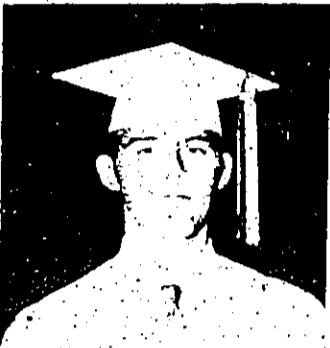

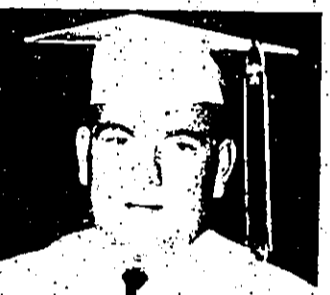

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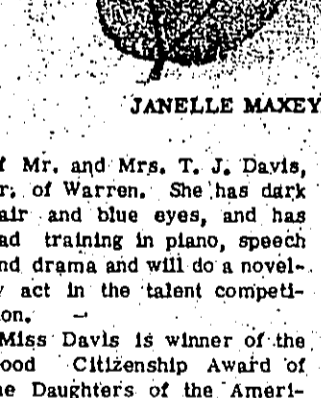

The Tyler County Booster and Radio Station KVIL are starting this week, in cooperation with local civic clubs, a campaign to get out a large number of voters for the second Democratic primary June 1. In the first primary on May 4, Tyler County voters turned out in larger numbers percentage-wise than neighboring counties, and a much larger percentage than the state as a whole.

Merely 65 percent of eligible voters turned out in Tyler County. Across the state, less than one-third of the eligible voters took the trouble to cast a vote in the first primary.

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In the second primary on June 1, voters across the state have to make their choice in the polls, except for a few local precincts. In the gubernatorial race, Preston Smith and Don Yarbrough face each other, and observers feel that the number of eligible voters who do not vote in the polls might be the winner.

In Tyler County, voters have two runoff contests. These are the sheriff's race between Grady Ray and Lewis E. Craven and the tax assessor-collector contest between A. L. Thornton and Tom Sawyer. All other contests were settled in the first primary.

In the "Get Out the Vote" drive, eligible voters are urged to come out in strong numbers in Tyler County to order to again set a good example for the rest of the state.

Tyler County has 5200 eligible voters and less than 3500 turned out on May 4. If the number going to the polls June 1 falls off sharply, either the sheriff's race or the tax assessor's race could be settled by default.

For that reason, all eligible voters in the county are urged to cast a ballot so that a majority of the people of the county can be said to have chosen the elected officials. Absentee voting is now going on and will continue May 28 for those who will be out of the county on June 1. If you don't vote, don't gripe.

Absentee Voting For 2nd Primary Ends Tuesday

Absentee voting for the second Democratic primary on June 1 began Wednesday and will end at 4 p.m. next Tuesday. Voting by absentee is handled at the county clerk's office in the courthouse. Office hours are 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday. Persons entitled to vote in Texas but who have lived in Tyler County less than the required six months may also vote during the absentee period in the governor's runoff by applying for a ballot at the county clerk's office.

Homecoming At Doucette To Be Held Sunday

The third annual Doucette Homecoming will be held in the old sawmill town three miles north of Woodville Sunday with registration beginning at 9:30 a.m. at the Old Union Church. During the first two homecomings, nearly 300 persons were present and the committee planning this year's event hope that many more than that number will register this year.

Everyone attending is asked to bring a basket lunch for the noon meal. Music and singing will begin at 1:30 p.m. Paul Sundin, district manager of International Paper Company, will give the welcome address at 1:45, and the special guests will be recognized at 2 p.m.

At 2:45 p.m., the second annual "First Citizen Award" will be presented. This award, which was started last year, is made to a person who has made a great contribution through service to the town of Doucette.

Candidates Expenses In County

Candidates for office in Tyler County spent peanuts in their first Democratic primary campaigns as compared to those in larger counties, according to their statements of expenditures filed with County Clerk Otha Miles.

The most expensive one item for county candidates was the filing fee which is based on the salary of the office. Candidates in the primaries are assessed proportionally for the expenses of holding the primary.

As an example, Reis L. Brockman, running for his first elective term as county attorney, reported expenditures of \$295.00--and he did not have an opponent and this was spared the other expenses of making a campaign.

Of the \$295.00, his filing fee was \$270. The other \$25 was for an announcement of his candidacy in the newspaper. Candidates with opposition did not fare so well. In addition to the filing fee and newspaper announcement most of the others had cards printed and handed out the radio and in the newspaper as well as other expenses such as gasoline used to cover the county.

In the first primary, statements filed on expenses show that the incumbent, Grady Ray, spent \$402.51; Webb Ashworth listed expenses of \$586.40, while Lewis Craven spent \$385.80.

Candidates for tax assessor-collector had similar expenses. A. L. Thornton spent \$429.73; Mrs. Audrey E. Hall \$356.40; and Tom Sawyer \$449.70.

In the race for county commissioner of precinct one, Joe L. Best reported expenses of \$434 while his successful opponent, J. Carl Shepherd, reported expenses of \$519.75.

In precinct three, the incumbent commissioner, Leon Fowler, reported that he spent \$308 while Frank S. Grimes listed expenses of \$465.44.

In the precinct one constable race, J. H. Collier reports expenses of \$68 while Harley J. Kimbrough, Jr. spent \$62.75.

In precinct three, where there was a three-way race for the constable nomination, Delbert Harris reported \$65, Harley Crews, \$87.70 and Joe K. Hughes \$141.12.

Also in precinct three, candidates for justice of the peace got off rather light in comparison with county candidates. J. W. Bunn reported

expenses of \$47.24 while Cecil Dubose reported \$42.38.

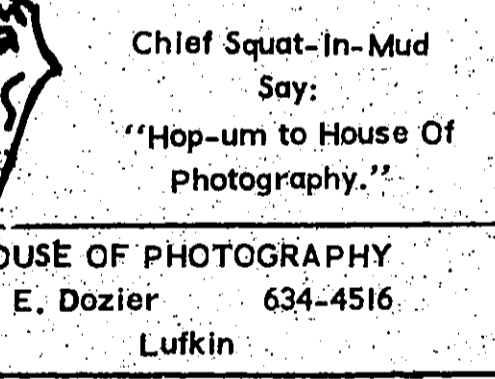

TOWER REPORTS

This week the Senate has been heavily engaged in debate and amendment of the 1968 Law Enforcement Bill. It is clear to us here, just as it is clear to you at home, that this bill probably will be the most important one from this session of Congress.

This Anti-Crime Bill would authorize federal funds for use in strengthening local police forces. A special 15-million-dollar fund would be earmarked for anti-riot work, and another special 15-million-dollar fund would be available to combat organized crime.

This bill also would counteract the effect of recent Supreme Court decisions that have made voluntary confessions inadmissible in many court cases. Provisions of this bill would place the decision about admission of confessions in the hands of the highest state courts, rather than the federal courts.

Special electronic surveillance by law-enforcement officials would be permitted by the bill in national security cases, and the bill would prevent convicted racketeers from holding federal jobs.

It is hoped this bill will be perfected and passed within the next few days. The need for it is great. Our system of law and order, without which all thoughtful Americans, whether in Texas or elsewhere, are unable to carry out their duties in the law-abiding manner which is a part of our national heritage, is being threatened by a series of developments which are being carried out by those who would destroy the law and order upon which our nation's freedom is based.

We have, in that time, never known a more serious threat to the system of law upon which we have built our nation. We are still a law-abiding people, but we are still a long way from being a law-abiding nation. We must take steps to strengthen our system of law and order, and this bill is one of the most important steps we can take.

The bill would provide for the following:

- Special electronic surveillance by law-enforcement officials would be permitted by the bill in national security cases, and the bill would prevent convicted racketeers from holding federal jobs.
