The Tyler County Little League season came to an end Friday night with the winner's trophy going to the Colts, who finished four games ahead of the Yankees. The Colts were awarded the winner's trophy at ceremonies preceding the final game Friday night, and the Yankees were presented the second-place trophy.

Also preceding the final game was the crowning of this year's queen, who is Miss Leasa Cain. She was crowned by the outgoing queen, Miss Pam Stillwagon.

Toby Spurlock, league president, presided at the awards and crowning ceremonies. Mr. Spurlock was lauded for his service as league president this year.

Pre-School Clinic To Be Conducted From August 19-23

The annual pre-school clinic for beginning first grade students will be conducted this week of August 19 through August 23. The homemaking students of the high school homemaking department will conduct the activities of the clinic under the supervision of Mrs. Marion Tidwell, advisor.

The activities will take place in the primary building on the elementary campus from 8:30 through 11:15 each morning. Students should report to the activity room in the primary building to be registered by the students. Important activities are planned for each morning throughout the week.

The following items should be presented at the time of registration: a copy of birth certificate (hospital certificates are not acceptable), an immunization record for Smallpox, DPT, Polio, and Measles (shots or statement that child has had disease).

The purpose of this clinic is to acquaint the beginners with the school and its facilities well before school begins. The teachers will have an opportunity to observe and become acquainted with the students and become aware of each of the children's special needs. It will also eliminate the mass of beginning preparations that would take away the teachers' time after school has begun.

District Governor To Visit Local Rotary Club Tonight

Woodville Rotarians will welcome on August 8 the Governor of Rotary district 591, D. D. (Dave) Wiltshire of Port Arthur.

He will address the Rotary Club of Woodville, one of 30 in his district, and will confer with Henry M. Durham, president of the local Rotary club, and with other club officials to obtain information on the group's plans for its service activities and to offer suggestions on Rotary administrative matters.

Mr. Wiltshire is one of 288 Rotary governors in all parts of the world who are serving as representatives of Rotary International in districts composed of member clubs. Each district leader is responsible for supervising the clubs in his area. Rotary, an international men's service organization has more than 632,000 members in some 13,256 clubs in 143 countries.

A member and past president of the Rotary Club of Port Arthur, Texas, Mr. Wiltshire is owner of Texas Electronics Company. He was elected to office at the Rotary Convention

in Mexico City, in May, 1968, and will serve until June 30, 1969.

Though a seasoned Rotarian before his election to the office of district governor, Mr. Wiltshire attended an eight-day international assembly last May at Lake Placid, New York, at which all Rotary governors for 1968-69 attended in-depth seminars to plan for their jobs. One of his biggest jobs will be to hold a district conference of all Rotary clubs in this area. The conference will be held March 27-28-29, 1969, in Lutkin, at the Angelina Hotel.

Tyler County is on the grow. Perhaps not too many of our readers are aware of the many building programs and expansion of others which reflect this steady growth which the county has been experiencing for the past few years.

With the opening of the new

Woodville Nursing Center, a \$300,000 facility on which construction began in April, building in the county now underway will exceed the million-dollar mark.

Besides the nursing center, construction is now underway on the Pine Hills Rural Recrea-

tion development just west of the airport and the 56 unit low-rent housing project on two locations in south Woodville, and the new plant for TYCO Feed Company on the railroad at Pavilion street. Also construction has begun on the new building for the Church of Jesus Christ of

Latter Day Saints (Mormon) on North Beech Street.

Other additions in the city of Woodville include the expansion at Heritage Garden Museum, the drilling of an additional water well and construction of a ground tank and an overhead tank by the City of Woodville. Radio Station KVLL went on the air in April and the Woodville schools completed a building program to replace buildings lost by fire and tornado. Citizens State Bank has a new TV drive-in banking service and enlarged the main bank building last year also.

Also in Woodville as well as across the county many new homes have been and are being constructed. Housing developments around lake subdivisions and along the Neches river and Dam B are bringing in new residents and many part-time residents.

Chester, which was recently incorporated, has a new housing development in the beginning stage with the acquisition of the land a reality. The city also is adding a water system, and the local lumber mill is being modernized and improved.

Probably the biggest development at Colmesneil is the work which is beginning on a new modern telephone system. Colmesneil Telephone Company has secured a long-term loan which will enable it to build a modern exchange and widen its service to the rural areas around the town. Underground cables are planned, even in the rural areas, to give a trouble-free and efficient telephone service to the communities it serves.

Colmesneil now has natural gas with United Gas Company serving the town. The Colmesneil school buildings are being improved and enlarged to care for present and future growth. The school improvement work is expected to be completed in time for the fall opening.

Lake Amanda and other lake-front subdivisions have brought in many new and part-time residents here also. Lake Texas, the swimming and camping recreation east of town, was recently improved and the facilities upgraded.

Warren, which recently organized a water corporation, has had a steady growth in recent years because of lake subdivisions, and the many county homes being built and which have been built in that part of the county. A new Church of Christ building is now under construction there.

East of Hillister are many new homes, and the old saw mill site is now the plant for United Portable Building, which has had a phenomenal growth during the past year. This growth of fine new homes also extends to Spurger and the Fred area. The Spurger Baptist Church, which has a new sanctuary only a few years old, has just dedicated a new educational building and upgraded the sanctuary. Incidentally, Spurger is the home of the current Tyler County Dogwood Festival queen, Miss Dell Jordan.

New homes are still being built in the Dam B area and along the river south of the dam site. Fairview Baptist Church, in the midst of the growth of new residents and weekend homes, broke ground for a new church building last Sunday.

Harmony and Campground communities west of Woodville have organized a water supply corporation to serve the families in that area.

There are many other improvements and signs of growth which are evident throughout the county and perhaps we have missed some larger ones. However, those listed here are indications of a "Tyler County on the Grow."

Chamber Members Increase 100%

During the past eighteen months the membership in the Chamber of Commerce has increased 100%. Many members have increased their financial support, some as much as four times their previous commitment.

Efforts are being made to secure right-of-way surveys for extension of FM 2628 from Colmesneil East to the river and FM 92 North from Hwy 160 to Rockland. An organization has been formed to provide information showing the need for improving and widening Hwy. 69.

The youth center is now in operation and is proving very popular with our young people. Some improvements are needed to adequately provide for the young people using this facility. New members since last report are L. M. Fagin Insurance Agency, United Portable Building Co., Shepherd's Gulf Service Station, and Woodville Nursing Center.

DETTA APPROVES NEW ASSOCIATION FOR THREE GREAT LAKES

In a busy monthly session directors of the Deep East Texas Development Association approved formation of a Lakes Association, inked a contract for a second national Bass Tournament for Sam Rayburn Reservoir in October, heard various reports from officials and committees then enjoyed a buffet luncheon at the Dogwood Motor Hotel where they met for the session.

Principal speaker for the business session was Dr. P. Teller, deputy director of the Texas Water Quality Board from Austin. Teller reported on water pollution and garbage disposal in Texas.

Proving Pain

As the result of an auto accident, you are left with continuing pains in your shoulder. At least, so you say. But the driver of the other car thinks you are faking. If it comes to a showdown in court, would your word alone—without supporting evidence—be enough grounds for collecting damages?

Fortunately, however, there are usually other ways—besides the claimant's own testimony—to establish that he does have pain. Most persuasive is medical evidence. Although a doctor cannot actually feel a patient's pain, he can find out a great deal through his instruments. For example:

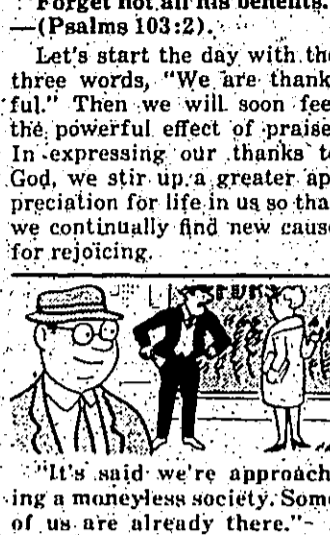
Pain may speed the patient's pulse. It may affect his blood pressure, his metabolism, and his respiration. It may even put extra zigzags into his electrocardiogram. Moreover, a doctor can learn much simply by watching a patient's expression. As one judge put it: "There are symptoms of pain that write their story on one's countenance as clearly as lightning scribbles in the sky."

Will a court listen also to the non-scientific observations of a layman? Generally yes, because these too may be revealing. SOX PROTECT REELS Wring roris in old heavy woolen socks. Keeps scribbles off.

USE TALCUM ON LURES Talcum powder dusted on rubber or skinned lures will keep them from sticking together.

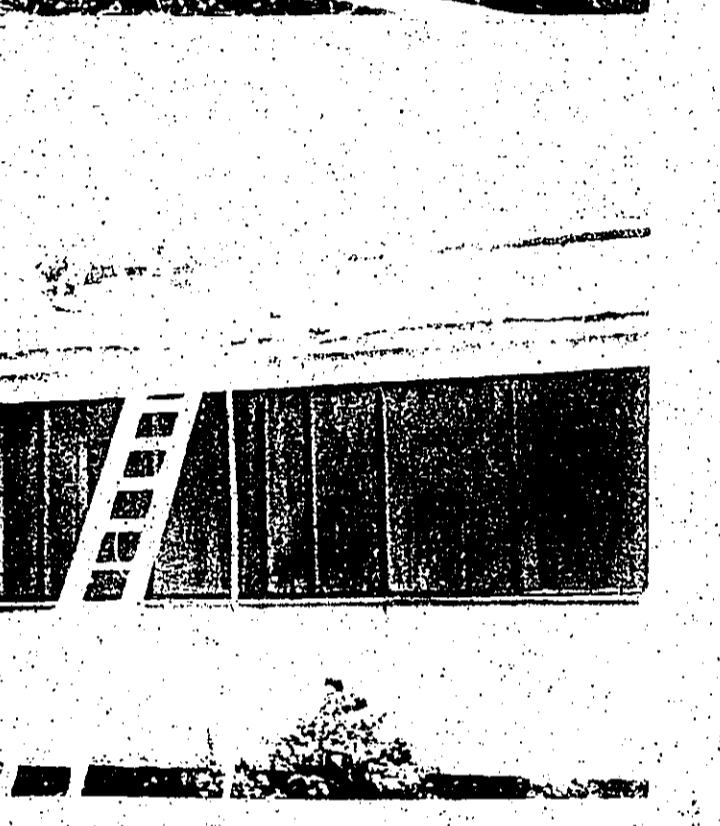


FIRE AT IVANHOE

STATE CAPITOL HIGHLIGHTS & SIDELIGHTS

LITTLE CHANGE—A subcommittee of the 25-member committee which is working on revisions of the Texas constitution has recommended to the full committee that closed sessions of the Texas Senate be abolished.

Texas' constitution now allows the Senate to lock its doors when it considers approval or rejection of persons nominated to state offices by the governor.

Subcommittee headed by Rep. Dick Cory of Victoria voted down a proposal to allow biennial sessions to vote. Also, it did agree to rejoin the present system of legislative sessions every other year.

WELFARE REDUCTIONS—Some needy families with dependent children will be getting a reduction in state welfare aid effective September 1. Reason is that a U. S. Supreme Court ruling that no

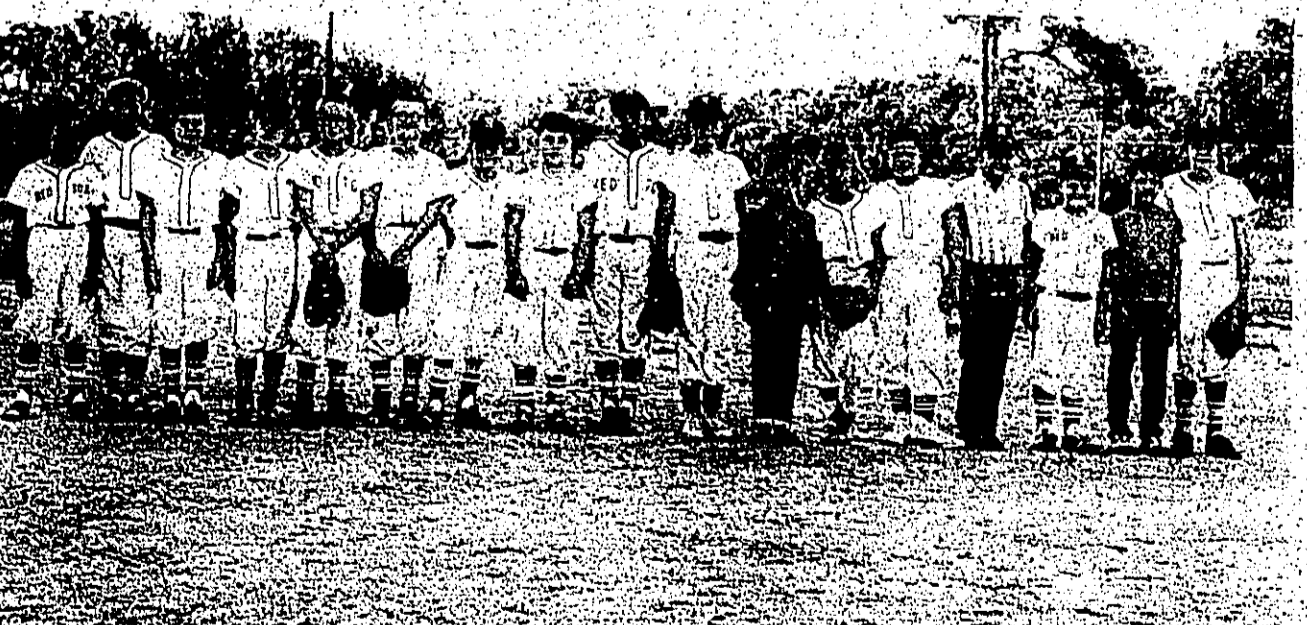
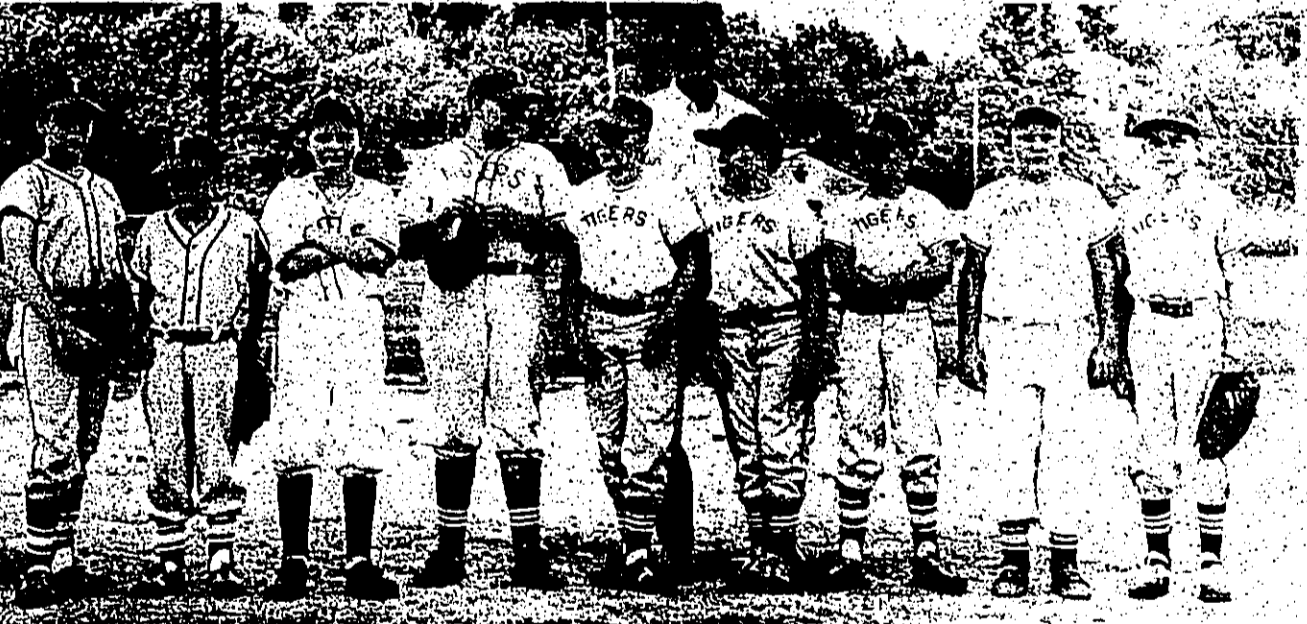
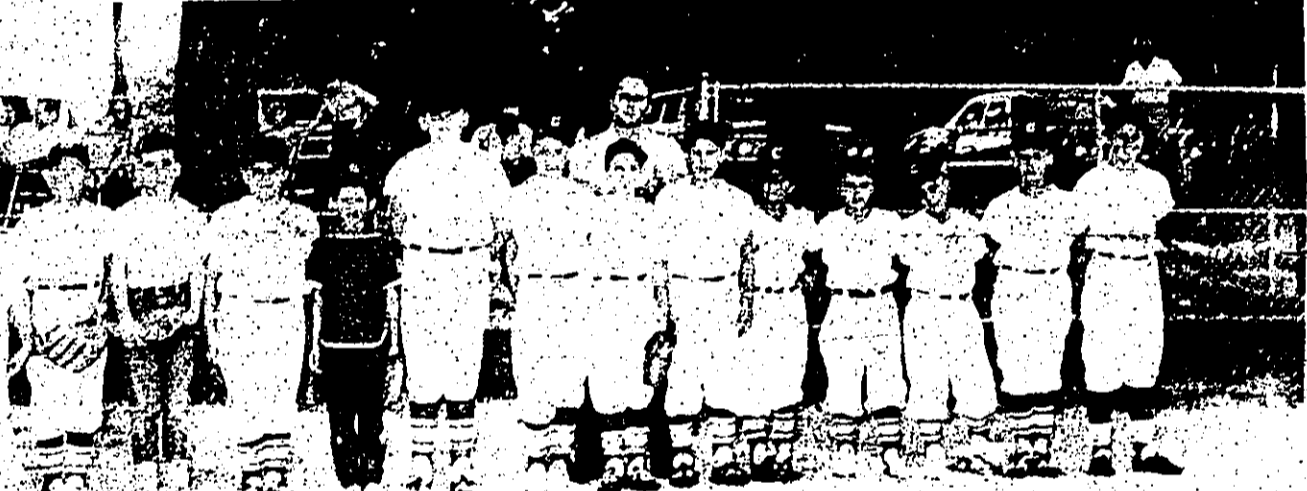
A: For individuals it is retroactive to April 1, 1968, and for corporations the effective date is retroactive to January 1, 1968.

Q: How much is this surcharge?


A: The annual income tax surcharge is an additional 10 percent of the tax to be paid by both individuals and corporations. However, because the effective date for individuals is April 1, 1968, the amount of the tax actually will be increased by only 7 1/2 per cent for individuals for calendar year 1968.

Q: Does this mean that I must pay 7 1/2 per cent more of my income in 1968?


A: No, it means that your normal 1968 tax will be increased by 7 1/2 per cent. There is a difference. For example, a single person with no dependents making \$2,100 in 1968 would have owned \$350 before the tax increase. The new tax will now be \$376.



Below are the runnerup teams in Little League this year. From top are the Yankees, who placed second; the Cardinals of Colmesonell, the Tigers, and the Red Sox.



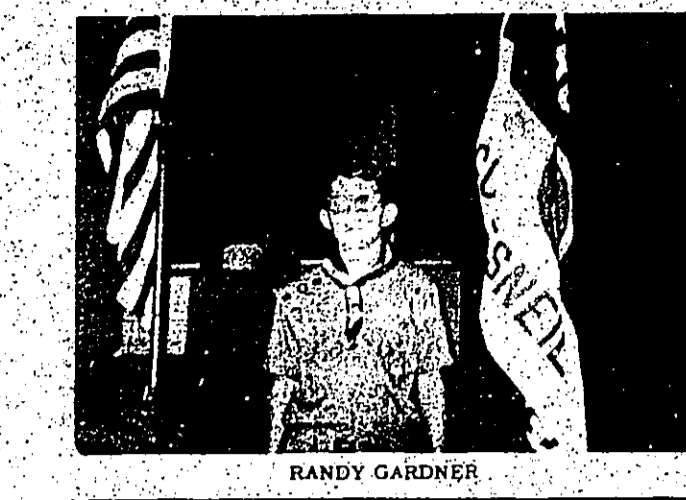

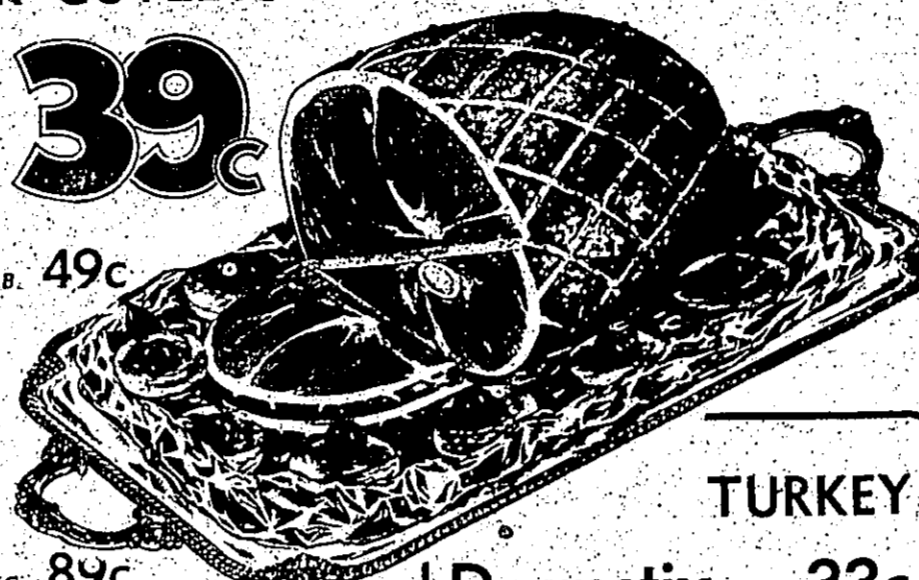
