ant trees in the East Texas region of our state? "Not so," says Jimmy Hull, assistant forester with the Texas Forest Service in Woodville. Over 265,000 young seedlings were planted this past year in 90 counties outside the East Texas Pineywoods area. Lobiolly pine was the favorite species planted in Texas with 5,062,750. Slash pine was second with 2,102,450 seedlings planted. Other species planted were Shortleaf, Austrian and Ponderosa pines, red cedar, and several broadless species. These included black locust, black walnut, catolpa, chinese elm, cottonwood, mulberry, osage orange, rose multiflora, sycamore, euonymus and butfaloberry.

Seedlings are sold each year by the Texas Forest Service and orders are now being taken for next year's planting sea-

Know Danger Signals For Appliances

Sick appliances have warning symptoms as do sick people, says. W. S. Allen, Extension agricultural engineer, Texas A&M University, If heeded, these warnings may prevent fire, damage to property and langers to personal health. Here are the four main symntoms as listed by the engineer

Is your appliance blinking on and off? If it is, you're being warned that there is a loose connection somewhere. It may be only a loose screw, but repairing it is a good idea. Ever touch an appliance and feel a little tingle? This is another sign of trouble. It calls for close inspection for cose wiring or poor insulation. In some cases, the appliance

may need a ground wire. Watch out for the short cl cuit. A symptom of this is a shock from a metal lamp base The trouble is usually expose

Blown fuses or tripped circuits, after plugging in your appliance, point to a serious ma lady--an overload. This is major cause of fires within the home. Too many appliance on one circuit throw your elec trical system out of balance Something has to give, and too often it's the homeowner.
