I've gone on record a couple of times as being in favor of helping out the Alabama-Coushatta Indians. My views remain the same. The Indians on their reservation between Woodville and Livingston have really done something to provide a tourist attraction of East Texas, other than our bevy of fine lakes. The Indians have provided people visiting in our area the chance to see just what the "Old West" really looked like in relation to the Indians.

However, the state legislature in their special session turned down a request for funds for the reservation. The Federal Government made a grant of some \$200,000 dollars to the Indians, to be matched by state funds, yet, the Red Tapers in Austin were more concerned with putting more taxes on us, and refuting the people's wishes in turning down a liquor by the drink bill, to give any thought to the plight of the American Indians. In Texas, we have only two tribes of Indians remaining, the Alabama-Coushatta and the El Tequis, who live near El Paso. Something needs to be done.

I guess it's more important to the Legislators to make sure that there's enough taxes on the people of Texas to insure the operation of the State Government than there is to giving the helping hand to Texas first citizens. Sure, we have to operate a State Government.... That's just another fact of life. But, we want to say that a lot more concern should be shown the Indians.... they have built up their reservation to the point that it is a major drawing card to East Texas. It brings a lot of our people here. But it seems that our East Texas legislators don't have much concern as to how East Texas prospers and grows.

I want to give credit to the Indians and their administrator, Walt Broemer, recently the Beaumont City council approved the moving of the Beaumont buffalo herd to the Alabama-Coushatta Reservation.... the Indians are now in the process of building a pen to hold the animals and bring them back. This shows the initiative of the Indians to really try to provide an even greater tourist attraction for folks coming to East Texas.... Let's get behind the Indians and show them that after all the pushing around they have gotten from the "White man" for the past century can be turned around and that true generosity and concern for the needs of others motivates us instead of the I don't care attitude.

Look out, football will be here before we know it. Dizzy Brown and I were talking about the fact that just as soon as Little League is finished, it will be time for football season... the first game will be the first week in September... be ready and go out to boost the Kirby High Eagles....

## Tribal Council Asks For New Superintendent

Members of the Texas Commission of Indian Affairs will meet with the Tribal Council Friday at the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation to discuss the disension which has developed between the council and the state-employed superintendent, Walter W. Broemer.

The simmering discontent of the Indians with the administration of Broemer came into the open late last week when the first chief, B. Cooper Sylvestine, wrote a letter to the chairman of the Indian Affairs Commission, Dempsey Henley of Liberty, asking that the superintendent be removed and an Indian employed as superintendent.

Both Henley and Broemer said that they would like to see Indians appointed business manager and assistant superintendent in order to train them for leadership positions on the reservation.

In his letter, Chief Sylvestine wrote that as long as a non-Indian tries to lead, his people the division among them will continue to exist.

It was reported that petitions were being circulated among the approximately 400 Indians who live on the reservation asking for the superintendent's dismissal.

The biggest complaint the Indians seem to have against Broemer is that he has been making decisions and taking action on his own in operating the flourishing tourist business of the reservation. He does not consult with the tribal council regarding Tribal Enterprises, the tourist development agency set up at the reservation, they claim.

Another source of contention was Broemer's proposal that \$75,000 in oil and gas lease funds be used primarily for Tribal Enterprises purposes. He urged that \$50,000 be spent on the tourist enterprises, and a small amount to improve and enlarge the 72 homes on the reservation.

The Tribal Council rejected his proposal and allotted \$27,000 to Tribal Enterprises to pay on its debts and \$38,490 for building and maintaining homes.

In his letter, Chief Sylvestine also took exception with a story in a Houston newspaper which quoted Henley, himself, as saying that the recent session of the state legislature had "scalped" the Indians by eliminating funds for the tourist development projects. The chief said that the article was degrading to the Indians, that the non-Indian always exaggerated to get more funds for the reservation, and "it makes us feel poor and ignorant."

Broemer has answered the recent criticism by pointing out that the reservation has made great strides in the 11 years he has been superintendent. He said that the average income on the reservation has risen from \$1,500 to more than \$3,200. He said that 80 Indians were now employed in the tourist development projects and more will be employed as the tourist industry is expanded. Broemer said that they had a good business and that every-

### Freak Accidents Claim Two Lives In Past Week

Two out of county men died in Tyler County last week in two freak accidents. Both accidents happened north of Woodville.

A 43 year old Grovesman, Joe Rogers, was killed Friday when a log rolled off a truck and struck him in the back. He was pronounced dead on arrival at Tyler County Hospital, as he was brought in by an Edwards Funeral Home Ambulance. The accident occurred as Rogers was loading logs on a truck near the Camden Hunting Club, some nine miles northwest of Woodville.

The second freak accident came one day later, when a 23 year old Grovesman, Tommy Jordan, of 6825 Washington St. was fatally injured when the horse he was riding threw him. The accident occurred at Colmesnell. Jordan was pronounced dead on arrival at the Tyler County Hospital Saturday afternoon. He was the grandson of Tom McClain of Spurger, a well known Tyler Countian.

Mr. Smith has been a pastor in the East Texas and Southeast Texas area for the past 15 years. He has served as a Baptist pastor in Gooch, Chiba, Vidor and Devers, Texas.

Prior to this he received his ministerial training from Baylor, attended Lamar College and is an alumnus of East Texas Baptist College in Marshall, Texas.

While a pastor in Vidor he participated in a study at Rusk State Hospital in pastoral care of troubled persons. This study was led by Dr. James Kreimeyer, M. D., clinical director of the Institution.

Bro. Smith spent his early years in Houston. He served in the Army in World War II in the 13th Armored Division in both the Atlantic and Pacific Theaters, and was discharged in 1945 with the rank of First Sergeant.

Time spent eliminating hazards and unsafe practices would well be the most important undertaking on the farm this year. Because farm accidents cost the nation almost \$2 billion each year.

The week of July 21 has been designated by President Johnson as National Farm Safety Week, and a time when farm families are urged to take a closer look at their own situation.

When our nation was very young, a man wrestled a living from the land as best he could. His tools were primitive, his productivity low, his work hard.

Today, the technological revolution has made the American farmer food supplier to the world. His produce feeds his family, his neighbors, his countrymen, and thousands abroad.

Yet that same revolution has brought unforeseen dangers. Modern farming is a complex and highly skilled profession.

Agriculture currently ranks third among our industries in accidental death rate. Thousands of farm residents are killed every year in accidents.

More than 700,000 others are disabled. The cost to the nation is almost \$2 billion. The cost in anguish is incalculable.

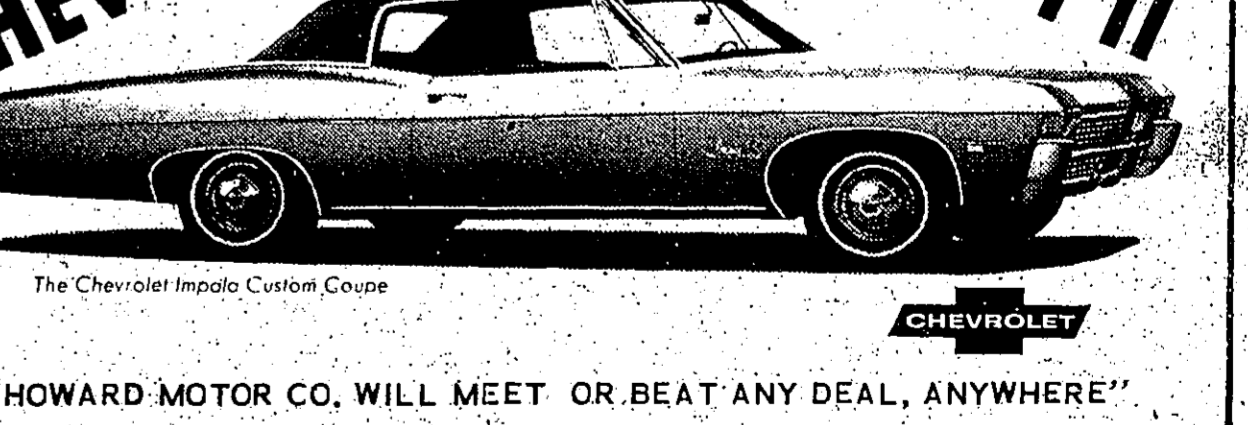

Break for Veterans?  
Three men apply for a single government job. One is a war veteran, the other two are not. Should the first man get the job just because he is a veteran?  
To some degree, veterans have been getting this kind of a break ever since Civil War days. The motive, of course, is to give them extra reward for their service to the nation.  
Still, they get the reward at the expense of non-veterans who might legitimately complain of discrimination.  
I know the law may... and often they, given reasonable advantages to veterans in the matter of hiring. For instance, the federal civil service law gives them extra preference, advantage in case of discharge.  
In one case, a veteran employed at a federal hospital was first on charges that he had stolen two fresh with certain young women at a party.  
But he was reinstated when the management failed to comply with sufficient details of the alleged misconduct. The court said he had been given the consideration to which a veteran was entitled.  
A public service feature of the American Bar Association and the State Bar of Texas, Warrenton, WA, is a booklet, "What a Veteran is Entitled To."
