A true American criticizes his government if he thinks it needs it, but at the same time, respects its authority, which he, as a voter and taxpayer have given it. He may not agree with the president of the United States, but again, he respects the president as the leader of the people, and as a man who does his best to provide the country with a firm hand of guidance.

See if you measure up to a true American. Probably, like the rest of us, you fall quite a ways short. We are all so involved with ourselves that patriotism seems a waste of time, just as religion does. Of course that's not the way it is. Patriotism should occupy a good part of our time. Try to bring more of it into your life, and make next July fourth a bit more American.

TEX-LA NECHES-VALLEY SINGING CONVENTION SLATED JULY 20-21 IN PORT ARTHUR

The 64th Semi-Annual session of the Tex-La Neches-Valley Singing Convention, known as nation's greatest gospel song festival, will meet in its summer session, July 20-21st, in the air conditioned Labor Temple in Port Arthur, Texas and is expected to attract 5,000 gospel singers and lovers of sacred music, who will attend from some ten states and parts of Canada. Stamps-Baxter Music Co. of Dallas, Jeffreys Music Co. of Arkansas, Vaughn Co. of Tennessee, and Hartford-National Co. will send representatives.

Following introductions and recognitions of visitors, the song program will begin and last until 10:30 p.m.

Sunday's program will start at 9:00 a.m. with a short church service and sermon by one of the many ministers attending. Singing will get underway at 9:30 a.m. and last all day closing at 4:00 p.m.

Cpl. John D. Powell, Jr. of the 1st Battalion, 11th Marines, was killed in action June 30 in the vicinity of Quang Tri, Vietnam. He suffered fragmentation wounds to his head from hostile artillery fire from a defensive position.

Cpl. Powell of Rockland attended school in Colmesneil and Weimar, Texas and entered the armed service in 1966 at the age of 17. He was a Baptist.

Survivors include his mother, Mary L. Craven of Woodville; his father, John D. Powell, Sr. of Rockland; five sisters, Tina, Eva, Madeline and Carmen Powell of Woodville, Christina Powell of Port Arthur; four brothers, Stanley, Louis, Mark and William Powell of Woodville; one half-brother, Paul Powell, and one step-brother, James Craven; grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Balsam of Port Arthur, and Mrs. Clem Tate of Rockland.

No funeral arrangements will be made until the body is brought back to the States.

This public water system will be designed to serve those members residing in the communities of Camp Ground and Harmony, located west of Woodville.

A public meeting of all interested persons will be held Friday at 7:00 p.m. in the Camp Ground Church. At this meeting, all members will be located on an area scale map, then the system will be designed to serve only those persons who have made their deposit and filled out an application form. Those persons who for some reason have not become charter members of the water system, will not be considered in its design. The total cost estimate will then be computed, and the entire design criteria submitted for approval of the loan.

Everyone is urged to attend this very important meeting on Friday. This meeting will serve as the deadline date for taking members into this water system and will give the Engineer the starting point for the application for this loan.

Kaye is serving as Area IX fifth vice-president. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roger T. Williams of Woodville. Lu Ann is serving as Area IX second vice-president. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Billy Max Nowlin of Spurger. They joined 119 other FHAs and 34 advisors to represent the Texas Association at the national meeting.

The theme of the meeting is "Citizenship - A Challenge to Growth." Twelve hundred youth delegates, selected on a

state quota basis, and some 300 adult advisors who are state home economics staff members or local home economics teachers, are attending. Mrs. Betty Romans, State Advisor for FHA in Texas, says the youth members of FHA not only plan their own national meetings but actually run it.

"Each state has a particular assignment," Mrs. Romans points out, "so that every teenage delegate will have some special responsibility to carry out during the week. This makes the meeting a practical demonstration of the ability of today's youth to work constructively toward an overall goal of helping individuals improve personal, family, and community living." The Texas

delegation has the responsibility of conducting the roll call of states, providing listening teams for one general session, and serve as leader for one of the idea swap shops.

The teenage convention will have a full four-day program which includes outstanding speakers, business meetings, sessions, and all-state chorus, national projects reports, discussion groups, and idea swap shops.

Of particular importance is the election of twelve national officers for 1968-69. Election results will be announced at noon on July 10 and new officers installed at the Thursday night banquet meeting. Future Homemakers of America is a national organization of home economics students in junior and senior high schools. A self-supporting, non-profit organization, it is sponsored by the U. S. Office of Education and the American Home Economics Association.

The Kirby High Chapter of Kirby High School has 195 members. The membership in the Texas Association is 7,150 members in 1,544 chapters. Homemaking teachers in the junior and senior high schools serve as advisors to local chapters. The overall program of Future Homemakers of America in Texas functions under the direction of the Division of Homemaking Education, State Department of Education, with Mrs. Elizabeth F. Smith, Austin, director, and Mrs. Betty Romans, consultant, and state advisor of Future Homemakers, also of Austin.

As the Future Homemakers of America begin their twenty-third year, they count over 600,000 members in more than 12,000 high school chapters throughout the United States and Puerto Rico.

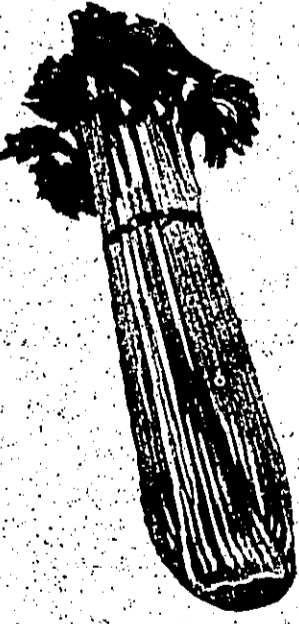
