1,379,741 Voted In Dem Runoff

Dallas — The final tabulation from the Texas Election Bureau for Saturday's Democratic runoff election shows a total vote of 1,379,741. In the governor's race winner Preston Smith received 758,554. Don Yarborough had 621,487. Smith carried 217 counties. Yarborough 38 and one county. Jasper had a tie with 1788 for each candidate.

Thornton To Ask Recount

Ray, Sawyer Win In Close Vote

Tyler County voters were almost evenly divided in support of candidates in the four runoff contests on the second Democratic primary Saturday in which over 3200 ballots were cast. The closest race was in the tax assessor-collector race in which Tom Sawyer led A. L. Thornton, the incumbent, by a 10-vote margin in official returns. Sawyer received 1802 votes to 1592 for Thornton.

The next closest contest in the county was in the vote for the candidates for governor. Don Yarborough received 1624 votes in the county to Preston Smith's 1591, a margin of 73 votes. Don Adams of Jasper and J. E. Miller, Jr. of Burkeville also had a close race in the county with Miller leading by 112 votes; 1818 to 1506. In the four counties in the district Adams was the apparent winner by 172 votes, 6892 to 6720. Grady Ray won re-election as sheriff of Tyler County by 113 votes in official returns. He received 1975 votes to 1562 for Lewis Craven.

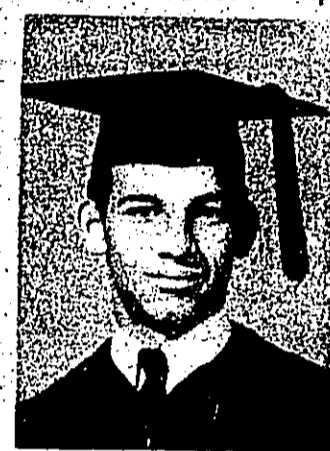
This is the closest election in Tyler County in the memory of oldtimers and certainly the closest for all contests on the ballot. Only 908 total votes separated the eight candidates in the four races. In all four counties in district seven for state representative, the two candidates evenly divided the counties. Miller carried Tyler and Newton counties while Adams carried Hardin and Jasper counties. Votes in unofficial returns from each of the other counties in district seven are: Newton, 1,415 for Miller and 894 for Adams; Jasper, 1,548 for Miller and 2,025 for Adams; and Hardin, 2,140 for Miller and 2,487 for Adams. With Tyler County's ballots added to each

candidate total, the margin for Adams was 172 votes. In the governor's race in the county, Yarborough carried 10 of the 15 voting boxes while Smith carried five plus the absentee vote. A heavy 631 to 398 margin for Smith in the Woodville box helped cut Yarborough's margin in the county to 73 votes, however. In the state representative race, Adams carried nine boxes in the county but lost the county to Miller by 112 votes. In the Woodville box, Adams carried it over Miller by only two votes, 512 to 510, while in Rockland the candidates tied at 46 for each. Campground gave Adams a one-vote margin, 17 to 16. Sheriff Grady Ray carried eight boxes, including absentee, and lost eight in his close contest with Lewis Craven. Ray carried the county by 108 votes and results in some of the voting boxes show the closeness of the race. Craven's carried Warren by seven votes and Campground by one vote while Ray carried another close box, Town Bluff, by nine votes.

In the race for assessor-collector, each candidate carried eight boxes (including the absentee) although several were close. Sawyer led by 10 votes overall, and the vote was fairly close in each voting precinct. Sawyer had a 95 vote margin in Woodville's precinct in which over 1000 votes were cast while the largest margin was won by Thornton in Colmesneil where he received 220 to 118 for Sawyer, a 112 vote margin. Narrowest margin was at Hillisler, where Sawyer led by three votes. The Tyler County Democratic executive met at 10 a.m. Tuesday to make its official certification of the results. Only two small errors in addition were found.

A. L. Thornton said Tuesday following the official canvass of votes cast in Saturday's runoff primary that he will begin preparing forms to seek a recount of ballots in each box. Thornton was apparently the loser by 10 votes in the primary to Tom Sawyer, who received 1802 votes to Thornton's 1592. Due to the small margin, chances for error in any of 15 precinct boxes and absentee tabulations might show that he is the winner, Thornton said. Application for a recount will be made through the State Democratic Executive committee which will authorize the recount in races in which there is a 5 percent or less margin between the candidates. He will entitle Thornton to a recount, according to this interpretation of the law.

MAY RAINFALL TOTALS 9.66; JUNE STARTS WET

Rainfall in May totaled 9.66 inches at the Texas Forest Service district headquarters south of Woodville. Heavier rains were reported in other sections of the county but were not officially gauged. The heaviest rain recorded at the forest service was 4.57 inches on May 12. On May 12 the gauge recorded 1.12 and on May 18 another 1.97 was recorded. Lighter precipitation fell on other days bringing the total up to 9.66. June started off wet with .42 of an inch being recorded early Sunday.

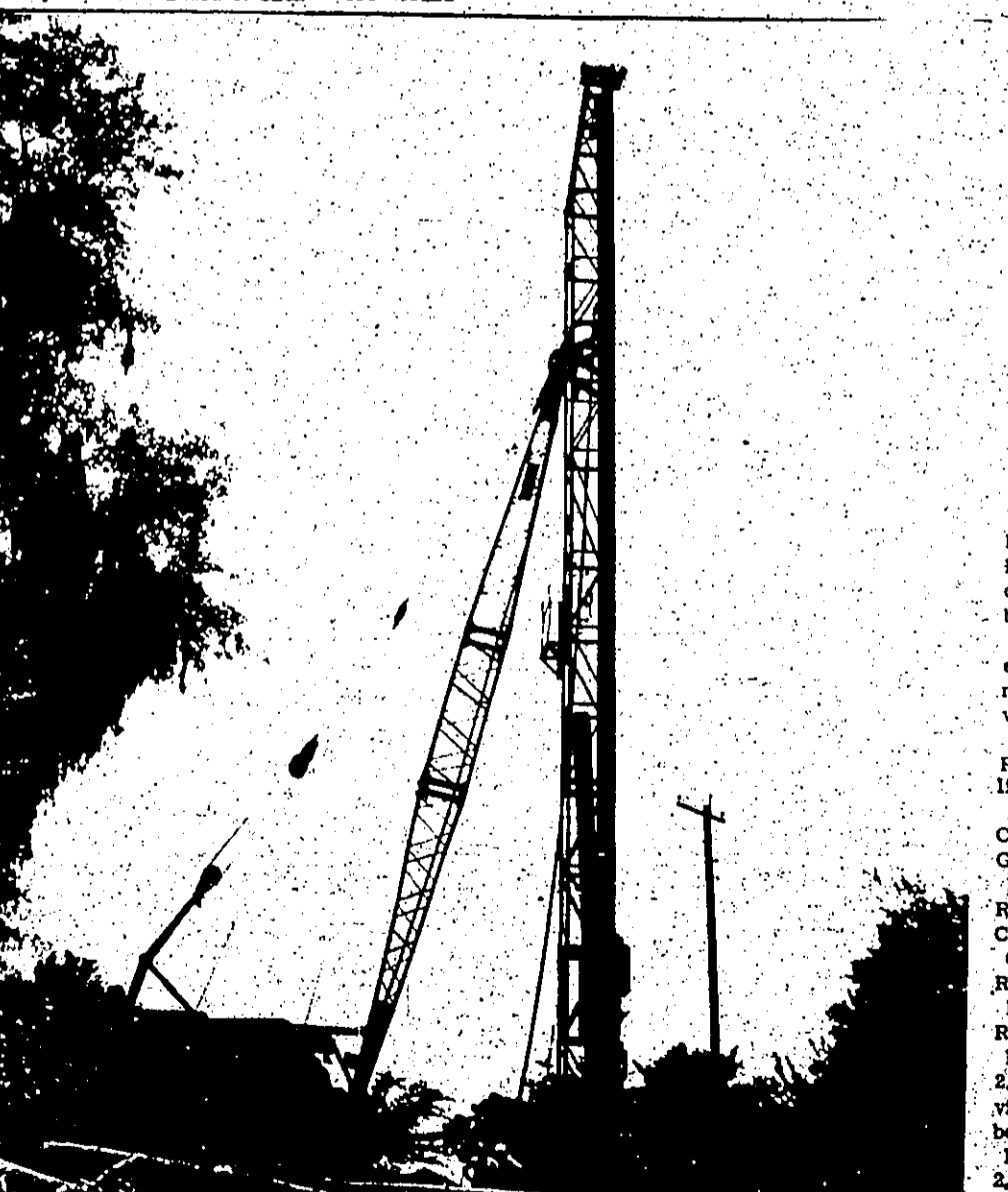

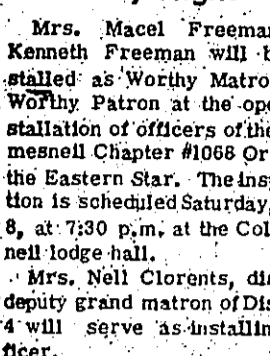
Gail Phillips Receives Club Scholarship

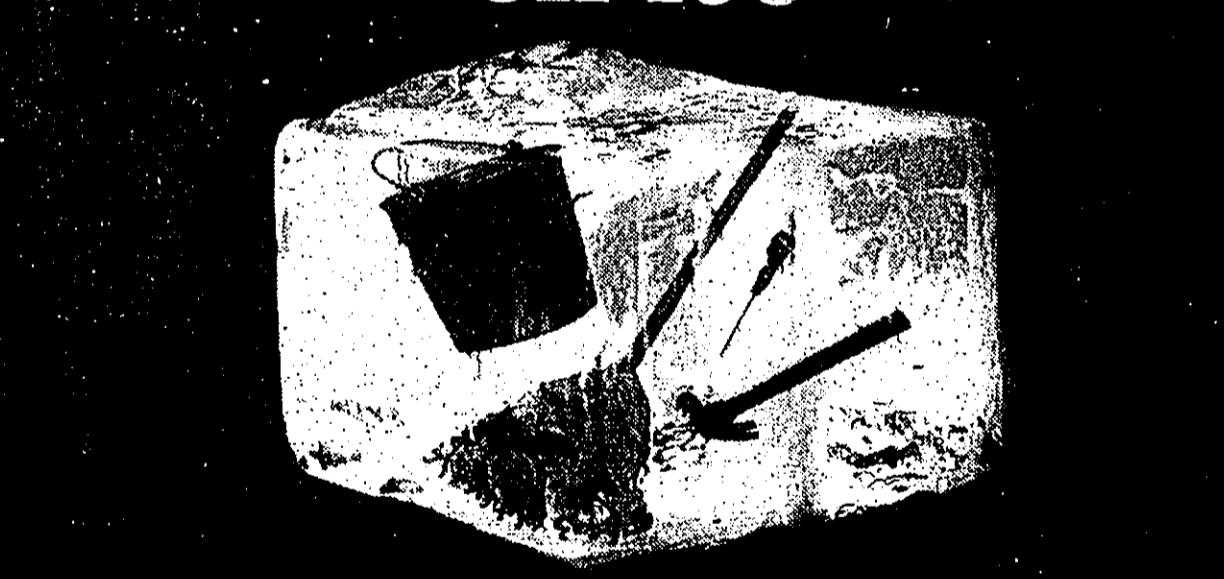

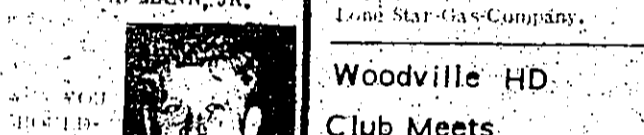

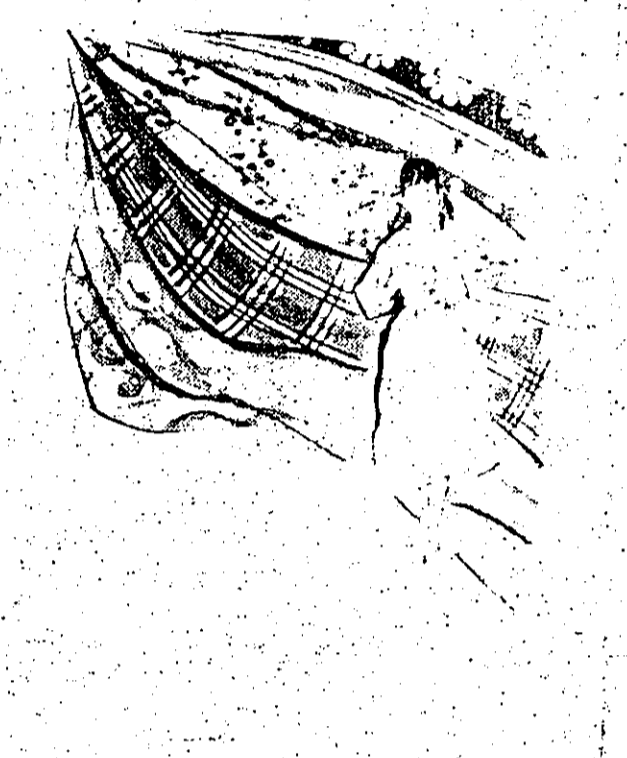

STATE CAPITOL HIGHLIGHTS & SIDELIGHTS

Texas' Constitutional Revision Commission has completed its series of winter and spring sessions, rewriting the Texas charter of government. It will not meet again until August.

Any fair analysis of the status of constitutional revision in Texas would have to be based on a note of pessimism regarding the chances for ultimate acceptance of the committee's work to date.

Main problem for the revisionists to overcome was created when the Commission was established by a divided legislature in the spring of 1967.

Originally, the Commission was formed by a 10-10 vote in the House and Senate. However, the Senate refused to go along with the plan of the House and the House then passed a bill to create a House Committee, but it was vetoed by the Governor.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Editor, The Booster:

In your issue of June 3, 1968, you published a letter from me regarding the proposed new law regarding the sale of alcohol. I am writing to you again to express my concerns regarding this proposed law.

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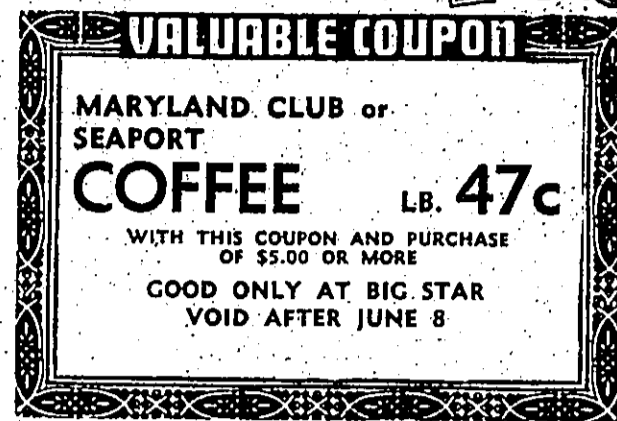
