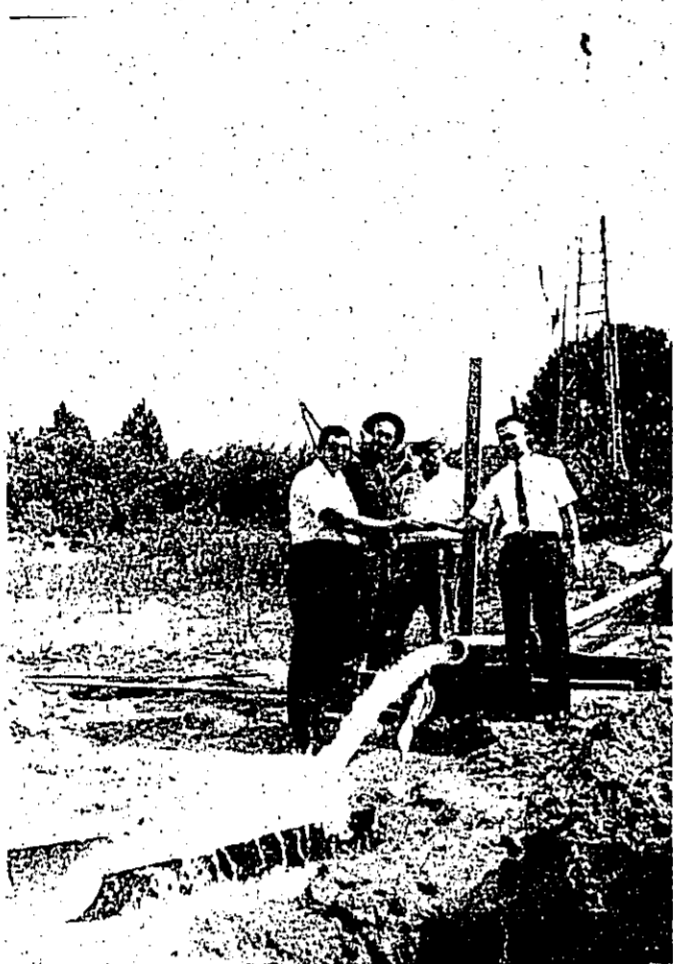

The new \$200,000 type 3 nursing home is to begin accepting residents Monday, Smith said, although the landscaping of the grounds and some finishing work is not completed. The 72-bed home was started in March on land acquired from the county just west of the Tyler County Hospital. It is the highest rated nursing facility under State Department of Health specifications with every modern device for patient care including medical examination facilities for use by physicians. The nursing center is constructed of brick with an area of 14,000 square feet so planned that additions can be made when needed. It has a spacious lobby which will have color televisions and a chapel for use by residents and guests. A administrator of the facility is Rowat Smith, Mrs. Smith, a registered nurse, will be in charge of nursing care. Dr. Ryder Stockdale is president of the corporation with Clinch McMillan and Clint Hines, vice-presidents, and John Karcher, secretary and treasurer. The public is welcome to view the facilities any time between the hours of 2 and 5 p.m. Sunday, M. Smith said. The officers and administrator are proud of the fine building and the extensive nursing care which it will offer, he said, and they want the people of Tyler County to visit it and see the excellent accommodations and patient-care facilities it will offer.

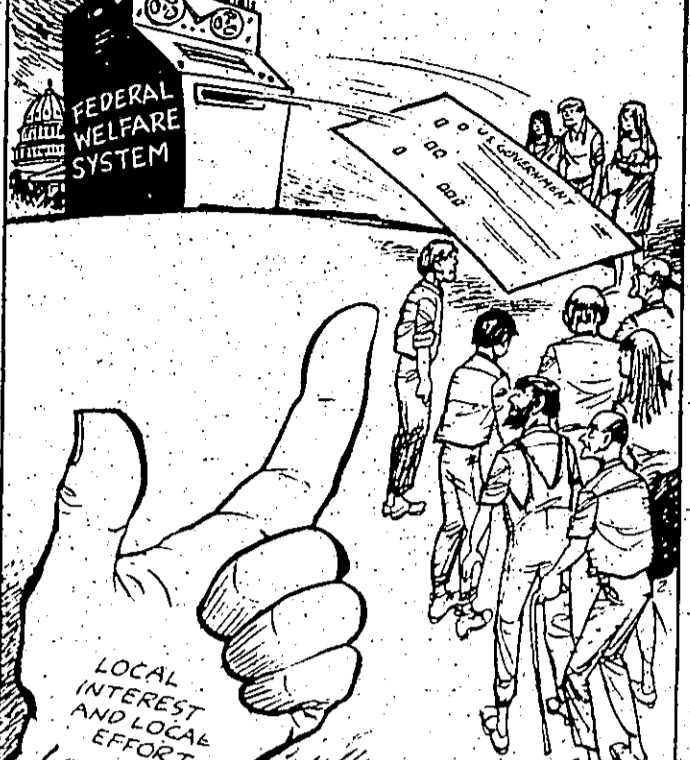

Social Security Play Up Sharply In County

A record \$179,030 was paid out in social security cash benefits to 2482 residents of Tyler County for February, according to L. H. James, Social Security District Manager, Lufkin. This is an increase of \$27,713 over the amount paid out for December, the last previous month for which figures are available. In January, 1968, was the first month in which increased benefits were paid to the Social Security recipients.

With July, the amount of monthly benefits exceeds \$2 million. The increase above the December figure is more than \$1 million. More than 100,000 people are now receiving benefits, and the number is expected to increase as the number of people who are eligible for benefits increases.

Of the total amount of benefits paid in February, \$119,030 was for old age and survivors benefits, \$59,776 for disabled workers, \$129,000 for unemployment insurance, \$15,044 for medical insurance, \$19,075 for children, \$27,000 for widows, \$20,552 for widowers and \$18,000 for dependents. The total amount of benefits paid in February was \$2,482,030.
