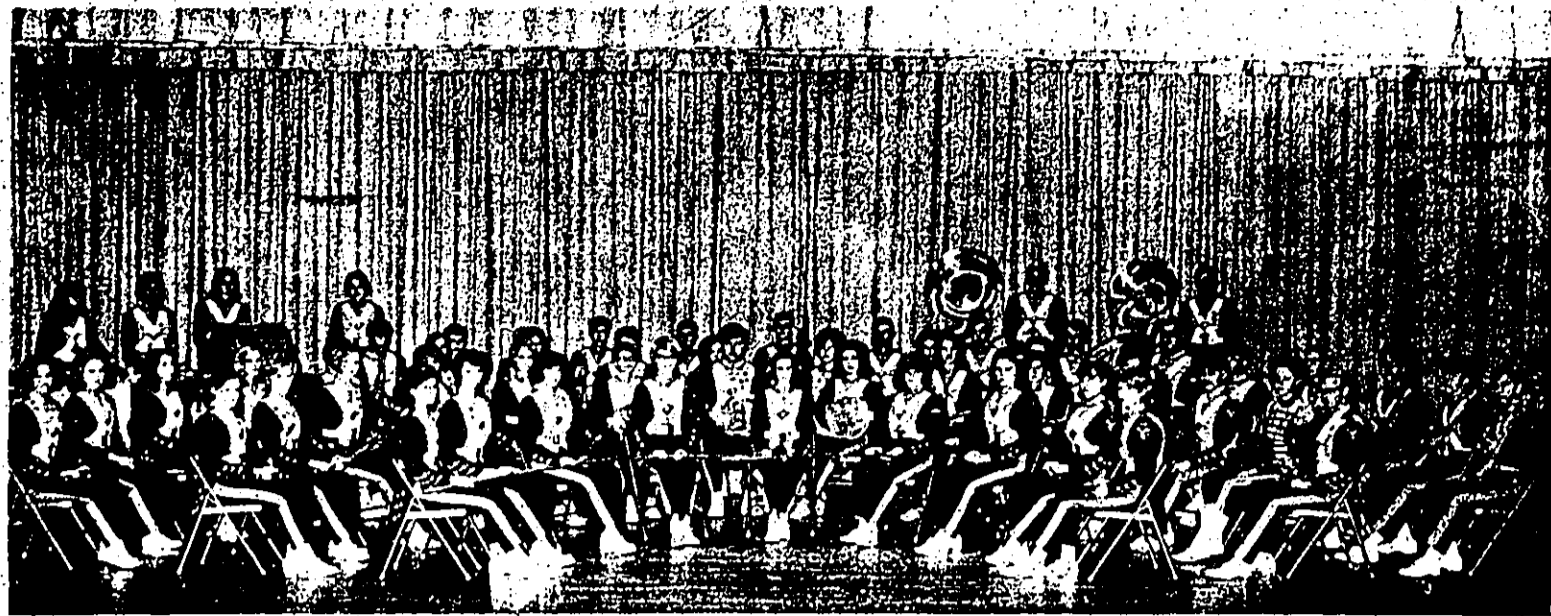
